CAPTAIN BRADLEY.

HIS REMARKS ON BOARD THE STEAMER "MADRAS"

We have received permission to publish the following statement of Captain Bradley, late commander of the Madras, which has been received from him:

Saturday, Sept. 8th, at 3:30, p.m. let go from the dock and proceeded to sea, Pilot in charge at 5:12 p.m. when about to discharge the Pilot into the Pilot schooner, Robert Amon, Chief Mate came on to the bridge, I told him that I did not intend to allow him to eat at the cabin table any more but that he would get his meals in his own room. Amon at once commenced to use abusive language to me when I told him to stop it and to leave the bridge, Amon refused to do so by saying "I shan't." I then went up to him with intention of putting him off the bridge when he made a grab at my beard and a blow on my face which I dodged loosing my cap. I then administered a chastisement to him, Amon at the same time trying to get the best of me which he failed to do. I again ordered him off the bridge, and had to put him off using no more force than was necessary, I then went aft and wrote out a statement of this whole affair and asked the Pilot who was on the bridge, also the third mate who was at the wheel to sign it if they thought it was a correct one, which they did; after discharging the Pilot into the cutter I rang the telegraph to proceed full speed ahead, the first Engineer Cotton immediately came on to the bridge and asked me if that signal "referring to the telegraph," meant to proceed on the voyage, I replied yes; he then said that the engines would not be moved unless to go back to Frisco. I cautioned him that the mate's business had nothing to do with him; I then made sail on the ship and while doing so called the engineer aft and ordered the first engineer to proceed on the voyage by working the engines, he positively refused to obey me; I then gave the same order to his 2d and to the 3d engineers, and they likewise refused to proceed or move the engines and they then went forward.

While setting the main-topsail I observed the ship working astern, I went to the engine room and found the engine working astern; I then went down on to the platform and found the three engineers all there; I ordered Cotton to stop the engines, he refused to do so, I then turned round to the 2d and repeated my order to him he also refused to obey me, I then went on deck and took in the main-topsail and made it fast, and let the ship drive, taking soundings occasionally and at 9:45 p.m. the weather coming in foggy, I let go the anchor in 16 fathoms fearing the ship would drive on to Cape St. Pedro; Immediately after I took in the main-topsail the engines stopped.

After coming to an anchor I set a sea watch, the 2nd mate going off duty when the Engineers refused to proceed, Sunday Sept. 9th coming with a thick fog at p.m. the Tug Boat Monarch with Pilot McNeil came alongside and asked if I wanted anything I desired him to report to the British consul the state of affairs on board and to ask him to send me off three engineers who would take charge of the engines, Pilot McNeil replied he would and then steamed away to port latter part of the day hazy.

At 9:40 p.m. the chain of the windlass carried away and the cable began to run out, I went forward and found Amon with a lamp and lever in his hand, I took them from him and ordered him away and secured the cable. Amon went aft and again came forward I repeated my order to him, when he replied "all right mind you said so" foggy throughout the night.

Monday Sept. 10th commencing with foggy weather. At 1 p.m. the Tug Boat Wizard came alongside and asked if he could do anything for me I sent dispatch to the British Consul and a copy of these remarks, also asking for three engineers to take charge of the engines; 3:30 p.m. British Consul, Mr. Lead,

Captains Smart, Freeman and pilot Freeman arrived to enquire into the proceedings on board, resulting in engineers positively refusing to go to sea in the ship, so I proposed to go out, sooner than take them on under arrest to Hongkong, which proposition is agreed to by all parties.

SHIPPING NOTES.

The Isle of Anglesea will sail to-morrow. The C. O. Whitmore sailed on Saturday in ballast and stores. She will return with a load of lumber for Allen & Robinson. The Bgtn W. G. Irwin sailed Sept 29 for S. F. She took 1,472 bags of sugar, 918 kegs of sugar, 1,257 bags of rice, and 148 bags of awa root. Total domestic value, \$27,204.21. Stmr C. R. Bishop brought 892 bags of sugar, 81 bags of rice, 15 hides, and 1 bundle of goat skins. Stmr Watoli brought 825 bags sugar. The schooner Mile Morris is being repaired. Schr Wailele brought 200 bags sugar. Mr. Sorrenson has the contract to repair the bark C. S. Hulbert. Work will begin to-day under the supervision of H. Cook. Stmr Likelike brought 1236 bags of sugar, 40 head cattle, 10 calves. The City of New York left San Francisco Sept 23, at 3 a.m. and arrived at Honolulu Sept 30, at 12:30 noon. She left for Australia at 3 o'clock this a.m.

A girl named Anna Nott, when bathing recently at Kapona falls, fell on a rock and injured her ankle.

The quarterly meeting of the Humane Society will be held this evening in the Y. M. C. A. hall at half-past seven.

A dividend of \$2.50 per share on Hawaiian Agricultural Co's stock is now payable at Messrs. C. Brewer & Co's.

A quantity of coin will be taken to-day by the Madras for Hongkong. It has been shipped by Chinese residents.

ECONOMY is Uncle Sam's motto. See Consul McKinley's flag. Won't American residents subscribe for a new one?

A LARGE piece of iron fell on the finger of a sailor of the Isle of Anglesea on Friday, smashing it so badly that it had to be amputated.

It is probable that a Social Entertainment will be given in the Y. M. C. A. hall on Thursday week for the purpose of raising money to pay for alterations to the building.

Dr. Hagan met with an accident on Thursday afternoon when riding. His horse turned a corner very sharply and jammed the doctor's knee against a post throwing him to the ground. He will be laid up for about a week.

The committee appointed at the Y. M. C. A. meeting have decided upon a musical and literary entertainment for Thursday evening next. There will be recitations, readings, music, singing and short addresses.

The crew of the schooner Ehukai had a water fight on Friday morning as a little pastime, deluging each other with buckets of water. The Police and a large crowd were attracted by their yells but found it was only fun.

His Excellency the Governor returned to town on Friday night, having enjoyed some good duck shooting on the other side. With philanthropic motives intent the Governor is raising a subscription for some of the ill-clad folks over there.

The postage on letters to the Colonies is twelve cents per half ounce and not ten cents. A number of letters with the latter amount of postage were detained by the authorities on Satu day but an old Colonial paid up the deficiency and they have gone along.

In the Australasian of September 1st an account is given of the grounding of the steamer Rotomahana, the finest intercolonial passenger boat, in exactly the same spot where the Tararua was totally wrecked two and a half years ago. It is said that "nothing but the material of her construction—milled steel—could have sustained with so little damage such a terrific battering as her bottom received from the sharp and jagged rocks off the fatal Waipapapa Point; and but for her having a double bottom, it is more than likely even these comparatively slight injuries would have proved fatal.

A theatrical panic occurred in the Chinese theater on Friday night, when one of the lamps suspended from the ceiling fell to the floor. A rush was immediately made for the door, but, though several men were badly crushed, there were

Dr. Thornton, Bishop of Ballarat, Victoria, preached at St. Andrews, last night.

Dr. Trask, of the City of New York, died when three days out from San Francisco.

The Alameda arrived in San Francisco just as the City of New York was leaving.

The report of the Commissioners to investigate Belmont's charges concerning Hawaiian sugars is favorable to this country.

The steamer Hansa was lost with all hands on board while going from London to Montreal, Canada. It is supposed that she struck an iceberg.

John Richardson was honorably acquitted at the Circuit Court on Maui. He proved an alibi on June 11, the day on which he was accused of taking a bribe.

Mr. E. O. Hall died at Falmouth, Maine, at midnight on Sept. 19th, of asthma, at the age of 72 years and 11 months. Mr. Hall left Honolulu in May, and intended to return next month. He was seized with a severe attack of asthma whilst in California, but, recovering somewhat, he proceeded East. Mrs. Hall is expected to arrive in Honolulu on the Mariposa. The relatives of the late Mr. Hall have our deepest sympathy as well as that of the whole community.

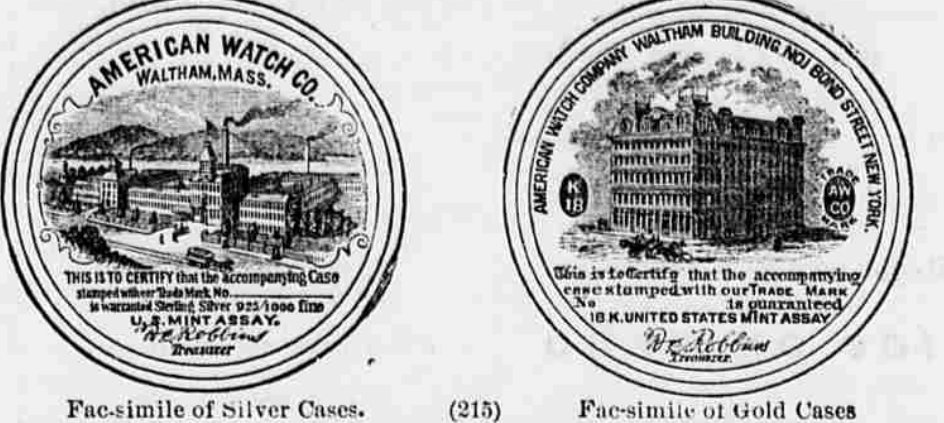

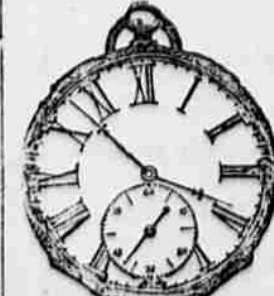
