CORRESPONDENCE.

Hilo Kicker Tells of Fourth's Races.

Hilo, July 3, 1903.

Editor INDEPENDENT:

The Fourth of July was celebrated in grand style. The weather was simply perfect. Thousands of men, women, and children crowded the streets of Hilo all day and late into the night.

The race track was a sight to behold. The grand stand was crowded at fifty cents per head, and Berger's band discoursed elegant rag-time music. The Portuguese band of Hilo did not appear, their nose being put out of joint by the Kamehameha boys' band.

What shall we say of the Congress of Cowboys, roping and tying steers for the championship of the Territory? The first wild steer that was let out of the pen was a two months old calf. They had choked the poor thing to death before they let it out of the pen. It was captured by a cowboy before it had got its nose out. There was loud cheering at the cattle pen, but nobody on the grand stand knew what it was all about, and so it was throughout. No wild cattle were in sight, but sick cows from Olas and Hamakua.

As for the riding and breaking of bronchos, the least said is the better. They were easily recognized by parties from 'Frisco as having done duty many a year with their stunt of running to Lone Mountain Cemetery as carriage horses. The oration at the fish market by Attorney Le Blond was masterly. The old Bowery Theatre, N Y, never made "Rome howl," or twisted the British lion's tail as his ribs did. Mr Peck made his little address on breaking ground for the Kohala-Hilo Railway. It was very nice and so on. Everything passed off nice, and we think we all got the worth of our money. The only thing to mar the occasion was the action of the jockeys at the race course. The waits were very long. It seemed impossible for the judge on the grand stand to get them out. When they did appear it was a long time before they made the start. It means simply this; Any one betting on the Hilo races will get left, and it has been this way for years, or ever since a track was built in Hilo.

There were large crowds at the Elks show, and it was a perfect success.

Great credit is due to Mr Lambert of the Hilo & Olas Railroad Co for the way he handled the crowd to and from the race track, and only twenty-five cents for the round trip.

All in all, after all, it was a red letter day for Hilo.

COOPER WANTS CAMPBELL.

During the discussion on the salary of the Supervising Engineer day before yesterday in the House of Representatives, which we deem to be the same as that of the Assistant Superintendent, previously struck out of the Six Months Salary Bill, and from the answers given by Superintendent Cooper in the grilling he received from members, it was plain to anyone with sufficient foresight and insight into the trend events are leading us to, that Marston Campbell was to be the man of the hour to help Poobah expend the money to be derived from the Loan Act. The attempt of some of the members to probe him, so as to get him to give a direct answer that he wanted Campbell, was unnecessary, and we think that when he refused to answer a direct question on that point, he was perfectly within his right, because it was a leading question, and others had a right to make and arrive at conclusions opposite to what he intended to convey, and in not conveying what was desired, he submerged the real desire aimed at.

There need be no gainsaying that he evaded the giving of any direct answer which will mislead the House members. He says he needs a technical man and that there are just as good men as Campbell to be got, but inwardly he wants Campbell, and no other need apply. We have it upon the best of inside information, brought to us by our diekey bird, that as soon as Mr Cooper had tendered his resignation, he immediately suggested, and even nominated Mr Campbell to be appointed in his stead. And it is also known that he insisted on it and that the first choice of the Governor for the position, so 'tis said, fell upon the

mantel of his "fraternal" friend Campbell, who since fell into disrepute and disfavor with the cohorts of the lower House.

Our diekey bird (not the Senator nor the Judge by that name) has brought us another information that Mr Cooper stated openly yesterday at a semi-public hostelry that if Mr Campbell tendered his resignation, he would accept it, but he would not ask for his resignation as requested by resolution of the House. Then, if such is the case, Mr Campbell is the man of Mr Cooper's choice as well as that of Governor Dole's.

In our opinion, if Mr Campbell is the man we think him to be, he should by all means resign, as he is not in odor with the people's representatives, and knowing it only too well, he should, in all decency, immediately tender his resignation. But if Mr Cooper should retain him in office, it would then clearly be a case of disregarding the wishes of the masses as expressed by resolution in the House. For the rest, we leave to the future and to posterity.

THOSE DISAGREEMENTS.

The cause of difference in the conference committee yesterday afternoon was over the items of salaries of the Japanese Interpreter and the Assistant Superintendent of Public Works in the Six Months Salary Bills. A compromise was moved and failed to be adopted, which is that the Senate give way to the House on the matter of the salary of the Japanese Interpreter which it had attempted to arrive at an agreement in an increased pay, and that the House give way to the Senate in the matter of inserting the salary of the Assistant Superintendent, which the lower body had struck out. But in both instances, the House would not recede from either item.

Those of the House attended to the business in a manner after our own heart. It is claimed that the "superior" crew gave way to many amendments by the "inferior" lot. Yes, it is all very true, but we are given to understand that most of them are inconsequential and hardly worth fighting over; and now, in the more important items, particularly in the above, over which much time was thrown away in fighting over the present incumbents, both of whom are unpopular, and it is these that the "superior" fellows want those "inferior" ones to make way to their better and "superior" judgment, but those of the lower strata cannot see it in such an "inferior" way. And another item these "superior" beings want is to increase the salary of the Superintendent of Public Instruction to that of an executive departmental head. We think this is both outwardly and inwardly wrong, when that branch of the Government service is purely a bureaucracy, and not a department, although called so for convenience sake. In the days that have gone beyond recall, it was always considered as a bureau and is so still today, a board of commissioners being in control, and the Superintendent is only its executive officer to carry out whatever the board decides upon to be done and to have done. And today, the duties of the Superintendent are not much above that of the former Inspector General of Schools, but they want to increase the pay, and this with three Normal

Inspectors besides, who are virtually assistants to the present chief of the bureau of today. The office now appears to be a mere sinecure from what it used to be formerly, and it seems to be only to provide a handsome living for one who spends nearly all his time at headquarters, and who has highly paid assistants; these latter we think might as well be safely dispensed with, as in our opinion, they are unnecessary and too cumbersome, and are impositions upon the taxpayers.

MORE "COLOR LINE."

By giving the native a taste of the Pierean spring—that "little knowledge" which wise men hold dangerous,—have we helped him and helped the country? Is he a better citizen; is he likely to be a better citizen? Under other circumstances would he not have realized his destiny as a contented laborer? Does he not use such education as he is qualified to absorb for his own harm and the disadvantage of the Territory? Can he assimilate enough knowledge to give him an equal chance with the white man or as useful a purpose in life? Is he able to get wisdom out of it all?—Advertiser.

The above appear, on their face, as mere questions, but they indicate an impulse if not an established intention. In other words, the Advertiser would suggest that the native Hawaiian is incapable of mental development beyond a certain limited scope, and that thereafter knowledge finds a false field in which to operate. It might just as well have said: "The natives were born to be hewers of wood and drawers of water. They have no intellect, no ambition, no hero worship, no goal; and they are incapable of possessing these noble qualities of our crowd."

We will not discuss the questions raised, for the facts too plainly negate them. It is just such utterances, however, that inflame the prejudices of the two races that control in these islands. No one outside of the Advertiser's clique desires race feeling. In fact the average kamaaina white would shun it as studiously as would Hawaiian. However, if the owner of the Advertiser wishes to press the matter to an issue it is reasonable to expect that he can be accommodated, although we do wish to suggest that he will have very few trumps to go in on and those trumps will be mighty, mitey small.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Of course "Cousin" Dole would readily sign a bill to compensate "Cousin" Dole, which he did wiki-wiki as soon as received.

Thomas Fortune does not like Honolulu. It is fortunate for unfortunate Hawaii that Fortune finds fickle fortune feasible in fertile foreign fields.

Officer McDuffie is making himself very unpopular in certain quarters. An officer who is working almost day and night to catch up with and punish crime is apt to make himself unpopular with criminals.

The Loan Appropriation Bill is now up to the House. An impression has got abroad that if it is passed, a move would be quickly made by the "superior" body to adjourn sine die, irrespective of any salaries appropriations, as the Government may then fall back on the last Acts of 1901. But the House

does not see it in that light and the Loan Bill is being held up till the others are passed upon in conference.

The Hawaiian Star gets a bad liver over the work of the Legislature, and morosely affirms that little good has been accomplished. Cheer up, "Twinkle," dear. Another election is coming, and if we all go damphool we may elect a Legislature to suit you.

We rise to a point of order again and claim that the rules of public interest demand the ownership of the Rapid Transit lines by the government. This concern is one of the most important of public utilities, and the control of it should be in the hands of the people and the enormous profits which must come in time should accrue to the people.

The special jury on the Booth fire case returned a verdict yesterday afternoon to the effect that the cause was unknown.

The First National Bank is suing McCleskey & Sons to recover \$37,527.20, balance on a note for \$50,000 given on March 29, 1901.

George H Robertson left in the Mauna Loa today for a tour of inspection of the plantations controlled by C Brewer & Co.

A number of Honolulu boys, now at home from eastern colleges, will leave next Tuesday for Molokai where they will hunt for several days.

Judge W L Wilcox's relatives arrived from Kauai yesterday to be with him during the critical period incident to the operation of Monday last.

John Clanhau, the well known horse trainer for Tom Hollinger, died at the Queen's hospital last night after an illness of nearly a year.

A meeting of the Hawaiian Gun Club will be held at the Hawaiian hotel at 8 o'clock this evening for the purpose of completing organization.

The Stint-Evans Comedy Co arrived by the Alameda this morning and will give their opening performance at the Hawaiian Opera house tomorrow evening.

The Portuguese soda water vander, Rodrigues, who was assaulted by officer McDuffie at Kapiolani race track on June 11, was awarded \$50 damages by Judge Dickey in the second district court yesterday.

IN EXTRA SESSION.

The Second Legislature for the Consideration of Appropriation Bills.

THE SENATE—FIFTY-NINTH DAY.

After the usual preliminaries had been disposed of, House Bill 9 was taken up on third reading. McCandless moved to lay on table and lost. It also failed to pass third reading by a vote of 7 ayes to 3 noes.

House Bill 10, also on third reading, was passed by a vote of 10 ayes.

Secretary Carter informed the Senate that the Governor yesterday signed Act 12, to compensate E P Dole.

On motion of Dickey, a recess of ten minutes was taken at 10:18, but it reconvened at 11:25 o'clock.

A letter signed by Philip L Weaver, Assistant Attorney General, was then read, giving an expression of opinion on the construction of Section 54 of the Organic Act, on the question "whether or not the Governor must call another extra or special session of the Legislature, in order that the Legislature may pass Appropriation Bills in case this session fails to pass either Appropriation Bills?" After giving the opinion, the conclusion is arrived at "that the Governor has fulfilled all the requirements of the law in calling this extra session, and is not required to call a special session under any section of the Organic Act, although he may do so in his discretion." Received and filed.

On motion of McCandless, recess was taken at 11:40 to 2 p m.

THE HOUSE—FIFTY-NINTH DAY.

After disposing of the usual preliminaries, Secretary Carter, by communication, notified that the Governor had signed Act 12, to compensate Edmund P Dole for services rendered in the Osaki Maniaki case before the U S Supreme Court.

A communication from Circuit Judges De Bolt and Gear was read, which is reproduced elsewhere, and accepted without a word.

The Senate sent information that the report of the conference committee on Senate Bill 9 was adopted yesterday. It also returned House Bill 8, relating to appropriations for the use of the Government Bond, as having yesterday passed third reading.

Unfinished business was ordered taken up, the consideration of the report of the conference committee on the Loan Bill. On motion of Long, consideration was deferred to 2 p m today.

And again, on his motion, recess was taken at 10:45 o'clock.

CIRCUIT COURT OFFICIALS.

The Judges Hold Them to be Territorial, Not County Officials.

The following communication was read in the House of Representatives this morning:

The Circuit Court, Honolulu, July 9th, 1903.
To the House of Representatives, Territory of Hawaii.

Gentlemen:—We respectfully submit that the Judges of the Circuit Courts and all officials of such Courts, to wit, the clerk, interpreter, stenographers and bailiffs, are Territorial officials and are not County officials. They certainly are not part of the machinery of the County Government, and without such officials the Courts are not complete. The salaries of all such officials (except the Judges, whose salaries are provided for by Congress) should be a Territorial charge and paid out of the Territorial Treasury. However, should your Honorable body not take that view of the source from which the salaries should be paid, and consider that the salaries should be paid out of the County Treasuries, which we submit would be wrong, still in that event we request that the salaries to be received by such officials from whatever source, be fixed by the Legislature, which is the Territorial law making body, and the body which should fix the compensation to be received by all Territorial officials. We believe that if the salaries are not fixed by your Honorable body, the door will thus be left open to the wrongful exercise of power and favoritism, and the pure administration of justice menaced.
