

Water Rights To Be Valued

SUPERINTENDENT HOLLOWAY APPOINTS A COMMISSION TO FIND OUT WHAT THE RIGHTS OF PRIVATE OWNERS IN THE PAUOA AND KALIHU VALLEYS MAY BE WORTH WITH A VIEW TO THEIR ACQUISITION BY THE GOVERNMENT.

Superintendent Holloway of the Department of Public Works this morning appointed a commission consisting of R. H. Trent, H. M. Von Holt and R. C. A. Peterson for the purpose of determining the value of all of the water rights in the Pauoa and Kalihu valleys at present owned by private parties. This action was taken with a view to acquiring the rights for the government.

POISONER CONFESSES

THE GARDEN ISLAND SAYS THAT A CONFESSION HAS BEEN SECURED FROM ONE OF THE JAPANESE ARRESTED FOR THE POISONING OF B. D. BALDWIN AND FAMILY—DISSATISFACTION WITH PLANTATION MANAGEMENT THE CAUSE.

The Garden Island contains the following account of the poisoning of B. D. Baldwin and family: A plot, which is rumored to amount to a conspiracy to do some wholesale poisoning, was discovered at Makaweli by Manager B. D. Baldwin, a little over two weeks ago, and Sheriff Conroy, who immediately took the matter in hand, has caused the arrest of two Japanese, Nomi and Yonemoto.

Electoral Vote Officially Counted

(Associated Press Cable to The Star).

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 8.—The votes of the electoral college were counted here today and Roosevelt and Fairbanks were declared duly elected President and Vice-President respectively of the United States of America.

The method of counting the electoral vote as provided by the twelfth amendment of the constitution of the United States is that the Electors of the several states having met in their respective states and cast their ballots for president and vice-president, these, sealed and certified are transmitted to the seat of government, Washington, directed to the President of the Senate. "The President of the Senate shall in the presence of the Senate and the House of Representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for President shall be President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of the electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by States, the representation from each State having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the States, and a majority of all the States shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President. The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list the Senate shall choose the Vice President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice President of the United States.

TOGO BACK IN HARNESS

TOKIO, Feb. 8.—Admiral Togo has raised his flag on the battleship Mikasa.

Following the total destruction of the Russian fleet in Port Arthur by the Japanese guns mounted on 203 Meter Hill, Admiral Togo was recalled to Tokio to receive the congratulations and the honors the Emperor wished to bestow on him. He has just returned to active service and has raised his flag on the battleship Mikasa.

SUBMARINE FOR RUSSIANS.

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 8.—The Danish steamer Nordhavet sailed from this port today with a cargo of agricultural machinery destined for Novovisk, Russia. It is rumored that she has also a submarine boat aboard.

BRITISH COLLIER CAPTURED.

TOKIO, Feb. 8.—The Japanese have captured the British steamer Eastry bound for Vladivostok with a cargo of coal for the Russians.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 8.—The Senate Committee on Foreign Relations today favorably reported on the matter of arbitration treaties between the United States and various foreign powers.

SPRINGS A SURPRISE FIVE ACRES AT M'BRYDE BURNED

BLAZE STARTED IN CANE NEAR THE LANDING AND SWEEPED OVER FIVE ACRES.

News of a big cane fire at Eleete was brought by the steamer Niihau this morning. Five acres of cane were burned over yesterday afternoon. The fire is thought to have started from a spark from a passing plantation locomotive. The steamer Niihau was loading sugar but all hands had to knock off work to go and try to put out the fire. About two hours were taken up with extinguishing the blaze. The fire passed over five acres of cane.

TWO CHINAMEN GUILTY. In the Chinese robbery case this afternoon the jury returned a verdict of guilty against Ung Hing and found Ah Kop and Tom Sing not guilty. Chung Hing pleaded guilty and the case against Man Leah was nolle prossed.

CHIEFESS BURIED IN CASKET OF LATE KING KALAUAKA

MRS. KANELE KAO WAS GRANTED PECULIAR REQUEST—WAS DAUGHTER OF THE LATE HIGH CHIEFESS KUKINI OF KONA, HAWAII—KUKINI WAS LIVING AT THE TIME OF DEATH OF CAPTAIN COOK BUT PROBABLY DID NOT WITNESS KILLING.

There died in Honolulu on January 25 an old native woman whose history was in many ways, one of unusual interest. Mrs. Kao was her name and she died at the age of 95 years. She was a native of Kona and her mother was Kukini one of the high chiefesses of that district of Hawaii. Kukini must have lived at the time that Captain Cook visited Hawaii and while she probably did not see that mariner killed she was living at Koa-lakekua Bay when Captain Cook was slain. Her daughter lived in Kona until David Kalakaua was elected king of Hawaii and then came to Honolulu to reside at the Palace as a member of the King's household. When Kalakaua's remains were brought to Honolulu by the cruiser Charleston, Mrs. Kao was one of the principal mourners. The death of her royal patron caused her the utmost grief and she never fully recovered from the shock. After the body of the King was removed from the casket in which it had been brought to this city from San Francisco and was placed in another casket, Mrs. Kao asked that she be buried in the first casket that had contained the remains of her royal master. The casket was entrusted to E. K. Liliokalani now a representative-elect to the legislature from the Fourth District and one of the claimants to the Crown Lands. When Liliokalani learned of the death of Mrs. Kao he at once recalled the trust that he held and caused the casket to be sent to her house. Her body was placed in the casket and interred according to her last wishes. She was an aunt of Mrs. Captain A. C. Simerson.

Hawaiian Speaker Will Be Better For Tourists

ONE OF THE HAWAIIAN MEMBERS OF THE NEXT HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES GIVES HIS REASONS WHY AN HAWAIIAN SHOULD BE CHOSEN SPEAKER—THINKS IT WOULD BE BETTER FOR THE TERRITORY, THE HAWAIIANS AND THE TOURISTS.

"The reason Hawaiians think Hawaiian ought to be elected Speaker of the House," said one of the Hawaiian members, "is on account the tourists. Many tourists are coming to Honolulu. Maybe they want to see everything Hawaiian they can. They hear legislature in session. They say 'we go see Hawaiian legislature'. They come to Palace go in House of Representatives. They see in Speaker chair, not Hawaiian, but Haole. What they think? They think Hawaiian not got ability to be speaker. They get wrong idea of Hawaiian. They take wrong idea back home. 'No, we want Hawaiian Speaker of the House. In Senate, Paul Isenberg, haole, president, Willie Savidge, haole, secretary. That all right. Haole have his share of honors in senate. In House of Representatives we more than half members Hawaiian. Why not Hawaiian for speaker? Why not Hawaiian for clerk? So Hawaiian get half, haole half. 'Tourist come, go to House of Representatives, see plenty Hawaiian members; see Hawaiian speaker; see Hawaiian clerk. Satisfied Hawaiian good American. Go back home tell all friends, tell newspaper, Hawaiian good American. Stars and Stripes on palace. Do good for Hawaii. 'Tourists come go to House of Representatives, see haole speaker, haole clerk, no care stop. Say all same like home. See Hawaiian speaker hear Hawaiian make speech, they like. They come next day bring more friends, Go home, talk about it. Many more tourists come. 'I think better for Territory, better for tourist, better for Hawaiian, if Hawaiian Speaker of House of Representatives.'

Kansas And Her Worthiest Son

Kansas has placed in Statuary Hall in the National Capitol a marble statue of John James Ingalls, for many years a representative in congress from that state and for eighteen years a senator.

Perhaps no one has any right to quarrel with Kansas as to whom she will honor in this way, and certainly Ingalls was a man of remarkable attainments and ability.

He served his state long, and he served it well. No one who knew him will begrudge his memory the place it holds, nor challenge his right to represent Kansas in Statuary Hall.

Long called attention to the fact that Ingalls had made an unavailing effort to have John Brown's statue placed in the national Capitol.

The other speakers on this occasion were Allison of Iowa, Cockrell of Missouri, Platt of Connecticut, Gorman of Maryland, Spooner of Wisconsin and Daniel of Virginia.

Bring Poisoners To Justice

If there be one word of truth in the allegations to the effect that an attempt has recently been made to poison wholesale the manager of a plantation in Kauai, together with his wife and family, it will without question be the duty of the law department of this Territory, aided by whatever private concern may be interested, to spare no effort towards bringing the perpetrator or perpetrators of the attempted crime to justice.

At first reading the affair seems to be of little importance after all. It is alleged at the outset that a manager of a plantation, who was not over-popular with the laborers, had had a narrow escape from poisoning.

The taking of a human life is a bad matter in any case. The execution of a condemned villain whose blood-stained soul is sent shrieking to its God, is so awful an event as to cause many men to shudder from even acting on a jury in a murder case.

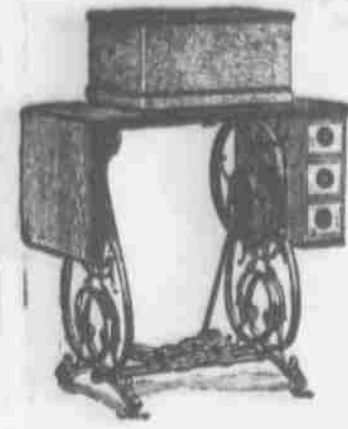

THEIR AIM IS THE U. S. NAVY

SEVEN CANDIDATES PRESENT THEMSELVES FOR EXAMINATION FOR ANNAPOLIS.

There were five aspirants for the nomination from Hawaii for entrance to the military academy at West Point but this morning at the Capitol seven presented themselves for the examination for admission to the naval academy at Annapolis.

The seven who began writing on the examination in arithmetic today are: Stanley Ashford, 1085 Beretania street, Oahu College.

Of these seven three also wrote on the military examination, Oht, King and Tucker.

This afternoon the examinations will be on algebra, physiology and hygiene. As a sample of the examination papers given the aspirants the following was the paper on arithmetic submitted this morning:

1. (a) Multiply 9634.58 by .0034865+.006273 and express answer correct to two decimal places.

(b) Divide 76.492855 by \$1749.25, and express the answer as a fraction whose denominator is 125.

2. (a) How many grains Troy are there in a pound Avoirdupois? (b) How many grains are there in an ounce?

(c) How many acres in a circular field of radius 61 yards? (d) How many kilograms in a cubic block of granite whose edge is 2 ft. when 1 cubic foot of water weighs 1000 oz. and granite is 2.6 times as heavy as water.

3. Resolve the following numbers into all their factors: 336,336; 596,594; 15,912.

4. Find the square root of 2986.0347 to three decimal places.

5. (a) Express the simple interest of \$12 1/2 for 9 mo. 12 da. at 6% in U. S. money. (b) What is the value at maturity in London of a note for \$2862.70 at 7 1/2% exchange costing 1/4%. Express in English money.

Legislation and Public Improvements stated that the communication from the Merchants' Association regarding the appointment of a Committee on Tax Law had been received by the Chamber, but in this matter the Chamber was awaiting the appointment of a committee by the Planters' Association.

He recommended that the committee be authorized to employ a clerk during the sessions of the legislature. This clerk would be required to give special attention and reading to every measure introduced so as to inform the members of the committee of the details and purpose of each bill.

A report was received from the vault committee. PROSECUTION HAS CLOSED

DEPUTY ATTORNEY GENERAL PETERS HAS PRESENTED THE LAST OF HIS TESTIMONY IN THE JONES MURDER CASE—DEFENSE WILL BEGIN THIS AFTERNOON—STENOGRAPHER TESTIFIES TO THE CONFESSION MADE BY THE ACCUSED.

"The government rests," said Deputy Attorney General Peters at a quarter past eleven this morning and all that the law department could do towards convicting Edward M. Jones for the murder of his former wife Linda K. Jones, has been done.

The admission as evidence of the revolver with which Jones killed his mother-in-law and wife was secured by the prosecution this morning despite the objections of the defense.

When she arrived Sunday her arrival was cabled to the war department and orders were asked. The reply came to discharge 1,000 tons of coal here as quickly as possible, and proceed at once without delay to San Francisco.

The transport Dix, which it was expected would remain in port perhaps two weeks, will sail tomorrow or Friday. When she left Nagasaki she had about 10,000 tons of coal aboard, and sailed for this port for orders.

THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF THE COUNTRY OF THE LEWIS AND CLARKE EXPOSITION DECLINES TO GIVE US EVEN ITS "MORAL SUPPORT" TO SECURE AN APPROPRIATION FOR DEEPENING HONOLULU HARBOR.

The Board of Trustees of the Chamber of Commerce held their regular meeting this morning at 10 o'clock. The communications from the Tacoma and Seattle Chambers of Commerce notifying the local chamber of having taken favorable action to aid in securing the appropriation for the deepening of Honolulu harbor, were read.

He recommended that the committee be authorized to employ a clerk during the sessions of the legislature. This clerk would be required to give special attention and reading to every measure introduced so as to inform the members of the committee of the details and purpose of each bill.

KOREANS ARE GOING TO COAST

REGULAR HOTEL FOR KOREANS NOW OPERATED ON RIVER STREET.

Koreans are slowly beginning to move to the coast. A regular Korean hotel is now operated on River street. Seven Koreans are living at the place, one of them to his cost.

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THE WAILUKU ARMORY SITE

THE MAUI PEOPLE AGREE ON A RECOMMENDATION TO SUPERINTEND HOLLOWAY.

WAILUKU, February 4.—A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Wailuku Improvement Association was held at the office of D. H. Case Wednesday evening to discuss the question of an armory site.

A letter to H. M. Coker, the chairman of the armory committee, from the Superintendent of Public Works Holloway, relative to using a portion of the old school lot was read.

The committee finally agreed to recommend that the rear end of this lot which is something over 200 feet deep be used, and so wired the department.

Some question was raised as to the advisability of the site as it might interfere with the plans for the new court house, but on account of the depth of the lot and the fact that the armory will be built at the extreme end facing Waikapu and Wahee ways it would not conflict.

The letter from Superintendent Holloway dated Jan. 21st states that the plans for the armory are being prepared and bids will be called for within a few days.

THE KENNEDY TAKES SUPPLIES TO MIDWAY

NAVAL AUTHORITIES ORDERED TO SEND MARINE GUARD SUPPLIES TO MIDWAY.

Captain Schlemmer is to handle stores for the Navy Department. Captain Lyon the naval commandant received word by cable authorizing the chartering of the schooner C. Kennedy to take the stores for the marine guard at Midway.

The vessel may not get away until tomorrow. The vessel will probably go direct to Midway not stopping at Laysan Island until after she lands her stores at Midway. She will return to Honolulu from Laysan with a cargo of guano.

SPLITTING WOOD BY MACHINERY

Some of the Japanese wood dealers have imported a machine from a Massachusetts manufacturer which splits algebra firewood a great deal faster than it can be done by hand. The machine is run by a gasoline engine. One of them is in operation on the mud flat between Oahu prison and the Oahu Railway station.

CRICKETERS ARE COMING

AUSTRALIAN EXPERTS MAY PLAY A MATCH WITH LOCAL DEVOTEES OF THE BRITISH GAME.

The Australian cricketers who are to uphold the honor of their country against the pick of all England this year, will pass through Honolulu on the Aorangi on March 8 next and an attempt will probably be made to arrange a match with them here by the local wielders of the willow.

Reincarnation As Theosophists Believe It

CHARLES W. LEADBEATER, THE WELL KNOWN LECTURER ON THEOSOPHICAL SUBJECTS, GIVES HIS LAST LECTURE IN HONOLULU AT THE CONCERT HALL OF THE ALEXANDER YOUNG HOTEL—EXPLAINS AN ANCIENT DOCTRINE IN A NEW LIGHT.

Charles W. Leadbeater, the lecturer on Theosophy, gave his last lecture in Honolulu at the concert hall of the Alexander Young Hotel last evening. There was a large attendance, very many of those present being church people. Mr. Leadbeater sails tomorrow for the Colonies where he will deliver a series of lectures on Theosophy. His lecture last evening was on "Reincarnation," and in it he sought to explain this doctrine as it is understood by Theosophists, and to give the reasons they have for believing in it. He said in part:

Since the finer movements cannot at first affect the soul, man has to draw round him vestures of grosser matter through which the heavier vibrations can play; and so he takes upon himself successively the mental body, the astral body, and the physical body. This is a birth or reincarnation—the commencement of a physical life. During that life all kinds of experiences come to him through his physical body, and from them he should learn some lessons and develop some qualities within himself.

After a time he begins to withdraw again into himself, and puts off by degrees the vestures which he has assumed. The first of these to drop is the physical body, and his withdrawal from this is what we call death. It is not the end of his activities, as we so ignorantly suppose; nothing could be further from the fact. He is simply withdrawing from one effort, bearing back with him its results; and after a certain period of comparative repose he will make another effort of the same kind.

Thus, as has been said, what we ordinarily call his life is only one day in the real and wider life—a day at school, during which he learns certain lessons. But inasmuch as one short life of seventy or eighty years at most is not enough to give him an opportunity of learning all the lessons which this wonderful and beautiful world has to teach, and inasmuch as God means him to learn them all in His own good time, it is necessary that he should come back again many times, and live through many of these school days that we call lives, in different classes and under different circumstances, until all the lessons are learnt; and then this lower school work will be over, and he will pass to something higher and more glorious—the true divine life-work for which all this earthly school-life is fitting him.

That is what is called the doctrine of reincarnation or rebirth—a doctrine which was widely known in the ancient civilization, and is even today held by the majority of the human race. Of it Hume, in his "Essay on Immortality," has written:

"What is incorruptible must also be ungenerable. The soul, therefore, if immortal, existed before our birth. The metempsychosis is, therefore, the only system of this kind that Philosophy can hearken to."

Writing of the theories of metempsychosis in India and Greece, Max Muller says: "There is something underlying them which, if expressed in less mythological language, may stand the severest test of philosophical examination." In his last and posthumous work this great Oriental again refers to this doctrine, and expresses his personal belief in it.

And Huxley in his work called "Evolution and Ethics" writes: "Like the doctrine of evolution itself, that of transmigration has its roots in the world of reality; and it may claim such support as the great argument from analogy is capable of supplying."

So it will be seen that modern as well as ancient writers recognize this hypothesis as one deserving of the most serious consideration.

It must not for a moment be confounded with a theory held by the ignorant, that it was possible for a soul which had reached humanity in its evolution to rebecome that of an animal. No such retrogression is within the limits of possibility; when once man comes into existence—a human soul, inhabiting what we call in our books a causal body—he can never again fall back into what is in truth a lower kingdom of nature, whatever mistakes he may make or however he may fail to take advantage of his opportunities. If he is idle in the school of life, he may need to take the same lesson over and over again before he has really learnt it, but still on the whole progress is steady, even though it may often be slow.

Life presents us with many problems which, on any other hypothesis than this of reincarnation, seem utterly insoluble; this great truth does explain them, and therefore holds the field until another and more satisfactory hypothesis can be found. Like the rest of the teaching, this is not a hypothesis, but a matter of direct knowledge for many of us; but naturally our knowledge is not proof to others.

Yet good men and true have been sorrowfully forced to admit that they were unable to reconcile the state of affairs which exists in the world around us with the theory that God was both almighty and all-loving. They felt, when they looked upon all the heart-breaking sorrow and suffering, that either He was not almighty, and could not prevent it, or He was not all-loving, and did not care. In Theosophy we hold with determined conviction that He is both almighty and all-loving, and we reconcile with that certainty the existing facts of life by means of this basic doctrine of reincarnation. Surely the only hypothesis which allows us reasonably to recognize the perfection of power and love in the Deity is one which is worthy of careful examination.

For we understand that our present life is not our first, but that we each have behind us a long line of lives, by means of the experience of which we have evolved from the condition of primitive man to our present position. Assuredly in these past lives we must have done both good and evil, and from every one of our actions a definite proportion of result must have followed under the inexorable law of justice. From the good follows always happiness and further opportunity; from the evil follows always sorrow and limitation.

So if we find ourselves limited in any way, the limitation is of our own making, or is merely due to the youth of the soul; if we have sorrow and suffering to endure, we ourselves alone are responsible. The manifold and complex destinies of men answer with rigid exactitude to the balance between the good and evil of their previous actions; and all is moving onward under the divine order towards the final consummation of glory.

There is, perhaps, no Theosophical teaching to which more violent objection is made than this great truth of reincarnation; yet it is in reality a most comforting doctrine. For it gives us time for the progress which lies before—time and opportunity to become "perfect, even as our Father in Heaven is perfect." Objectors chiefly found their protest on the fact that they have had so much trouble and sorrow in this life that they will not listen to any suggestion that it may be necessary to go through it all again. But this is obviously not argument; we are in search of truth, and when it is found we must not shrink from it, whether it be pleasant or unpleasant, though, as a matter of fact, as said above, reincarnation rightly understood is profoundly comforting.

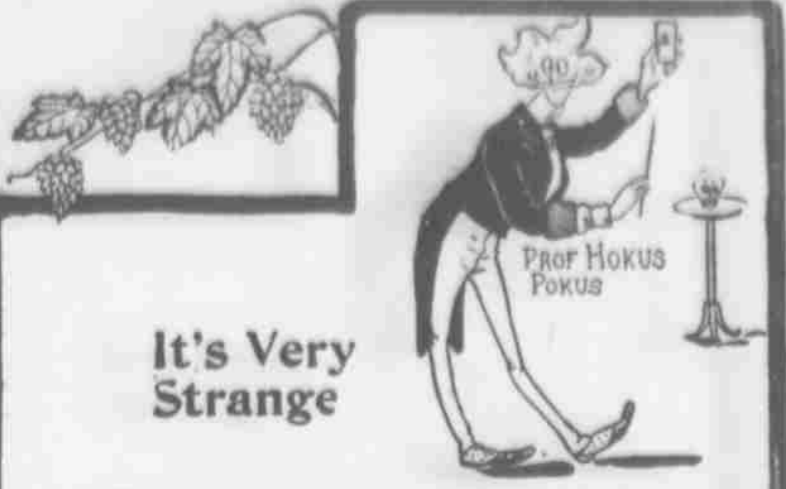
Again, people often inquire why if we have had so many previous lives, we do not remember any of them. Put very briefly, the answer to this is that some people do remember them; and the reason why the majority do not is because their consciousness is still focused in one or the other of the lower sheaths. That sheath cannot be expected to recollect previous incarnations, because it has not had any; and the soul, which has, is not yet fully conscious on its own plane. But the memory of all the past is stored within that soul, and expresses itself here in the innate qualities with which the child is born; and when the man has evolved sufficiently to be able to focus his consciousness there instead of only in lower vehicles the entire history of that real and wider life will be open before him like a book.

HARMONIZE ON A COUNTY ACT

COUNTY ACT COMMISSION GETS TOGETHER ON ALL ESSENTIAL POINTS AND ADOPTS REPORT

At the meeting of the County Act Commission last evening the report of the harmony committee was adopted. This report contains a plan for a bill which harmonizes the differences of the committee in the past.

The Commissioners, with the exception of Watson voted for \$300 per annum as compensation for supervisors Mr. Crabbe stated, however, that a supervisors in Kohala, Island of Hawaii, traveling to Hilo to attend meetings, would have to pay out at least \$25 for his traveling expenses, to Honolulu and there would be his expenses in Hilo. Here is would be different.

New sections were added to include school agents in the list of persons elected in counties, and salaries were suggested. Stewart favored cutting down the Honolulu school agent, who is also the assistant secretary of the Department of Education, from \$1800 to \$1200 per annum. Where two districts on this island were combined, even taking in Waianae, the amount was put double, or \$1200 per annum, providing for two agents at \$60 each.

The matter of holding the first county election was discussed. It will be held on June 6, and the elected officers will take hold of county offices the first Monday in July.

The secretary stated that he addressed letters to people at various proposed county seats asking what the cost would be to establish county offices. Stephen Desha of Hilo said rooms could be had there at \$100 per month. The Hilo Board of Trade said rooms in the Spreckels Block could be had for \$10 per room.

D. H. Case of Wailuku said rooms could be rented cheaply. Letters from Lihou were to the same effect.

DEATHS OF A MONTH.

The report of the Board of Health for January shows that with a total population of 29,306, there were 57 deaths in Honolulu during the month, a mortality percentage of 1.45. Of those who died, eleven were under one year old, six were between the ages of one and five years, seven between the ages of ten and twenty years, five between the ages of twenty and thirty, seven between the ages of thirty and forty, four between the ages of forty and fifty, seven between fifty and sixty, five between sixty and seventy, and five over seventy years old.

There were 21 males, and 28 females died, divided as to nationality as follows: Native Hawaiians, 32; Chinese, 7; Portuguese, 3; Japanese, 10; Americans, 3; other nationalities, 1. There were forty-six marriages reported to the Board of Health, and thirty-nine births.

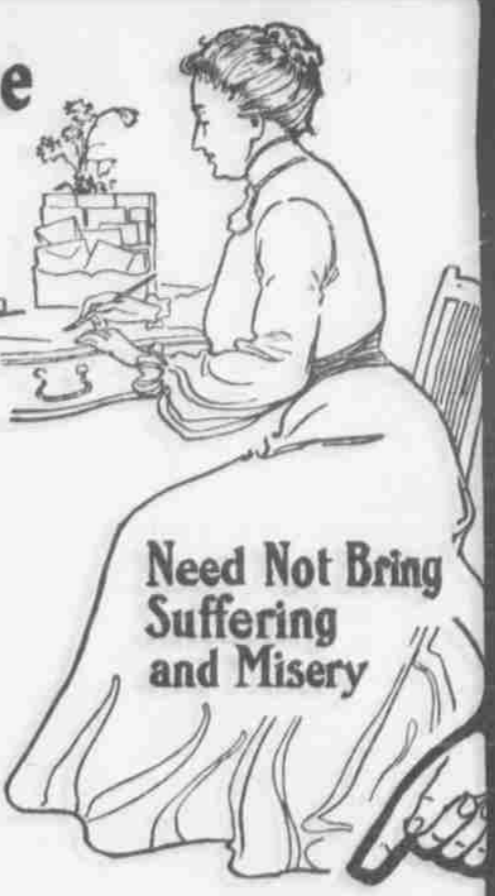
