ROOSEVELT TO FAVOR RECIPROCITY AND INDICATIONS PREDICTED AS FAVORING RECIPROCITY WITH CUBA

Washington, Oct. 25.—A special to the Brooklyn Standard-Union by Albert Halstead says: President Roosevelt is expected, in his first message to Congress, upon which he is now at work, to take a very strong stand in favor of reciprocity.

Whatever may be done at the coming session of Congress in the matter of ratifying reciprocity treaties, it seems reasonably certain that a treaty will be negotiated with Cuba and ratified, granting the Cubans a favored entrance for their sugar and tobacco into the American markets in return for like favors to American merchandise and manufactures.

In negotiating new reciprocity treaties President Roosevelt is fully appreciative of the necessity of consulting with leading members of the Senate, for he knows that without their co-operation no reciprocity treaty can be ratified. But no matter how cautious the President may be, it will not be in the least, easy to secure the ratification of any reciprocity treaty.

But, on the other hand, there is no question now but that Minnesota, Ohio and Iowa, States which have much to do with formulating public opinion, are earnest in demanding some modifications of the existing tariff schedules, and this demand is very noticeable among Republicans.

ST. LOUIS EXPOSITION.

Again the St. Louis, Louisiana Purchase Exposition is before the Chamber of Commerce to be dealt with as becomes its importance to this Territory or laid on the shelf for some more convenient season.

The least the Chamber can do is to appoint a committee to confer with a similar committee of the Merchants' Association and determine if possible whether our business men will begin early preparations for the proper representation of Hawaii or follow the old time policy of waiting till the last minute to scurry together an exhibit that satisfies no one and leave the principal representation of this Territory solely to the votaries of the midway.

There are few men of standing in Hawaii who are ready to put forward the claim that Hawaii should not be represented at St. Louis. The natural questions arising are how much the business men and the Territory can afford it.

MAMMOTH PACIFIC STEAMSHIPS.

Two steamships, in size double the largest that now crosses the Pacific, and up-to-date in every respect, will soon ply between San Francisco and Oriental ports.

The new steamships, which are for the Pacific Mail line, are each of 12,000 tons. This was about the maximum size of trans-Pacific liners prior to the recent advent of a few marine monsters.

The placing of two such craft as the Korea and Siberia in the Pacific service is only the beginning, however, in a series of progressive steps.

DISFRANCHISEMENT BOOMERANG.

Senator Cantrick of Tennessee was asked by the Washington correspondent of the Brooklyn Standard-Union what he thought would be the effect of the adoption by several States of Constitutions disfranchising the negro, and he said:
