GEN. GOMEZ IS AN ALLY

Offers His Services to the President for Cuban Weal.

Will Use His Efforts in Securing Peaceful Disbanding of Cuban Insurgents and Distributing Pay Among Them.

Remedios, Province of Santa Clara, Feb. 1. (via Havana, Feb. 2.)—General Maximo Gomez, the commander in chief of the Cuban army places himself squarely in position today as an active ally of the United States government in the work of the reconstruction of Cuba.

As a result of the conference which Robert P. Porter, the special commissioner of President McKinley has had with General Gomez, the latter cabled to President McKinley this afternoon, assuring him of his cooperation in disbanding the Cuban army and in distributing among the Cuban soldiers the \$3,000,000 appropriated for the purpose of enabling them to return to their homes.

General Gomez also telegraphed to Major General Brooke, saying he would accept the latter's invitation to go to Havana.

SUGAR WAR IS DESPERATE

Efforts to Secure a Truce Are Without Avail.

Havemeyer Tells the Grocers They Can Buy Where They Please—Combine of Grocers of Middle West.

Chicago, Feb. 2.—A special to the Record from Detroit, Mich., says:

The committee of three Michigan wholesale grocers who went to New York for the purpose of making some arrangement by which the sugar war in this territory might be stopped has returned home empty handed. They said Mr. Havemeyer of the American Refining Company, would not enter into any sort of an agreement with Arbuckle Doscher et al., and that the Michigan jobbers could buy where they pleased.

When Messrs. Brace, Lemon and Sanger of the Michigan Wholesale Grocers' Association were in New York they met jobbers from other Western points and a plan is now on foot to organize a wholesale grocers' trust for the purpose of controlling the trade in the Middle West. A meeting will be held in Chicago, February 8th, to discuss the possibilities of such combine.

Cheap Atlantic Cables.

New York, Feb. 2.—The Western Union Telegraph Company and the Commercial Cable Company announces that from March 1st next the cable rate to points in Holland and Belgium, will be the same as to Great Britain, Germany and France, or 25 cents per word. This is a reduction of seven cents a word to Holland and five cents a word to Belgium.

NO GENERAL HAWAIIAN LEGISLATION.

It can be positively stated that there will be no general legislation relative to Hawaii at this session of Congress. The Peace Treaty will be ratified, thus preventing any probability of a special session of Congress being called.

This information comes from an official source direct from Washington. That the laws relating to shipping will be extended to Hawaii at this session seems highly probable, and the registry of foreign ship under the Hawaiian flag will be stopped. The fate of the tariff law is still in the balance.

Thus Hawaii will continue for another year under the administration of the Republic of Hawaii, which will necessitate the general legislative election next September.

SHAFTER WAS OFFENDED IN FAVOR OF THE TREATY

But Navy Say He Was Given Full Credit for His Action.

His Remarks About Securing of Hobson's Release Create Comment—Thought He Was Not Sufficiently Thanked.

New York, Feb. 2.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: While admitting that no formal tender of thanks were given to Gen. Shafter for accomplishing the exchange of Naval Constructor Hobson and the crew of the Merrimac, officials of the Navy department declare that proper credit has always been given to him for his action.

These declarations are in answer to Gen. Shafter's statement in his article in the current number of a monthly magazine, that "the fact that they were released by the army has never been acknowledged by officers of the navy who simply speak of Mr. Hobson's return to duty."

It is true so far as the public reports of Rear Admiral Sampson show that he did not refer to General Shafter or the army in effecting Hobson's release to the navy department. Friction between the army and navy commanders at Santiago was too evident to permit any commendatory reports of General Shafter's efforts to be made, but naval officers say the army never has always been given full credit for his act of humanity.

Resolution from Legislatures to the United States Senate.

Tilman Asks About Franchises Granted—Spooner Explains His Position on the Treaty Ratification.

Washington, Feb. 3.—Mr. Platt of New York laid before the Senate the resolutions adopted by the Legislature of New York, urging the immediate ratification of the treaty. In this connection Mr. Chandler, of New Hampshire called the attention of Senators to similar resolution adopted by the legislature of New Hampshire.

Mr. Aldrich, of Rhode Island, presented a number of memorials from business men's associations of Boston, New York and Chicago urging that the territory except Cuba acquired by the United States during the late war be retained "until such time as Congress may determine its final disposition."

Mr. Tiltman, of South Carolina, offered the following resolution which was adopted:

That the President be requested if not incompatible with the public interest, to inform the Senate whether any franchises or concessions of any character are being or have been granted by any municipality in Cuba or Porto Rico since the military occupation thereof by the United States; if so, what they are, for what length of time and the authority by which they have been granted.

At the conclusion of the morning business, Mr. Spooner, of Wisconsin, addressed the Senate upon the Vest anti-expansion resolution. In defining after a brief statement of his reasons for speaking at all, he said:

"I find no objections, constitutional in nature, to the ratification of the pending treaty. The Senators from Connecticut (Platt) and Colorado (Teller) have fully presented the view I entertain."

Franciscan Sisters for Molokai.

Syracuse, N. Y. January 26.—Two sisters of the order of St. Francis, Sister Flaviana and Sister Bonaventure, left this city tonight to join the leper colony in the Hawaiian islands. Twelve sisters of St. Francis have already gone from this city to the leper colony. The order has made this an important branch of its missionary work, to which it was the first to offer its services, but those who go are volunteers. There is no compulsion, and the act is one of pure self sacrifice. The family of one of them lives in this city, the other in Louisville, Ky. Both families are heartbroken, but will put no obstacles in the way.

GEN. MILES SPEAKS AGAIN

Gives a Statement to be Taken Authoritatively.

Mass of Facts and Affidavits—Complaints from All Parts of the Country—More Radical Than Ever.

New York, January 31.—General Nelson A. Miles gave out a statement tonight, after denying several published interviews attributed to him. He prefaced his statement by saying:

"I have been most freely quoted without authority from me or without any utterance on my part. It has been a source of great annoyance to me."

His statement is as follows: "On the 20th of last September I issued an order to regimental commanders to report to me concerning the beef which had been issued to their men. At the time that I went before the War Investigating Commission I had only received reports from fourteen of the commanders. Now I have thirty reports. They all tell the same story.

"The evidence proves the truth of the statements I have made. In addition to the report of the regimental commanders, I have a great mass of evidence consisting of communications, affidavits, etc., from officers, soldiers and civilians. Every part of the country has contributed to the mass of correspondence which I have received in reference to the beef served to our soldiers and the evidence is all corroborated of what I have said. The great publicity which the press has given to the matter has brought all the correspondence of which I speak upon me.

"I have overwhelming evidence that the embalmed beef was treated with chemicals in order to preserve it. I have affidavits from men who saw the beef undergoing the treatment or embalming process.

"Now, as to the canned roast beef, that was different from embalmed beef. The canned roast beef was the beef after the extract had been boiled out of it. You have seen the advertisements 'beef extract; one pound contains the substance of from four to five pounds of prime beef.' Well, this is the beef after the extract has been taken from it. They put this beef pulp up in cans and label it 'Canned Roast Beef.' The soldiers report that the canned beef was nauseating. If swallowed it could not be kept on the stomach."

NO DECISION YET.

Inspector Joshua K. Brown was disappointed in the expectation of getting advices from Washington, in the Rio de Janeiro's mail, regarding the disposal of the Chinese refused admission to the islands on Hawaiian return permits. The only reason that can be given for the delay is that other matters deemed more important to the Nation are pressing upon the Executive for settlement.

"Konghi Patchoy!"

The doors of all the Chinese shops are closed today and the Chinamen are celebrating the event of the New Year. Business men of the city were around calling on their Chinese friends today. They received the greatest of courtesy on all sides.

A Gruesome Sight.

On the fishmarket wharf is a very gruesome sight. A hundred coffins for the soldiers buried here, the intention being to ship the remains back to the States. There are three hundred more in the Senator for Manila.

Buffalo at Manila.

Washington, Feb. 2.—The Buffalo arrived at Manila today, having made a record-breaking run from New York to Manila in 54 days. She has aboard about 700 sailors to relieve men in Dewey's fleet, whose time has expired.

She will be used as a regular transport for men and naval stores, making regular trips between Manila and San Francisco every three months.

Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 2.—The only features of the Senatorial ballot today was the gain of another vote for Thompson and the loss of two by Reese to Hayward. The vote was: Allen, (Pop.) 57; Hayward, 35; Webster, 10; Thompson, 9; Field, 4; Wooton, 4; Reese, 1; Foss, 1; Adams, 1; Hinshaw, 1; Lambertson, 1; Cornish, 1; Van Duser, 1. Total 126; necessary to a choice 64.

More Regulars for Manila.

St. Louis, February 1.—Colonel J. P. Smith, commanding the Thirteenth Infantry at Jefferson Barracks, today received telegraph instructions from Washington to sail on February 9th for Manila. This will necessitate an early start from here for New York, where the regiment will embark.

Stanford Captain Dies.

Stanford University, Jan. 25.—George M. Beckett, captain of the Stanford baseball nine, died at 3:05 o'clock this morning in Episcopal hall after an illness of a week. The immediate cause of death was heart failure, resulted from complications following appendicitis.

Censorship More Strict.

New York, January 28.—The Commercial Cable Company today issued the following notice: "We have been advised by the American authorities at Manila that private telegrams in secret language cannot be accepted from and to the Philippine islands."

K. of P. Supreme Tribunal.

Indianapolis, Feb. 2.—The Supreme Tribunal of the Knights of Pythias met at noon today. The only case of importance was that of Henry Wellenbos, who appeared to show why his name should not be stricken from the lodge records. The tribunal expects to adjourn tomorrow.

LAST EARTHLY HONORS
Funeral of Hon. Hermann A. Widemann
 Yesterday Afternoon.
 Great Concourse of Representative People of
 Honolulu—Full Account of Services
 and Special Music.

All of the principal stores were
 closed yesterday afternoon in re-
 spect to the funeral of Judge
 Widemann. At 3:30 o'clock the
 Catholic cathedral was crowded
 to the doors, and a cosmopolitan
 throng stood in the yard and ad-
 jacent streets. In the front pews

 Accompanying the hearse from
 the house was a platoon of police
 as body bearers. Marshal Brown
 and Senior Captain Parker at-
 tended in full uniform. A moun-
 ted patrolman was present to regu-
 late vehicles.
 The casket was borne up the
 aisle, attended by the pall bearers
 who, as announced in yesterday's
 issue, were: Minister S M Damon,
 August Ahrens, Godfrey Brown,
 Justice W A Whiting, B F Dil-
 lingham, J F Hackfeld, F A
 Schaefer, Dr McKibbin, H Focke,
 Dr Miner, S C Allen and Senator
 G N Wilcox.
 It was what is technically called
 a black cloth draped casket,
 with silver handles running
 lengthwise. The name plate was
 inscribed thus: "Hermann A.
 Widemann; Born Hildesheim,
 Germany, December 24, 1822;
 Died Honolulu, H. I., February
 7, 1899."
 The Bishop of Panopolis, who
 conducted the services, had held a

levee du corps at the house just
 before the body was removed
 thence. His lordship now met
 the body at the main entrance,
 where he was awaited by an es-
 cort of acolytes bearing tall
 candles, holy water and incense.
 Beautiful ilima leis nearly
 hid the lid of the casket,
 but, on this being laid on the
 bier, were immediately cov-
 ered with a pall.
 Following the body were the
 chief mourners, viz: Mrs Wide-
 mann, leaning on the arm of her
 eldest son, Carl A Widemann;
 Mrs O Berger and Miss Unna
 Widemann, Mr and Mrs H R
 Macfarlane, Mr and Mrs F W
 Macfarlane, Mr and Mrs J M
 Dowsett, Mr and Mrs W Lanz,
 Mr and Mrs Chris Conradt. Her-
 mann, the youngest son, is in
 San Francisco.

Bishop Gulstan was assisted in
 rendering the Libera by Fathers
 Matthias and Clement, and Dea-
 cons Aloys and Julian. As the
 body was being carried up the
 aisle, Father Valentin and the
 choir sang the Meseremini to the
 leader's own accompaniment on
 the organ. During the service at
 the bier soft Gregorian music was
 played. While the body was being
 slowly borne to the hearse, the
 English song, "Jesus, Be His Rest
 Eternal," by Rosewig was
 given beautifully. It is a re-
 markably fine composition, and its
 rendering on this occasion caused
 many admiring comments amongst
 the concourse.

Interment was in the Wide-
 mann plot at Nuanu cemetery.
 The procession was a very long
 one. It was headed by the police
 guard of honor. Ed. A. Williams
 the undertaker had four black
 horses, caparisoned in black net-
 ting, to draw the hearse. Chas.
 H. Bellina, manager of the
 Club stables, was the driver.
 Owing to the desire in the dead
 man's will for a simple funeral,
 the Government band only met
 the cortege at the grave. There,
 while the Bishop rendered the
 regular service, the band softly
 played "The Sweet Bye and Bye."
 Immediately about the grave am-
 ple space was kept clear for the
 clergy and the mourners, which
 was a decided reform compared
 with the crush that sometimes
 creates most unseasonable annoy-
 ance.

When the last narrow bed of
 the departed was filled up with
 mother earth, the mound was
 densely covered with the emble-
 matic designs and other floral
 tokens. Conspicuous among these
 were the Hawaiian flag veined in
 natural colors by Mrs. W. Luther
 Wilcox, a massive cross from the
 Hawaiian Bar and "Gates Ajar"
 given by Mrs. E. D. Tenney.

AFTER ISLAND TRADE.
Fleet of American Vessels Bound for
Hawaiian Ports.
 San Francisco, January 29.—
 American shipping to the Ha-
 waiian Islands has rapidly in-
 creased since the annexation of
 the little mid-Pacific republic to
 the territory of the United States.
 There are now loading for or on
 the way to the islands fifty ves-
 sels, of which thirty-five fly the
 American flag, five the British,
 three the Norwegian and two the
 German. The vessels aggregate
 in all \$50,000 tons and they hail
 from New York, Baltimore, Nor-
 folk, Calita Buena, Hongkong,
 Iquiqui, London, Liverpool, New-
 castle, N. S. W., Santa Rosalia,
 Westport, N. Z., and Yokohama.
 The vessels from Newcastle are
 loaded with coal. Those from the
 Chilean ports are in ballast and
 are in ballast and are after sugar
 cargoes, but all the others carry
 their holds full of general mer-
 chandise.

U. S. TRANSPORT SENATOR.

Says He Committed no Crime.
 N. P. Plunkett, arrested here sometime ago on the charge of gross cheat is quoted as follows in the San Francisco Chronicle: "It is not true that I had no account at Bishop & Co.'s bank. I had an account at that bank running to nearly \$1000, and the matter was simply an overdraft, such as is liable to occur to any one. Prior to December 1st, I had had an account at that bank running up to \$505, and on December 8th I deposited at the bank a draft on the California Bank for \$300. I left Honolulu September 21st for San Francisco, and at that time had over-drawn my account \$105 unknowingly. I had not been notified of the overdraft up to the time of my departure. The notice of overdraft did not reach me until January 15th, for the reason that I left there the latter part of September, and that before it reached me here I was on my way back. When I deposited the draft for \$300 in December I knew nothing of the overdraft and supposed I had the full amount to draw from. After I had drawn to the amount of the balance a check given to Pete Balana was returned to him marked 'No funds,' and he had me arrested. On explanation by the people at the bank and by myself I was released. The charge against H. F. Soper has also been dismissed on settlement of the amount involved."
 It will be remembered that both Plunkett and Soper were found guilty of the charge and sentence was suspended one month by Judge Wilcox, with the understanding that both young men leave the town within that time.

TWO JURIES SITTING.

Exceptions to Various Rulings.—A Confession of Judgment. Maramoto alias Maida is on trial before Judge Stanley, by the following jury: I. A. Burgett, C. H. Clapp, J. Schnack, A. B. Wood, J. L. McLean, Louis Marks, D. T. Bailey, Wm. Savidge, D. F. Thrum, T. S. Douglas, C. Du Roi and W. E. Brown. E. P. Dole and A. L. C. Atkinson for prosecution; J. T. De Bolt for defendant. The prosecution rested at 11:18, when the court took recess until 1:30.

Argument takes place this afternoon, before Judge Perry, in the malicious prosecution case of Roche vs. Dickey.

Judge Stanley this morning granted a motion argued by Mr. Silliman to strike from the calendar the case of Allen & Robinson vs. G. W. Lincoln and H. E. Cooper. Exceptions were noted by Mr. Ballou for plaintiff.

J. Alfred Magoon has accepted to the order of Judge Perry, denying his motion that Anastasia N. A. Olds be compelled to elect between one of the stated causes of action in her complaint against him for unprofessional conduct.

H. E. Cooper by his attorneys, Magoon & Silliman, has excepted to Judge Perry's overruling of his objection, and protest to the issuance of execution in J. A. Hopper's suit against G. W. Lincoln and himself.

An order to show cause has been made on the application of Victoria S. Ellis, administratrix of the estate of Nancy S. Ellis, deceased, to sell real estate and pay debts.

Confession of judgment has been made by John K. Sumner in favor of Mary Porter, administratrix, for \$1000, interest of \$350 and costs of \$52.75, in all \$1402.75, payment to be made within six months and execution not to issue within that time.

From Commissioner Frear. Most of the session of the Executive Council this morning was devoted to a consideration of matter from Washington.

This consisted of the Hawaiian government bill before Congress, with the report thereon of the House committee.

Few and slight were found the changes made by the committee, of which the press dispatches have already made the public acquainted.

Commissioner Frear writes the Government, expressing a strong hope that the Hawaiian bill will be passed this session.

How to Prepare Codfish Toast.

Half a pound of cold cod, 1 1/2 ounces butter, three eggs, three tablespoons milk or cream, a half teaspoon lemon juice, three rounds of buttered toast, salt, pepper. Separate the fish into small pieces, free from skin and bone. Beat the eggs to a light froth. Add to them the fish, milk, lemon juice and seasoning. Mix well. Melt the butter in a clean, bright pan. When it bubbles, pour in the eggs, etc. Stir with a wooden spoon over a slow fire till the mixture is soft and creamy. Take it off at once and heap upon the buttered toast, which must be very hot. Serve at once.

How to Make Picked Codfish.

Pick the fish into flakes and wash repeatedly until it is no longer salt, then put it into a pan of cold water and let it come gradually to the boiling point. It must remain this way for at least 20 minutes, and it is important to remember that the water should not really boil. An excellent sauce is made by measuring a pint of rich milk for each pint of codfish and stirring into it a tablespoonful of flour which has previously been mixed in an equal measure of butter. The sauce must simmer slowly, the bubbles rising only at the sides. When the water on the fish is at just allowed to boil, turn it off and put the drained fish into the cream sauce. Let it boil up for two minutes, then draw it to the back of the stove. Season with a little white pepper and add two eggs which have been previously beaten with a little of the hot cream sauce. The cod may stand in the sauce for three or four minutes, but it must not boil. Prepare three delicate slices of brown toast, lay them on a hot platter and pour the picked cod over. Three tablespoonsful of cream, stirred in when the eggs are beaten, will be found to be an improvement.
