By way of New Zealand, it is announced that Queen Victoria has given her assent to the Colonial Act restricting Chinese immigration.

Yesterday, J. H. Wodehouse, Esq., H.B.M.'s Commissioner and Consul-General, with Hon. A. S. Cleghorn, Commissioner of the Board of Immigration, left town for Koolau, en route for a tour of this island, as was recently done by them on Kauai, for the purpose of examining into the labor system in all its particulars. They proposed to spend last night with Mr. J. A. Cummings, at Waimanalo.

A treaty has arrived in New Zealand, by which Queen Victoria recognizes King George of Tonga, now eighty years old, and who has reigned since 1815 as an independent sovereign, and Tonga as belonging to the brotherhood of natives. The Friendly Islands, (the native name of which is Tonga) is said to be progressing well in agriculture and commerce. Drunkenness and grog-selling, we are told, are kept out by main force.

Four thousand and four hundred deaths from small-pox, are reported as having occurred in Hayti, West Indies.

The Ssmr Ceylon leaves for San Francisco via Hilo at noon to-day. A mail will be forwarded from the Post Office closing at 11 o'clock.

The Schr. Compeer sails for San Francisco at ten o'clock to-day, she takes away 10084 packages of sugar weighing 1,255,210 pounds. Domestic value \$80879.59.

We publish in this issue a communication sent us by a gentleman in this city regarding the treatment of the disease known as the "Pink Eye."

We have already announced that the artesian well on the property of Princess Keelikolani, at Palama, reached flowing water on Saturday last. We are now in a position to state that on Monday Mr. Fessler tested the height of rise, and found it to be about twenty feet above the level of the earth at the top of the well, or a little over forty feet above the sea level. No doubt, an accurate survey will show that the water rises precisely the same height as on the Waikiki side of Honolulu; thus completely exploding the theory that the break made by Nuuanu Valley in the back range of mountains would deprive the possibility of flowing wells on the north side of Punchbowl.

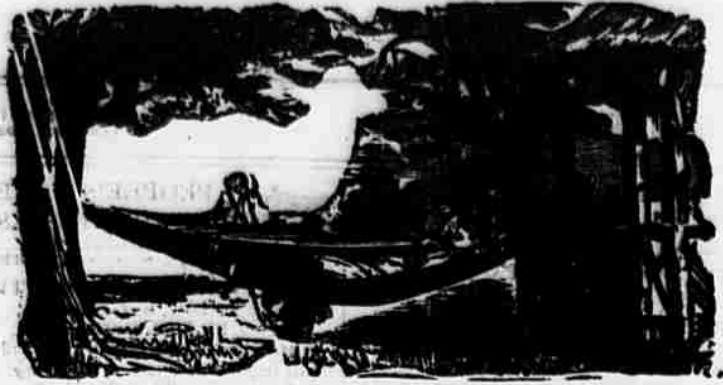

The Pink Eye.

Messrs Editors:

As the "Pink Eye" disease is undoubtedly here, a few suggestions will not come amiss to the owners of horses who have the disease or who fear they may have it. In the first place there is no danger from the disease, if proper precautions are used.

Symptoms: Dullness of the eyes, lassitude, thirst, retention of the urine, partial paralysis of the legs, the horse resting on one hind foot and changing frequently.

Treatment: Place the animal in a well ventilated stable; cover with a light blanket; avoid cold drafts of air; give 1/4 oz of sweet spirit of Nitre in two gallons of warm water, every three hours until he urinates; then same dose every twelve hours, give no hay or grain; give bran mash or sloppy bran and hot water, with a bottle, every five or six hours. Feed green grass sparingly or better still the "Pulele" or milk weed; do not walk him about, but have him, when he can, walk if he chooses to. Put a piece of thin muslin over his eyes to keep of the flies. Sixth or seventh day, give a small feed of oats and bran, and don't worry or apply to any doctor; the animal must not be allowed to drink cold water. VERITAS.
