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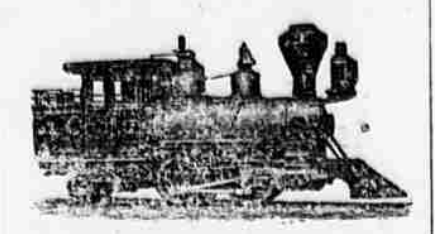

THE WORLD OVER.

Interesting Gleanings From the Latest Foreign Mail.

INCENDIARY BY OCCUPATION.

The Grand Jury at Chicago returned indictments charging Otto Jursa and Fred. W. Smith with arson. Bills were also found against ten other persons, who, it is said, were Smith's accomplices. Prosecuting-Attorney Kern and Fire Inspector Conway claim that Smith was the head of a great conspiracy that has defrauded insurance companies of \$100,000 by burning stores, in which he had placed packing-cases filled with rubbish. Smith was sentenced a few days ago to prison for two years for connection with an attempt to bribe the jury in the Cronin murder trial.

A SECOND POMPEII.

A Paris newspaper announces the discovery of a second Pompeii. It is said to be an entire town, consisting of a number of streets, houses, etc. It was unearthed in the promontory of Laurium, southwest of Attica, Greece.

RUSSIAN WARSHIP LOST.

Special services were held Sept. 27 at St. Petersburg, in the Cathedral Church, belonging to the Russian admiralty, for the officers and crew of the ironclad Kosalka. All the naval dignitaries and foreign ambassadors were present. Much indignation was expressed at the delay in ascertaining the fate of the vessel. Three days were allowed to elapse before a single steamer was sent from Helsingfors to search for the possible survivors, although the authorities at Sveaborg knew on the day of the storm the Kosalka was unable to make port.

A TRUST FAILS.

The U. S. District Court at New York has appointed receivers for the Jarvis-Cookin Mortgage and Trust Company of Missouri, with offices in that city. The capital stock of the company is \$3,750,000. The company issued debentures to the amount of \$7,025,171, bearing 5 and 6 percent interest. It is indebted to various banks, individuals and corporations upon demand and time loans, secured and unsecured, in a sum aggregating \$911,041. The petitioners state that because of the financial and commercial conditions now prevailing, they are unable to provide for the payment of these liabilities unless they sacrifice their holdings at a great loss.

Our evening annexation contemporary suggests that the Provisional Government get out of its temporary status, and start a new concern at the old stand under the name, style and firm of "The Commonwealth of Hawaii." This is another virtual admission that annexation is a lost cause, and the only proper thing for the Provisional Government to do, in that case, is to resign in favor of the Constitutional Government of the country.

With all that has been charged against Hawaiian institutions under the monarchy, they compared favorably in character and conduct with those of the most advanced nations, monarchical or republican. We have never had to record such disgraceful scenes in our Legislature as are periodically reported of the legislative bodies of France, Great Britain and the United States. In fact, most of the stuff sent abroad about our recent past history has been fabricated as a pretext for a disgraceful and lawless revolution.

AFTER THE EVENT.

Judging by all the comment on the late six-oared boat race, one would think that the Healanu Boat Club had a patent right on winning. The assumption that something was wrong because the Healanu boat was behind at the turn, and came home at a slower pace than it went out, is unworthy of sensible people. There was much more reason for surprise at the defeat of the Myrtle crew last year than at its victory this year. For many years the Myrtle Boat Club has maintained a healthy, unbroken organization with crews always more or less in practice. It has seen different rivals rise and fall in its time, but none which was able to wrest aquatic honors out of its hands. The Myrtle oarsmen knew the Honolulu harbor course like a book, and had the proper steady stroke down fine to make it in a given time. They had to row against an admittedly faster boat than their own at Pearl harbor last year, and they had an imperfect knowledge of the water and bearings. This year they had provided themselves with a boat that was a beauty to behold, and quartering themselves some time in advance on the course they knew it thoroughly by the day of the race. The Healanu crew, on the other hand, were found with a boat that was only best before their opponents had procured a new one. They trained almost entirely in the very different water of Honolulu, having but little practice before the event on the championship course. Although a heavier crew with probably a higher average of muscular strength, they showed by the way they set out to win the race that they needed a great deal of technical training. Indeed, one would have thought on seeing their tactics that they had never even read of how races were won by the famous oarsmen of the world. While the Myrtle crew had learned exactly the stroke that would take them over the course in a given time, the Healanu crew virtually pulled themselves all to pieces in a desperate attempt to secure a lead in the first quarter of the race. It was the old story, told so often in single-scull as well as crew races—of cool, calculating skill playing excited, unreckoning exertion as the angler plays the salmon to its death. Talk about selling the race, which has been indulged in, without the production of a scintilla of evidence, is unbecoming in the extreme. It is an insult to the club whose crew has been fairly beaten, and a contemptible means of detracting from the clean honors of the winning crew. In deploring the evils of betting on contests of strength and skill, a contemporary omitted to mention one that its own remarks illustrate, namely—the inability of some people to accept the loss of their stakes with good grace and gentlemanly equanimity.

NEW KIND OF SURPLUS.

Now we have an explanation of the treasury surplus from the Advertiser, for which we are duly and truly grateful. The receipts of the Provisional Government for the first eight months of its existence have been \$967,924.70, and the expenditures in the same period \$1,298,273.79. This shows an excess of \$330,349.09 of expenditures over receipts. This is a new kind of a surplus. In ordinary political economy a surplus has usually been understood to mean an excess of revenue over what had been estimated to meet the necessary expenditures of a definite financial period. There can be no actual surplus declared until the close of the biennial period for which the late Legislature made appropriations. As for many periods the Legisla-

ture has appropriated more money than the probable revenue the only means possible of obtaining a surplus has been the restriction of such expenditures as the Government had in its discretion and control. Thus far, with an excessive expenditure of over \$330,000, the prospect of a surplus at the close of the present period is small, and can only be realized by the starving of ordinary services that the public has a right to have liberally maintained, and an abandonment of schemes of necessary public improvements which the people are entitled to have carried out promptly. Mr. Thurston, it is noticed, in his hysterical reply to Mr. Spreckels, has attempted to throw dust in the American people's eyes by calling a temporary balance in the treasury a surplus. He knows that there is no surplus, and he knows that the sales of bonds—not at par as he claims, however—effected by the Provisional Government would, if his political opponents were in power, be seized upon by himself, with all the rancorous avidity that characterizes him, as the occasion for bitter denunciation of the rate at which the public debt was being increased. Apart from the Savings Bank deposits, in themselves loans from the public, the Advertiser informs us that the Provisional Government has borrowed \$152,000 on bonds in the eight months. This amount has been devoted mainly to refunding the treasury for advances made to the branch of expenditures legally derivable from borrowed money. Thus the ordinary revenue and expenditure are virtually placed in their natural relations to each other, affording a fair criterion of the quality of economy to which the Hawaiian Islands are being treated by those now controlling its affairs. And the result is that we have in one-third of the biennial period an amount of over \$330,000, not a surplus but a deficit—the result of the military rule of the Provisional Government. This is at the rate of nearly a million dollars of deficiency for the whole period of twenty-four months. We do not claim that it is fair to assume that the proportion will be carried out to the end, but such a claim would be more honest by far than the cool assumption of the Advertiser and Mr. Thurston that a treasury balance on any given day is a surplus.

THE MIOWERA.

The Contract For Floating Her Not Awarded.

The C. A. S. S. Miowera still lies on the reef outside the harbor in the same position as she was yesterday. No further efforts have been made to pull her off, but the work of lightening her continues. Some of the deck machinery was brought ashore this morning and landed at the Pacific Mail dock, along with several marble slabs. The stores and furniture are being stored in the O. S. S. Co.'s warehouse. During the last one of the anchors thrown loose and had to be hauled up and placed farther to sea.

Inquiry at the office of the agents, T. H. Davies & Co., this afternoon elicited the information that only two bids had been received, but they were not opened. In the meantime additional bids are awaited.

DEATH OF MRS. CARTWRIGHT.

An Aged Lady Resident Gone to Her Rest.

Mrs. Eliza Anne Cartwright, widow of the late Alexander Joy Cartwright, passed quietly away at 9:30 o'clock last night, at her residence on Beretania, Alakea and Union streets. Since the death of her husband on July 12, 1892, Mrs. Cartwright has been very frail with the infirmities of age. She was a native of Auburn, N. Y., and lived 73 years. Mr. and Mrs. Cartwright came to these islands in 1850. They were married in New York city in 1842. Two daughters came here with the couple, but died shortly after their arrival. Their surviving sons, Bruce and Alexander J. Cartwright, our well-known fellow-citizens, were born in these islands. The funeral of Mrs. Cartwright is taking place this afternoon, as this paper is going through the press.

RECOVERED THE BODY.

Found Floating in the Passage by a Boatboy.

The body of Makaio, who was drowned on Sunday last, was recovered at 2 o'clock this afternoon by Edw. Kekoa, a boatboy. Kekoa was returning from the S. S. Miowera when he saw the body floating near the Fau buoy, on the Ewa side of the passage, below the lighthouse. Blood was trickling down his face from a bruise in the head, and with the exception of a few bites, presumably by crabs, the body was in good condition. It was towed to the wharf and later taken to the Police Station, where a jury was empaneled by Deputy-Marshal Brown.

Coal Consumption on Steamships.

The coal consumption of the Atlantic greyhounds is enormous in total, but in proportion to the power generated it is not at all large. The American liners New York and Paris, for instance, burn about 330 tons of coal per day, or about 30,800 pounds per hour, and maintain about 18,000 indicated horse-power, which is equivalent to a coal consumption of about 1.71 pounds per hour per horse-power. The average for all the fast ships with triple expansion engines, like the New York, Paris, Majestic, Teutonic and Fuerst Bismarck is probably only about 1.75 pounds per horse-power hour. In the case of the Umbria and Etruria and similar ships which have only compound engines the rate is higher. For example, the Etruria burns as much coal as the New York and more than the Teutonic and develops far less power than either of them, which illustrates the great advance made in marine engineering by the introduction of the triple expansion system. The new ships which are now being built on the Delaware for the American line are to have quadruple expansion engines, these being the first of that type to be constructed. The results will be awaited with interest.

With the resources provided Hawaii by nature, (and by such resources we mean the fine quality of building stone), a lighthouse could be constructed on the point where the Miowera struck so that such accidents would be of the past and sea captains would not have the hours of anxiety that make young men old. If it be necessary to have a lighthouse halfway between the entrance to the channel and the dock let the old one remain where it is, but that fact should not prevent the erection of a new one, the expense of maintenance would be light compared with advantages to all seafaring men. If the government had a million dollar reserve fund it might copy New York City in its expenditures after the fashion of the Bartholdi Statue and make one of some prominent politician and call it "Blank Enlightenment his Constituents" instead of "Liberty Enlightening the World." This would be too extravagant for this little government, and we would suggest a plain stone lighthouse painted with Hendry's Ready Mixed Paints, that are guaranteed to withstand the semitropical storms which we sometimes experience in Hawaii Nei.

The long-looked for Pfluger arrived on Friday and with it there came to us fence wire both black and galvanized, in No. 5 of the former and Nos. 4, 5, 6 and 7 in the galvanized. 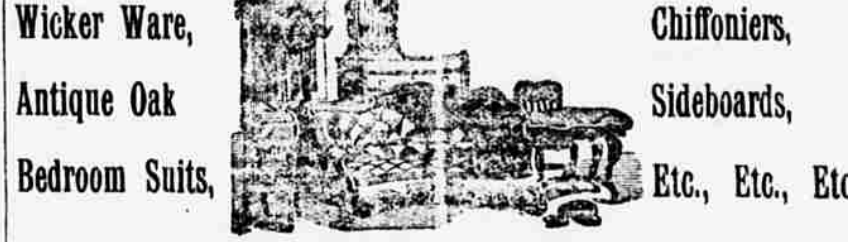

The flames were finally gotten under control, but the boat was badly damaged.

SNUBBED BY THE ARCHDUKE.

The diplomatic attache of the Austrian Embassy invited a select crowd, including the exhibition representatives of different countries, to the Austrian section of the World's Fair art gallery. He gave them a hint that the heir to the Austrian throne was coming that way. Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria, Count of Este and Modena, heir presumptive to the Austrian throne, spent only three minutes in the gallery, and was so late coming that most of the guests went away before he arrived. He paid no attention whatever to those who remained, but stalked haughtily through the gallery with his companions. The Chicago society people in the invited company were much put up about the royal snub. With Ferdinand were Prince Leonberg-Birstein whose name has been coupled with that of Miss Florence Pullman by society gossips as a probable suitor, and Count Wurmbbrand-Stuppach, controller of the Archduke's household.

UPROAR IN CONGRESS.

The lie was passed, at the opening of the House of Representatives in Washington on Sept. 28, between Morse of Massachusetts and Fithian of Illinois. Morse in a speech attempted to justify his course in filibustering the previous day, and charged Fithian with being solely responsible for the refusal of the House to permit him to print in the Record certain newspaper extracts attacking Pension Commissioner Lochren. Fithian, replying, said Morse had endeavored to induce him (Fithian) to withdraw his objection to printing the extracts by coming to him and promising that he (Morse) would as a member of the Committee of Buildings and Grounds help Fithian to get through any public building bill in which he might be interested. After each had declared the other to be speaking falsely, while they shook their fists at one another, the House was in an uproar. The Speaker rapped vigorously for order, and declaring both out of order closed the scene.

HOME RULE IN AMERICA.

A Washington despatch of September 28 says: In the executive session this evening, after some debate, Voorhees reluctantly agreed to devote all next Thursday to an executive session, at which appointments in opposition to the "home rule" plank of the Democratic platform, against which there have been such strenuous objections, will be considered. This agreement pleases silver men immensely, as they regard it as another point gained by them. If a quorum be present on Thursday it is probable that these appointments will be favorably acted upon by a strict party vote.

BOSTON NEWSPAPERS ENJOINED.

The injunction laid upon the newspapers by Judge Barker of the Supreme Court yesterday, says a Boston despatch of Sept. 28, forbidding any report or comment in the breach of promise case of Van Houten vs. Morse, was obeyed and the morning papers contain no report of the case. Among the lawyers, it is believed, there has been an understanding among the "justice" courts that "hereafter cases are to be tried in the courts, not in the newspapers," as one of the fraternity puts it. It is reported the reason for the Judge's action was the suspicion that the case was one of blackmail against Morse, who is an ex-State Senator.

A THREAT FROM ENGLAND.

The London Times, in a financial article, says: Several American sterling loans will shortly mature. Although European lenders would ordinarily be glad to renew them, it is feared that if the United States Senate persists in its present course several of these loans will have to be repaid by shipments of gold to this side.

THE FRENCH IN SIAM.

A despatch from Chantibun, Siam, says the French cruiser Alouette captured Paknam fort, put a garrison inside and proceeded to build rifle pits around the barracks. The fort is on the Meam, four miles from the Gulf of Siam and twenty miles southeast of Bangkok.
