THE POLITICAL POT.

The meeting of the Republicans last evening was as well attended as any circus in town will always be. The speeches were dull and the men hired to carry torches were glad that their pay was forthcoming.

There are Republicans here who cannot yet realize that the whole ticket of their party will be defeated.

From the headquarters money are sent out indiscriminately. Rumor has it that every man promising to vote the Republican ticket is given \$2 in cash with a promise of \$8 if the precinct in which he votes is carried. We advise our friends to take the two dollars and try to get onto the \$8 before election day. After election day the missionary gang, now calling themselves Republicans has never met a promise made before election, even if it was made in black and white.

Sam Parker made a speech; of course the managers of the sugar trusts are bound to have poor Sam speaking although he knows that he is politically dead and that in spite of his eloquence he cannot be elected. But read the speech of this chum of McKinley, Cecil Brown and Achi and judge as to his ability to guard Hawaii's interests in Washington. Mr. Parker said, according to his newspaper:

"Ladies and Fellow-citizens" On the 6th of November I predict a great victory for the Republican party. When we receive the first news from the mother country after that date it will be that McKinley is elected President and Roosevelt, the Cowboy of New York, is elected vice President (loud cheers.) I will also venture to predict that the cowboy of Hawaii will be chosen Delegate to Congress from Hawaii (again the cheering) and that the Senators and Representatives nominated by the Republican party will be elected to the legislature of Hawaii.

Some of you may ask. Why do you predict these things? All I can do is to look about at this great concourse of people gathered together (not brought here by a luau on the side) and it assures me that success is coming for Republicanism in Hawaii.

The Republican party is what I call the clean party of Hawaii. It is not like the Democratic party of the Mainland, with its Tammany Hall, nor is it like the Democratic party of Hawaii. A few weeks ago I left our beautiful city for the island of Hawaii. When I landed at Mahukona what did I hear? That the Republican party was accused by the Democrats as well as by the Independents, first, of being the missionary party, second, that they were land-grabbers, third, that they stole the land from the Hawaiians, and, fourth, that it was headed by a

cowboy. Ladies and gentlemen, I was born a cowboy and it's not my fault. [Laughter and cheers.] I own a few cattle, I admit, and also a few sheep, and I am not ashamed of it. The Democrats, headed by McClanahan, say that I am the cause of the increase in the price of beef. I only wish I owned more cattle, and then perhaps they could not accuse me of causing this increase in the price of meat.

I am proud to stand before you as your candidate for Congress and to say that with your assistance not only of the voters but of the ladies, I think I shall be elected. As we have heard from the distinguished Captain Baker of the transport Grant, the Republican party is the only party in the United States and I am proud that I am its candidate in Hawaii. It was not my fault that I am a candidate, for I did not seek the honor, but it has been given me, and when it comes to the ballots I believe that I shall be elected by the votes of both Democrats and Republicans.

Prince David is a personal friend of mine. Sometimes he calls me 'Papa,' sometimes he calls me his chum. We have been in Washington together and his friends are my friends. But I should advise him to wait until Bryan is elected. Then I promise him to give up my seat to him. I say that I will resign my seat if Bryan is elected, but I don't think there is any danger of that, for I have received some very cheering news from the Mainland today, and I have a strong string tied to that sea, and that is why I am so bold.

There is no doubt of the success of the Republican party on the Mainland, and I do not believe that there is any more doubt of the success of that party in the Hawaiian Isles."

As a ladies' man Colonel Parker is undoubtedly a success; as a political prophet he may yet have something to learn.

The Democratic meeting at Waialua last night was highly satisfactory to the speakers from Honolulu who addressed the voters. It had been stated that the Republicans were a "sure" thing in Waialua. When J. O. Carter appeared he was greeted with a most flattering ovation. When at the meeting in the evening he produced the small-pox emblem of the Republicans with their stolen inscription, the motto of Kamehameha, and in scathing terms denounced the use of the word Righteousness by the P. G. crowd, he was hailed with a storm of cheers.

An Independent meeting was held at the same time attended by fourteen men and twenty-two women while all the voters of the District listened to the eloquent words of J. O. Carter and E. C. Macfarlane, who was greeted as an old staunch friend. The speeches by McClanahan and John Wise were loudly applauded and the strongest henchman of Colonel Iaukea whispered to a friend at the closing of the meeting: "They have got us this time sure;" and the answer came brief and to the point: "You bet your life, Archie!" We don't know who "Archie" is. This afternoon J. O. Carter and E. C. Macfarlane, who returned by the morning train to the city, will go to Laie, where they will meet McClanahan and Wise and where addresses will be made.

The Republicans on Hawaii concede that Prince David will pull a stronger vote than Sam Parker and that Palmer Woods, one of the Democratic candidates for senator is a sure thing. The Maui reports from Republican sources are that Ben Lyons, Tom Clark and Kaue are sure things for senators and that Baldwin and Cornwell have a toss up for the fourth place on the senatorial ticket. If the voters of Maui know their business they will send Cornwell to Honolulu and keep Baldwin at home to look after his big interests and numerous charities.

O Oahu it is easy to predict the results of the election. As it is easy, we will not devote any space at present to our sure thing prophecies.

Kaula is a peculiar island politically speaking and we admit our inability to do the forecasting business for the Garden Island.

The island of Molokini is a "sure" thing. The Independents will win out there hands down, and Wilcox will be invited to sing his political swan song from the top of that pretty but not over inhabited part of Uncle Sam's domain.

It is reported by a certain henchman of the Republican party that J. K. Pa'ele, one of the nominees of the Independent party for representative, stated publicly yesterday at Koloau that he had been approached by J. K. Kaula, an Independent leader, to withdraw in favor of John Emmeluth and was offered \$100 so to do.

There will be some fine horse racing on Thanksgiving Day. More than thirty horses are in training now for the event.

The Zalandia with the Shriners on board left last evening for San Francisco. The Shriners were well-pleased with their reception here. They understood that our weather man was off on a vacation.

Judge Humphreys has decided not to summon a grand jury for the November term of the Circuit Court owing to the depleted condition of the public treasury. And some Kimalo promoters heaved a sigh of relief.

Lionel was sporting a 10 x 12 chrysanthemum in his button hole this morning besides the latest in the line of collars and the brightest of neckwear of the daintiest design. The chrysanthemum was evidently borrowed from the ice chest of a steamer. Who wouldn't be the iceman when the young athletic ball player hangs out his curled chrysanthemum sign.

News came by the Queen of the death in Chicago in October of Mrs. Sarah K. Lyman, wife of Dr. Henry M. Lyman, at the family home, on Ashland boulevard. Mrs. Lyman was well known in Honolulu. She was a sister of Mrs. C. T. Gulick of this city and of Mrs. Severance and Mrs. Austin of Hilo. Dr. Lyman's father was the founder of the Boys' Boarding School at Hilo.

Dr. Pratt Scored.

Judge Wilcox has recently been annoyed by remarks made at meetings of the Board of Health and repeated in the press in regard to the alleged impossibility of getting a conviction in the District Court against parties violating the rules of the Board of Health.

At a meeting of the Board Dr. Pratt stated that it was useless for him to take any case into the District Court as he could not obtain a conviction. This morning Judge Wilcox had an opportunity to "answer back" and from the Bench he made it known that nine out of ten cases arising from violation of Board of Health rules had been thrown out of Court by a nolle pro. being entered, which as a matter of fact ends a case as far as the Magistrate is concerned. The cases which had been tried had resulted in a conviction, and under the circumstances he considered a piece of unblushing cheek and effrontery of Dr. Pratt to have made the statement published and casting a reflection on the integrity of the Court. His Honor said that what Dr. Pratt had said he would stamp, from the Bench, with a word which it takes only three letters to spell. The Republican interpreter who has the task of turning Achi's speeches into Hawaiian and English told our reporter confidently that the word referred to by the Judge spells i. i. e. Dr. Pratt will probably understand the meaning of the word.

No Successor to Huntington Chosen.

New York, Oct. 16—Charles H. Tweed, chairman of the board of directors of the Southern Pacific Railroad, said to-day that all rumors relative to the appointment of a successor to the presidency of the committee were simply haphazard guesses. He said:

"I don't think anything will be done this week as to appointing a successor to the late Mr. Huntington. It is not wise to predict what may occur a week hence and I am not in a position to say whether the President of the United States or the president of our company will be chosen first."

Probably we had something to do with that special paragraph which does not appear in other territorial acts, but no other territory had a "family compact" to deal with.

Mr. Allan Herbert deserves the credit of the public in his having entered a protest to the Federal officials in regards to the disposal of certain water rights at Wahiawa on this island which has been contemplated by the Territorial officials and which would seriously injure the preservation of the forests in that district. Mr. Herbert has for years taken an active interest in our forests, and will of course vote for Sam Parker whose cattle have destroyed the forest on Mauna Kea.

A correspondent asks us whether Government beneficiaries should be allowed to "whoop up" any political meeting. We certainly say that it is very poor form for an official to be a soldier or a clerk or in any other subordinate position to take an active part in a political campaign. Soldiers and clerks evidently don't remember that any active part they may take in the present political campaign may act as a boomerang. The clerks who are spouting for the Republicans can hardly expect to keep their positions or their present salaries under a Democratic-Independent Legislature.

The National Guard of Hawaii is not a political body and the appearance of men belonging to the militia in political parades should not be construed as showing the political feelings and affiliations of the Guard as a body—No member of the Guard is obliged to carry torches except he chooses to do so as far as the military headquarters are concerned. If we remember rightly the Colonel of the N. G. H. is an ardent Republican; the Lieutenant-Colonel, is chairman of the Democratic committee. One major is an active worker among the Republicans and the other is a candidate on the Democratic ticket. The Captains—well they are of course mostly Democrats. We mention this because an erroneous impression has gone forth since Captain Nahora Hipa accepted the job from the Republicans to have his men carry torches at so much per parade. When reference is made to Companies A, B, C, etc., it means companies of the so-called marching clubs but not the companies of the N. G. H.

Will Succeed Baron Russell.

London, Oct. 16.—It is officially announced that Lord Alverstone, better known as Sir Richard Webster, has been appointed Lord Chief Justice of England in succession to the late Baron Russell of Killowen. Justice A. L. Smith succeeds Lord Alverstone as master of the rolls.
