## ROAD MEN GET THEIR PAY WITHOUT CONTEST

### Hawaiian Pastors Hold To The Teaching Of Missionary Fathers

OTHER DENOMINATIONS AND LORD'S SUPPER

(Special to The Bulletin)  
 Walluku, Maui, Sept. 20.—The Hawaiian Evangelical Association, consisting of the native pastors and Sunday school superintendents of Maui County are still in session at the Kahumanu native church, in Walluku. Delegates also from the Christian Endeavor Societies on Maui are present. A concert was given in the Sheriff's office last Saturday evening for the benefit of the Sunday schools and quite a sum of money was realized for that purpose. The rain during the early part of the evening somewhat cooled the ardor of some of those who intended to attend the concert that even-

ing. Those that did not mind the rain were well repaid for their trouble, for the singing was considered par excellence, and well worth the wait. On Sunday morning the exhibitions of the various Sunday schools on Maui took place, the following Sunday schools participating: Kanaloa, Keaukapu, Waikapu, Waiehu, Waiehe, Kahalulu, Kahakuloa, Paia and Pahihihi (Hamakua). The Kanaloa people opened the exercises of the day. They came from a great distance, more than forty miles, and their efforts in coming were greatly appreciated. ### Mandamus Withdrawn And Treasurer Trent Pays Warrants WILL NOT AGREE TO PROPOSED TEST

County Treasurer Trent will not be mandamused by County Attorney Douthitt, to compel the payment of warrants charged to the account of the special road tax fund. The papers were all ready to be filed this afternoon and it was expected that Trent would be haled before the court this afternoon, but, where argumentative atmosphere was breathed before, brotherly love and harmony reign—as far as this particular dispute is concerned. Trent has obtained what he asked for and is paying the warrants. When these warrants were presented to the Treasurer for payment, as previously reported in the Bulletin, the Treasurer, following Section 3 of the County enabling Act, refused to cash them on the ground that there was nothing to show, on the face of the warrants, what work had been performed. Section 3 requires that road tax special deposits must be paid out only for maintaining or repairing public roads. The warrants did not show

that the men calling for their pay had been working on the maintenance or repair of public roads. Trent asked that a statement be made as to the work performed. He said he would then pay the warrants. This was refused. At once the County Attorney's office proceeded to institute mandamus proceedings to compel payment. Incidentally, had Trent been served with mandamus papers, he would have in the sworn statement which would have to be served on him, been presented with an official statement as to what work had been done for the road. ### Old Advertisers

The Advertiser's effort to escape the boomerang of its "old-paper" stories is daily becoming more laughable. The Advertiser has said that The Bulletin has forged bills regarding sales of old papers made by the Hawaiian Gazette Company. Also that the papers sold by that company to the Chinese were exchanges, not Advertisers. The Bulletin has now in its possession the original bills received by the Hawaiian Gazette Company showing the sales of its old papers on August 10, 1904, 1904, 1905, for which the sum of \$16,455 is acknowledged by the company per S. Again, on September 11th, a receipt was given for 2357 pounds of old papers, for which \$23.55 was accepted per S. The Bulletin has also in its possession bundles of old Advertisers which the Chinese old-paper merchant purchased in this lot. With the exception of two copies of the Hawaiian Gazette, these bundles averaging over 100 copies in each bundle, are made up exclusively of old Advertisers. There are more to be bought at the same place. All of which goes to show that the morning paper, as usual, in trying to discredit The Bulletin, got very much the worst of it and in crawling out has been caught in a lie.

### TAXES RUN UP ON PROFITLESS LAND

Judge Whitney this afternoon heard a batch of tax cases in which judgments were entered by default. Included were taxes against Mrs. S. M. Angus. After default had been entered Attorney J. Alfred Magoon, accompanied by Mrs. Angus, entered the court room. Magoon will move for a reopening of the case. **New Promotion Bureau  
With Fred Smith  
Completes Organization**

PRIZES AWARDED FOR FOLDER COVERS

The Hawaii Promotion Committee met yesterday afternoon in the headquarters in the Young building on Hotel street, at 3:30 o'clock, with J. A. McCandless in the chair. Present were J. A. M. Johnson and A. Gartley, members representing the Merchants' Association; E. I. Spalding who, with Mr. McCandless, represents the Chamber of Commerce; Secretary E. M. Boyd and members of the press.

Boyd went rapidly through the minutes of the previous meeting and they were approved. Johnson moved that the four members proceed at once to select the member-at-large, the fifth man, to complete the organization. He named Fred Smith of the Oahu Railway & Land Co. "for reasons that we all know full well," said Mr. Johnson. "I move the nominations close," said Mr. Spalding.

McCandless instructed the secretary to cast a ballot for Fred Smith. "This is done," said Boyd. Fred Smith was immediately communicated with by telephone and asked to come to the meeting. Secretary Boyd submitted the following letter, which tells its own story. It was approved and ordered forwarded:

San Pedro Steamer Line. Mr. J. B. Jensen, Box 711, Salt Lake City, Utah. Dear Sir:—We have received the following from our Los Angeles agent: "The enclosed card is that of a man who is here representing a large Utah coal company, that are to build a short branch to connect with the "Salt Lake," put in coal bunkers at San Pedro and secure if possible the contract for coaling the Government vessels. He claims that their coal is of a superior grade for this purpose as it contains less than one-half per cent of sulphur, with high per cent of carbon, about 55, owning the mines, road and bunkers as well as having capital for a steamer line, he is very anxious to know whether he can do business with the Islands, would like to know where the Government gets their coal, price paid, quality, and source of supply; as well as general market for a good article at lowest possible figure; please give your personal opinion. "Also, are there any large freight contracts on the Islands that could be secured for a steamer line? He has been advised that there are two sugar firms, that are not in the "Trust," is that true? His idea is to carry freight, at low figure on account of having their own coal, and cargoes from here; adding passenger service at \$100.00 round trip, say twice a month; from San Pedro. They claim to have a capital of \$3,000,000 and fine backing." In response thereto we beg to submit to you a few facts and figures which may be of service to you. You will appreciate that we offer only our opinions; that it is seldom that we go further than to give bare statistics on such matters, urging that our correspondent come down and look over the field in person, to have that close and intimate

acquaintance with conditions which will result in complete satisfaction whatever is done. Local Coal Figures. There exists no reason why any steamship company should not come into this port and do business with Hawaiian merchants and shippers. This of course must not be taken to include the sugar factors. Under contract the sugars are moved to San Francisco or New York for refining. This would seem to cut out business for San Pedro. The United States Navy Department has practically three sources of supply for coal: England, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. The naval coal sheds are fairly well stocked, the stocking going on each alternate year. The Army gets its coal from Nagasaki now, it being brought over by returning transports. Time was when all coal was purchased from local dealers, but this was too expensive and so the order was made to have returning transports bring coal to this port. The stock carried is not large and the draft upon the yards is not heavy. The two trans-Pacific steamship companies keep supplies, as well as the local Inter-Island Steamship Company. It would be very hard to guess just what is the cost of these cargoes.

All these coals are of a bituminous nature. Occasionally the Navy gets some coal from England (Cardiff), and this year will restock its bunkers with about 12,000 tons. The Australian coal, more largely used than any other, comes in for \$5 to \$6 per ton; duty paid, cargo lots. As to a general market, the use of coal has been declining steadily since the introduction of fuel oil. Where at one time 10,000 tons of coal were used per month, by a string of plantations along the Oahu railway on this island, now barely 1,000 tons are consumed. For illustration, we add statements of importations for the fiscal years ending June 30, 1904, and June 30, 1905: United States Customs Service—Coal Imported from Foreign Countries into the District of Hawaii for the Year Ending June 30, 1904.

playing between the Coast and the Islands are through ships, which can neither always accommodate travelers nor general return passage with first rate cabins. Personally we know of many travelers who have turned away from Hawaii because of these conditions, and many more who could not get away when they wished. This will partially explain the small figures of travel during some months of the past year. We feel that there will be a heavy increase in business and that every would-be passenger can secure accommodations to his liking. Especially we are convinced that this will be the case when there is a steamer line from Los Angeles, the center of tourist travel. The following are figures showing inbound and outbound travel at the port of Honolulu, these being only first class passengers by steamers, the sailing vessels being about balanced in arrivals and departures:

Marks had asked Johnson if he might refer people to him. Johnson said he might, on the strength of the letter of introduction.

Boyd stated before Johnson made that statement that Marks had referred to Mr. Johnson as knowing who he was. Spalding—"What do you think of it, Mr. Boyd?"

"I think it would be a good thing for us to have a card in the book," replied the secretary. "An ad. for Hawaii would not go ill. 'Twould, in fact, be better than a card of the Hawaii Promotion Committee'."
