FOREIGN NEWS.

St. Louis, Mo., April 6.—United States Senator J. R. Burton was today sentenced to imprisonment of six months and pay a fine of \$2,500. The case has been appealed.

Washington, D. C., April 5.—The Senate amendment to the Panama Canal Administration Bill permitting the use of Panal Canal bonds by National banks as security for bank-note circulation, was today favorably reported by the committee. This amendment will place canal bonds on the same basis as far as National banks are concerned as United States bonds now accepted as security for National Bank circulation.

St. Petersburg, Russia, April 5.—General Pflug reports that there are no Japanese troops in Manchuria. The entire Japanese force is believed to be concentrated on the Korean border, where it is preparing for a general advance later in the season.

St. Petersburg, April 5.—It is rumored that the Government has bought four Turkish cruisers, built by Germany, and two built in France, paying \$20,000,000 for them.

Shanghai, China, April 4.—Japanese scouts today entered the town of Wiju and met no opposition. The Russian have apparently retreated beyond the Yalu river.

West Tampa, Fla., April 4.—A terrible fire is sweeping through the district where the large cigar factories of this city are located. Twelve blocks have already been destroyed and the fire has not been checked.

TELEGRAPHIC ITEMS

Anti-Jewish riots are portended at Kieff and Odessa.

The Russians are utilizing trained dogs as army messengers.

225,000 cases of Alaska salmon have been purchased by Japan.

Gaylan de Ayala, the first Spanish Minister to Cuba has arrived.

There was another bombardment of Port Arthur on last Sunday.

It is estimated that Russia will have 350,000 men in the field by July.

The territory between Port Arthur and Taichow is in a state of siege.

The Russian press discusses the Thibetan incident dispassionately.

Good coal deposits have been discovered in the vicinity of Port Arthur.

There is a general thaw in Korea and Manchuria, and the roads are impassable.

Fugitives who left Vladivostok when hostilities began are returning to the city.

A marine guard of twenty men has been ordered to Midway island to protect property there.

Viceroy Alexieff says that the damage done to the Port Arthur fleet by the Japanese is very slight.

The season's output of the American Beet Sugar Company's refineries is estimated at 81,053 tons.

The survivors of the sunken cruisers Korietz and Variag received a tremendous ovation at Sebastopol.

All the coal mines in Iowa have shut down on account of a strike, and 13,500 miners are out of work.

The Russian railroad across Lake Baikal has been abandoned on account of the breaking up of the ice.

The Japanese military strength consists of 260,000 moving troops, 60,000 garrison troops and 120,000 reserves.

The American specie pack train from the Unsan mines, Korea, which was held up south of Anju, has been released.

The Wilder steamship Likelike, recently launched from a San Francisco ship yard, sailed for Honolulu last Saturday.

Orders have been given to the commander of the Russian fleet at Vladivostok to sink all vessels entering the port at night.

There is serious apprehension in London that complications with Russia and China may follow the British advance in Tibet.

Russian engineers hope to raise the Japanese merchantmen which were sunk as obstructions in the mouth of Port Arthur harbor.

David B. Hill states that the New York delegation to the St. Louis Convention will be instructed for Judge Parker for President.

Lieutenant Commander Warburton, attached to the battleship Maine, committed suicide at Pensacola, Florida, last Saturday.

The Dutch troops in northern Sumatra lately engaged an intrenched body of Achinese, killing 541. The Dutch lost three killed and twenty-five wounded.

The Thibetans attacked General Younghusband's forces in Thibet, and were defeated with a loss of 400 men and their general, the British losing twelve men.

Senator Foraker has introduced a bill providing that the governor of Hawaii may remove officials for cause, without the assistance of the Territorial senate.

Japan's second army of 50,000 men completed its landing in Korea on March 30. The artillery is moving slowly, and a great battle is not expected for a month.

The companies of Coast Artillery now stationed at Honolulu will be relieved in May by the Twenty-eighth and Twenty-second companies now stationed at the Presidio.

LEAGUE GAMES GOSSIP

The following are the ground rules adopted by the Baseball League for 1904:

- 1 This baseball league shall be known as the Maui Baseball league.
- 2 The league shall be under the auspices of the Maui Athletic Ass'n.
- 3 It shall consist of the following team, viz: Wailuku, Morning Stars, Kahului, Makawao.
- 4 The games shall be guided by Spaulding's 1903 Baseball rules, and the rules of the Maui Athletic Association, until the 1504 Rules arrive.
- 5 All teams appearing on the grounds to play a scheduled game, shall appear in uniform. No person will be allowed to participate in a game unless he wear the complete uniform of his team. Neither agreement of Captains nor any prior arrangement shall invalidate this rule.
- 6 No team shall be allowed to enter a player who has played a scheduled game of the Season of 1904 as a member of another team, unless such shall have disbanded or such member shall have been discharged from some team, of this league.
- 7 This Rules Committee shall remain in office until the season is completed. The shall have jurisdiction over any violation of these rules and through them will come the notification of the Maui Athletic Association hereinafter spoken of.
- 8 Any team disbanded shall give written notice of such disbandment to the above committee, who will notify the Association.
- 9 Games shall be called at 2.30 P. M. Said time taken by the Catholic Church clock.
- 10 Any team failing to play on the call of time by the Official Umpire shall forfeit the game to their opponents.
- 11 No game shall be called by the Umpire unless the grounds are in proper condition.
- 12 The Association shall provide at least four Regulation Spaulding or Spaulding or Reach Championships Baseballs for each scheduled game. The used balls to go to the winning team.
- 13 There shall be one official umpire and official scorer at each game.
- 14 The Association shall see that the grounds reserved for playing are clear of all persons other than officials and players.
- 15 None but a Captain of a team or his legalized Deputy shall be allowed to address the Umpire, in relation to any decision of that official, under a penalty of \$1.00 fine for the first offense, and suspension from the game for the second.

A \$20,000,000 Junk Pile.

Within the next thirty days the United States will own the Panama canal property, which includes a \$20,000,000 junk pile.

Heaped along the line of the canal at Colon, at Emperado and at other points are quantities of machinery and supplies for the construction of the canal which cost millions of dollars, but are practically valueless.

They were bought by the old Panama Canal Company, but before a large proportion of them were used it had come to an untimely end, and the supplies were left to the fate of time. When the Isthmian Canal Commission visited the isthmus two years ago, it found these supplies so vast in quantity that it could only occasionally examine them. It has been estimated—although there are but few, if any, who know exactly how much was spent in this way—that they might have cost \$20,000,000. Although all of this material is less than 25 years old, it is relatively so antiquated in design that the commission recommended that the United States pay no attention to its existence in making an offer for the purchase of the canal property.

The supplies piled up on the isthmus range from articles of crockery to locomotives, excavators, dredgers, cars and hospitals. There are 2,431 buildings of various sorts, including those which were intended and used as offices, quarters for the thousands of laborers, storehouses, hospitals and machine shops. The value of the hospital alone is nearly one million dollars. There are the structures and doubtless the United States will make allowance for them. Many of the other buildings from disuse, are showing signs of decay. In the machine shops are steam hammers and great turning lathes for making repairs to the large pieces of machinery used in excavation. There are scores of locomotives which the members of the commission were told had never been used, and their appearance bore out the statement.

There has been an impression that the old Panama Canal Company wasted large sums of money in the purchase of useless machinery. Rear Admiral Walker, President of the

Wanted, a drygoods store. This is the first time that the NEWS has ever voiced this want, for obvious reasons, and now asks for it only because the need is becoming too strenuous to be borne quietly. If there were a drygoods store in Wailuku, the NEWS would not ask for another, but one can examine the advertising columns of the NEWS from beginning to end, and not one drygoods store appears. It is rumored however that there are stores in Wailuku, some of which carry drygoods, but the NEWS in not in a position to officially confirm or deny the rumor. One thing is certain however, and that is that if a gentleman wants a suit of clothes, a shirt or even a linen collar, he must send away for it. The ladies also are compelled to send away for most of their needs in the line of ladies' dress goods and the thousand little needs of their daily lives. Now is the time for some live drygoods man to come to Wailuku and start an up-to-date drygoods store, with a varied stock of ladies' and gentlemen's dress goods and a general line of like supplies.

Public opinion throughout the Islands has crystallized on the matter of a brief session of the legislature, which must be devoted wholly to a proper adjustment of our finances, to be followed by immediate adjournment, and any member who tries to force extraneous matters into the legislature will thereby sign his own political death warrant. The people do not want and will not stand for any doing of politics at this juncture, and any member of either branch of the legislature who tries to rub salt into our wounds by forcing any political issue, should be marked for slaughter. Now is the time for the Hawaiians to prove themselves patriots, above the clamor of party, and God pity the haoles who fail to follow the example which it is ardently hoped that our brother Hawaiians will set. In this connection the NEWS solemnly warns both haoles and Hawaiians against the use of any more than a limited quantity of hot air.

Carter is right and Cooper is wrong in the recent contention between them. Retrenchment all around is an absolute necessity, and the people have not forgotten the millions needlessly squandered, to the almost bankruptcy of the Territory, by the doctors several years since, in the fight against the bubonic plague in Honolulu and Kahului. Give us hospitals where needed, provide government physicians for necessary and extreme cases, and exercise reasonable sanitary precautions in Honolulu, but cut down expenses to reasonable and necessary dimensions. And those doctors on the Board of Health who have grown too large to heed the wishes of the government and the people should follow Dr. Cooper's example, and pass up their resignations. Do you hear that, Dr. Mays?

The citizens of Wailuku are to be congratulated on the results which have already sprung from their united efforts to advance the various interests of their district, but the NEWS also now gives fair warning that unless more is done, all efforts to date will be barren of fruit. In other words, now that the work of the Improvement Association has begun, every citizen must continue zealously in season and out of season to urge constant and repeated iteration of our needs. All having the interests of the district at heart should attend next Thursday evening's meeting, and every meeting called thereafter. There is much good in store for Wailuku, but it will require constant and patient effort to achieve the full measure of results.

There is no particular reason why the republicans should not win out on Maui this fall, even against a combination of democrats and home rulers. The combination had its chance last fall, and the result of the election was a demonstration of the fact that the combination officers elect were not suitable men. But the arbitrary method adopted by the republican leaders last fall must be abandoned, or another home rule victory is bound to follow. The people must and will have their say as to who the candidates shall be. Last fall the republican ticket was slated and forced through against the will of the convention with properly disastrous results, and a like mistake must and will be avoided this fall.

By the Sonoma, there arrived in Honolulu the complete machinery for the pineapple cannery in Haiku. The installation of this factory is a direct fulfillment of what this paper has long prophesied. And this is not the only pineapple factory which will be established on Maui. The time will come when Maui will sell millions of dollars worth of canned pines annually, and some of us will live to see it.

It is beginning to be time when all spirit of childish acrimony should be laid aside or frowned down between the different teams of our baseball league. There has been too much of it in the past. True blue sport encourages generous rivalry, but leaves no room for babyism or humor. The leading spirit of each team should encourage a feeling of brotherhood between all the players.

There are a number of citizens of Wailuku who were unable at the last meeting of the Improvement Association to attend and sign the roll. All such are earnestly exhorted to be on hand next Thursday night and unite with the association. Wailuku is a growing town, and its growth should be fostered by every good citizen.

Judge Kalua claims to be a politician of twenty years' experience, but he has yet one lesson to learn, and that is to avoid one man power. Such an idea is radically opposed to the genius of self-government, and when one man undertakes to dominate the wills of the entire people, his finish is not far off.

United States Commission when asked about this at the hearing on the canal before the Senate committee, declared it to be his impression that it was not so much useless machinery which had been purchased as a surplus of useful machinery. Doubtless the failure of the canal company had something to do with the nonuse of the supplies, but it is said by those acquainted with the work upon the canal that it would have been impossible to utilize at one time all the machinery taken to the isthmus. In this item of machinery millions of dollars, which were drawn from the savings of the people of France, have been sunk, never to be recovered.

Judge Kalua adjourned court till June 6, but failed to lock up the attorneys in the meantime. You should have juggled the whole lot, Judge.

The annual meeting of the Maui Racing Association will be held at Wailuku this evening, for the purpose of the annual election of officers.

Both the civil and criminal calendar of the District Court at Wailuku are in a congested condition, and the District Magistrate is kept quite busy.

Every citizen of Wailuku should turn out at the regular monthly meeting of the Improvement Association at the Courthouse next Thursday evening.

On Thursday morning, Judge Kalua revoked his order adjourning court to June 6, and will proceed with the ordinary work of the court as usual. Sensible idea.

KALUA REMOVED.

Washington, D. C., April 6.—President Roosevelt and Attorney General Knox held a conference today concerning the action of Circuit Judge Kalua of Maui. The appointment of a successor to Judge Kalua is imminent.

Washington, D. C., April 7.—President Roosevelt today removed Judge Kalua, Circuit Judge of Maui. His successor is not yet chosen but will probably be nominated soon.

WORKING FOR MAUI

On last Friday evening, the executive committee of the Improvement Association of Wailuku District, held a meeting to digest the work cut out for them at Wednesday's meeting of the Association.

It being learned at the meeting that Mr. Case, Mr. Coelho and Mr. Robertson of the executive committee were going to Honolulu on Saturday, they were appointed as a special committee to lay all matters considered before the government authorities and ask for information and action.

The committee held a long interview with Treasurer Kepoikai at the Hawaiian Hotel on Sunday, and received from him much needed information as well as a cordial support, which promise he more than fulfilled before the committee left Honolulu.

On Monday morning the committee, in company with Kepoikai held a long and interesting interview with Superintendent of Public Works, C. S. Holloway, and fully explained to him what the committee wished to accomplish, and received from him the assurance that he would extend his hearty cooperation in furtherance of their plans.

An interview was then sought with Governor Carter, who having learned through the Honolulu press that such a committee had arrived from Maui, appointed Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock for the interview. By invitation of the committee, Supt. Holloway and Treasurer Kepoikai were present at the appointed time and a long and informal but quite satisfactory interview was held with Governor Carter during which the fact was brought to view that in the loan bill, \$178,000 was appropriated for Maui, only one-half of which is available, for the reason that only one-half of the bonds have been sold.

Governor Carter informed the committee however that he had decided to sell the remaining one-half of the bonds on or before the first of July, so that the whole loan appropriation would be available during the summer.

The Governor then went into a careful investigation of the more important needs of Maui, a prepared list of which were presented by the committee. The matter of equipping the fire department was taken up, and it developed that the loan bill makes no provisions for hydrants, without which a fire department would be useless. Not long since, Honolulu ordered an additional lot of hydrants, and it was understood that the hydrants needed for Wailuku and Kahului were included in the order.

Superintendent Holloway however blushing confessed that when the Honolulu order went on, Wailuku had been cut out. It was agreed in the interview however, that Superintendent Holloway should at once forward an order for hydrants according to the specifications heretofore furnished to the department by Supt. Bal of the Wailuku water works. It was also agreed that hose carts and hose for two carts should at once be ordered, and that work should at once be begun on a fire department building.

The matter of the Iao Valley road was then taken up, and it was agreed that the work should be pushed. It was agreed that the bulk of the work should be done in the upper portion of the valley, leaving our road board to handle the lower end, as the amount appropriated is insufficient. Probably however the grade may be lowered near the reservoir as that can be done at a small expense according to the survey made some months since by Mr. Silliman.

Road work was then discussed and committee urged immediate work on the road and bridges to Maunaloa Bay, repairing the parapets on the pali road, and the building of much needed bridges near Olovalu. The upper Kula road, the road to Kihai, from Deahi to Kailua, the Nahiku road, the

road from Lahaina to Honolulu and from Honolulu to Waihee were also discussed, and the committee strongly urged that the work be begun on them as soon as possible.

The proposition of a jail at Wailuku was discussed in connection with the building of a courthouse. The impression of Governor Carter and Supt. Holloway seems to be that the use of the unfortunate word "county" in the clause appropriating money for the courthouse will tie the hands of the government. This is of course a silly contention, for there is not and never was a county government on Maui, and everyone knows that the appropriation was made for the specific purpose of building a courthouse at Wailuku. If however, the Governor and Supt. of Public Works insist on their contention there is nothing for the helpless people of Maui to do save to wait for legislative action, to smooth out the difficulty.

At the close of the interview Governor Carter was asked to state specifically what he would do for Maui. He declined to make any specific promise, but assured the committee that he would give the matters presented to him immediate consideration, and that the department of Public Works would take them up in detail and push them to a finish within the next few months.

ATHLETIC NOTES.

The News man was in Honolulu when the first league game of ball for the season was played in Wailuku, and is indebted to his under study in the News office for the following interesting skit, apropos of the game.

It was generally supposed that the Morning Stars having lost some of their best players, which forced them to put new material in the field, that the coming championship would be between the Kahuluis and Wailukus. But the first game played between the Stars and Makawaos on Sunday last proved that their new ones are a hard proposition. M. E. Meyer a son of our old townsman, D. L. Meyer, the first time in a league game, has certainly played wonderful ball.

Owing to the death of A. J. Rodrigues, the two Garcias members of the team, could not play and master Meyer was put in 2nd. baseman's place, and the ease with which he put three men out by his wonderful ball throwing should put all of opposing teams on their guard, what a cracker-jack coming pitcher?

When this young man plays a few games and learns what he has to do, he will certainly be a wonder, we predict a coming Champion in this Mauite.

The following is the official score of the game, the low record of the Makawaos being explained by the fact that they were playing on new ground, against a veteran team, and there is no doubt but that when they get one or two new men that they expect, and play one or two games, they will develop a formidable team.

SHIPPING NEWS

The bark St. Katherine, Captain
Saunders, sailed on Tuesday for San
Francisco with 11,278 bags sugar
from Onomea. 18,080 bags from Ho-
nomu, 3,000 lbs. coffee, 269 bundles
hides and skins and general mer-
chandise amounting to \$953. Total
cargo, \$109,320.58.—Hawaii Herald.

The Hawaiian American S. S. Tex-
an arrived in port Tuesday night, and
will take on sugar for Delaware
Breakwater. Capt. Horatio Timotheus
Lake will have charge of the
loading.—Hawaii Herald.

Newchwang, April 4.—The press
boat which was held by the Russians
has been released. The Russian com-
mander has explained that the boat
was detained on account of its coming
indirectly from Chemulpo.

San Francisco, Cal., April 2.—The
steamship Coptic sailed today for the
Orient via Honolulu. The Coptic car-
ries in her cargo 2,500 tons of freight
for Japan,—supplies that will pre-
sumably eventually reach the Japa-
nese army.

The U. S. S. Iroquois departed at
2 p. m. Monday for Midway, all re-
pairs to the intermediate cylinder
having been made. The vessel put
back to Honolulu on Sunday after
having gone seventy miles on the way
to Midway.

Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans,
commander-in-chief of the Asiatic
Station, cabled the Navy Department
on March 1 that the annual record
target practice of the battleships and
cruisers of his fleet had been com-
pleted, the following being the best
single scores made. In 11 minutes
and 20 seconds the best 13-inch gun of
the Wisconsin made nine hits, the
Oregon six hits and the Kentucky
made five hits. The best 5-inch gun
of the Kentucky made eleven hits in
two minutes. Letters received from
the Pacific Station announce the com-
pletion of the target practice of Rear
Admiral Glass's Squadron, but no
figures are given, though it is stated
that the records were as good as be-
fore.—Army and Navy Journal.

The S. S. Nevada arrived in Ka-
hului yesterday morning.
