STRICTLY IN UNDRESS.

Corporal Rudolph's Appearance Before General McClellan With a Message.

William K. Rudolph, engineer at the Spring Garden waterworks, was a corporal in the Eighth Pennsylvania cavalry and is a post commander of Post 35. He was Colonel Keenan's orderly in the famous charge at Chancellorsville and fell heroically wounded by the same volley that killed his colonel.

The night of the battle of Malvern Hill, June 1, 1862, was a very dark and rainy one. The command to which Rudolph belonged went into camp near the White Oak swamp. Late in the night he was aroused from sleep and ordered to report at once to Captain Keenan.

"I said, 'I am off on an important duty, and I want you and Privates Marks, Johnson and Cox to go with me. Leave your horses and arms except your pistols, in charge of the orderly sergeant. In a few minutes all were ready for the start. Captain Keenan told the men that they were about to take great chances."

AS A BIG MONEY POWER.

BRITISH CAPITAL INVESTED OUTSIDE OF GREAT BRITAIN. Shipping Figures—Great Loans and Speculations—Foots up to Billions of Pounds.

The London Statist has an interesting though conjectural estimate of the amount of British capital invested outside of Great Britain. Last year the value of the imports into the United Kingdom exceeded the value of the exports by £134,000,000.

The British vessels entering and clearing with cargoes during the year measured about 50,000,000 tons, which at 10 shillings per ton would represent earnings of £25,000,000; to this should be added the earnings of English ships which did not touch at English ports; also the commissions and insurances, amounting in all to £40,000,000.

The foreign and colonial borrowings during the year amounted to £30,000,000, while advance orders for machinery, etc., would account for £6,000,000 more. Adding £36,000,000 to the £134,000,000 excess of imports and deducting the £40,000,000 referring to the shipping, we have a remainder of £130,000,000.

Large amounts of capital invested abroad were brought home to London, but these withdrawals were offset, the writer thinks, by the interest which became due in 1894, but which the English capitalists did not receive, because of default. Next, the net imports of coin and bullion of all kinds amounted to £10,000,000, making the total assumed receipts on capital invested abroad £140,000,000. Capitalized at 5 per cent, this sum would represent an investment of British capital outside Great Britain amounting to nearly £2,800,000,000, or \$15,000,000,000, which probably understates the real amount.

Rebellious Sailors. Breste, Eikeren Kotton and Gehrmanne, the three sailors who were arrested Monday on a charge of arson were liberated Wednesday and ordered back to the ship. They were instructed to go to work, but refused. The captain was referred to Consul Mills for reasons. The men refused to work because of their arrest, a thing that seems to have made them very sore. They were rearrested on a charge of refusing duty.

AWA IS TABU. License for the Lepor Settlement Re-vised—Meeting of Physicians. The Board of Health met at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The usual reports were received and filed. A petition from the settlement for a license to sell awa there was denied. The amount of \$1000 was voted as passage money for the four brothers ordered from France for the Baldwin Home. It was decided that the first annual conference of physicians should be held May 23rd.

There will perhaps be no meeting of the Board next week.

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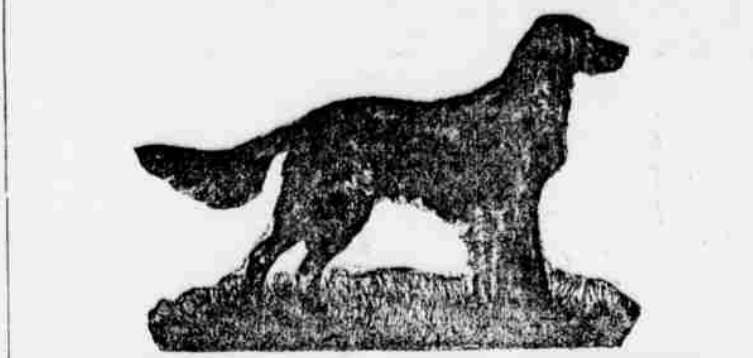

NATIONAL CANE SHREDDER. Patented under the laws of the Hawaiian Republic. One of these Shredders has recently been installed at the mill of the Paahua Plantation Company, Hamakua, Hawaii, and Mr. Andrew Moore, the manager, writes concerning it

PAAHUA PLANTATION CO., HAMAKUA, Jan. 10, 1895. WM. G. IRWIN & CO., LTD., HONOLULU: Gentlemen—The mill has been running during the past two weeks, with the National Cane Shredder lately installed, giving the most satisfactory results.

Our mill consists of three sets of two rollers, 32 in. dia. by 22 in. long, the shredder discs being 5 ft. 7 in. long, driven by an automatic engine 11 in. dia. cylinder by 14 in. stroke. The National cane being milled is as hard as it is possible for cane to be, having been subjected to a severe drought during the whole period of its growth, and growing on land with a trade wind exposure. Our experience with the shredder, particularly with above cane, proves it to be just what our mills required, the shredded cane being better prepared to leave its stalks connected than formerly after passing through the first mill. The first mill is now allowed to open 9-16 in. instead of 3/4 in. as formerly, so that the trash now leaves the first mill, better ground, than it formerly did the second, and this without the old time grooves, chiseling, and straining of the machinery.

Behind the first and second mills we apply hot water, the quantity for the past 24 days, as per statement attached, has averaged 35 per cent. on the total juice from the cane. The trash from the last mill is cut up much finer than before the shredder was applied, on each of it resembling saw dust, it contains as per statement 20 per cent. of moisture and makes good fuel, the juice from the last mill stands 5 degrees Brix, so that the moisture in the trash is of 5 per cent. sugar solution. The rollers make steam much easier than before, now cane has to be kept from blowing off, whereas before great care was necessary to keep the steam from going too low when the Pan was on. By the use of the shredder we have dispensed with six men, formerly necessary to attend the cane on the carrier, feed the first mill, and throw back the long pieces. 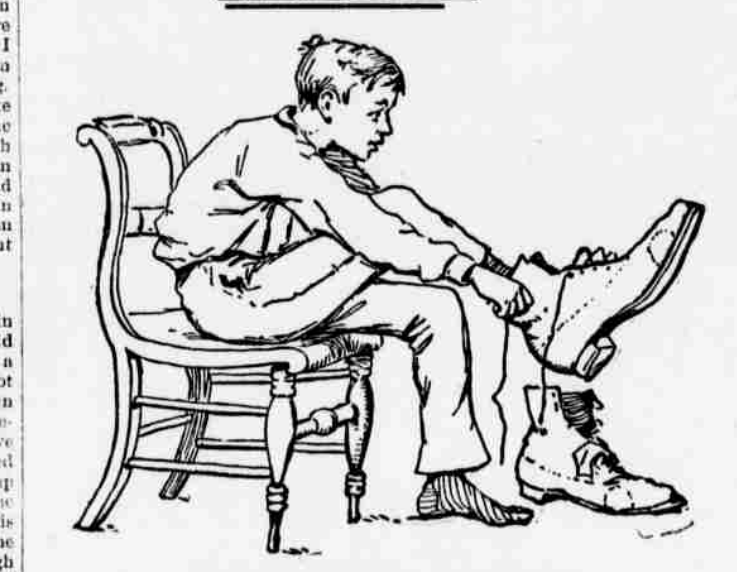
