## MORE MUSIC.

Kawaihae Seminary Girls Delight  
a Large Audience.

Kawaihae Church, although not  
crowded at the Kawaihae Seminary's  
concert Saturday evening, had a full  
appearance. Many of the lately ar-  
rived tourists were in the audience,  
some of whom have been heard to  
express their delight with not only  
the native music, but the manner in  
which it was rendered, together with  
wondering admiration for the pro-  
ficiency of the native orchestra. The  
library fund of the Seminary must  
have got a good lift from the net  
receipts, as the expenses of the con-  
cert could not have been very great.

The program opened with an over-  
ture by the Royal Hawaiian Orches-  
tra, conducted by Prof. H. Berger.  
It was "Enchantment" by Herman,  
and fell agreeably on the auditors.  
The Seminary sang Wiener's "Wel-  
come," a chorus, followed by the  
gavotte, "Queen's Jubilee," the Ha-  
waiian Queen's compliment to Her  
Britannic Majesty. Both perfor-  
mances were warmly applauded.

Hon. Paul R. Isenberg, in his rich  
tenor, awoke the enthusiasm he al-  
ways does on the musical stage, with  
the solo, "My Queen," by Blumen-  
thal. An equally acceptable piece  
was given in response to a recall.

The pupils of the first choral class,  
conducted by Miss Susanne Patch, in  
the course of the evening, gave "The  
dearest spot on earth to me," by  
Benedict, and the duet with chorus,  
"Onward, bonny boat," by Kucken,  
in each case being loudly recalled  
and cheerfully responding.

Further numbers by the Seminary  
were: "Kanani o ka pakipika,"  
words by Mrs. Haalelea, music by  
A. B. Naone; "Full and harmoni-  
ous," chorus, arranged from Gibby  
la Cornemuse; "Song of the hop-  
pickers"; "Pushi a ka lani," by  
Queen Liliuokalani, and "O'er  
blooming meadows," a waltz trio, by  
Wekerlin. In every case the audi-  
ence asked for more. The orchestra  
played "Egyptian midnight parade"  
effectively in the middle of the sec-  
ond part. Miss May C. Atherton  
sang the solo, "Burst, ye apple bloss-  
oms," by Stephen Emory, and of the  
way she did it produced a furor of  
applause. One recall was complied  
with, but to a second the fair song-  
stress bowed her acknowledgment.

Miss Carrie Castle, who is in the  
front rank of local amateur pianists,  
was the accompanist for the Sem-  
inary. Mr. F. M. English ably ac-  
companied Mr. Isenberg, and Mr.  
Theo. Richards played for Miss  
Atherton. It is seldom that such an  
aggregation of musical talent appears  
in Honolulu as did on this occasion.

Results as to the Seminary stand as  
a high tribute to Miss Patch's pains-  
taking training, and as to the orches-  
tra a credit to the players and an  
added wreath to the fame of Prof.  
Berger, both as an instructor and  
conductor. Considering that the  
orchestral branch of the band has  
only been organized a few months,  
exacting criticism would be out of  
place and still not be able to ferret  
out many flaws.

A fine Kimball piano was kindly  
loaned for the occasion by H. H.  
Williams & Co. The artistic and  
clear programs were printed at the  
BULLETIN office.

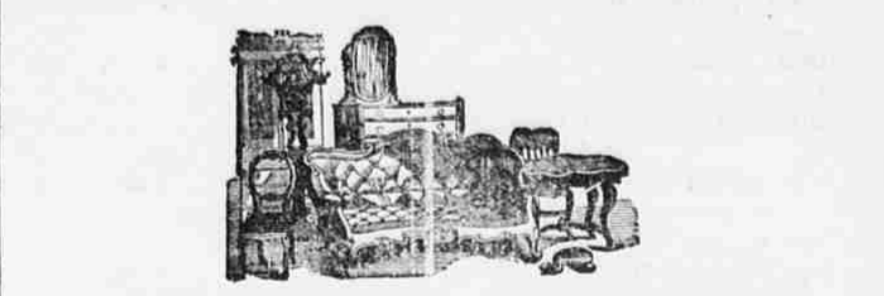

### MAUI NOTES.

Drowning of a Native off the Coast at Paia—Society News—Kahului Shipping.

March 24, Mahiai (k.) of Waikapu reports that he in company with his friend Kahahana (k.) went to Kaupukuloa, Hamakualoa, Makawao District, to procure a canoe from a relative named Kalani (k.), which was delivered to him. Kahahana started to return in it to Kahului, while Mahiai came back on horseback, leading the other's horse to Kahului, where he was to await the arrival of his companion Kahahana, who was seen trying to put in at Maliko Gulch, but the wind was blowing too sharp and he could not make a landing. He was advised by those on shore to go in at Kuau. This was about 5:30 p. m., and later, about dark, the man in the canoe was seen off Kuau, but he made no attempt to put in at that place and continued on towards Paia. At daylight next morning, as Kahahana had not arrived at Kahului, Mahiai became anxious and returned along the beach to look for his friend. At a small fishing place called Kaa, between Spreckelsville and Kahului, he found the canoe bottom up on the sand, the paddles gone and the man nowhere to be found.

The missing man was an expert with a canoe, having fished and traded between Lanai and Molokai, and was well known and highly esteemed. As he has not returned to Waikapu where he belongs, it is supposed he is drowned. He leaves quite a large family to mourn his loss. Immediately upon the information being lodged with the Sheriff, Mr. Chillingworth had his men out, and the beach was thoroughly patrolled, but up to present writing no trace of the body has been discovered.

Society people still continue on their way rejoicing, amusing and being amused, with receptions, afternoon and high teas, dinner and card parties, etc., etc., apparently utterly indifferent to the momentous questions of the day, such as annexation, sugar bounties, contract labor, opium license and the like, in which so many of your good people are in heated debate at present.

This afternoon there is to be a social gathering and dance at the elegant new home of one of the people of Wailuku, at which Paia, Makawao and Waihee loveliness will predominate. On Thursday next, Mrs. Ed. Friel will entertain her many lady friends at her pretty home at Waikapu with afternoon tea.

Prominent among the picnic and riding parties of the past week was one from Spreckelsville and Kahului to the beautiful Iao Valley. Col. Z. S. Spalding, of Paris, France, and Kauai, H. I., has been visiting his sister-in-law, Mrs. Geo. Herbert, of Wailuku, during the past week, combining business with pleasure. Business called him to Waihee, to examine into the present management of the plantation at that place, of which he is the president. The Colonel is looking well, but, judging from a brief conversation with him, is not very favorably impressed with the future prospects for Hawaii, and is evidently a strong advocate of annexation as a prompt remedy for many of the existing evils, including the present stagnation in business.

The harbor at Kahului looks bare and empty. There are no vessels in port, which is rather unusual for this season of the year. The schooner Mary Dodge, Gallop master, discharged her cargo of redwood from Eureka, for Wilder & Co., and sailed Monday, March 21, for Mahukona, North Kohala, Hawaii, where she will load sugar for San Francisco.

The schooner Anna, Williams master, is due at this port, having left San Francisco on the 11th.

We are pleased to report quite a decided improvement in the condition of our Circuit Judge, Hon. George Richardson. Mr. H. G. Treadway, who has been quite ill at his house for the past week or ten days, is again at his desk, although not fully recovered.

Mr. E. B. Carley of Kahului, superintendent of the Maui Telephone Co., in convalescing rapidly and, although not able to attend to outside active business, can be heard in answer to a telephone call for "central."

Strong E. and N. E. winds still prevail, with continued rain squalls. The temperature is decidedly cool—too much so for health or comfort—and there is a great deal of sickness in the district, so that the Sisters in charge of our hospital at Kahului have their hands full.

The present indications are that you may have some interesting reading for the Marshal next week. The good people hereabouts are mustering all their Christian forbearance and resignation in view of the renewal of the controversy on Prohibition in the BULLETIN between "S. S." and J. M. Horner. Oh, why is suffering humanity thus afflicted? Are there no vacant halls, away out in the woods, that they can hire? If not we beg they will have mercy on us. "Cut it short" and give us a rest as soon as possible.

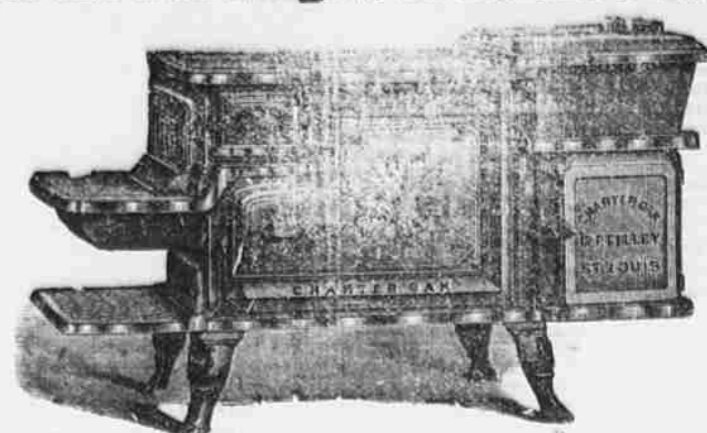
