VACATION DAYS IN THE TROPICS.

BY REV. T. E. G. PECK.

No. III.

Do not let my last letter lead you to infer the rapid progress of this people in all that is good merely from what has been accomplished in the matter of education. I would go around with you, as Dr. Hyde has gone around with me this morning, among the native churches of the place. I would show you large congregations of native Hawaiians singing the songs of Zion, and listening to the truths of the gospel, as if these islands had never known anything but the gospel. I would show you their Sunday-schools filled with the bright, eager faces of young people and children. I would take you into their prayer-meetings and missionary concerts, and let you see how freely these people, so recently heathen themselves, give of their substance for the benefit of mission churches in foreign lands. And from these churches of the native folk, I would take you to the churches devoted to the foreign population who have taken up their abode among them. There is no class of foreigners here so numerous as the Chinese. You meet them at every corner, with their almond eyes, shaven foreheads, blue shirts, and braided pig-tails encircling their heads. They are the Yankees of this part of the Pacific, ubiquitous, industrious, enterprising, and persistent. They have long lines of shops, are honest in trade, exemplary in practice, and in these respects afford a strong contrast to their countrymen in many other places. In the houses of the wealthy residents they are indispensable as servants, and always, I learn, faithful to the trust imposed in them. Some have come over from their native country converts of the missionaries there, with letters of recommendation to churches here; but the great majority have come with no religion at all, save the superstitions of their own land. It was natural, therefore, that they should awaken the attention and excite the sympathies of the Christian people of Honolulu, and that they should seek to bring the influences of the gospel to bear upon them. And this they have done, and a large congregation has been gathered, and a church erected for their worship. Over the door are the words, in great gilded Chinese characters, "Jesus' House," and entering, I found the good-sized building full of eager listeners. The women occupied one-fourth of the church, and the men the remainder. Mothers sat on the steps at the entrance to the church with their little babes in their arms, while the older children, in their neat Chinese dresses, played on the grass in front of the door. It was a pretty sight. The children played, while the mothers sat near so they could watch the children at the same time that they received the benefit of the services. Below was the Sunday-school room, and in the rear the fine large building known as the "Chinese Young People's Christian Association," with a hospital ward attached for any who were sick, and furnished chambers for those who were homeless. Hung around the walls were the rules of the Association, and maps and prints in the Chinese tongue. I never was more pleasantly impressed with any efforts put forward for the benefit of any class than those put forward for the Chinese here. Mr. Frank Damon, the superintendent of the mission, and who speaks the Chinese language like a native, is still a young man, an indefatigable worker, and in every way adapted to deal with these people of the Flowery Land. As such, he more than deserves the commendation, the sympathy, the assistance of every society and organization in our land who have for their object the spiritual benefit of this most interesting people.

In a long ride which I have taken with my friend, Dr. Hyde, who occupies a most important position here as the head of the "North Pacific Missionary Institute," and who seems to have had a hand in every prominent educational and religious enterprise connected with these islands for the past ten years, he showed me a large plot of land eligibly situated in the suburbs of the town which had been donated for the purpose of establishing a school for the mental and physical training of native boys. Already a fine artesian well has been bored and the grounds partially worked for the erection of the buildings. In this, too, we must acknowledge the liberality of the Bishop family, Mrs. B. having left some four hundred thousand dollars for this and similar purposes. A girls' school, of a like character, is to be established on the other side of the town.

And so I might go on and tell you of institution after institution organized here for the moral, mental and physical improvement of these native classes, and all, I may say, more or less intimately associated with the missionary work first started here some fifty years ago. There are hospitals for the diseased, a prison school for the convicts, asylums for the old and decrepit, like the Lunallilo Home which I visited to-day, native schools, foreign schools, government schools, pri-

vate schools, elementary schools, and schools preparatory to a college course. In one morning, Dr. Hyde was kind enough to take me to visit at least a dozen, and all within a comparatively small radius. The atmosphere is full of rudimentary instruction. You breathe the air of literature all around you. English, too, is universally taught, the Bible used as a text-book, and in one school I saw the American and Hawaiian flags gracefully intertwined. There is no reason why these Hawaiian people should not become the best educated people in the world. And yet, believe me, all this effort put forth for their mental and moral improvement is attended with no little discouragement and even opposition. The discouragement comes from the moral apathy of the race to avail themselves of these benefits, their sensual temperament, their inbred superstition, improvident habits and utter lack of responsibility. In spite of good education and faithful moral training the original savage will occasionally crop out, and it will take two or three generations at least fully to eradicate it. And the opposition comes, whence perhaps you would least have expected it, from Government circles. From what I have heard I am led to infer that neither the King nor his Cabinet lend their approval or encouragement to what is being done by Christian people here. The term "Missionary" is a distasteful term to them, and they seek to make it a term of opprobrium with others. But the people in their own time will vindicate these their noble and disinterested benefactors, and when King and Cabinet shall have long since ceased to be remembered, their names will be treasured as the most precious legacies of the nation.

The Library consists at the present time of over Five Thousand Volumes. The Reading Room is supplied with about fifty of the leading newspapers and periodicals.

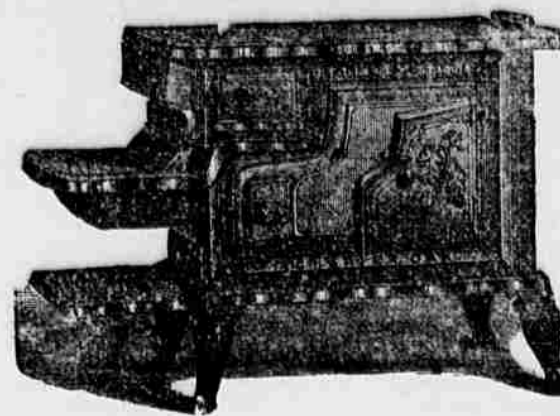
A Parlor is provided for conversation and games. Terms of membership, fifty cents a month, payable quarterly in advance. No formally required in joining except signing the roll.
