THE CENSUS.

Our readers are aware that the regular census of this country, required by law to be taken every six years, is to come off during the present month. Owing to the unexpected failure of the Legislature to pass the bill reorganizing this branch of the public service, the work was thrown back upon the Board of Education, in whose charge it has been for the past twenty five or thirty years, with very inadequate time for preparation.

The retrospect of the past year is ample and shows the spirit of advance and security developed since 1887. Other articles and notices particularly that of the Hawaiian band are very interesting. The history of land titles in the Kingdom from the ancient system to the present day prepared by Hon. W. D. Alexander is both interesting and instructive.

The book is badly indexed, the table of contents being arranged by the pages instead of the subject. Thus if one wants information on postal matters for instance, one has no alphabetical guidance. "Comparative" tables appear in three different parts of the table. "Hawaiian" on four, "Table" or "Tables" appears on the first or second word of a heading in half a dozen different places.

or district judge for refusal to answer questions or furnish the information required by the census man. The census will include all persons stopping at the particular house, premise or place on the Sunday night in question. It includes not only those residing but those who are present at the time. Persons at sea, passengers and crews of vessels in transit among the islands will be returned by the captains or pursers of the vessels. Inmates of jails, hospitals, boarding schools, hotels and lodging-houses, may be returned on blanks furnished in advance to the persons in charge of such establishments.

HAWAIIAN ALMANAC AND ANNUAL FOR 1891.

We have received a copy of The Hawaiian Almanac and Annual for 1891 and are pleased to find that Honolulu itself is larger, more comprehensive, more convenient and more ornamental than in any previous year.

Foremost among the new features of our old companion is a lithographed map of Honolulu showing in different colors the fire wards and election wards of the city with the principal buildings and fire engine stations marked out. Another novelty is the representation in colors of the house flags of the various foreign and inter-island lines of sailing and steam vessels trading regularly to or amongst these islands.

For the use of historians and politicians the list of all Cabinet Ministers who have held offices in the Hawaiian Kingdom from Dr. G. P. Judd under Kamehameha III. in 1842 to the present Ministry, will be valuable, more especially to those who know something of the occasions of the many changes in the present reign. These are all grouped primarily as under each king, secondarily as in each year, from which we learn that from the accession of King Kalakaua in February, 1874, to the present date no less than seventy Cabinet commissions, acting, interim or positive have been signed or about four and a half changes per annum, including the names of some of the worst as well as many of the best men who ever held office in these islands.

A similarly arranged table of the occupants of the Supreme Bench is given from Chief Justice Hon. Wm. L. Lee in January, 1843, to the present bench. Owing to the arrangement however the Supreme Court of five Judges, or indeed its present status of four Judges, is not to be found without trouble and comparison of date.

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Hawaiian Hotel Dinner. The Christmas dinner at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel Wednesday evening was a splendid affair. The bill of fare was of the most tempting nature, and included many delicacies, cooked as only they can cook at this well known hostelry. The dining room was prettily decorated with leis, flowers and evergreens and bouquets of flowers stood on all the tables. Steward P. M. Lucas was very courteous and attentive to the guests, and is to be congratulated on the success of his Christmas dinner of 1890.

Postmaster Backus calls the attention of the public to the fact that the practice of mailing letters on board ocean-going steamers, particularly those for Australia and China, at the last moment before sailing, is prohibited by regulations of the Post-office Department, unless the following conditions are complied with:

Letters mailed in such a way without passing through the post-office first must either relate to the cargo of the vessel upon which they are placed, or they must be enclosed in United States stamped envelopes of a denomination sufficient to pay the legal rates of postage.—Alta.

A PACIFIC CABLE.

Senator Mitchell of Oregon has introduced a bill to advance the scheme for laying a cable to connect this coast with Hawaii, Samoa, New Zealand and Australia. We are not informed as to the details of the measure, but it is fair to assume that Senator Mitchell has drawn it with his accustomed exactness and that he will push it with his accustomed energy.

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

The Court Calendar for the January Term appears on the first page. J. Ludvigmeier advertises in this issue as a house and decorative painter.

The Hawaiian Band will give a concert at the Hawaiian Hotel this evening. The special meeting of the Board of Health was postponed from Wednesday till this afternoon.

A handsome paperweight and calendar combined, from Hollister & Co., ornaments our local desk. Up to 1 a.m. this morning there were no signs of the S. S. China from San Francisco.

The Hawaiian Mission Children's Society meets Saturday, December 27th, at the residence of B. F. Dillingham. Quite a large number of people turned out to listen to the band playing in Emma Square yesterday afternoon.

It is reported that a native on Hawaii had parts of his hands and face injured from the explosion of giant powder used in fishing. One Chinaman was arrested for unlawfully having opium in his possession, and twelve cases of drunkenness completed the list on Christmas Day.

The S. S. Amigo is expected from San Francisco on December 31st, en route to Hongkong, and will take freight and passengers. Wm. G. Irwin & Co. are the Honolulu agents. Some of the visitors at Emma Square yesterday afternoon left impressions on some of the seats not likely to produce pleasant recollections—the coat of paint lately put on not being thoroughly dried.

Eight sailors from the British bark Girvan, with drums, accordions, fife, etc., paraded through the streets last evening, a large crowd following them. They were mistaken for converts of the Salvation Army man. The steamer Kilanea Hon arrived Wednesday noon from Hawaii. She reports that one of the Iwalian's boats was capsized off Honokaa, and six persons—one woman and five children—were drowned; the boat's crew saving themselves by swimming.

Christmas services were held Wednesday evening at the Chinese Mission Church; they consisted of recitations, songs, etc. A Christmas tree well laden with presents was an attractive feature, especially for the children. Over \$80 was expended for the Japanese tree. One hundred and twenty-two permits were issued to Chinamen returning to China per S. S. China. It's the largest number ever issued for one vessel. The whole number leaving are 173 Chinamen, three women and twelve children to Hongkong, and about forty Japanese to Yokohama.

A. Michael Drew, father of Captain E. P. Drew of the barkentine W. H. Dimond, died at his home at Hallowell, Maine, on December 12th. Captain Drew received the news of the sad occurrence on arrival here, and out of respect to the memory of his father, he placed the flag of his vessel at half-mast. Perhaps a more attractive dining room was difficult to find than that of the Hamilton House yesterday evening. It was beautifully decorated and foretold that the dinner was to be. A most substantial and delicious repast was served; in fact, there was so many good things that it was hard to choose from them.

The members of both the Kawaiahaeo and Kaunakapili Y. M. C. A. held a Christmas service at the Kaunakapili Church last evening, which was largely attended. After the service a splendid collation of ice cream and cakes were served. The evening was spent in a very pleasant manner, sociable chats being indulged in by both young and old.

Christmas Day is o'er, and there's no doubt many of the residents on the Islands have made a comparison of the day here with the same in their younger days in colder climates. Here nothing but a "green" Christmas can ever be expected, there's no "white" Christmas is often seen, and tho' surrounded by flowers and ever green vegetation, the hearts of many yearned to have a "white" holiday again, with its stirring air and delights not to be had in the tropics. Even if the recollections of such are only from boyhood's memory, they cling to us till the "head whitered by the snows of many a winter" is laid to rest.

CHRISTMAS SERVICES.

Special services were held in the Anglican and Roman Catholic Cathedrals yesterday in commemoration of the festival of Christmas. At St. Andrew's Cathedral the chancel was decorated with flowers and greenery, while on the altar table stood bouquets of white flowers. The Bishop's congregation opened the day by a service at 6:30 a.m. Holy Communion followed at 7:30 by the Second Congregation, a large number of communicants being present. The principal service of the day, however, was that at 11:15 a.m. by the Second Congregation. The church was crowded in every part, and the ladies and gentlemen constituting the choir rendered the special music with telling effect. A tenor solo in the anthem was masterly effort on the part of Mr. T. May. The pastor, Rev. Alex. Mackintosh, preached an able sermon from the text "Glory to God in the highest." Immense congregations were present at the early masses at the Roman Catholic Cathedral. At 10 a.m. there was Pontifical High Mass, the music, as it always is at this church, being a very special feature. It was exceedingly well rendered. Services were also held in the afternoon.

Director-General Davis of the World's Fair has completed the regulations to be sent to foreign countries with the President's proclamation. The rules are an epitome of the experience of the successful expositions of the past. The financial report of the directors will be ready soon, and all necessary documents will be sent to the President. A party of engineers are now surveying for a new bridge over the Niagara river, supposed to be for the Canadian Pacific. Thousands upon thousands of crisp, new \$10, \$5 and \$1 notes are about to be sent out by the United States Treasury. Foot ball clubs are so popular, and make so much money in England nowadays, that many of them are converted into joint stock companies.
