LONDON GOSSIP.

A CURIOUS FISH
 Is now, on view at Mr. Kraft's, jeweler and watchmaker, on Merchant street, next to J. M. Oat, jr., & Co's. It was found alive on the beach at Waikiki, on Monday, by a native. It is oval in shape, and much broader at the head than anywhere else. It is about 7 in. long and 4 in thickness. It has no bones, apparently. It has a big mouth, from the upper lip of which projects a thin tendon or spine, with a thick development at the end, which was probably used to attract its food by moving it to and fro. It has only white spots as rudiments of eyes. It has a fin above and another below the tail, and both very close to it. On its body are small shells and coralline substances, so that it probably lived a very inactive life. Its stomach is flattened, and apparently it rested on it, and then looked much like a rock. But the most curious part about it are four fins, shaped like legs and feet, two in front and two behind its stomach. The fore fins or legs have five divisions or fingers, and the hind ones ten. The hind ones also appear to have bent legs under the skin, which were capable of movement. So far, no one that has seen it, has ever seen or heard of a fish with four legs, like this, before.

WHERE is that street sweeper that the Minister of the Interior told us, six months ago, was ordered from California? Has it got lost on the road? It is wanted now.

YESTERDAY we received a sample of some nice peaches grown up the valley, by Mr. Chas. Breing, owner of that fine block on the corner of Nuuanu and Queen street.

THE Road Supervisor has had Fort street and Queen street graded by the Government Surveyors, so that there will be no guess-work about the drainage. It will be a certain fact.

MR. A. G. Ellis reports having sold within the past few days, 97 shares Inter Island Steam Navigation Co. at previous price, 10 shares of Waimanalo at \$130, and 3 shares of Wailuku at \$900.

BEFORE stealing a word from your neighbour's vocabulary you should learn to spell it correctly first. Eh! Teaser? and besides it conveys no sensible meaning in the connection you use it.

IT is time to prepare for the exhibition of the Royal Hawaiian Agricultural Society. All those who intend to exhibit and compete for prizes according to the handsome varied schedule offered should fix on and prepare what they intend to exhibit.

WHY not employ a government water cart to lay the dust on the newly made roads out of the city. It was intended that this should be done while the Legislature was in session. But like many more beautiful promises of that period is still lacks fulfillment.

MESSRS. Hackfeld & Co. have received per Bishop, some luminous paint which will be used for their sign, and for harbour buoys, etc. This paint has the property of absorbing the rays of sunlight during the day, and giving it forth again at night.

THE Band gave an excellent extra concert on Monday night at Emma Square. Three new pieces were presented, of which, we think, the "Stephanie," gavotte, and "In the centre," galop, will be the most popular. A lot of new seats have been placed in the gardens. There are sufficient now to accommodate about a thousand people.

IT has been a matter of comment for some time that volunteers may be seen walking about the streets partly in uniform, and partly in plain clothes, when not on duty. It looks incongruous, and undisciplined to say the least of it. But the officers of the corps seem to take no heed of it.

THERE are tricks in all trades, but when a man will go round and ask that he should get the whole of a given kind of work when he knows that it is being distributed fairly already is an enemy to the sentiment, "Fair play and an equal footing to all." Still worse is it to go round and offer to lower prices and get the whole trade into your hands.

A LITTLE additional proof of the merits of our local yachts was obtained last Sunday. The Healan left here for Pearl River in the afternoon and arrived there about 6 p.m., meeting the Restless and the Hihilani. On the return she passed them, getting into port about 8 p.m., the Restless coming in an hour later, and the Hihilani not till early next morning.

YESTERDAY afternoon great attention was attracted by the presence, in the yard in front of Messrs. Hackfeld & Co., of a fine short-horn bull and two cows. These were imported from Oldenburg, North Germany, by Messrs. Hackfeld & Co. to the order of Judge McCully. One of the cows is in calf, and will shortly be delivered. The race from which these are selected originally came from the south of England, but they are now extensively reared Oldenburg. All three have an excellent pedigree. Considering the

long sea voyage they have arrived in splendid condition, and look likely to fulfil the traditional use of this race, "milk and meat." Judge McCully deserves great praise for his endeavors to raise the standard of stock in this country. Fuller particulars to-morrow.

A COUNTRY RIDE.
 NUMBER 3.

The road still skirts the lagoon, alternately rising over abrupt ledges and descending into narrow gulches. We pass some very fine springs of clear cold water on Mr. Robinson's property, just on the edge of the road. Further on the ubiquitous Chinaman has reclaimed the swamps from their crop of bulrushes, and substituted the useful rice. We are now on the confines of Honouliuh ranch, and we learn, that it stretches away up into the Waianae range and embraces all the plains and foot-hills that we see.

The loch here seems to once have had a larger area than it has at present, for the flats that we look down upon seem to have been formerly a part of the bed of the loch and to have been raised by the unseen operation of those volcanic forces which have had the greatest, if not the only share, in the formation of these islands.

For they are not continuous but divided into small gulches and openings, such as the water would make in the shores of a gulf, and they are enclosed by an almost perpendicular edged higher ground that was once the shore, when these flats were part of the bottom of the loch. It is extremely interesting to note the geological formations of these perpendicular cliffs, if we may so call them. At the surface is a loose rich loamy soil, which extends downwards with a varying depth of 1 to about 4 or 5 feet. Below this comes a hard brownish soil, like the hardpan known to miners. This is some 20 feet in thickness and sometimes more. Below this again is a narrow stratum of limestone or coral, showing a clear white seam from 1 to 2 feet thick, which contrasts strongly with the deep brown of the soil above and below. We were informed that this coral stratum is found wherever shafts have been sunk all over these plains.

The view from these plains is magnificent and tends to give one a greater idea of vastness than any other part of these islands we have yet been on. Far away to the left is the rim of blue, which marks the presence of the ocean, nearer is the archipelago which spangles the bosom of the lagoon, at our feet below are the flats but recently reclaimed from their primeval marshiness, while before us lie 8,000 acres of broad level plain unbroken by a rise of any kind, and to our right are the sharply defined outlines of the Waianae ranges resembling so much the Coast range of Southern California.

After feasting our eyes on the prospect before us we descend the declivity, and riding slowly along reach the hospitable abode of the owner of the ranch, Mr. Jas. Campbell, who receives us with that welcome courtesy which is so refreshing to the traveller after a toilsome journey.
 To-morrow we will give an account of the ranch and its resources, which will fitly end the story of our first Country Ride in these islands.

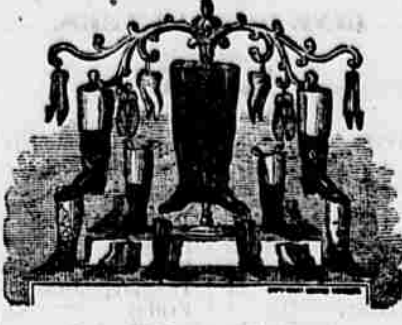

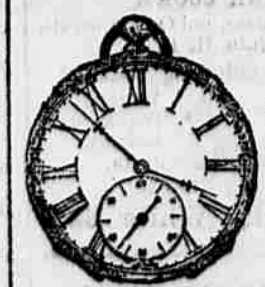
