The steamer Lehua arrived from Maui, Molokai and Lanai ports last Saturday afternoon with 1,029 bags of Olowalu sugar, iron rails, 59 pigs, 78 bags corn, 7 packages coin, 8 crates chickens, 30 head cattle and 27 packages sundries. The Republicans of Kauai gave a big luncheon at Nawiliwili last Saturday afternoon. The feast began at 2 o'clock and lasted all the afternoon. Kauai is experiencing good weather and nearly every politician on the island was at Nawiliwili to enjoy the feast.

At about 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon, a still alarm was turned in and the fire department went swiftly to the back part of the Hawaiian Hotel, in which hostelry the fire was located. Smoke was seen issuing rapidly from some place near the roof but the exact location could not be determined. The chemical engine started in first and then a regular hose was used. It was not long before the smoke ceased, but the water continued to flow and did considerable damage to furniture, carpets, wall paper and the like. The fire was started by some painters who were scraping the old paint off a section of the back veranda on the second floor. They used the ordinary blow lamps in the work. A small aperture was run across and the flame shot up into this place. An old bird's nest was ignited and the woodwork began to burn from the inside. When the firemen got to work it did not take long to extinguish what fire there was but the water used in the operation played havoc with the furnishings of two or three of the rooms. The damage amounts to a few hundred dollars. The next transport from Manila will very probably bring Brigadier-General Lee and Wint. The former has been on duty at Batangas and the latter at Iloilo, commanding the Department of the Visayas. Wint is wanted for a departmental command and Lee to join the force in Colombia under General Bell.

FRIEND AND COIN LEFT. Nicolas George, an Italian, reported at the police station this morning that he had been robbed. The man stated that another Italian invited him to come and live in his house, one of the cottages on Marion street in Kalaiala. Yesterday morning George got up early and left the bedroom where he and his friend slept. He went to another room to smoke. When he returned to the bedroom he saw that his friend had departed; so had \$60 in coin, a gold chain and a silver watch, all belonging to George. The police have taken the matter up.
