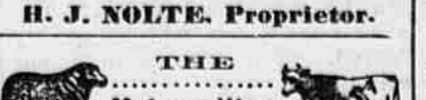

Could not this case have been treated at the prison? This, I have been told, is not by any means the only instance of a like nature. Frequently the members of the hard worked Hospital staff are called upon to do work that should be done by the Prison Physician. If he does not feel himself capable of performing the duties appertaining to his office, why not replace him with a competent man? Or if the present course is to be pursued, why not send all prison cases to the Queen's Hospital and engage some respectable old woman to attend to coughs and colds and other minor ailments? OUR AMERICAN LETTER.

California Politics and Other Topics.

Sugar Trust Re-organizing

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23. Congress is getting down to work, the necessity for doing something in the shape of legislation before the elections becoming apparent to party leaders. Last Saturday saw the Rivers and Harbors bill pass the Senate, and a programme of business was arranged for the ensuing week. The National Election Bill is a great stumbling block, however, and a good deal of bitterness has been engendered inside, the Republican party through Senator Quay's attempt to shelve the bill this session. It was decided by the Republican Senators to let it stand over for action in the short session. The chances are that it will be quietly shelved. The country does not want it.

The strike on the New York Central railroad is likely to result in a general strike on all Eastern roads. The action of the New York Central management is recognized as a challenge by federated capital to federated labor. This will be the second trial of strength on the railroad lines and capital will probably win. But when the third trial takes place, as it assuredly will, labor—that is flesh and blood—will be on top. It is folly to force such an issue at the present time, when the public mind is agitated by the unscrupulous and thieving operations of trusts and combines. The ballot and manhood suffrage should be left to settle all social and economic issues.

Great preparations are being made for celebrating the fortieth anniversary of the admission of California into the Union.

HAWAIIAN INTERESTS WATCHED.

Representative Morrow is not happy. He was nominated by the Republican State Convention as one of two "Congressmen at large," but as there has been no new apportionment of seats, and as none is likely to be operative before 1892, it follows that these nominations are worthless. It is like inviting a gentleman to hunt rainbows. Mr. Morrow has been the subject of a good deal of banter and fun at the National Capitol. Speaker Reed takes special delight in rubbing attic salt into Morrow's wounded vanity. The truth is, Morrow was never a strong man. He was disastrously beaten on his merits by Chas. Sumner, a newspaper reporter, in 1882, when he ran for Congress as candidate-at-large for the State, and his subsequent success in the constituency of San Francisco is to be credited to the telling work of a few prominent Republicans rather than to his own strength. In the last gubernatorial fight he was taken up by the Chronicle and the Federal office holders, led by General Dimond, who worked for him as Chairman of the State Republican Committee, although Morrow voted for the McKinley tariff bill abolishing the sugar duty and practically abrogating the Hawaiian Treaty. The Islands at least should not be burdened with regret at the rejection by the Republican Convention of a candidate who had gone dead against their interests, as well as against the commercial and manufacturing interests of San Francisco so intimately identified with Hawaiian trade.

The Democratic State Convention at San Jose nominated Mayor Pond, of San Francisco, for Governor. The choice was the very best that could have been made. Mayor Pond is also a good friend of the islands. He is too well known to readers of the BULLETIN, however, to need special mention. The Chronicle made a savage attack upon Judge Wallace, who was a candidate for his old position as Chief Justice, charging him with corrupt motives in his decision on the Sugar case, and alleging that his decision was reversed and he, himself, rebuked by the Supreme Court. All of which, as a matter of course, is untrue. His decision has not been reversed, he was not rebuked, and it is fair to presume that he was not actuated by improper motives in giving his decision.

BOUGHT OFF. It is stated, on the authority of a despatch from Portland, Oregon, that the Canadian Pacific Company is to receive \$20,000 per month subsidy from the Pacific Mail, for keeping out of the latter Company's shipping territory. This is the amount originally asked by the Canadian Pacific, and it is believed that the American Company concluded that it was cheaper to pay tribute to the Canadian Pacific than to fight. That some consideration was given is undoubted, but the precise figures are not likely to be spread abroad.

RAPID ADVANCE IN SILVER. What was said in relation to silver in former letters is being rapidly verified. Although the new Silver Purchase Bill only came into operation on the 13th inst, the United States Treasury paid up to \$1.19 per ounce for silver 1000 fine on the 18th. On the 20th the Treasury paid \$1.20 per ounce. The London price of silver on the 18th was 54 pence per ounce for silver .925 fine,

or within ten cents of parity with gold. The chances are that in a few weeks silver, as a commercial article, without the advantage of full legal recognition as money, will be on parity with gold. Instead of becoming the dumping ground for the world's silver the United States is being depeted of silver by purchases on foreign account.

In view of this outlook, it is now proposed that the United States Government should commission an agent to visit the European States and bring about the general recognition of silver as money, on a common ratio of weight of 16 to 1. The upward movement of silver, when even partially emancipated from the fetters of the yellow metal, serves to show the enormous imposition upon the debtor class by establishing the single gold standard in the interest of money-lenders and note shavers. Every productive industry has been heavily handicapped that one small class of non-producers should become enormously rich by controlling credits created to a great extent by other people's money entrusted to their keeping, and which enabled them to arbitrarily fix the rate of exchange and depress or inflate values. If the upward movement in silver continues, as it probably will, you may find the much despised Kala-kaua dollar at a premium in Honolulu despite hostile legislation. French bankers have been heavy buyers of silver in Australia at an advance on London rates.

THE SUGAR TRUST SWINDLE.

The work of reorganizing the great Sugar Trust swindle proceeds slowly. The Central Trust Company of New York is to exchange certificates as the following from a New York despatch of Aug. 18th will show:

Another step was taken to day in reorganizing the Sugar Trust. The Central Trust Company, which has been waiting for the preliminary agreement, under which it received deposits of certificates, is now in possession of that document and today announced that it was ready to exchange its engraved certificates of deposits for certificates of the Sugar Trust.

The agreement is between three parties. S. V. White, Kemhardt & Co., Cord Meyer Jr., S. F. Weichers, Gustav H. Gossler, Naeh, Spaulding & Co., Silas Pierce and all other certificate holders, who sign the agreement, being of the first party. The Reorganization Committee is second party and the Central Trust Company the third party.

By the agreement full power is given to the Reorganization Committee to wind up the trust and reorganize it according to law.

The agreement will be effective when approved by a majority of the certificate holders, and the committee is given power to vote on all certificates deposited. The Central Trust Company will receive all dividends on sugar-trust certificates deposited and pay them over to the holders of the engraved certificates.

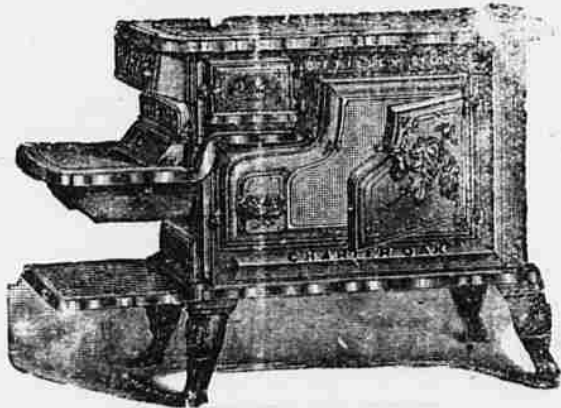

The Rev. T. L. Gulick returned to his home by the steamer Likelike on Wednesday last, much improved in health from his sojourn on the Coast. A surprise party to welcome him home was contemplated for Wednesday evening, but the inclement weather kept nearly everybody at home. The few that were there, however, spent a pleasant evening in social converse.

The deal in sugar plantation stocks that was vaguely hinted at in a recent issue of the BULLETIN, has been consummated, and in a short time you will probably hear of the consolidation of some of our plantations into one gigantic corporation, with one of Maui's most successful plantation owners and managers at the head.

The weather still continues rainy, but as it is planting season nobody grows.

A most enjoyable farewell party was given at the residence of Mr. C. H. Dickey at Haiku, on Monday night last, for Masters Harry Baldwin and Willie Dickey, and Miss Maud Baldwin, all of whom leave on the next steamer for the United States to attend school. They will be missed very much, as they have a large circle of friends who wish them "bon voyage" and a happy school life.

The Rev. W. D. Westervelt has returned to his missionary work among the natives and Asiatics of Maui. His labor among the haoles while temporarily filling the pulpit of Makawao foreign church, during the absence of its pastor, the Rev. T. L. Gulick, will be long felt and deeply appreciated by all the residents of the district. His genial and kindly nature and earnest Christian work has made him many life-long friends, all of whom wish him the success he so richly deserves in his labor among the heathen.

Politics are dull, and interest in legislative matters is lagging. Occasionally when any important measure has been before the house comments upon its merits may be heard, but at other times not a word. Probably we are too far away from the scene of action to be particularly anxious about what our representatives are doing.

There was a rumor that became widespread that P. M. G. Wundenberg had been removed and Judge Geo. E. Richardson, of Wailuku, had been appointed to fill the vacancy, but as no official notice of such a change has appeared we presume it is a canard.

Mr. Millward, who a short time ago received serious injuries by being thrown from a brake, has almost entirely recovered and will shortly resume his work on Paia plantation.

The long talked of and much needed school at Spreckelsville is about to be started. The Inspector-General of Schools was there last week, and located a site for the building, which we understand will be constructed at once. N. Maui, Aug. 29th.
