The date for the coronation of the Czar of Russia is rapidly drawing nigh; and the condition of Moscow, even at the present time, is suggestive of the cordial feeling of the inhabitants, and of the enthusiastic loyalty which will, later, be demonstrated in the presence of the Emperor of all the Russias. Seventy-five thousand picked troops now garrison the city—merely, of course, to add to the splendor of the welcoming spectacle; and the detective force has been so increased, that even the man who chops your wood for a square meal and a pannikin of vodka is, in nine cases out of ten, a member of the very plain clothes constabulary. The triumphal arches will be composed exclusively of *chevaux-de-frise* and bayonet stacks—which will have a pretty effect in the sunshine; and while the coronation ceremonial takes place, and the central figure is bombarded by an enthusiastic populace, Alexander the Second will be awaiting the issue of events in a friendly suburban coal-cellar. We have also learned that three months prior to the coronial (yes, coronial's the word) ceremony, such is the confidence of His Majesty in the affection of his subjects that he always puts on in the morning a suit of clothes laid out for somebody else, and before going to bed sneaks down in the kitchen and bribes the cook with a kopeck or two to change sleeping apartments until the morning. Things, however, are much quieter than they used to be. A sawdust-stuffed effigy placed in a chair in what is popularly considered to be the Emperor's private garden, was found last week to have received, after one whole morning's exhibition, only five slugs in the region of the heart; whereas a month ago, after reclining in the Czar's favorite attitude for half an hour, there was a rattle and a crash in the air, and all that was left of the figure was a helmet spike, half an eye-glass, and the order of the Iron Crown. And yet the whole time the misguided Nihilists were pounding away at the effigy, the original was administering the government of his Empire—in the drain.

The Late Mrs. G. Lucas.

It became our painful duty, in our last issue, to announce the demise of Mrs. Lucas, wife of Mr. George Lucas, proprietor of the Honolulu Planing Mills. Mrs. Lucas was a native of Ireland, and came to Honolulu, along with her husband, twenty-six years ago. From the time of her first landing until recently she had never been out of the country—indeed, had scarcely been outside of Honolulu. She came here a young woman, here most of her offspring were born to her, and here she nurtured and brought up a family of seven children—six sons and one daughter.

For a considerable period past she had been in failing health, and went on a visit to California, about two months ago, valiantly hoping for improvement. There she became gradually worse, and left for home, in a weak condition, by the D. C. Murray, on Sept. 16. She continued to decline until Oct. 4, when, within sight of land and near to home and loved ones, she ceased to breathe the breath that is mortal, and her spirit passed into the unseen land beyond. Her husband and her little son Albert were with her during her suffering, and did all in their power to comfort and soothe.

At the time of her death the D. C. Murray was becalmed off the east end of this island. Capt. Jenks kindly sent a boat ashore to Mr. Cummings' Plantation, with a request to telephone to Honolulu. The steamer Waimanalo was at once dispatched from here to tow the vessel around to port, where she arrived shortly after dark the same evening. The deceased was then removed to her late residence in Kulihi Place.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon, and was largely attended by all classes of the community. The procession started from the family residence, led by the Rev. Dr. Damon. The hearse came next, containing the coffin covered with beautiful floral wreaths, the love offerings of sad hearts and kind hands. Then followed the mourning carriages with the relatives of the deceased. After these about eighty other vehicles and a great many pedestrians fell into line. The procession proceeded to Nuuanu Cemetery, the place of interment. Besides the regular burial service, which was feelingly and impressively recited by Dr. Damon, several sacred pieces appropriate to the occasion were sung by friends.

Thus, at the comparatively early age of 52, has ended the earthly pilgrimage of a true woman. We speak from personal knowledge when we say that Mrs. Lucas was a de-

voted wife, a fond mother, and a sympathetic friend. We knew her as a plain, patient, unostentatious, even-minded, true-hearted woman, who never had an unkind word to say of others, and whose single concern and sole happiness were inseparably associated with her family and her home. It is no misrepresentation nor exaggeration to say that she was most esteemed and loved by those who knew her best and longest.

We furnish the following Postal statistics by the courtesy of the Post Office Department. For the quarter ending Sept. 30th: Foreign letters received, 22,044; foreign letters forwarded, 27,196. Received from San Francisco, per s.s. Australia, 4,504 letters; despatched inter-island letters, Monday, 1,201; Tuesday, 4,245.

CONSIDERABLE has been said from time to time in our columns relative to Artesian Well boring in this Kingdom, and out of the many wells that have been sunk few have failed to offer up the material flow. During the past four months Mr. John Ashley, (well-known in conjunction with Mr. Fessler in the many wells they have sunk together), has been boring artesian wells at Waialua, and has sunk two for Mr. Silva and two for Mr. Mendosa on their ranches in that district. These wells are 400 feet deep and water raises 20 feet 6 inches above the level of the sea from each of them. Mr. Silva is intending to sink from 15 to 20 more wells on his immense ranches through Waialua, and has sent East for a complete rig to perform the works. Mr. Ashley is still boring away on two more contracts for Mr. Silva, and the people in the neighborhood praise the name of John Ashley and the owners Messrs. Silva and Mendosa, are highly satisfied with the success attained by this thoroughly qualified artisan.

THE "little bill" which the War Office will have to meet on account of the bombardment of Alexandria will be almost as mighty as the 81 ton gun himself. 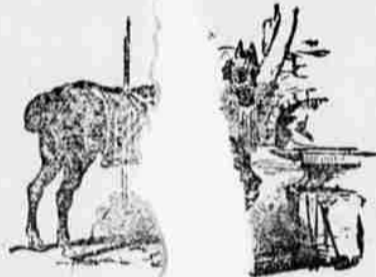

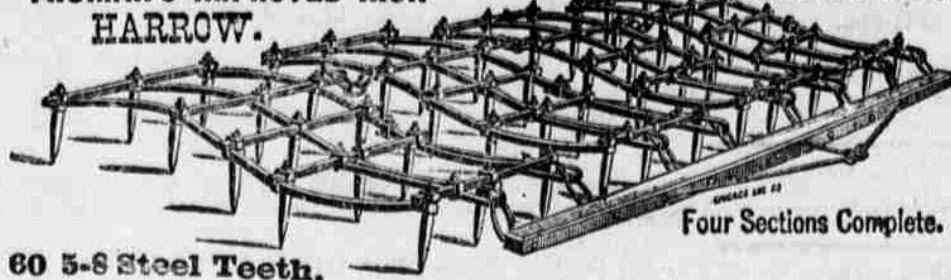
