THE GREAT TRUST.

Owing to the large batch of foreign news, we have deferred the publication of the cast-iron agreement into which the planters of Hawaii, have been invited to enter for the formation of a "protective" association. The poor planters need protection indeed. The small stockholders will have to get along without it. The proposed agreement is in the hands of our printers, and when published will place our patriotic sugar planters in the proper light. It is noteworthy that stockholders in two plantation corporations have notified the directors of the companies that litigation will be started if an attempt is made to join the nefarious trust.

JAPAN VICTORIOUS.

THE CHINESE ARMY ROUTED.

Moukden to be Captured Today.

Chemulpo, Oct. 26. Dispatches from Wiju dated midnight gave additional details of the battle fought between the Chinese and Japanese across the Yalu river. General Nodzu, the Japanese Chief of Staff, it appears, succeeded in getting the main body of the Japanese army across the Yalu river without a mishap before daylight Thursday. Then Colonel Sato was sent forward at the head of a flying column on a reconnoitering expedition and he discovered them occupying a fortified position near the village of Fushang on the right bank of the Yalu. Though he had no artillery at his disposal Colonel Sato immediately commenced an attack upon the Chinese and a fierce battle followed. The Chinese fought desperately and stubbornly.

The attack began at 10 o'clock in the morning and lasted until noon, when the Chinese began wavering, broke and eventually retired in great disorder, falling back upon Kuliencas.

The troops commanded by Colonel Sato, after the Chinese had retired, set to work upon the demolition of the fortifications of Fushang.

Inside the fortifications they found 200 Chinese dead. The Japanese also captured a number of prisoners, among whom was a Chinese officer who stated the position was held by eighteen battalions of Chinese troops.

The Japanese, escorting their prisoners, then marched in the direction of General Nodzu's main body, with the intention of rejoining it.

The number of Chinese wounded is not known. The Japanese lost five officers and ninety men killed and wounded.

Later dispatches said the Chinese outposts were falling back upon Kuliencas, where it is expected the only determined stand of the Chinese in Manchuria will be made. It is understood Field Marshal Yamagata's plan are completed in every detail for inflicting what he hopes will turn out to be a crushing blow upon the Chinese.

Several columns of Japanese troops are acting in concert, after the manner adopted by the Japanese commander at the Ping Yang, and it is expected they will deliver a simultaneous attack upon the Chinese position. If the Japanese Field Marshal's plans are carried out in the manner indicated in the dispatches from the front, it is probable the network of the invaders will be completed around the Chinese position by midnight Saturday, thus enabling the Japanese attack to be delivered at dawn Sunday. But if the Japanese columns succeed in occupying the position

assigned them previous to midnight Saturday, it is believed the attack will be delivered at the earliest possible moment.

Some doubts are expressed among the Japanese commanders as to the reported strength of the Chinese position at Kuliencas.

It is reported the Japanese batteries at Kuliencas have been from three to eleven, but, on the other hand, rumor says it is extremely doubtful whether all these batteries are fully armed. The *esprit de corps* and health of the Japanese troops are excellent and it is said to be the universal ambition to capture Moukden before the birthday of the Emperor of Japan, November 3d.

THE FORCE OF THE CHINESE.

Yokohama, Oct. 26. Later dispatches from the Yalu river, show that in the battle fought yesterday between the Chinese and Japanese 3,500 Chinese troops of all arms were utterly routed.

Yokohama, Oct. 24. It is reported that the second Japanese army began operations for the capture of Port Arthur yesterday.

Shanghai, Oct. 24. Generals Yih Chi Chao and Wei Yu Kwei formerly commanding in Corea, have been accused, the former with cowardice and with responsibility for the murder of the French missionary, Joseau, and General Wei is accused of extortion and cowardice. They will probably lose their heads.

The French Ministry has threatened the Tounghli Yomen, or Foreign Council, with serious consequences should the long list of claims handed into them remain unsettled.

WELL PREPARED.

Japan was Ready for the War.

Victoria, B.C., Oct. 24. The steamship Empress of Japan has brought Oriental advices to Oct. 12th as follows: All Japan is in a fever of excitement awaiting the news of General Oyama's expedition, supposed to be directed towards some point on the Chinese coast within the Gulf of Pechili. The reports of landings at Port Arthur, Wei-Hai-Wei and other localities are published in Japan newspapers.

From the beginning the Japanese authorities have been determined to allow no inaccurate reports to go forth. Admiral Ito's official report of the battle near Tai Kosen harbor has been published. It is extremely exuberant in tone and filled with eulogies of the spirit and fortitude displayed by the officers and men.

The position of foreigners in the interior of China, especially in the north, is regarded as extremely critical. Even the residents of Shanghai feel it necessary to remind commanders of European fleets of the dangers that threaten them in the case the Government suffers further reverses, and the few aliens who remain in Peking have far more serious cause for apprehension.

The authority of Li Hung Chang, which would ordinarily be exercised on behalf of strangers is now so weakened that his promises of protection can no longer be trusted.

No immediate movement from the Capital could safely be expected as the roads are thronged with disorderly bodies of troops and the peasant populations famished and destitute.

The presence of a marine guard at the Legations to restrain lawlessness, which seems awaiting only for a pretext to rise up on Europeans and Americans, is imperatively demanded.

understood as a denial of Li's position to be intrusted with the direct management of the military and naval forces.

The statement previously published that the Chinese fleet purposely carried no boats is corroborated. The crews of all the lost vessels perished, with scarcely an exception. The number drowned is roughly estimated at nearly 700. Every deck officer engaged was injured. On the ships which returned to Port Arthur about 100 were killed and 250 wounded.

An extraordinary imperial edict has been issued calling for a true report of the battle of Phoyong Yang. The Emperor announces the defeat was owing to dissension and the rivalry of the Generals in charge of several brigades, and it states the guilty warrties will be severely punished.

Among the passengers on the Empress was Major Richter, late of the Chinese Army, who threw up his post of Inspector General at Tien Tsin in disgust. He was formerly in the German Army, and was commissioned by Li Hung Chang a couple of years ago to inspect all the troops of the regular militia and report on them and suggest reforms and improvements. He entered heartily on the work, but soon found it impossible to accomplish it.

He found corruption and fraud rampant, even his reports to Li Hung Chang being garbled and cut before they reached him, and he could accomplish nothing. The war with Japan was never expected, and when it came the Chinese were in a state of demoralization; poorly armed, poorly drilled and generally disorganized. Large sums of money had been expended to increase the efficiency of the army, but they had found their way into the pockets of greedy, avaricious officials.

After leaving China, Richter spent a short time in Japanese and had a long conference with high Japanese officials at Hiroshima. When taxed with having given away valuable information, Richter laughed at the idea, for he said he could gain no information from them he could give to the Japanese. The Japanese had been preparing for war for several years. They had complete surveys of every port, the result of a large amount of open, also secret work, by spies. Major Richter said they had excellent information as to the defenses of Tien Tsin.

The Dying Czar.

London, Oct. 26. Dispatches received at the Russian Embassy this morning from Livadia say the Czar is much better. He ate breakfast with appetite and energy.

Plymouth, Eng., Oct. 26. The Russian Imperial yacht Pole Star has left this port for Livadia where it is understood she will take on the Czar and the imperial family and convey them to Corfu.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 26. The following bulletin was issued at 11 o'clock this morning: The Czar slept fairly last night, and his appetite this morning is good. There are no somnolent or convulsive symptoms. Edema has increased.

London, Oct. 26. A statement purporting to come from Livadia by way of Paris, alleges the operation of thoracentesis has been performed upon the Czar with success. The releasing of the liquid matter by puncturing has greatly relieved the patient's breathing and the pressure around the heart.

It is reported Professor Leyden declared there is no danger of an immediate collapse.

Belin, Oct. 26. The Lokal Anzeiger publishes a dispatch from Livadia saying the Czar suffered a very serious relapse, and it is not expected that he will survive the night, or tomorrow at the very farthest.
