LAW MAKERS BEGIN THEIR ARDUOUS WORK

House of Representatives Completes Its Permanent Organization with Hon Apukai Akina as Speaker---Senator Russel Slated for President of Upper House---Senate Delay Permanent Organization.

The convening of the Legislature attracted a large number of people, curious to witness the ceremonies attending the event. Before 9 o'clock the Capitol grounds were sprinkled with loitering men and women both native and foreign. Carriages filled in and out through the big iron gates, pausing at the foot of the Capitol steps to unload a senator or representative clad in proper Prince Albert and crowned with a glistening tile, or arrayed in a plain business suit as the case might be.

Senator White moved that a committee on credentials of three be appointed. There was some discussion on this point, Senator Cecil Brown insisting that, not until the permanent president was elected, could such a procedure be carried in order. The motion was put and carried by a close vote.

President pro tem Russel appointed Mr. White, John Brown and D. Kanuha a committee on credentials. The Senate then took a recess of ten minutes to give the committee a chance to examine the credentials.

The Senators of the Independent and Republican parties, with the exception of two, were in their seats some time before 10 o'clock. As in the lower house, there were a large number of visitors present.

There was a half hour's recess instead of a ten minutes one. Senator White as chairman of the committee on credentials, reported all credentials in proper form. The report was adopted.

At a little after 10 o'clock, Wm. White arose in his place and stated that the time for calling the Senate to order having arrived, the Senators should proceed to the election of a temporary chairman and secretary. Senator Kalaokalani placed in nomination the name of Dr. Russel who was chosen without further ado.

Mr. Emmeluth then took the floor and moved that a committee of three be appointed to wait upon the Judge of the Circuit Court and have him administer the oath of office to the members.

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amous ballot for Mr. Akina. There was more wrangling over this point but the end of it all was that temporary secretary Mossman did cast a ballot for Mr. Akina and he was elected Speaker.

The next matter of business was the choice of a vice-speaker. There was only one candidate, F. W. Beckley of Maui, who was nominated by S. K. Mahoe. There was a discussion of about fifteen minutes on a point in the rules. The temporary secretary cast a unanimous ballot for Mr. Beckley.

It was moved by R. H. Makekau that the rules of the last Legislature under the Republic of Hawaii be adopted as the rules of the House until such time as others should be framed.

to collect the ballots. J. N. Kamoku was chosen chaplain by a vote of 21 to 6. Jas. K. Paole moved that a committee be appointed to instruct the Governor of the readiness of the House for business. This was not seconded, J. K. Prendergast mentioning the fact a sergeant-at-arms had not yet been appointed. The following names were then placed in nomination for the position: J. K. Nakookoo, H. P. Haliola and W. H. Kallikani. Nakookoo won out by a vote of 17 out of 27. Kallikani got second place with 9 votes. Haliola only got four votes.

S. K. Mahoe moved that the House proceed to the appointment of a messenger. The names of Kahaokalani and Kelliaa and Kaona were placed in nomination. Kahaokalani won out by a vote of 17 out of 27 votes. Kelliaa was next with 7 votes and Kaona last with only 3.

C. H. Dickey moved that a committee be appointed to notify the Governor of the readiness of the House for work. J. Emmeluth was of the opinion that a committee on rules should be first appointed. J. K. Prendergast stated

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that a janitor had not been chosen. Several names were proposed and then W. H. Hoogs arose to ask if these men had been recommended as competent sweepers. Wm. Aylett objected and stated that the ability of none of the other officers, had been questioned.

Wm. Aylett moved to adjourn. The House should not go past the lunch hour. The stomachs of the representatives should be taken care of. However, the resolution was adopted and a committee consisting of Jonah Kumalae and J. K. Prendergast was appointed by the House.

Both the Senate and House have adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. The House expects at that time to have its joint committee meet immediately with another committee from the Senate, this joint committee to call on the Governor and instruct him that the Legislature is ready for business.

GOVERNOR DOLE'S TRIFLING PROMISES

He Was Juggling When Conferring With Federal Officials.

PROPERTY NOT TURNED OVER PER AGREEMENT

Customs House and Federal Court Rooms Remain in the Dubious Custody of Territory.

WILLIAM H. MOYER, representative of the Department of Justice, who left for Washington on the Alameda last Sunday, went away from Honolulu a very much surprised, a very indignant and a somewhat insulted man.

As published in the Bulletin at the time, a conference was held in Governor Dole's office between William H. Moyer, agent of the Department of Justice at Washington, Federal Attorney H. J. Testa, Collector of Customs Stackable and Governor Dole on the subject of Federal court rooms and the Customs House.

According to Mr. Moyer, Governor Dole agreed with the three officers at his office to turn over to Moyer as the representative of the Department of Justice, the Customs House absolutely and the rooms occupied by Judge Estee's court, conditionally.

ROBBERY AT EMERSON'S.

Last evening a Knight of the Jimmie, robbed the house of J. F. Emerson on the corner of Hackfield and Spencer streets and succeeded in making his escape with a small sum of money belonging to a Japanese servant.

The police have the entire matter in hand together with the pipe, and officers are now at work on the case. The police authorities state that the district where Mr. Emerson resides is a tough one, a fact well known to the police.

AUCTION OF POSTERS.

Col. Will E. Fisher acted as auctioneer for the Mardi Gras poster sale last evening. The colonel was called to this important position on five minutes notice, and was unable to make any preparation of special costume. He carried off the honors very acceptably.

BIG LUAU BEING PLANNED.

The ladies in charge of the business affairs of the Kapiolani Maternity Home are now making arrangements for a big fair and luau at the Home to take place on the 16th of March. The object is to raise funds for the addition of a gynecological ward at the Home.

CHARTER NEARING COMPLETION.

The independent charter makers expect to complete their charter for the City of Honolulu at the meeting to-night in Foster hall. The document will be presented in typewritten form as perfected by the sub-committee. It will, in all probability, be subjected to few changes.

REDUCTION SALE OF STRAW HATS AT IWAKAMUI'S, HOTEL STREET.

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This formal transfer of the custody of this Federal property was to have been acknowledged in writing by Governor Dole to Mr. Moyer. However, the formal note never came and no explanation of the reasons why it was withheld was given to Mr. Moyer, consequently, he had to leave Hawaii without closing up one of the most important matters which it was his business to settle as examiner of Federal matters here.

The status of Federal buildings is the same now as it has been since Governor Dole first gave scant courtesy in the matter of housing the Federal Court on the arrival of Judge Estee.

Mr. Moyer had hoped to close this whole matter but did not figure that it was possible for the Executive of the Territory to violate his official promise and ignore the accredited agent of the Department of Justice. His surprise at Governor Dole's action was expressed freely and his feelings owing to the direct slight given him were of the most painful kind.

Inquiries made at the Governor's office this morning as to why the formal notice of the transfer of the custody of these buildings had not been made to Mr. Moyer, elicited this explanation. Governor Dole had submitted a letter to Secretary Gage, all the facts and asked for his judgment. On receipt of the views of Secretary Gage, the Governor will make up his mind what to do about turning over the Federal property in question.

This leaves the problem identically in the same state it was in, before the delegation of Federal officers called on the Governor. It leaves the flat promise of Governor Dole unfulfilled and broken.

**Drank Coffee Rather
Than Save a Life**

An example of man's inhumanity to man was given on the Oceanic wharf late Monday night.

One of the customs guards was attracted to an unusual splashing in the water near the end of the dock. Investigation showed that it was caused by a man struggling in the water. The guard jumped into a boat near by and grabbed hold of the man in the water who was going down for the third time. He was very drunk and very heavy, and was too intoxicated to help himself. The guard, after grabbing the man, yelled for help and the wharf watchman came to his aid. The guard asked him for a line and the watchman got one.

The line was made fast around the drunken man's body and the watchman held it until the customs man got on to the wharf.

They both began to haul and got the drunken man about half way up the wharf. Then the watchman, thinking he had worked enough, refused to work any more and went to get some coffee, as he complained of being hungry. The guard begged him to stay by him until the man was rescued but the watchman refused and went away.

Then the rope slipped off the limp body of the drunken man and he fell back into the water again. The guard luckily grabbed him for a second time and again made the rope fast around him. While he was doing this, the watchman yelled to him and asked if he wanted some coffee also.

The Custom House man was very mad and told the watchman to go somewhere where it was hot and to telephone for the police.

The watchman refused to do this at first but was finally prevailed upon to notify the police station and the patrol wagon was sent to the rescue of the half drowned man.

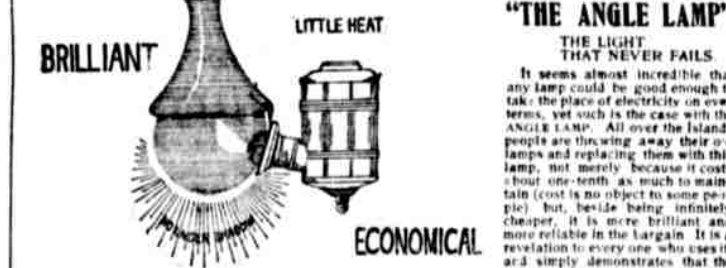

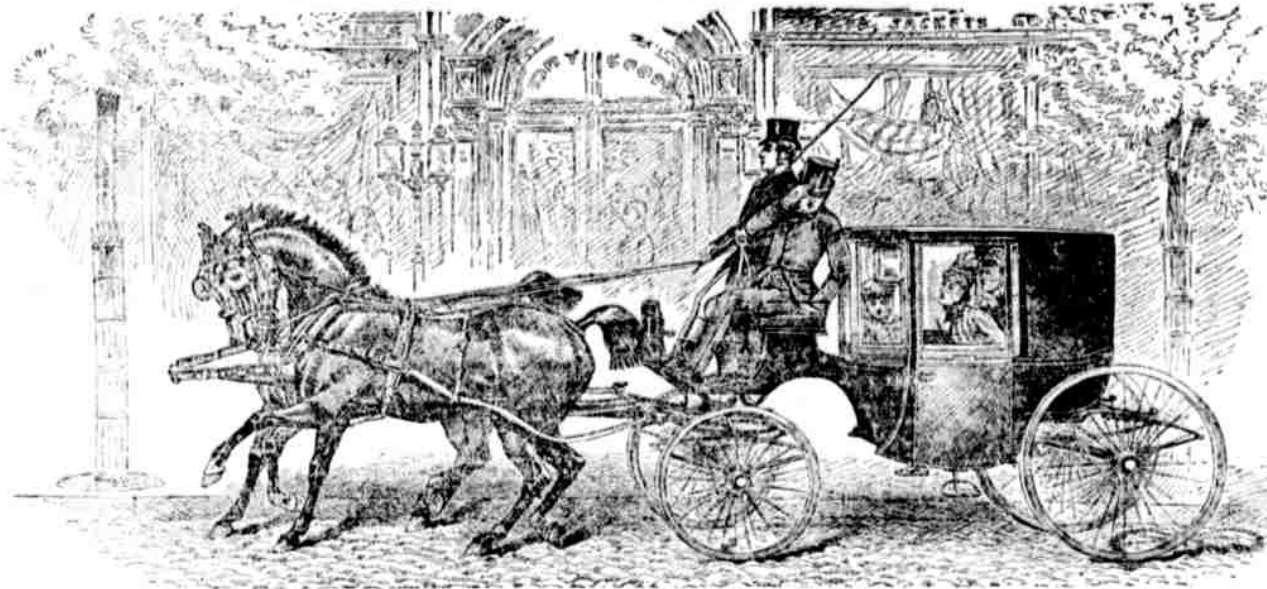

PREPARING TO FIGHT.
Cincinnati, Feb. 4.—Notwithstanding the action of Governor Nash there has been no suspensions today of the preparations for the Jeffries-Rhulin contest. The work has been proceeding at the big hall as heretofore. The sale of tickets went on the same as last week. The programmes were carried out as usual at the training quarters of Jeffries, Rhulin, Martin and Childs. The Saengerfest Athletic Club and its attorneys, after repeated conferences, insisted that it will carry out its program unless a permanent injunction is issued by the courts. Arguments will be heard on the petition for an injunction tomorrow, and may continue for two days, and then Judge Hollister may reserve his decision for a day or two, so that the indications tonight are that there will be no suspension of the preliminary work for some days.

Weather Bureau
Wireless Telegraph
Washington, Feb. 8.—A new system of wireless telegraphy has been developed by the weather bureau.
"It is a success," said Willis S. Moore, chief of the bureau. We have been experimenting for a year at Cobb's Island, in the Potomac river, seventy miles below Washington.
"We have completed an apparatus that will enable us to signal ships 500 miles or more out at sea. We shall soon send out ships equipped with receiving instruments. We have just completed a station at Roanoke, N. C., and will soon have stations at Hatteras and Cape Henry.
"We have succeeded in telegraphing perfectly with our wireless system for sixty miles over a rough country around Washington. That I believe is fully equal to the best transmission by the Marconi method. Our system is quite distinct from his and is being developed along our own lines.
"We succeeded in sending messages for some distance from a staff only three feet high. We established regular communication between the laboratory and Washington, sixty miles. One of our men has a farm near Fort Meyer, Va., just across from Washington, a staff one hundred feet high was on the place, and at the top we placed our instruments. We were able to communicate with the island as regularly and as frequently as though we were working over a wire. The speed of the waves was practically that of light.
"We used a system of dots and dashes and our receiver was of the 'sunder' type. We read messages by sound. We expect, however, to develop a receiver that will record messages. Notwithstanding our success it does not seem that wireless telegraphy is developed yet to the point where it can be used for ordinary commercial purposes on land. The earth disturbances and the conditions that surround cities would prove obstacles."

This committee will receive the claims and pass on them, and put them in shape for presentation to the Legislature.
