THE respect and honor which each year is shown to the memory of those who gave their lives to preserve the integrity of the great American Union of States is not, nor never has been wholly confined to the boundary of the country for which those brave men died.

But nowhere outside of the Union itself do the people of another State or Government set apart a day in each year on which to hold a solemn memorial service for America's patriot dead.

Hon. member Thurston presented a petition from Kaanapali praying that the election of the member from that District be set aside. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

Hon. member Kaula presented a petition asking that \$2,000 be appropriated for extending the wharf at Waimea, Kauai. To be considered with the Appropriation bill.

His Excellency the Minister of the Interior reported back as printed the following bills: An act to regulate the construction of buildings in Honolulu.

and especially that of bona fide Americans, has differed widely from the policy of both parties, but has differed more widely, on certain points, from the so-called Opposition party than it has in any specific points from what is known as the Government party.

It is well that the outside world should not confound the views of the independent element of Hawaii, with the present Opposition party, which is made up largely of men who oppose the present Administration from personal grounds, rather than from principle.

HAWAIIAN LEGISLATURE.

TWENTIETH DAY.

House met pursuant to adjournment, at 10 o'clock A.M., the President, Hon. J. S. Walker, in the Chair. After prayer by the Chaplain, and calling of the roll, the minutes of the previous session were read and after amendment, approved.

The Secretary then read the names of members present at preceding day's roll call, and was instructed by the President to excuse the members of the Finance Committee.

PETITIONS.

Hon. member Thurston presented a petition from Kaanapali praying that the election of the member from that District be set aside. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

Hon. member Kaula presented a resolution that \$75,000 be appropriated for building a road over the Pali or through Kaili Valley, Oahu, to the other side of the Island.

Hon. member Dickey presented a petition that \$300 be appropriated to repair and enlarge the house of the Deputy Sheriff at Paia, Makawao, Maui. Referred to Committee on Lands.

Hon. member Kaula presented a petition asking that \$2,000 be appropriated for extending the wharf at Waimea, Kauai. To be considered with the Appropriation bill.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

His Excellency the Minister of the Interior reported back as printed the following bills: An act to regulate the construction of buildings in Honolulu.

Hon. member Richardson from the Committee on Engrossments reported as engrossed an act amending Section 1, Chapter 21, C. C., relating to challenging of jurors.

His Excellency the Minister of Foreign Affairs presented a resolution that when the Assembly adjourn for the day they do so to Tuesday, the 25th, to mark their respect for the birthday of Her Majesty the Queen of Great Britain and Empress of India.

Hon. Noble Rhodes requested leave of absence from the Assembly for the balance of the session on account of failing health demanding that he should seek another climate. The Hon. Noble referred to the fact of his having taken a part in the Legislature proceedings of the country since 1850, sitting in all but two or three of the Legislatures, without having asked for leave of absence before. Leave of absence granted.

His Excellency the Minister of the Interior in reply to the resolution passed by the Assembly asking him to lay before them a statement of the amount awarded persons on account of lands taken for Makiki reservoir, presented the following list, as per appraiser's report, filed January 24th, 1885.

Excellency read for the first time by its title, (the rules being suspended) an act to regulate the construction and repairs of buildings in Honolulu. His Excellency made a motion that the rules be suspended and the bill read a second time by its title, in order that it might be referred at once to the committee appointed to consider the "fire limit" bill.

Hon. member Keau read for the first time an act providing for a permanent settlement of \$2,000 per annum on Hon. W. C. Parke. Passed to second reading. The Hon. member also read a resolution, that an unpaid balance of salary voted to the captain of police be paid that officer. Laid on the table for consideration by the committee of thirteen appointed to adjust salary of police officers.

Hon. member Keau offered a resolution that the extension of Queen street be repaired, and that the Road Supervisor cause the work to be done immediately. Laid on table for consideration with the appropriation bill.

Hon. member Castle, on suspension of the rules offered a petition that an appropriation be made for water pipes in Wailuku and Kahului. Referred to Committee on Public Lands. Also, that no bill for a loan of \$10,000,000 be passed. Referred to Finance Committee. Also, that no bank bill like the one presented last session be passed. And that no bill licensing the sale of opium be passed. Both referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Hon. Noble Cleghorn presented a resolution that a committee of five be appointed to visit and report upon the Government nursery and parks. He would ask that the Committee invite Mr. Jaeger to accompany them, and that Hon. member Cecil Brown be placed on the Committee, he being well acquainted with the Kapiolani Park. The Hon. Noble stated he himself did not wish to be a member of the Committee. The resolution was amended by adding "and carriages be provided for the use of the Committee," and was then adopted. The President appointed on the Committee, Hon. members Brown, Hayselden, Kaunamano, and His Excellency the Minister of the Interior.

His Excellency moved the "Order of the Day," but withdrew his motion to allow a bill to be read for the first time.

Hon. member Kaunamano read for the first time an act repealing the act relating to Road Supervisors in Chief. Passed to second reading.

Hon. member Lilikalani introduced a resolution that the newspapers furnished the members be paid for at ten cents per copy. On motion the resolution was referred to the Committee on Accounts.

His Excellency then moved the "Order of the Day." Motion lost.

Hon. member Kauai gave notice of his intention to introduce a act reducing the duty on spirituous liquors.

On motion of Hon. member Ahole the House passed to the ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill relating to challenging of jurors, permitting plaintiff and defendant each two preemptory challenges then passed its third reading.

The bill relating to the kindling of fires in Honolulu, on its second reading was, on suspension of the rules, read by its title and referred to the Special Committee on fire limits of Honolulu.

On motion the amended bill relating to the sale of spirituous liquors, was ordered to be read before the House on its second reading with the original bill, on its second reading.

On suspension of the rules, Hon. member Hayselden from the Committee on Accounts reported back the resolution regarding pay for newspapers recommending that all dailies heretofore furnished members be paid for at the rate of five cents per copy, and all weeklies at ten cent per copy. Amended by the Attorney General to include all newspapers that may be furnished and adopted.

The act repealing the law relating to the collection of rents, on its second reading was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

On suspension of the rules the act relating to obstruction of streets was read by its title and referred to the Special Committee on fire limits.

The House then adjourned to Tuesday the 25th (to-morrow) at 10 o'clock A. M.

DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING POT.—Take the desired amount of flour and mix very thin with cold water, being sure there are no lumps. Confine this in a bag or cloth and place in a kettle of boiling water, and let it continue to boil 1 1/2 to 2 hours, until cooked. When done (while warm) stir with a stout spoon, adding a little water until the whole is well mixed. Let this stand from 5 to 6 hours. Then add water in small quantities, mixing thoroughly and kneading until the desired consistency is obtained. Owing to its great purity it will take from 3 to 4 days to become acid or sour.


