SATURDAY, May 8th.

BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS. Minister Gulick read the first time by title an act to prevent obstructions on the streets of Honolulu and other towns.

Rep. Dickey read a first time an act relating to stamp duties.

Minister Neumann gave notice of an act amendatory of sec. 2, chap. 28, laws of 1878, relating to the import duties on wines. (The object of this act is to encourage the introduction of California wines in preference to those of other counries.) Also, an act to provide for the codifying of the laws of the kingdom. By permission, the Minister also read a first time an act amendatory of the Sunday law. It imposes a penalty not exceeding \$50 for disturbing public worship, and forbids work and trade on Sunday, but exempts railways, steamboats, daily newspapers, barber's shops, etc., from the operation of the law.

Rep. Dole gave notice of an act to amend the law relating to the collection of taxes. Also, moved that the resolution for a hospital at Libue be taken from the Internal Improvements Committee and referred to the Sanitary Committee. Carried.

The President intimated to the house that Admiral Seymour, through Hon. C. H. Judd, His Majesty's Chamberlain, had invited the members of the Legislature to visit II. B. M. S. Triumph at 10 o'clock on Monday.

ISLAND NEWS.

OAHU.

Capt. McGregor, of the schooner Manuokawai, reports strong trade winds with frequent squalls at Koolau, during a portion of last week. The wells recently put down at Laie are flowing, but not abundantly, and are therefore to be made deeper. The rice crop is looking well, and harvest will begin next week.

NITHAU. The wrecked steamer Planter is broken to pieces, one half having gone one way and the other half another. Her bow is embedded in the coral and one blade of her propeller, projects above water. Her boiler, which, it may be remembered, was taken out, is now a shapeless mass. With every high sea it rolls shoreward for about 50 feet, and retufns with the same billow. Mr. Gay, who purchased the wreck for firewood, is gathering the pieces as they drift ashore. The Iwalani succeeded in getting the windlass and smokestack, besides a few odd

The Mariposa came to the wharf about 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. She brought six or eight passengers for Honolulu, and had on board over 200 in transit, for the Coast, among whom were Sir Anthony Musgrave, ex-Governor of Queensland, and Mr. Service, ex-Premier of the colony of Victoria. Most of the passengers came ashore during Saturday afternoon and evening and Sunday, and took in the sights. A great many visited the recreation grounds at Makiki, where the game of cricket was in progress, Saturday afternoon. Several parties drove to the pali during Sunday, and one, man, William J. L. Seriven.

comprised of Sir A. Musgrave, Captain Pritchett, General Freemantle, and Hon, J. Service, visited and inspected the palace. The passengers in general seemed extremely pleased with what they saw of Honolulu, its surroundings, and its people.

Among other visitors of note from the Colonies were the Rev. S. Me-Farlane, from New Guinea; Rev. Geo. Brown, from New Britain, and Rev. W. H. Fitchett, B. A., president of a ladies' college, at Hawthorne, Melbourne. Mr. McFarlane was sent to New Caledonia some 28 years ago by the London Missionary Society, where he labored 13 years, and had, among other successes, established a native seminary. Taking with him eight young men of his own training, he went in 1871 to start a mission in New Guinea, where he has labored up to the time of leaving on his present journey.

Mr. Brown has been laboring under the auspices of the Wesleyan Mission of Australia in New Britain since 1875, at which time there was

not a white man on the island. The three gentlemen, having accidentally met Dr. Hyde, at the Postoffice, Saturday, were taken in charge by him and shown round the city. Mr. Fitchett preached in Fort street Church Sunday morning, and in the afternoon, Messrs, McFarlane and Brown addressed a meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, giving accounts of their experiences and do-

ings among the cannibals. A great crowd assembled at the wharf to see the steamer off last evening. A very few were leaving from here, but among the few were Signor Campobello and Miss May Spring, who had many friends, made during their brief visit to Henolulu, to bid them adieu.

THE LEGISLATURE VISITS THE TRIUMPH.

At ten o'clock this forenoon a steam launch towing two gigs from H. B. M. S. Triumph came into Brewer's dock to convey members of the Legislature outside the reef to that noble ship. The following members embarked on the train: Noble Kaae and Representatives Kaai, Pachaole, Kaukau, Wight, Dickey, Kauhi, Kalua, Nahale, Kauai, Richardson and Lilikalani. Mr. Nowlein, Sergeant-at-Arms; Mr. Pierce, Secretary, and Rev. J. Waiamau, Chaplain, together with representatives of the daily papers, were also passengers. Immediately after this flotilla the Admiral's launch, in charge of his aid, darted out of the dock, having on board His Majesty the King, Hon. C. H. Judd, H. M. Chamberlain; Major Wodehouse, H. B. M. Commissioner; Mon. A. S. Cleghorn, and Col. Boyd, of H. M. staff. Hon. S. Parker, Captain Haley and others

On the first boats approaching the ship, a salute of sixteen guns was fired, and the yards were manned. The guests were received on board and the Admiral gave especial atvessel during the party's stay on board. Besides being shown the guns great and small, the guests were treated to exhibitions of gunnery drill, manuel exercises, etc., and torpedoes were fired off twice at a flag target several hundred yards from the vessel. The curious eighrshaped machine was shot out of the muzzle of a gun used for that purpose, and diving down about a fathom maintained a uniform depth the entire passage. Propelled by compressed air it flew at perhaps twenty knots past the target, and then a bright chemical flame and a wreath of smoke showed a waiting boat's crew where to find and take it in tow. The Hawaiian flag was flying at the mainmast of the Triumph in honor of the occasion, and the boats carrying the different detachments of the party flew similar compliments. Admiral Seymour gave the party a hospitable reception in the cabin.

THE OLD BETHEL.

Of all the buildings that stood on the thirty acres of land swept by the late fire, the old Bethel was probably the one having the most intimate connection with the history of the Hawaiian Islands. It was the first church edifice, erected for worship. in the English language, in Polynesia, and its history reaches back to a period anterior to the building of churches for the like purpose on the west coast of America.

The Bethel was one of three foreign chaptaincies established in 1832 by the American Seamen's Friend Society in Honolulu, Havre and Canton respectively. The first chap-lain was the Rev. John Diell, who, with his wife, and the Rev. Lowell Smith, Rev. B. W. Parker and their wives, arrived here on board the whaleship Mentor, Capt. Rice, the Fith May, 1833, round the Horn. Along with this band of missionaries, the ship carried matterials for the building of the church. On the 28th November, '33, the dedication of the church took place, the sermon being preached by Mr. Diell from the text, "And Who Is My Neighbor?" His Majesty King Kamebameha III., with the Premier Kinau and her sister, occupied a sofa in front of the desk. Mr. Diell was succeeded by Rev. Mr. Tinker, after whom came the Rev. S. C. Damon. installed pastor, the second Sunday in April, 1850, the congregation having been organized on the 3rd of the same month. Doctor Damon, whose life and labors are wellknown, was identified with the Bethel up to 1884, when he resigned, only a few months previous to his death. The present pastor, Rev. E. C. Oggel, has been in the pastorate of the Bethel congregation since the 15th April, 1885. He preached the last sermon in the Bethel on the morning of the 18th. about six hours before the building was wrapped in flames, from the text, "For there is one God, and, one mediator between God and man the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself a ransom for all." One of the hearers on this occasion was the venerable Rev. Lowell Smith, D. D., who was present also as one of the assembly that met at the

DACCETT'S BUSINESS RUINED BY A MULE.

Many years ago down in Idaho during the gold excitement a good many men went into the country to make money outside the gold-hunting industry. Their idea was to make the other fellows delve for the gold, while they appropriated it afterward. Rollin Daggett, afterward Nevada's congressman, established a ferry boat on a small creek. and named the place "Death's Ford," at the same time inventing a musty legend to the effect that it was thus named because so many lives had been lost in an attempt to cross it. The stream was not more than a dozen yards wide, and the water nowhere more than two feet deep; but he rigged up a flatboat, and pulled it back and forth by a rope contrivance. Whenever the prospectors crossed he regaled them with horrible tales of the treachery of the stream, and the remorseless quicksands which had drawn so many men and mules to terrible deaths.

In the night when he ferried people over he would caution them not to get too near the edge of the boat. as a fall overboard was certain death. By letting the dim old lantern go out and making slow time, he frequently impressed the a passengers with the idea that the stream was half a mile wide. For night trips he charged \$5, but if the wind was high and the weather bad heistuck sanguine prospectors for much larger sums. In the daytime \$1 was his modest charge. He went along in this way for several months, the men who rushed to the hills looking upon him as a benefactor to his race by this conquering of so formidable an obstacle to travel as "Death's Ford."

One day Charley Stoddard, the promoter, appeared on the bank with a mule, and boarded the flatboat to cross. In the middle of the stream, just when the ferryman was telling how dangerous the place was, the mule grew restive and fell overboard. One leg caught on a rope, and he got his head under water, and, unable to extricate himself, was drowned. When he was cut loose he lay there in the middle of "Death's Ford," half out of the water, so that all who came along saw what a miserable sham the ferry was, and that any four-footed animal could walk across. Daggett tried to get the mule away; but he was too heavy to budge, and so he lay there in plain sight for weeks, man was ruined. - [Carson Appeal, | 318]




