### FOREIGN NEWS.

**LONDON, Nov. 30.**—The Japanese Minister in an interview today said that it was for the interest of Japan and other nations to have either Yongampho or Wiji opened to commerce. It is the intention of Japan to negotiate with Korea directly.

**LONDON, Nov. 30.**—Admiral Alexieff has dispatched a battleship and three destroyers to Chemulpo to support the demand made for redress growing out of the trouble between Japanese and Russian sailors.

Russia is apparently actively preparing for war. She is now endeavoring to purchase for the far east two Chilean battleships just built in England.

**COLON, Panama, Dec. 1.**—The Hay-Varilla canal treaty arrived today and will be immediately taken to the headquarters of the Panama government. It is believed the treaty will be signed tomorrow and all details completed to make Panama's part in the compact binding.

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.**—A bill was introduced in Congress this morning which provides for the application of the Chinese exclusion law to the Japanese. This measure is largely the result of labor agitation in the West Coast States.

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.**—In the Senate inquiry into the claims to promotion of Brigadier General Leonard Wood, Major General Brooke testified that General Wood was insubordinate in Cuba. Wood will probably be recalled from the Philippines to testify.

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

### TELEGRAPHIC ITEMS

The University of Munich has decided to matriculate women.

Israel Zangwill, the author, has been married to Edith Ayrton.

Lord Roberts is said to have decided to resign, on account of ill health.

It is understood that England and China will hold Tibet against Russia.

The London War Office will establish balloon stations on the Mediterranean.

Frau Wagner lost her suit brought to prevent the production of Parsifal in New York.

The Russians have reoccupied Haiching, a place eight miles from Port Arthur.

The Brooklyn Academy of Music was completely destroyed by fire, November 23.

Three negroes were lynched at Shreveport, La., on Tuesday, for murdering white men.

President Roosevelt will recognize King Peter of Serbia, and reestablish the legation at Belgrade.

United States Minister Powell has refused to recognize the provisional government of Jimenez.

Samuel Rainey, the noted San Francisco politician and running mate of Buckley, died November 25.

The Dreyfus commission will soon submit its conclusion on the demand for a complete revision of the case.

A daughter has been born to Mrs. W. R. Vanderbilt Jr., who was formerly Miss Fair, of San Francisco.

Grover Cleveland has published a letter in which he absolutely declines to be a candidate for the presidency.

The Colorado State militia have been armed with 1000 government rifles in anticipation of strike troubles.

British officials deny the rumor that a British squadron is to be sent to Lagayra to enforce demands upon Venezuela.

Thirteen provincial viceroys have offered 90,000 foreign drilled troop to assist the Peking government in resisting Russia.

A Japanese student at Yokohama was arrested on suspicion that he contemplated an attempt to assassinate Marquis Ito.

President Roosevelt, Senator Platt and Governor Odell of New York have agreed to work harmoniously in New York politics.

Emperor William has postponed the Atlantic ocean yacht race until 1905, the Emperor's poor health being given as the cause.

The Duke of Devonshire has made a vigorous attack upon the position taken by Chamberlain and Balfour in their fiscal speeches.

The Newlands resolution inviting Cuba to enter the Union as a State was tabled in the Senate, and will come up for discussion later.

Colombia has notified the Panama Canal company that it will not allow the transfer of the company's privileges to the United States.

Rios, the Filipino leader was hanged Dec. 1, he having been convicted of murder, and Toledo, the Ladrope leader, has been sentenced to death.

General Reyes states that Colombia is ready to grant all the concessions to the United States given by Panama in the Hays-Varilla treaty.

Major J. W. McClung was fatally shot in the Palace Hotel, San Francisco last week while attempting to save the life of Lillie Hitchcock Coit.

The Maui Hotel, under its new ownership and management is once more running as smooth as silk, and is proving its reputation as one of the best and most popular hotels outside of Honolulu.

On last Saturday and Sunday an abnormally heavy surf ran along the east coast of Maui, overflowing the beach road at Kahului and the road across Maliko Gulch, with the force of a tidal wave.

There will be a mass meeting of the citizens of Wailuku held at the Courthouse this (Saturday) evening at seven o'clock for the purpose of taking steps to organize a fire company. All are invited to attend.

A program of races has been prepared for the holidays at the Kahului track, and will appear in next week's issue.

## A NEW KAHULUI

Anyone going to Kahului, will note at a glance, that considerable changes have recently taken place in the vicinity of the wharves. Most notable amongst these is a small, but very attractive passenger station, built somewhat on the style of those one sees when travelling along the line of the Southern Pacific Railroad. The building consists of a main office about 18x16 floor space, with awing on each side, of 22x18 each, which the Kahului Railroad Co. will throw open as waiting rooms for the use of its patrons.

The yards also present an altogether different appearance, since the removal of the old, light rails which, owing to the limited space at the command of the former owners of the Railroad, were laid down in a sort of wormy way. A new solid 45 pound rail has replaced the old ones, and the sharp curves have been taken out, and switches of the latest pattern lead from one track to another. The yards have been leveled off and covered with rich red loam, through which already grass can be seen, so that in time the new yards will represent in appearance, a well laid out lawn. On the mauka side of the depot, the open space is being filled in with good soil also, where the Railroad Company intend to lay out a miniature park, with a neat fence and a driveway all around it. Among other improvements most notable is the large addition to what is known as the freight warehouse. This building, originally 40x150 is now enlarged to 60x225, with a single track through the middle, thus affording two immense floor spaces on either side. The main office of the Kahului Railroad Co. will be moved towards the beach about 100 feet, giving room for additional track space, and easier approaches to the lumber yards and warehouses. The Company further intend enlarging their sugar warehouse so that an additional 10,000 bags of sugar can be stored, and before the opening of the sugar season, there can be stored in Kahului at one time 6,000 tons of sugar, besides allowing ample room for the large incoming freight which the Claudine and the big steamers continuously bring to Kahului.

The writer was at Kahului last week, and in conversation with the Superintendent, the matter of freight rates was mentioned. We were then shown a little pamphlet which the Kahului R. R. Co. issued some six months ago, and although this pamphlet is to be had for the mere asking by anyone, yet we doubt whether the public has taken due notice of its contents. The pamphlet contains a complete freight tariff, and should be carefully perused by anyone sending or receiving freight. Upon close examination we find that the complaint made some time ago, in regard to the what was called excessive freight rates charged by the K. R. R. Co. is without foundation. Our attention was called to the rates on numerous items, as they appear in the freight tariff. For instance, Metal Lined Bath Tubs, are carried for 1/2 rate; the same with bones. In the interest of fruit growers, boxes are carried for 1/2 rate. The interests of the charcoal burner are well taken of, as the Railroad Co. takes 40 bags at the rate of one ton. Empty containers for poultry, etc. are returned free of charge, and others at 1/2 rate, taken on the basis of 1 1/2 pound per gallon capacity. Fish, an article which is so lamentably scarce in these Islands, is taken at net weights, with the weight of ice and packing thrown in. Furniture, which has heretofore always been a source of expense to anyone buying or shipping same, is carried at 1/2 rate when new, but when second-hand, it is carried for 1/2 rate, thus giving people, who through change of position are forced to move about some, a living chance. Hay, an article which is considerably used in this community the K. R. R. Co. carry for 1/2 rate, and ice, is carried for 1/2 the usual charge. The liquor dealers have come in for their share of consideration, inasmuch as the objectionable custom to lay an extra heavy freight tariff on this commodity has been entirely done away with by the K. R. R. Co. Liquors of all kinds are now carried on the same basis as any other merchandise. The shipping of live-stock, especially where the same is done by sea, has received the attention of the Kahului Railroad Co., and considerable reductions have been made all along the line, especially in the case of live

poultry, of which a goodly amount leaves this Island, and which the Railroad Co. carries at 1/2 rate. Feed Stuffs are taken at their actual weights, which in the case of bran and barley, means considerable saving to the shipper. It is evident that the R. R. Co. wishes to encourage the planting of trees, as it offers to carry them in crates, and "protected" at 1/2 rate.

We mention but a few of these rates. A close examination of the entire tariff will reveal the fact that the rates are more than reasonable, and can well afford comparison with the rates charged by other Railroad Corporations on these Islands. For instance, the O. R. & L. Co. charge on an average \$2.20 per ton, the Hilo Railroad Co. \$2.00, the Hawaii Railroad Co. \$2.00, for what the Kahului R. R. Co. charge \$1.00, without taking into consideration the numerous reductions and exceptions made on the different classes of merchandise, by the latter company. Even taking the Railroad charges in conjunction with the lighterage charges, the K. R. R. Co. is still way below the rates charged by the other three named Companies for Railroad charges alone.

There has been much complaint in regard to excessive charges made on single shipments or packages, 40 cents being charged as a rule for freight from Honolulu on a package to Kahului or any other station on the line of the railroad. While this may seem high at first glance, it is well to bear in mind that the clerical work in connection with the 40 cent package, is fully as much as with a 100 ton single shipment. So that, all things considered, the charge is justified to a larger degree than is commonly taken for granted. The News pointed this out to the Superintendent, and wishing to accommodate the public at large, he showed his willingness to make a suitable reduction on his end of the line, and to at once take up the matter with the Wilder's Steamship Co., so that in the near future, we may look forward to more reasonable rates on such small shipments as we all are in the habit of getting from Honolulu and other places. At present however, any package from Honolulu, although it may have cost only ten cents carries a charge of 65 cents delivered in Wailuku, apportioned as follows: 25 cent, steamer freight, 15 cents lighterage and railroad freight and 25 cents for delivery from the depot, when handled as a separate package by lack, etc.

In conclusion, it is evident, that the present K. R. R. Co. management is very anxious to consider the wants and rights of the public, which certainly is evidenced by the improvements made at Kahului, quite a number of which are certainly for the benefit of the public.

### LAHAINA LINES.

Miss Horner has received from Dr. Miyata a beautiful basket of artificial flowers, manufactured in Tokyo. At first sight almost anyone would think the flowers were natural, so perfect is the skill of the artistic manufacturer. Another present from Japan is a very handsome fan.

A small structure, intended for a Chinese restaurant, has been built near Mr. Henning's residence.

Mr. Valentine is one of the engineers on night duty, at the Pioneer Mill. Aupuni Hayselden is quite successful as a sugar boiler.

Wireless Operator Kinney has considerable artistic talent. He has recently completed a fine sketch of Lanai and the wreck of the Kiloana, Mr. Kinney's brother is captain of a large steamer, running between Boston, Mass., and Yarmouth, N. S. As the trips are discontinued during the winter months, preparations are being made for an excursion to the West Indies.

Mrs. Decoto was the guest of Mrs. McKay at Wailuku last week.

Mr. Henry Dickenson, Miss N. A. Holden and Miss Ivy Richardson attended the teachers' convention in Honolulu.

A Congregational church was dedicated on Lanai last Sunday, and delegates from Lahaina were present.

A young man named Noa died of pulmonary disease on Wednesday, and the funeral took place on the following day. His health and strength have been gradually failing for a year or more.

## SHIPPING NEWS

The two vessels which Russia is reported as trying to purchase from Chile are the two first class battle-ships "Constitution" and "Libertad," powerful 12,000 ton vessels which have been built in England and which Chile offers for sale owing to the agreement between Argentine and Chile to reduce their navies. Among the countries which have recently been reported as wishing to buy these vessels are Germany, Great Britain, and only a few weeks ago Japan tried to buy them.

London, Nov. 30.—Heavy storms continue throughout Europe and the list of disasters on the sea coast has been constantly increased. A score of French fishermen were drowned today in a wreck on the English Coast.

Port of Spain, Dec. 1.—A British squadron is going to La Guayra, it is reported, in connection with President Castro's closing of the Orinoco river to foreign trade. Great Britain has twice protested against this measure.

Berlin, Nov. 29.—One hundred people were drowned in the recent storms that swept the North sea.

General MacArthur, U. S. A., Mrs. MacArthur, Captain B. Parker West, aide to General MacArthur, were the guests of Admiral Terry yesterday on a cruise in the U. S. S. Iroquois to Pearl Harbor. There were also aboard Mr. and Mrs. Regan of Oakland, Cal., Mrs. Severance, Mrs. Valbridge and A. L. C. Atkinson, Captain Rodman was in command of the tug.

The tug left the Naval Dock shortly after 10 a. m., and made a quick run to Pearl Harbor. General MacArthur had a splendid opportunity to inspect the several sites for buildings, general Navy Yard and docks.—Advertiser.
