THE EVENING STAR, which has faithfully twinkled o'er Honolulu for many years, will pass out of existence on July 1st.

We are told that the 4th. of July celebration at the Kukulolono park will include public speaking, base ball, fireworks and so 4th.

Those responsible for the present condition of the crossing near the McBryde Store will confer a great favor upon the traveling public by putting it in better condition.

COMPLAINTS have reached this office in regard to riding horses on the sidewalk between the butcher shop and THE GARDEN ISLAND office. This is mere thoughtlessness upon the part of those who do so, and once it is called to their attention, it is doubtful if they will repeat the practice.

L. D. TIMMONS, one of Honolulu's veteran newspaper men, and for more than a year manager of the Hawaiian Star, has resigned, his resignation to take effect July 1st. Tim is one of the most capable men in the service and his brother fellow-men deeply regret his leaving and wish him unbounded success in whatever line he decides to embark.

THE GARDEN ISLAND received notice last week from the wholesale paper houses, announcing another advance of from 10 to 20 per cent in the price of all kinds of paper used in the commercial world. And yet the fool newspapers are charging the same price for their work that they did ten years ago. We haven't got sense enough to get in out of the rain.

AN exchange doesn't see how W. G. Smith can justly defend the Hawaiians against slanderous reports appearing in mainland papers, because of his past attitude towards them. Five hundred dollars per month will do wonders brother. However, if a man is able to do so much harm in writing against a cause, let us suppose, when he is lined up on the other side of the fence, that he will do as much for the other fellow. It is the consensus of opinion that no better choice could have been made in the selection of a man for the place, and time only, will prove whether or not the move has been a wise one.

BEFORE settling the Territorial Homesteads Laws, it might be well to remember that there is a bill before congress providing for a reduction of the time of residence on homestead claims from five to three years, further action upon which depends the information regarding incomplete claims in this connection. Every land office in the United States has been ordered to furnish at once, a statement of the number of homesteads which have not been completed.

THE amalgamation of Honolulu's two afternoon papers should form a combination of such strength as to enable the production of one of the best papers ever yet published in the Territory. On the reportorial staff of both papers are writers of experience; men who know newspaper work in all its branches and whose combined efforts are sure to give the readers of the new paper a class of news equal to that given by the big daily press service on the coast.

Farrington, present editor of the Bulletin, the manager-to-be of the new concern, is a keen business man, his prowess as such being indicated in the great improvement he has wrought in the Evening Bulletin since it came under his control. In taking up his new duties, he is fortified with years of experience and the best wishes of THE GARDEN ISLAND for success in the continuation of a position for which there are none better qualified to occupy.

W. G. Smith, Editor of the Star, and who on July 1st. resigns to enter a new field, has been known for many years to be one of the ablest writers in the Territory and that he has been induced to leave the newspaper field, is deeply regretted by all who are familiar with his style of writing. That there never was a more popular local writer is evidenced in the multitude of regrets that are heard from all sources, over his resignation. Many readers of the Star are such solely on account of this brilliant writer, and the promise that he may again return to Honolulu after his engagement is finished, to apply himself to newspaper work, is the source of much happy anticipation among his admirers.

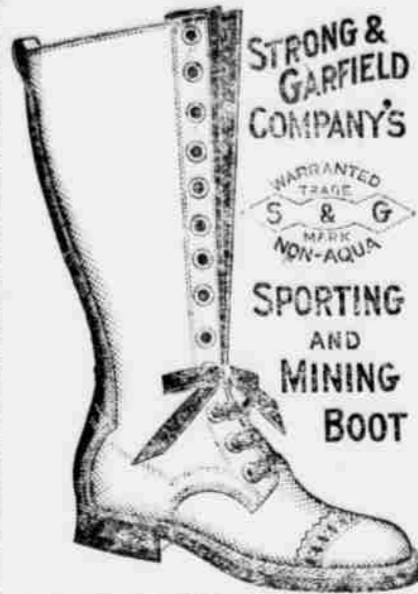

BALDWIN DEFENDS OUR SCHOOL PLANS

Condemning the action of the Commissioners of Public Instruction in demanding and enforcing radical changes in the present course of study in Hawaii, and declaring that the system as already changed to suit the Commissioners' ideas is not as efficient as the old one. Supervising Principal Charles W. Baldwin of Oahu has issued a statement in which he sounds a warning that the modifications urged by the higher body will if enforced, result in lowering the standards of the Territory's public school system.

In the course of his statements Mr. Baldwin says: "I do not intend in this article to go into any argument to defend our present school system, or to prove our course of study, or explain the plan of our Normal School. I should say, however, that our school system has had the endorsement of every credited school man who has passed this way—it has been pronounced as good and more than good. Our course of study receives its justification from the great McMurry books and has the endorsement of such educators as United States Commissioner of Education Claxton, ex-Commissioner Elmer E. Brown, Dr. John Dewey, Dr. Dressler, McMurry and others. Of course the above endorsement applies to our Normal School as well.

"But if the public does not believe, and that is what some of the Commissioners would have us think, then they should inform themselves as to what is going on in the various educational systems of today. The McMurry books are very readable and may be found in any library.

"If the opinion of expert educators and book men is worth anything, our schools are thoroughly abreast of the times, so much so that our ideas have been made use of by the leading book companies in getting out their latest sets of readers and books on the subject of language-teaching. That our schools are up-to-date is due chiefly to the untiring efforts and foresight, coupled with an indomitable energy, of the principal of our Normal School, Professor Edgar Wood.
