THE SMALL-POX CASES. We publish in our "By Authority" columns to-day a very important report by Dr. Trousseau on the condition of the Japanese immigrants at the quarantine ground.

Small-Pox in Quarantine.

HONOLULU, June 19, 1885. His Excellency W. M. Gibson, President of the Board of Health—

Sir: According to your instructions, I have this 19th day of June, 1885, visited the Japanese immigrants now in quarantine at Maoliha. My object was principally to ascertain the nature of the disease for which they have been quarantined by your orders, and the number of cases affected.

Examining the hospital, I found four patients, two suffering from small-pox in the ordinary form, and two suffering from the same disease in the confluent form. One of the latter is in a protracted condition. It is the last case segregated yesterday, the 19th, and this may prove fatal. The others, under ordinary care, should recover.

After visiting the hospital, I visited a few immigrants, four in number, segregated yesterday evening on account of indications of fever. So far they show no sign of small-pox.

My next step was to examine carefully the people who had been on the sick list during the voyage—two children and some ten adults. In none of them could I detect any sign of either varioloid, measles, or other eruptive disease. I am positive in assuming your Excellency that they had—mean those pointed out to me—neither measles nor varioloid during the voyage. One of the cases, a child vaccinated two or three weeks ago, had signs of cow-pox.

Therefore I beg to report to your Excellency that I consider the cases to be small-pox, not measles or varioloid, and that the stringent measures you have enforced were imperative, and will not do credit to the community from any contagion.

The persons in charge, Mr. Dayton and Mr. Reynolds, are fully alive to their duties.

There will, no doubt, be more cases developed; but I do not anticipate a very serious outbreak, as fully one-fourth of the points show undoubted signs of previous infection, and many others must have been repeatedly exposed in their own country, and may, therefore, be immune. It was possible to gradually separate all those who show regular marks of small-pox, quarantine them for three or four days, and fumigate them; they might safely be transferred to the immigration depot. The balance might then be divided into two lots, and one lot dismissed under proper conditions after the 15 days' quarantine, thus saving time in liberating the whole. As it is, all staying together in a body, it might be difficult to liberate them under six weeks or two months.

I would also advise your Excellency to have the ship visited every two or three days, and have every case of small-pox transferred immediately to the quarantine ground, thus saving time to the ship.

One more suggestion respectfully submitted is that a small house be set apart to receive such cases as suffer from other ailments than small-pox—I have seen four cases—so that they might receive daily attention from the Superintendent.

Useful Plants and Seeds.

The "Planter's Monthly" for June contains a letter addressed to Mr. Jaeger from the Director of Public Gardens and Plantation at Gordon Town, Jamaica, W. I., enclosing the following list of seeds and plants sent through Mr. J. Marsden, who, during his recent visit to the United States, went on to Jamaica to procure mungooses and some valuable plants and seeds.

The number in each case follows the name: Cacao, 12; Librarian Coffee, 3; Cardamom, 4; Cinnamon, 6; Cinnamon, best variety, 3; Aloe, 6; Ginger, 6; Tamarind, 6; Kola nut, 6; Coca, 3; Sweet orange, 6; Dill, 6; Pimento, 1; Cane wood, 3; Brazil nut, 3; Mandarin orange, 6; Biggaroon orange, 3; Shaddock, 3.

There was also 27 varieties of seeds. It will be seen that the above list embraces some very choice trees, and we are pleased to learn from Mr. Jaeger that almost all have survived the journey and promise to do well. Mr. Marsden experienced considerable difficulty on the Isthmus in procuring transportation for the plants and mungooses, as the rolling stock of the road from Panama had been destroyed by the forces engaged in fighting for the control of the Isthmus.

In spite of the detention, however, the loss among the plants is small, all but about twenty coming through in healthy condition. Of the mangoes sent, one of the kind marked as "No. 11," which is said to be a very choice variety, is alive, and in time will afford grafts which can be grown on our more common kinds. The coca is another valuable tree, the fruit being eaten as a grateful and harmless tonic, the leaves possessing curative properties in diseases of the eyes. There are many other things among the seeds sent, and we hope that in a short time Mr. Jaeger will have many of the plants growing, and that the shipment will prove a valuable and lasting addition to the resources of the Kingdom.

New Landing at Kilauea, Kauai. A report from Kauai states that Mr. H. A. Macfie, Jr., has commenced erecting a new landing at Kilauea, Kauai, on the site of the former one, which was washed away about three months ago. A powerful derrick engine has been stationed at the landing for the purpose of hauling stones from the quarry. The base of the landing will be masonry work of Portland cement, and on the weather side heavy timbers will be erected as fenders. Stones weighing about five tons each will be laid at an angle of 45 degrees to break the force of the sea. When this landing is completed a railroad track will be connected with the warehouse for the purpose of conveying sugar to the landing. Mr. R. A. Macfie is superintending the work himself, and it will be completed within two months. This landing will undoubtedly be the best on the island of Kauai.

Death of Mr. H. C. Austin. We regret to chronicle the death, on Thursday evening last, of Mr. Robert Capland Austin, in the 38th year of his age. He deceased had suffered for some time past with aneurism, which, within the last few weeks developed very rapidly and caused his death. He was educated with his brother, lately deceased, in the school of Mr. Ingraham, and from an early age occupied positions of trust in this community. For the past two years he was one of the Custom House guards, and did his work faithfully and well. He was a member of Engine Company No. 2, and the flag of the Department, as well as the flag at the Custom House, were displayed at half-mast yesterday. Their Majesties the King and Queen paid a visit of condolence to the family of the deceased yesterday. The funeral will take place on Sunday next from the late residence of the deceased.

Mr. Wilder informs us that those who wish to see as much as possible in the shortest possible time can take the steamer for Kahului on Monday evening and arrive there early the next morning. They can then breakfast with the train goes on to Paia. They can then ride to Waikuku and visit the Valley of Iao, before doing which they can take dinner. Returning to Waikuku, the tourists can spend the evening quietly until midnight, when they will be taken across to Maaila Bay, and there go on board the Kinaiu for Hawaii and the volcano. The whole cost of this side trip will be only \$10.

About Pineapples. Our old friend Pineapple, who is located now in South Kona, Hawaii, has sent to the Advertiser office a box of very fine pineapples, grown by him near the store he has charge of. He writes that the fruit is not grown in sufficient quantity to make it worth while to ship it to Honolulu for a market, but that any quantity could be supplied if there was a sufficient demand for it. The experiment has been tried in the Kona district of preserving the fruit and shipping it to the Coast, but we believe it did not pay. The rats destroy a great deal of the best of the fruit, and we are of the opinion that the pineapple patches are just the places where the mungooses might be placed to advantage. Now the natives who own the patches gather only the fruit that grows on the extreme edges, it being too much trouble to get at that in the middle.

In the Police Court yesterday there was little doing. Olliphant, who had been remanded on the charge of assault and battery, was discharged, as the prosecution discontinued the suit. Vanucio d'Almeida, who was charged with the larceny of sundry articles, the property of Messrs. Hackford, Pfleger and Muller, was defended by Mr. John Austin, who asked that his client be reprimanded and discharged, as the whole affair was a trifling matter. FOOD AND LODGING FOR TRAMPS WHO WILL WORK. A Plan to Relieve the Police Stations and to Make Begging Unprofitable and Unnecessary—The Mode of Operation.

(Cor. Chicago Times.) The Boston "Wayfarers' lodge" was established in 1878. Its purpose was to relieve the police stations of the crowd of tramps which nightly thronged them...
