## HAS IT BEEN A BLESSING?

Question that "A. H." Asks About  
O. R. & L. Co.

Where Pleasant Homes Could Be Located—  
About Landlords—Power of the Press So-  
lotted—Matter of Acreage.

MR. EDITOR:—Has the Oahu Railroad and Land Company been the blessing to us that the promoters promised? Flowery speeches were made in the Legislature to obtain the liberal subsidy of \$3500 per mile of tax-payers' money on government bonds. Without this the O. R. & L. Co. could or would not have been built. It was advocated by its promoters that this road would open up the country along the sea coast for small homes, farms, orchards, beautiful villas, etc. The writer, being a fairly large rat-paver, encouraged and gave what little assistance he could in the way of telling its manager that any land owned by him or under his control the R. R. could pass through without charge. We took a round trip over this excellent road a few days ago. The fare was reasonable, cars clean and airy, attendance courteous and the scenery beautiful; but no cosy little homesteads could be seen anywhere—only coolie camps from one end of the road to the other. If this road was built for the plantations, the Government may have put its money to better use, as the plantations on Oahu have better landings than they have on the other islands.

Is it not a fact that the manager of this road (which he could not have built without the Government subsidy) has been the advance agent of the road and gobbled up all available large tracts of land as well as small kulanas?

We know of several small homesteaders who rented or leased land from the said company, built houses, planted fruit trees and, after a few years of struggle, had to leave as they could not pay the rent, water rates, etc.

There is no landlord so exact and cruel as the middleman, speculator or second landlord. That has been the case in Ireland, Australia and other countries and it is here today; but with the advent of one man, one vote, under our new American laws, it is to be hoped the power of corporated wealth in this little country will be held in check.

The value of such association can easily be appreciated, but the question is how to bring the subject before the small settlers of these islands. As it seems to us there is but one way, and that is, through the Press of Honolulu and Hilo.

If you gentlemen of the Press will take the matter in hand and advocate a system that has proved such a marked success in the Old World, it should insure success on these islands.

Waimea Valley, adjoining Waialua, has an area according to Mr. Gay's survey, of 6674 acres—enough land to settle our whole Portuguese Colony. The beauty of scenery and the fertility of the land is indescribable. Some 40 years ago or more a company of natives purchased this land and formed a cooperative association. This Hui has held together for over 30 years and prospered. The Honorable Jesse Amara, its president, says that he had \$600 in the treasury, until the ever hungry land agents got in and purchased 23 shares out of the 48 and it is only a question of time now till they have the natives away from this charming valley.

It would be of more value to our government to have one thousand men with \$1 each in Waimea and Waialua valleys than to have three men with three million dollars.

## CRICKET MATCH FOR TODAY

W. G. Grace, the English Veteran, Still  
Wields the Willow.

Heavy Scoring in This Year's Matches—How  
Lancashire Avoided a Defeat in  
Face of Heavy Odds.

This afternoon a cricket match between "Australia and Hawaii" and "World" elevens will be played on the Makiki reservation.

As cricket is a live sport in Honolulu, some items from the birthplace of the game will hardly lack interest.

W. G. Grace, the great English cricketer, is still at it. The present month he was to play at the Hastings Festival for England in Surrey and Sussex vs. England, and a London paper recalls that 31 years ago, when Grace was a slim young man of 19, he played for the same side in an identical match. Of the other 21 players in that match there are ten survivors.

In the table of "first-class averages" in the same paper, Grace is eighth on the list of 87 players. His figures are: Innings, 35; runs, 1372; most in the innings, 168; times not out, 5; average, 46.73.

W. G. Quaife, at the head of the batting list, has this record: Innings, 23; runs, 884; most in an innings, 157, and not out; times not out, 7; average, 61.50.

Albert Ward did some fine work at the bat in a recent match between Lancashire and Surrey which ended in a draw. He carried his bat out for 63, to the credit of Lancashire, after playing with extraordinary patience and skill for nearly four hours. That was good for a defensive game such as he played, but was totally eclipsed by Hayward for Surrey, in carrying his bat out for 315.

In this match Lancashire played for the draw in their second innings, having had to follow on against a balance of 461 runs. They simply had to keep up their wickets for four hours to avoid being beaten. When stumps were drawn at six o'clock they had scored 210 with a loss of four wickets. The Daily News, in reporting the game, says the Surrey eleven had reason to regret the time they wasted the first day in making runs that were no use to them. "They would have had a much better chance of winning if they had been content with a total of 500."

The Minneapolis Times has published a very attractive folder giving the itinerary of the big excursion that is to leave Minneapolis for Hawaii on Saturday, Nov. 5. The first excursion is limited to 150 people.

## LATEST AMERICAN NEWS

Changes and Orders in Both Army and  
Navy.

Admiral Cervera Expresses Gratitude for Kind-  
ness of Americans—Camp Scandals In-  
vestigating Commission.

Commodore Kautz is assigned to the command of the Pacific Station to succeed Admiral Miller, who is to retire in a few weeks, being the senior admiral in the navy. Commodore Kautz is ordered to take a steamer from San Francisco for Honolulu by October 8.

General Shafter has been placed in command of the Department of the East, with headquarters at Governor's Island. General Shafter will enter his new command at once, and General Bates will remain at Camp Wikoff.

The revenue cutter Bear has reached St. Michael, Alaska, returning from the Arctic with more than a hundred rescued sailors. The Bear was imprisoned in the ice thirteen days at Point Barrow and narrowly escaped destruction.

The battleships Iowa and Oregon, accompanied by four large steam colliers, will leave New York for San Francisco the last of this month. They will likely be sent on to Manila.

The directors of the American Sugar Refining Company have declared the regular quarterly dividends of 3 per cent on the common stock and 1 3/4 per cent on the preferred stock, payable October 3.

Senator Hoar has been offered the post of Ambassador to England in place of Mr. Hay.

If Senator Hoar accepts the post of Ambassador to England, and Secretary Long is appointed his successor, Colonel Roosevelt may become Secretary of the Navy.

Captain Bradford, chief of the Bureau of Equipment of the Navy Department, was notified at the last minute that the President desired his attendance upon the Commissioners at Paris in the capacity of an expert, for no one in the United States navy is so well informed as this officer as to the needs of the navy in the matters of coaling and naval stations.

Colonel William Jennings Bryant will resign his commission, to go home and attend to the fall election campaign, unless his regiment be mustered out. President McKinley has decided to keep the First Nebraska in service, not because his late political rival is colonel of the regiment but because this one remaining regiment from Nebraska is needed for service in Cuba.

### THE ADMIRAL'S GRATITUDE.

Admiral Pascual Cervera, on the eve of his departure for Spain, under date of Portsmouth, N. H., Sept. 11, addressed a letter to the president of the Associated Press, in which he says: "I sail with my heart full of gratitude for the sympathy that has been shown me by the people of this country. My farewell then takes with it every assurance that the memory of this sympathy I shall warmly and actively conserve during the rest of my life."

### CAMP SCANDAL INVESTIGATION.

Those accepting membership on the Commission to investigate army camp scandals are: Evan P. Powell, Atlanta, Ga.; Former Minister Charles Denby, Indiana; Colonel James A. Sexton of Illinois; D. C. Gillman, president of Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore; Dr. W. W. Keene of Philadelphia, Pa.; General Granville M. Dodge, New York. The President is urging Lieutenant General Schofield to make up the complete number of seven.

### Samoa Coaling Station.

Of eight bids for the coaling station structures at Pago-Pago,

Samoa, seven are from California firms. There is an enormous difference in the amounts. Cotton Bros. of Oakland tender for the work at \$133,397, while the Risdon Iron Works' figure is \$255,000.

Commander Tanner does not consider that it will be necessary to have a United States man-of-war at Pago-Pago harbor during the work of construction, which will probably occupy over a year. But it might be advantageous as a method of keeping the natives in order and asserting Uncle Sam's prestige.

"Now that the war is over," he pointed out, "probably the usual round of naval visits will be resumed, and undoubtedly one of our war ships will visit Samoa. The Bannington will go to Honolulu, but if she should get news of importance by the Australian mails she might go on the Samoan group."

### Sickness at Manila.

The hospital ship Rio de Janeiro is on the way out from Manila, taking home the sick and wounded in charge of Dr. Daywalt. There are thirty men from the Astor Battery, Tenth Pennsylvania, Thirtieth Minnesota and First California.

About 100 additional men of the regulars and other volunteer regiment are sick. They suffer for the most part from chronic dysentery and a stubborn form of typhoid peculiar to that region. Strenuous efforts are being made to clean the walled city. The Spanish prisoners are filthy in their habits, and unless some heroic measures are adopted there is danger of an epidemic, as the hot season is increasing the number of cases in all the regiments.

### Quarterly Exercises.

The branch Sunday Schools of Kawaiahaio church will have their quarterly exercises in the mother church tomorrow, beginning at 10 o'clock. An interesting program has been prepared. A cordial invitation is extended to all those who might care to attend.

### Rare Musical Feast.

The concert at the Y. M. C. A. hall Tuesday evening October the 4th, under auspices of the Amateur orchestra promises to be a very fine affair. Among those who will take are Miss Maud Kinney the talented young violinist and pianist, Prof. Jacobs the blind tenor vocalist, Mr. Ed. Sherman the fine basso, Mrs. F. W. Glade, soprano soloist and a mixed quartette. The orchestra will play two numbers of new music. The program is in charge of Wray Taylor. Admission will be for members 25 cents, for others 50 cents. Tickets can be obtained of H. E. Coleman, the General Secretary, at the Y. M. C. A. building.

### U. S. T. S. Senator Sails.

The U. S. T. S. Senator sailed between 12 and 1 p. m. today for San Francisco, having been delayed one day. Among those who went up on the Senator were twelve convalescent soldiers from the military hospital, as well as a number of soldiers from the camps who have completed their terms of enlistment.

## DISGUSTED WITH INSURGENT

American Boys Write of Dealings in  
the Philippines.

Natives Are Regular Thieves—Fruit Inferior to  
That of Hawaii—Boys Want to  
Get Home.

A letter received from Quarter-master-sergeant Frank Godfrey of Co. B of Rosebury, Oregon troops by his local namesake contains the news in detail of the capture of Manila and the part taken therein by the Oregon and California companies. He describes scenes connected with the landing and occupation, detailing the music played by the bands in the march through Manila's streets and states that the hearts of many of the boys were in their throats, and eyes wet with tears when the familiar "Marching Thro' Georgia" was played, as the troops marched over the city draw bridge and passed through the main gate to the city, the keystone of which gate bore the inscription of building and the date "Anno 1783." The exhibition of feeling was occasioned by the remembrances of home and the dear ones left there, and the hope of soon being enabled to see them.

Sergeant Godfrey states that the American troops occupy the quarters formerly held by the Spanish troops, and reports that the buildings are large, roomy and well-ventilated. Cos. B and H of Oregon are in one building about 300 feet long, 30 to 40 feet wide and well ventilated thus enabling everyone to be in good health. The Filipinos say that the Americans are "much bueno" [very good] but the rebels or Aguinaldo crowd are "very bad."

The "kid glove" soldiers, the Astor Battery of New York have won the esteem and respect of all the troops for their conspicuous bravery and determination. It is stated in this letter that but for the aid given by this battery at a critical time the 18th and 23rd U. S. Infantry and the Pennsylvania volunteers would have fared much worse.

Hope is expressed that from the appearances then presented [August 15th] that there would be no trouble with the natives as Aguinaldo was becoming daily more cognizant of the "iron hand beneath the glove" of General Merritt's apparent easy way of governing and the rebel chief was commencing to appreciate American power. The Oregonians yet remember the kindness shown them by the Honolulu people and the writer expresses the hopes of all the contingent that they may be enabled to stop in to Honolulu en route home.

L. P. Tenney has received a letter from A. N. Waite, a San Francisco boy in the First California. He speaks of the native renders of edibles as the worst of thieves. "Such a contrast to the natives of Hawaii. There we found them generous and trustful. Here they are mercenary, suspicious and dishonest. We are all disgusted with their treatment of us especially as most of the boys show a willingness to be lenient. The natives are making more money than ever before and all comes from the soldiers.

"The tropical fruits are not compared with the products of your islands, either in size or flavor. The bananas, or some at least, actually have not flavor but taste more like apples. We are all looking forward to a speedy settlement of this trouble as we want to get home, and the stop at Honolulu is one of the greatest incentives."

For the week ending Sunday, September 18, there were 50,000 fish received at the market. The number will be slightly less this week.

## SAD HEARTS GRATEFUL

Relatives of Sergeant Fletcher Thank

## ROOSEVELT TO HIS RIDERS

Typical Farewell "Teddy" Speech Delivered.

Urges His Men Not to Rest on Their Laurels—Tribute to Chaplain Brown and Valor of the Men.

Camp Wikoff, (Montauk Point, N. Y.), Sept. 4.—Colonel Roosevelt made his farewell speech to his plucky boys this morning at service. It was a typical "Teddy" Roosevelt speech that he made, full of common sense, homely precept and keen wit, and the Rough Riders enjoyed it immensely. Five hundred bronzed and bearded men squatted Indian fashion on the parched grass in front of the open tents. On a little platform were a folding organ, four young women to lead the singing, Major Whittle of the Soldiers' Christian Association, Chaplain Brown and Colonel Roosevelt.

After the lesson the men sang "Onward, Christian Soldier," very heartily. Major Whittle then made a short address, and led his hearers in singing the "Battle Hymn of the Republic." After this Colonel Roosevelt made his way to the side of the organ. He said:

Men, or rather comrades, of the Rough Riders: We are not really saying good-by. It's going to be a week or ten days before we are mustered out, and in that time I shall see each one of you for a personal good-by talk. But I wanted to talk to you on the war when you were all together, and I embraced the chance.

You know how closely we are knit together, more closely, I believe, than ever a body of men were. Death only is going to break our friendship and loyalty. We were satisfied to keep on fighting. We did not say after Las Quasinos, "Well, that's enough. Let some other regiment do the rest." In fact, when we were asked that night as we lay in trenches if we did not want to be relieved we said, "Oh, no; we are here now and we will stay."

But as we have got to stop fighting and go back to the more prosaic, but no less important, ways of peace, we must agree at last to keep up our friendships. The association we have formed will be a priceless possession to us and the proudest of inheritance to our sons.

Now, to make this perfect we must act in our future life on the ever higher grade. Don't go home, boys, and lean on your laurels. Laurels wither, you know, and they are not comfortable as a permanent bed. Don't put on any "edge" because of your fine record. The world will stand that for about ten days. Then it will say, "Rather a pity he went to the war, isn't it?"

The Colonel then paid a glowing tribute to Chaplain Brown for his courage and helpfulness in Cuba, saying: "He was on the fire line as often as any of us in his work of rescuing the wounded men, and he had a carbine in that first day of the fight."

The Rough Riders cheered themselves hoarse at this and the chaplain blushed like an ingenue.

"If the reverend gentlemen will pardon me," said the Colonel in conclusion, "I will tell one little story. Several persons called on me yesterday and said, 'Oh, you were brave to lead your men up that hill.'"

"Why, I didn't lead them," I answered. "I had to run like hell to keep them from running over me."

Phew! The Commission has gone. Now take a breathing spell.

No American has to think twice over the meaning of the term "liberal franchise." It is manhood suffrage; nothing more and nothing less.

If the American Union party played to the galleries, then the majority of the people of Hawaii are in the galleries.

Speaker Reed's reelection to Congress shows a falling off of 4000 votes compared with 1896. We suppose local political lights will say the cause of this was Reed's opposition to Hawaiian annexation.

We would suggest that the Advertiser send a marked copy of this morning's paper to Washington so that the American members of the Commission will know where the Cabinet stands.

It appears that the minority of the Central Committee opposed to the memorial consisted of one and a very small one at that. The BULLETIN supposed that F. J. Lowrey was one of the absent members. It is W. J. Lowrie of Ewa who is a member of the Committee.

It is a noticeable fact that the sentiment of the local Grand Army post speaks for American territorial expansion. The men who stood behind the country in its most critical period do not fear the ability of future generations to hold high the standard of American power.

We are very glad to know even at this late day that the Cabinet members consider themselves handicapped in their relations with the people, by reason of their appointment at the hands of President McKinley. We apologize gentlemen, but why didn't you speak before?

Reports from Manila re Aguinaldo & Co. are very similar to those published from Cuba "before the war." First Aguinaldo is quiet and then again he is obstreperous and more troops are needed to cool him down. It seems rather unfortunate that an opportunity did not offer in the first place to give the insurgents a good "licking."

The murder of Austria's noble queen demonstrates that the world is far away from the millenium. People can sometimes understand why men in public life are attacked, but the murder of a defenseless and universally beloved woman may be put down as one of the most dastardly crimes of the century. Such events make one wonder whether lynching is really a crime.

If our correspondent "A. H." does not think the Oahu railroad has been all that it ought to be, we would ask, Where would the development of Oahu's agricultural resources have been today had it not been for the indefatigable work of Manager Dillingham? There has been so much hard honest work put into this proposition, that the public is inclined to the belief that the railroad is entitled to all it has gained.

**SENATOR CULLOM'S WORDS.**

There is a great deal of latent meaning in the remark of Senator Cullom through the BULLETIN that "any effort on the part of any persons, or any body of persons, to change the situation from the policy which has been adopted annexing the Islands as part of the United States of America, will prove to be futile and only work an injury in so far as the influence of such action may affect the masses of the common people."

Of course many will draw the attention of those who appealed for restoration to this. It certainly applies to them. But may it not also apply to the various organizations that have applied for favorable exceptions to American laws. It is pretty generally accepted the American members of the Commission will not deem it advisable to go before their constituents in the fall elections with the statement that the newly annexed territory cannot be taken care of without upsetting some of the foundation American principles expressed in the present laws of the country. The farmers of Illinois are not liable to receive with favor special legislation for Asiatic labor. They will be very cold hearted on this proposition, as will the labor organizations that flourish throughout the country.

We may be positive that American statesmen will be sure to look after their local fences first, and the people will not be quick to appreciate that Hawaii or any other of the new islands should have special favors. The people here will find that they are merely a drop in the bucket when pitted against the labor organizations alone. Then there is the beet sugar crowd as well as American sentiment that no section of the country is better than another, to run against.

The American Commissioners have been good listeners, and they appreciate the necessities for local commercial success, but we doubt very much whether they will throw overboard the sentiments of their constituents. After all it is the American people who will designate the colonial policy of the United States and no one realizes it better than the Senators and Congressmen.

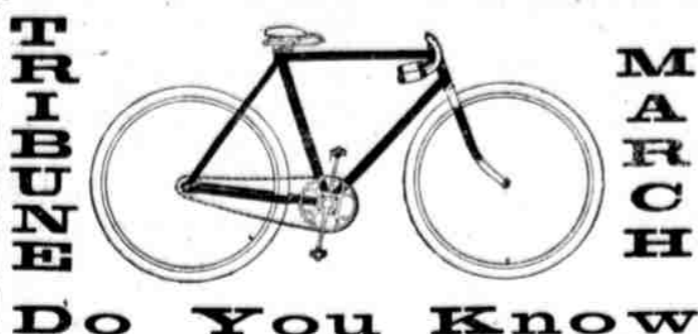

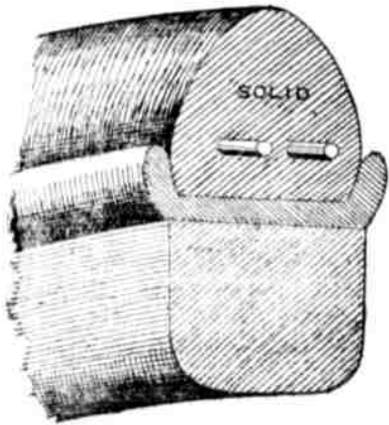
