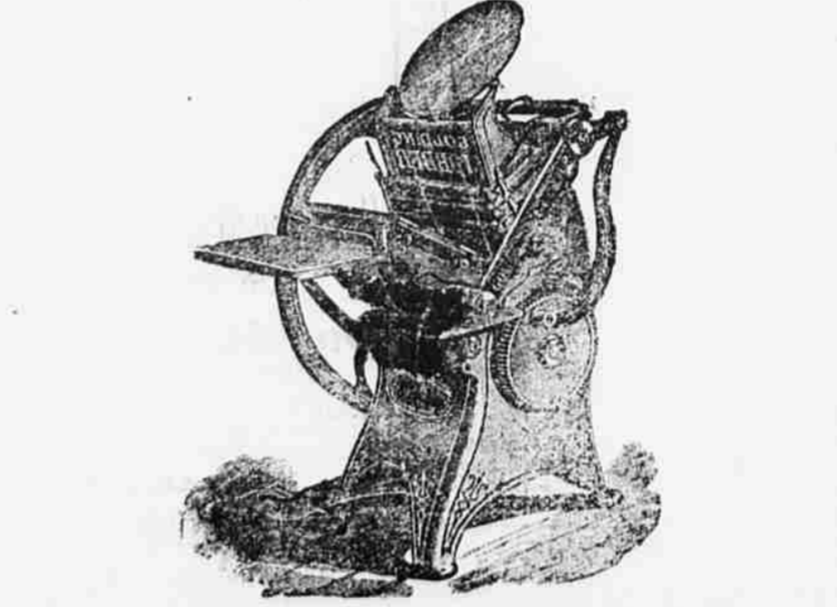

DANGERS ON THE HIGHWAY.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Last night, when going over my regular milk route, I met with what might have proven a serious accident. Going at my usual quickened speed and with my wagon heavily loaded, I suddenly came in contact with a large pile of water pipes, placed almost in the centre of the road. The night was particularly bright at that hour, and there being no light, or danger signal on or near the obstruction, of course I was upon it before I knew it. Fortunately my horses escaped uninjured, but my harness was injured, by the bursting of straps, etc. It seems to me no strange that there should be no lamps burning, to warn travelers against such obstructions, and it is more so, as the electric lights are not to be depended upon. I had a similar accident some months ago. Is there no way in which contractors or builders could be compelled to secure travelers against such dangerous obstructions? H. A. JONES.

CAN'T SEE IT.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—I have no interest in the Tramway, other than a desire for its success, because it is a great public benefit. Neither would I question for one instant the commendable merciful feelings of "Punahou" in his "protest." But it does seem to me that that individual has protested against an over-working of mules when no such over-working is practised. That two of the trams, linked together, with seventy or eighty passengers on board, are not a heavy load for two mules, anyone can see who will take the trouble to look; for it will be seen that for the greater part of time they run with comparatively slack traces. At starting, of course, the pull is somewhat hard, and so is a place or two on the line where the grade is a little steep. Barring these exceptions, the load is light and easy for two mules.

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—I read with satisfaction in this morning's "Advertiser" a communication and editorial comments thereon relating to cruelty to animals. Having recently returned from a visit to some of the country districts, I wish to say that here in Honolulu we see no cruelty practised towards dumb brutes as compared with what may be seen on some plantations. True, a tender-hearted and merciful man can see enough here every day to make his heart bleed, but the worst is mild in comparison with what I have seen on plantations. The poor mules are compelled to draw frightful loads, at a fast speed, and are whipped and flogged shamefully. I don't know whether any society in the city could have the effect of mitigating the suffering of those poor dumb creatures in the country; but I do wonder that their owners do not prevent such treatment of their property in their own interests. NOT OVERWORKED.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—"Punahou," in an article in your issue of yesterday, under the heading of "Protest," makes a very specious, and philanthropically tinged objection to what he is pleased to consider cruelty to the mules employed by the Tramways Company. "Punahou" is either a person who sees things through a doubly magnifying glass, or one who has never seen the workings of the locomotors of similar cars in the States. In this city two mules haul two small cars, for a comparatively short distance, over a road with very little or no uphill grade. A very light load indeed, when compared with that usually put on a large freight wagon or dray. Whilst in New York, or any other large city of the States, cars of the size of those used by the Tramways Co. (called there "Bob-tails") and holding at least one third more passengers, are invariably drawn by one horse, and in many instances one mule. These mules, though small, are of remarkable strength and endurance and seem—as evidently they are—obtained by the Creator to be the carriers of heavy loads. You are mistaken "Punahou" these mules are not ill treated, and your thoughts in that relation must rise from an overcharged philanthropic nature, superinduced by an utter ignorance of the little animals' capacity and endurance. OBSERVATIONS ON XERXES.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Yesterday, I read with some degree of interest, a correspondence published in your issue, on "School matters," signed by "Xerxes," and though I agree with him, in the general views expressed as to the modes of properly teaching the young intellectual buds to blossom, I do not entirely concur with him, in his attack upon the actions, or bearings of the Inspector-General. His language there imports to me the wail of one, who having met with just handling from this official, seeks—under the cover of his desire to have youth properly instructed—to endure the patient and Christianlike giving public the sum of his personal grievances or spite. After considering the matter I am prone to think, that more than possible the Inspector was right in kicking a teacher out, because he, no doubt, weighed the teacher's capabilities, in the scale of honest judgment, and finding him wanting, used the only method of reformation, allowed him, namely, dismissal.

I would like to suggest to "Xerxes" in a mild and entirely pacific mood, that one of the "imported teachers from a foreign country" who come "by the boat load," if he be qualified is more apt to honestly advance the cause of education, than are those, who come singly and not in the "boat load," and are not capable. From the tenor of "Xerxes's" letter, I would again mildly suggest, when he feels inclined to ventilate his spleen, let him do so in the glare of the day, and not under the sheltering cloak of an ardent desire to promote the proper intellectual advancement of youth. His points then would not suggest so much palpable bosh. AN OBSERVER.

PLANTERS LABOR AND SUPPLY COMPANY. A meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Planters' Labor and Supply Company was held this morning at the office of Messrs. H. Hackfeld & Co., the Vice-President, Mr. H. F. Glade, in the chair. The subjects under discussion were Portuguese immigration and the United States Tariff.

OVERWORKED MULES. EDITOR BULLETIN:—If either of your correspondents will favor me with particulars of time, number of car, and direction in which it was moving, when any occurrence of which they complain took place I shall be much obliged to them. Their names can be kept secret.

As to general statements of the overworking of stock: the stables are at Punahou and I shall be pleased to give any of the complainants a card to inspect the condition of the stock themselves. Considering they are only just broken, the animals are in remarkably good fettle. They will get sore shoulders and sore mouths during the process of breaking in, just as oarsmen will get sore hands until they are used to the oar, but any case of working a mule with a sore will be treated most severely.

None of them do more than 12 miles a day. In San Francisco they do from 16 to 20. When some showed signs of fatigue on Sunday they were taken off after doing only 8 miles.

Some of them had to be whipped because they had been worked in carts during the week and had got out of gait; but any case of cruelty would be visited with instant dismissal if it were authenticated at this office, as also any case of bad language being used by the employees.

The live stock is being continually increased, but it should be remembered by those who make these complaints that no one, not even themselves, could have foreseen and provided for the amount of travel which has come to the road on Saturdays and Sundays, and there is always a peculiar difficulty in handling a traffic where the travel on two days of the week so greatly exceeds the ordinary week-day average.

NEW LINES. Whilst on the subject of the Tramway I wish to lay before your readers the proposed initial working of the Beretania, Nuuanu and Fort street lines with the view of drawing out suggestions.

Route A—Nuuanu street (Pauoa) via Queen and Fort to esplanade; hourly service. Route B—Nuuanu (Pauoa) via School and Fort to esplanade; hourly service.

Route C—Beretania street, from Nuuanu to Punahou; half-hourly. (The above three services form a half-hourly communication between Punahou and Pauoa by changing cars at corner of Nuuanu and Beretania, or corner of Fort and Beretania.)

Route D—Up and down Fort street and esplanade to Beretania every ten minutes. Special Route E—Nuuanu (Pauoa) via School, Fort and Beretania to Oahu College, cars to suit school requirements.

Special Route F—Nuuanu (Pauoa)—via Beretania and Fort to esplanade, cars to suit business men. Special Route G—Fort and Beretania to Oahu College, cars to suit business men and College people.

If the heads of public institutions would kindly send in their figures of regular traffic and hours of the day it would greatly facilitate the arrangement of the schedule.
