Advices received by the steamer W. G. Hall state that the volcano of Kilauea continues in an active condition, displaying at night a very fiery glow similar to what was reported ten days ago.

The tram cars recently arrived from San Francisco are now running in the city tram system. They give very considerable relief to the former overcrowding conditions, as the trips are now more frequent.

Up to 11 o'clock last night the arrests were: One for using threatening language, one for violating carriage rules, and a Chinaman for larceny of a pair of sleeve buttons.

The Kamehamehas and Hawaiis will play the baseball game to-day on the Makiki diamond. It is also announced that the Nipsics and Kaulais will have another game next Wednesday on the same ground at 3:30 p. m.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Queen's Hospital will be held in the Chamber of Commerce this forenoon at 10 o'clock. Important business, relative to a change in the by-laws, will be brought before the meeting.

There is a bust-model of a child on exhibition at the art-store of Messrs. King Bros. It is a white plaster cast, and a work of fancy by Mr. Hutchinson, the sculptor. The expression is peculiar, and the model is worthy of a visit.

Opening of Oahu College. Mr. Editor: Oahu College and Punahou Preparatory School open on Monday next September 9th, at 9 o'clock a. m. I desire to call especial attention to the new order of things in the matter of transportation. No omnibusses will be run by the college for the accommodation of students. All who plan to attend either school will do well to study the advertisement of the Tramways Co., as published in the ADVERTISER.

The students' car leaves Puna, on Nuuanu street, at 8:23 a. m., and running by way of School, Fort and Beretania streets, will furnish ample accommodation for all who come to Punahou.

Only one fare will be charged on this car, payable in "students tickets" only, in the sale of which a liberal discount is made to those who purchase in quantity. There seems to be only one drawback to the accommodation provided by the Tramways Co., viz, that they do not run to the upper gate on the campus, as they did last term. Mr. Gribble found it necessary to remove the track to a point opposite the lower gate, and has not been able to replace it. It is hoped that this section of the line may be replaced at an early date, when, with the present schedule of trips, the company would provide all the accommodation needed for students and friends.

Protest of Paris' Wine Merchants.

The wine merchants of Paris held a meeting the other day to petition the municipal council for the suppression of the municipal laboratory, which they declare is ruining their business. M. Girard, the chemical analyst and manager of the laboratory, has just published in the Soir a letter in which he shows that what the wine merchants really claim is a sort of impunity to adulterate their wine, and to defraud the state and this city of Paris of their dues.

He says: What the wine merchants want is permission to sell to the consumer water at the same price as wine. The municipal laboratory draws samples of wine from the casks as they enter Paris, and also samples from the same barrels after they are placed in the stores of the wine merchants. The result arrived at by the laboratory is, that the wine is mixed with water in large proportions. By adding water four casks of wine are turned into five, and the laboratory experts have calculated that more than 5,000 wine merchants practice this kind of fraud. Moreover, the experts have discovered that wine is clandestinely made in Paris of raisins, apples, pears, prunes, etc. Other wine merchants mix low priced Spanish wines with the produce of French vineyards, and sell the mixture as genuine French wine. In this way the city of Paris has been defrauded of nearly 300,000 francs during the last few months, as wine thus manufactured pays no octroi dues.

There are annually consumed in Paris 5,000,000 hectolitres of wine. The wine merchants claim the right of replacing these millions of hectolitres by 1,000,000 hectolitres of water. As the duty is 18 francs per hectolitre the state and the city, who divide the octroi dues, lose 18,000,000 francs per annum. Official documents state that the wine merchants purchase nearly as much foreign as French wine.

Poisoned by a Sturgeon.

Ma J. Sheffield, who was out on crutches the other day receiving the congratulations of his friends, stated that he felt first-rate, and hoped to be able to throw away his wooden legs in a short while. To a Register man he gave some additional information concerning his encounter with a sturgeon. The fish, he said, about a yard wide, and the sting penetrated his leg about three inches. The first sensation was as if he had been pinched right sharply. He was about 200 yards from the shore at the time. Knowing himself hurt, he rowed as rapidly as possible. About half way in the poison began to pass through the system, and the pain became terrible. When the sting was pulled out the barbs spread out all around and lacerated the flesh, making a hole an inch wide.

"Ordinarily," said the major, "a little whisky effects me very quickly, but on this occasion I drank over a pint of whisky—maybe a quart—and swallowed two doses of morphia, and all of it had no more effect than so much water."

"Did you holler?"

"No, but I gressed and I grit my teeth mightily hard. I tell you it was the most awful suffering a man ever passed through. I don't think I could have stood any more of it than I got. I believe I would have gone to pieces if it had not let up just when it did. Three more minutes of it would have made me crazy."

"How long did the pain last?"

"The severe pain lasted five solid hours. My leg swelled up as big as a watermelon, and it hurt in every inch of its increased proportions. Since the pain stopped I have had a pleasant time. I cannot begin to tell you how kind everybody has been to me."

Hereditary Transmission.

Mr. Francis Yalton, at the recent meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, delivered an address in which he discussed the conditions of stability and instability of "types" with reference to the existence of this same law which governs hereditary transmission. Nature, says Mr. Yalton, is always trying experiments and producing new types, some useful, others useless in human beings. When a child develops some peculiarity which is profitable and agreeable, it is the duty of the parents to "domesticate and perpetuate it." Nature's little experiments should be aided by our intelligence; valuable forms of family type should be conserved, and the conditions favoring their perpetuation should be established. A race of men and women may thus be eventually evolved as superior to the present, and the developed ground is to the primal dog.

The Very Last Shot by Lee's Men.

Joe Dewberry says that Nap Crosby fired the last gun of the war on the Confederate side in Gen. Lee's army. At the time of the surrender at Appomattox the Federals and Confederates were drawn up in lines facing each other and but a few feet apart. The latter were almost starved, having been without food for several days. While the terms of surrender were being arranged some very good-hogs came along near the line, and as soon as they discovered them he raised his gun and took one of them in. The shooting of the hog created a considerable sensation for a little while, as it was thought by some that the Yanks and Rebs had got into a fight among themselves. The facts were soon understood, however, and Nap, and his friends had a good time eating pork for dinner.

Newspaper Iteration.

Every journalist knows what persistent iteration, what repeated, well-aimed knocking of the same nail on the head, is required to hammer an idea into the public mind, and how impotent it is to extract an idea once well driven in. But mere newspaper iteration fails for two obvious reasons. The best utterances of a party journal seldom reach its opponents, and are taken at a heavy and often exaggerated discount even by its readers.

Plants Which Grow on Money.

Although a variety of microscopic forms of plants have been found on bank notes and coins in circulation, none known to be dangerous to human life has yet been discovered.

Multiplication of Infusoria.

Two microscopists, Dr. Nussbaum and Dr. Gruber, have artificially multiplied infusoria by cutting them in halves, each half becoming a perfectly developed animal.

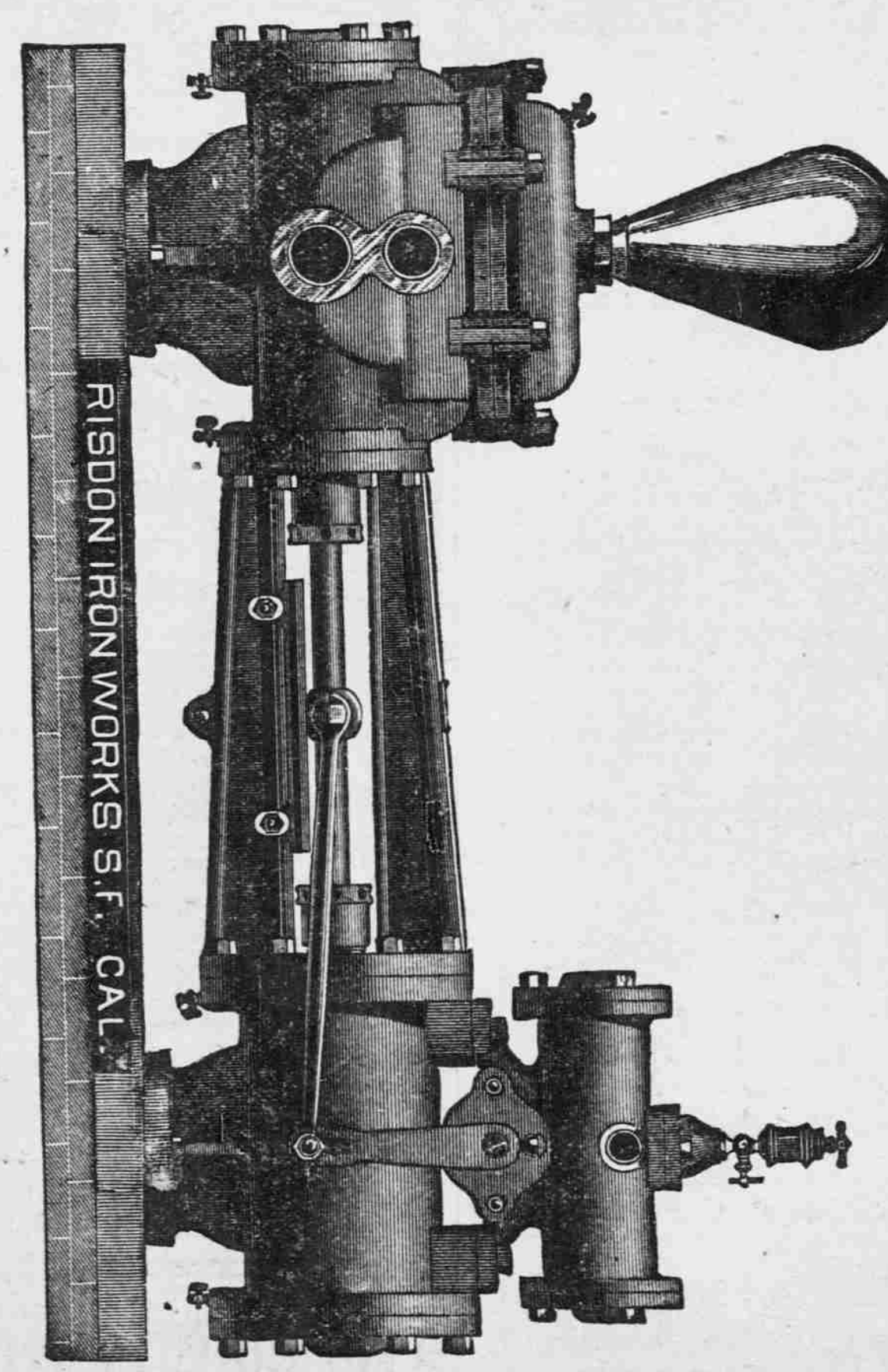

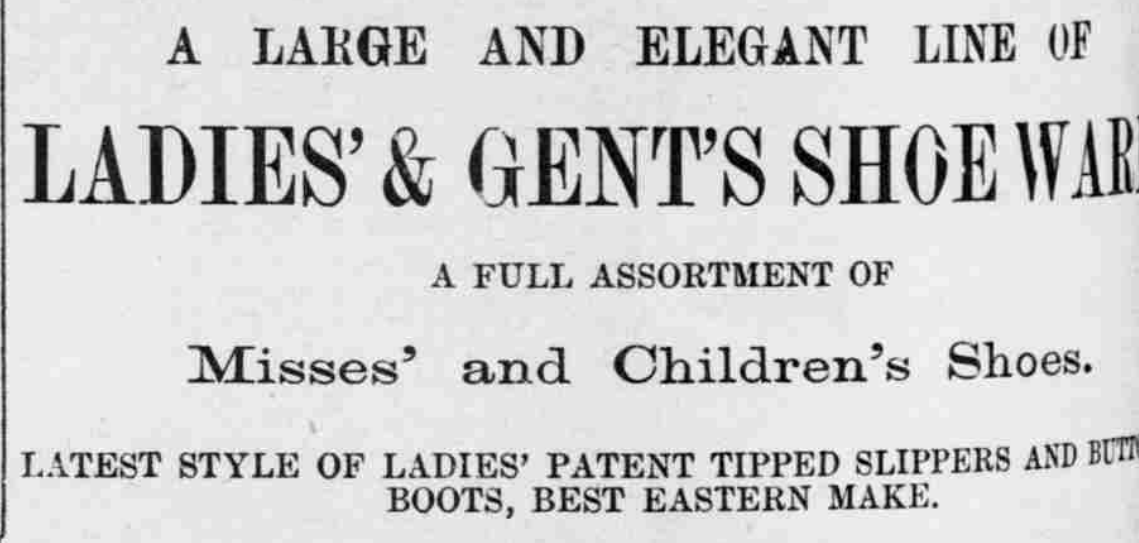
