BY AUTHORITY.



Regulations for Carriages and Rates of Fares.

Under and by virtue of the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act to Regulate the Carrying of Passengers and Freight, and the Letting to Hire of Carriages, Wagons, Carts, Drays and other Vehicles in the District of Honolulu," amended and approved on the 24th day of August, A. D. 1855, I, Chas. T. Gulick, Minister of the Interior of the Hawaiian Kingdom, do hereby make the following Rules and Regulations to be observed by licensed carriers of passengers and freight in the District of Honolulu:

1st. Every licensed carriage, dray or vehicle must be numbered, and this number must be placed on a conspicuous part of the carriage, dray or vehicle. 2d. Every licensed carriage running at night must exhibit two lights, and the number of such carriage plainly shown on the glass of each lantern, in figures not less than one and one-half (1 1/2) inches in height. 3d. Drivers of licensed vehicles must obey the orders of the police.

4th. No licensed carriage will be allowed to stand on the makai side of Queen street near the Fish Market, and no two or more carriages will be allowed to stand abreast on any street. 5th. On all stands set apart for licensed carriages the horses must be harnessed parallel to the street and close to the sidewalk. 6th. No licensed horse and carriage must be left without a proper attendant, or properly secured.

7th. No licensed carriage will be allowed to be left on the street over night. 8th. STANDS SET APART FOR LICENSED CARRIAGES. No. 1. Makai side of Beretania street, east side of Maunakea street. No. 2. Makai side of Beretania street, from east corner of Nuuanu street.

9th. No more than two carriages will be allowed on any one stand at any one time. 10th. Licensed carriages standing in front of the Hawaiian Opera House shall also on the makai side of King street. 11th. Licensed carriages standing upon the Esplanade, near the Hotel, shall align upon the makai side of the street to the corner of Klug street, and make along the east side of Klug street.

12th. Licensed carriages at the Government Building shall enter on the eastern side of the drive, and align on the outer side of the circle awaiting their fare. 13th. To or from any point in Beretania street, from the harbor, and between Matanua street and Panchow street, for each passenger, 10 cents. 14th. To or from any point between the second bridge, Nuuanu Avenue, and the harbor, and the Reformatory School, on the Ewa road and the line of Victoria street, not exceeding one mile from the starting point and not conflicting with Rules 9, for each passenger, 25 cents. For each passenger to or from any steamer or sailing vessel to or from any point within the foregoing limits, 25 cents.

15th. Outside these limits, not exceeding two miles from the starting point, for each passenger, 50 cents; beyond two miles, 25 cents per mile or fraction thereof, for each passenger. 16th. Children three years old or under, no charges over three years old and not more than ten years old, half price. 17th. For all detentions of a licensed vehicle while under engagement within the 10 cent limit \$1.50 per hour, irrespective of the number of passengers, beyond the foregoing limit, \$1 per hour. For each vehicle attending a funeral, \$4. 18th. Time to be counted from the time of engagement to the time of dismissal, and when called by the telephone the engagement commences with the receipt of the message. Service in answer to call by telephone may be charged a fare and one-half.

19th. No extra charge shall be made to any passenger for ordinary hand baggage. 20th. For any other than ordinary hand baggage, each trunk or box, 25 cents. 21st. Every licensed driver shall have a silver or white metal badge, with his number plainly shown on it, as per sample at the Police Station; said badge to be worn so as to be distinctly seen upon the left breast. To insure uniformity, these badges will be furnished at the Station House at cost price. 22d. WHEN ORDERED SPECIALLY FOR KAPALANI PARK.

One passenger, each way.....\$1.00 Two passengers, each way.....\$1.50 Three passengers, each way.....\$2.00 WHEN ORDERED SPECIALLY FOR THE FAIR. One passenger, each way.....\$3.00 Two passengers, each way.....\$4.00 Three passengers, each way.....\$5.00 No driver is compelled to take a single fare beyond the two mile limit, except by special bargain. When two or more offer the regular rate as per the above schedule must be accepted. Licensed drivers ordered to return for passengers left at any given point, may charge a fare and one-half fare. 23d. Between the hours of eleven (11) o'clock p. m. and five (5) o'clock a. m. the above rates of fare shall be doubled. 24th. If any licensed vehicle shall be found standing in any place but on the appointed stand, the driver shall be liable to arrest by any police officer unless said driver shall be under engagement, and no licensed driver will be permitted to wait under engagement for a fare in the vicinity of any designated stand except on the stand itself. Nothing in this regulation, however, shall be construed to conflict with regulations 10, 11 and 13 above.

25th. Any licensed driver who, when in charge of a licensed carriage, dray or other vehicle, shall be intoxicated, or who shall use insulting or abusive language, who shall demand more than the authorized fare, who shall neglect upon demand to show a card of rate of fare, or who shall contravene any of the rules above, shall upon complaint of any of the police, be arrested, and upon conviction be liable to the penalty set forth in Section 14, of the act approved the 24th day of August, A. D. 1855. 26th. No licensed driver shall leave his vehicle at any wharf, public or private ball or entertainment, place of amusement or public assemblage, or liquor saloon. 27th. No licensed vehicle will be permitted to stand on any steamer wharf on the day of arrival or departure of steamers. 28th. Any licensed vehicle, horse or harness found in service at any time in an unsuitable or

unsafe condition for performing the duties of common carriers will render the owner or driver, or both, liable to arrest and prosecution. These rules shall have full force and effect on and after January 1, 1886, and all former rules and regulations for the government of licensed vehicles are abolished. CHAS. T. GULICK, Minister of the Interior.

Water Notice. From this date, till further notice, W. R. SEAL, Esq., is alone authorized to connect water rates and dues on account of the Honolulu Water Works.

He is fully empowered to give a good and sufficient receipt, and none other will be acknowledged. All parties are requested when paying water rates, to produce to the Receiver their last receipt. This Regulation does not apply to any business relating to the Water Works, which now is, or may hereafter be placed in the hands of the Attorney-General for settlement. CHAS. T.
