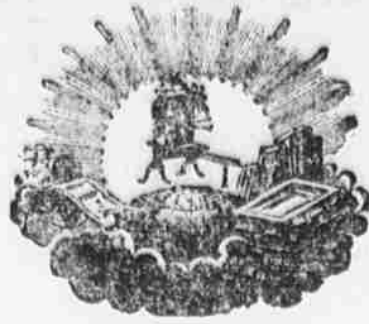

DEATH. McINTYRE - In Honolulu, March 13th, at her residence, King street, Mrs. Margaret McIntyre, a native of Ayr, Scotland, aged 76 years, 4 months, 10 days.

DEATH OF MRS. M'INTYRE. At 2:30 o'clock this morning, Mrs. Margaret McIntyre, widow of Hugh McIntyre, died at the family residence, King street, aged 76 years, 4 months and 10 days. The deceased was born in Ayr, Scotland, November 3d, 1812, and had lived in Honolulu for nearly 40 years. She had long been a sufferer from asthma and rheumatism. Her husband died March 9th, 1887.
