## The Election.

On Wednesday, the election of delegates takes place. The government has been very derelict in enlightening the voters in regard to the use of the ballots and especially in the use of the accumulated vote, for the first time used here. Sample ballots ought to have been shown before this time, and published in the papers with the necessary explanations. The reason why this hasn't been done, is plain enough. The missionaries are anxious to see their own men get elected, and the supporters of them are familiar with the Australian ballot system and know how to use the accumulated vote. But there is a large number of voters who have no experience, and who are apt to make a mistake in marking their ballots which will cause the ballot to be cancelled, and the candidate to lose so many votes. All those who realize this trick of the missionaries, should gather together and vote the independent anti-missionary candidate Mr. H. Klemme, but they should have the way of voting well explained and be sure not to make any mistakes. Every vote counts.

## Off His Nuts.

The editor of the *Advertiser* tries in a special article for the benefit of his readers abroad to manipulate the registration figures so as to make it appear that the annexation party has won a victory. On the face of it the attempt is puerile if not fraudulent. The *Advertiser* cannot deny the fact that there were at the last election 14,113 registered voters. And we presume that it will not deny the fact that when all the returns are in the total number of registered voters will not exceed 3000. Is it possible that the official organ will claim that the 11,000 not registering this time haven't paid their taxes? If so our system of tax-collecting must have become extremely poor since the advent of the p. g. Further more the *Advertiser* ignores the fact that a very large portion of the persons registered now would not be qualified to do so under our constitutional government because they haven't lived long enough in the country. Why, every fellow who arrived three months ago and got a job in the army is entitled to register under the p. g. rule. If a legitimate election had been held this year the total of legitimate voters would have been considerable swelled by the addition of all the young men who have become of voting age since 1892. The *Advertiser* speaks about Honolulu being the stronghold of the Loyalists and that the p. g. will do better on the other islands. A glance over the returns from Kohala, Hamakua and Labaina, will prove that the p. g. has even been worse defeated in those districts than here. In Hamakua 20 Hawaiians have registered while Kohala meets with 35, mostly composed of government officials. The total vote in Labaina is 46 including Portuguese, haoles and natives. In the last named district, even the policemen, with one exception, refused to register. In Lanai three men registered, the judge, the policeman and a man implicated in the Lanai horror—a brother to the murderer. In the latter place the judge, Solomon Kahoolalahala told the natives that the government had promised 20 acres of land to each Hawaiian who would register but even that

bribe didn't take. At the Leper Settlement 3 men voted one of whom was Doctor Oliver. And so on all over the group. If the p. g. and the *Advertiser* can find any comfort out of this state of affairs they are easily satisfied. Besides there have been no challenges, no investigations, no attempt to stop anybody not qualified even under p. g. rule. The *Advertiser* flourished among those who had registered in Honolulu the name of a criminal who never has been pardoned, but nevertheless was convicted three or four years ago of the trifling offense of sodomy. But that is nothing, everything goes, Coercion and bulldozing is the order of the day. Rogues and rascals are allowed to vote and yet the result shows the impossibility for the self-appointed p. g. to rule this country. The result of the registration is a significant victory for the principle of Government "by the people for the people and of the people."

## The Appropriation Bill.

The passage of an appropriation bill for the coming two years by a provisional government is one of the most astounding actions that Dole & Co. yet have committed—on that we will say something. It can only be described as a piece of gross impudence to the country and to the taxpayers. The provisional government has signified that its existence is to be terminated in a few weeks by calling a constitutional convention for the purpose of forming a permanent, and, it is to be hoped, a respectable government by the people. The passage of the appropriation bill seems to indicate that the constitution to be passed by the convention is already manufactured and that it will provide for the continuance of the present government "ad infinitum." If it was the programme to pass a decent constitution, and immediately hold an election, and call a legislature, it would be both improper and ridiculous for the p. g. to have spent its time making a bill that most probably would meet with disapproval by the regular legislature, and consequently would have to be made over again. The action of the p. g. gives color to the report that the new constitution will make Dole president for 10 years—without election—and will make the present councils hold office for life. If Hawaii quietly will accept a fundamental law with such provision all we can say is that she deserves to get it.

The appropriation bill in itself is a remarkable affair. It is to appear in three volumes. For what reasons we cannot see. At present we are told that all salaries are provided, for yet we see nothing of the salaries for the military—perhaps they serve for nothing, or perhaps the government is ashamed to show the sinful waste of the taxpayers' money in that department. Some day an appropriation bill will have to be made, and it should certainly be made so specific that everybody can see how much he pays for the pleasure of "educating" a number of loafers and giving regimental (?) hops.

There are no signs of retrenchment. Some salaries have been cut down and others have been raised. W. O. Smith who in 1892 pointed out that he rather would be jailer in Oahu Prison with \$1500 a year than chief-clerk with \$3000 has changed his mind and spoke warmly for a raise in the salary. His reasons were that there were at present quite a different kind of prisoners, much more dangerous, than two years ago. Is that one of the benefits that the country has gained since the advent of Stevens' immaculate government? The extravagance in the pay of the legation in Washington has already been commented on. The heat with which the government fought for an increase in the salaries of the employees of the legation and the great importance they placed on the services of the show-and and his harmless clerk proves that, which has been said to the contrary by the p. g. press, the Hawaiian

question is yet a very live question in Washington. The Loyalists will please take notice. Before the appropriation was passed we should have thought it good sense and policy for the Minister of Finance to have placed the other two volumes before the country to show how much the total expenditures of the country is estimated at, and then be might at the same time have presented an estimate (an honest one) of the revenues for the same period. If he had done that the Councils would have known what they were about and how much money the country can afford under the present circumstances to pay in salaries. As it is now the prospects are that the whole bill will have to be reconsidered and the next government forced to cut the coat according to the cloth. The Advisory Council by the way seems to be as interested in public works and improvements as is the Executive. But why bother about the public as long as they have Soper—and his uniform.

## Hobson's Choice.

The *Advertiser* is always fair and just. Every day brings forward a new proof of these sterling qualities in the moral and virtuous government organ and the community is proud of having such a sheet. Look at the treatment by this just paper of C. B. Wilson. A while ago Mr. Wilson interfered in a pending fight at the Hotel and the *Advertiser* howled, and foamed and in righteous indignation stigmatized Wilson as a coward. A few nights ago a fight took place at the Hotel in the presence of Mr. Wilson. The *Advertiser* claims that he didn't interfere and with the consistency for which the official organ is noted it foamed and howled and called him a coward. Take that hat up and "you get licked, or leave and you get licked." This is evidently the main principle in code of the just, fair and moral morning paper.

## The Mayhem Trial.

A large crowd gathered at the police court this morning to listen to the trial of Gallegher, Brown and Wilson. There were two charges against the first named. The first one was mayhem to which the defendant plead not guilty, and which was continued till Thursday the 3rd inst. To the second charge of assault and battery, he plead guilty, and was fined \$10.00 and costs \$3.00. The case against Wilson and Brown, were continued till Thursday, both defendants declining to plead. Mr. Cecil Brown and C. W. Ashford for defendants.

## On The Warpath.

Mr. William C. Achi is on the warpath. He has issued a proclamation to the voters of Hawaii calling upon them to select him as a delegate. He has written a letter to the learned attorney general, and asked if the voters on Hawaii may vote for him, although he has filed no request to be a candidate signed by a 25 voters as required by law. The learned attorney general answers that he may run in spite of not conforming with the law, because "any voter may erase the name of any candidate on the ballot and substitute another name." After receiving this learned decision by the most learned attorney general, Mr. Achi issues a proclamation to the voters of Hawaii in which he tells them that he "shall do all in my power to advance the prosperity of the coming Republic of Hawaii, and the interests of the American Union Party with the exception of Section 5, as I think that the interests of the sugar plantations, and other industries demand cheap laborers; but Asiatic immigration may be restricted in some way in order to protect the interest of the laboring class!! We don't think Mr. Achi will get there, but we cordially congratulate the American Union Party on its acquisition.

## The Registration.

Is the government afraid of publishing the returns from the other islands of registered voters? It seems so, because the government must have all the official returns at hand, and yet not a syllable to show how the "strongholds" turned out. Minors and criminals were registered on Maui as well as on Oahu, and yet the government couldn't make a half decent showing. Poor Dole, does he yet claim to possess popularity and the support of the people?

The *Advertiser* who catches a persons eye usually wins a customer. Many different styles of advertising have been adopted and with more or less success, by the believers in the use of printers ink. The manufacturers of Pears Soap, for instance, occasionally buy paintings that have been on exhibition in the Paris Salon and have lithographs made from them for the purpose of bringing their product before the people. In addition to such side issues, Pear spends hundreds thousands of dollars annually among the newspapers and magazines. Some years ago the Agents of certain article on sale in New York made a hit in advertising by having on Broadway during business hours two fatuously dressed Negroes wearing very high collars, on the backs of which was printed "Use Smiths Pills." The idea was novel and the public caught on. Rising Sun Stove Polish has been kept before the public for years through persistent, and sometimes expensive advertising. Twenty odd years ago the manufacturers of this polish started half a dozen men across the continent to paint signs on rocks and fences. The Aermotor Co., of Chicago have increased its sales more than five hundred per cent in two years by the use of printers ink. We do not wish to say that advertising will sell any manufactured article; there is no use spending money in advertising "cheap and nasty" goods because the people will not be hoodwinked. If Haviland China was not the superior article it is, all our advertising of it would not have sold the thousands of pieces that we have. We simply call the attention of the people to it and its superior quality is apparent to the customer directly a piece of it is examined.

Printers ink has helped the sale of the James Locked Fence but it would not have done so if it had been as flimsy as the ordinary wire fence. First, the economy there is in building it recommends it to the plantation manager and then its durability clinches the sale. If the stays and washers cost as much as an ordinary redwood post our sales of the material would not have reached such enormous proportions.

The National Iron Works Co. have been kept pretty busy lately in filling orders on small jobs for their many patrons.

The Bulletin made a scoop on the other local evening papers on Saturday by getting out a noon edition for the Australia.

The mate received a cut in the head; one sailor was cut in the lower part of the left leg, an artery being severed and the other sailor had his right leg broken above the knee. Doctor Allen of Hana, Maui, attended to the men immediately and the sufferers were afterwards landed at Maalea bay and taken to the Wailuku hospital.
