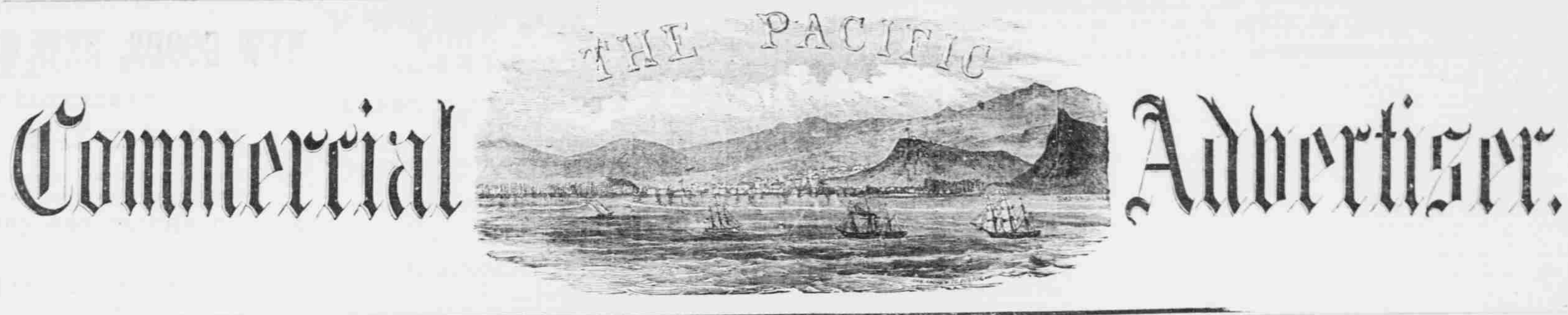

The History of the Decree.

The very natural inference which would obtain by reading the proclamation of May 6th, 1864, as given in our issue of Saturday last, would be that certain restrictions upon the rights and liberties of the people existed and were apparent in the Compact of 1852, and which they had outgrown, and that the Sovereign had elected to call a Convention for the purpose of enlarging those rights and privileges—surely, not to initiate revolution, and a retrograde policy.

Soon after the proclamation was issued, a writer appeared in this journal under the signature of C. C. H.—the present Minister of Foreign Affairs, then the head and front of the conspiracy—and he wrote as follows, on the proposed revision of the Constitution:

"To suppose that they (Constitution and Laws) would not need change, is as if one were to make a coat of clothes for his neighbor, and then to say that it would fit him when he should become a man, and that he should continue to wear them all the days of his life."

"His Majesty is desirous of referring back the Constitution to the parties that made it, to the constituting power, [the Estates are not ours] to meet the delegates of the people, freely elected, and the Nobles, on equal terms, in a frank and confidential manner—to talk with them face to face, and to see whether any change should be made in the fundamental laws of the Kingdom for the common good—believing that he has no interests distinct from the interests of all his people—believing most earnestly that his smallest interest is dependent on their well-being, and being sure that his whole happiness is wrapped in theirs. In this Convention, if the people accept his invitation, they will be represented by *Zemstvos*, being thus, if they band together, an overwhelming majority, inasmuch as the number of the Nobles will not be increased, so that no changes can be adopted without their consent. There is no concealed thought in this Proclamation—it means just what it says, and no more. There is no desire and no intention to seek to lay any new burdens on the people, or to disturb the well established order of things—no craving for power, no thought of proposing anything not in the interest of the people. If the delegates shall meet the King in the spirit of confidence in which He will meet them, good will certainly be effected; but if, on the contrary, they choose to meet Him in the spirit of distrust and obstinate, unreasonable opposition, though no good will come of the Convention, most certainly no harm can come of it."

The King "intends to respect and secure to cause them to value—that Government as a social compact, of which He is the head—and that that compact has for its only end and aim the common good." He invites the people to listen to Him with the same respect that He will listen to them or their delegates, and requires nothing more.

If the Convention is willing to adopt an improved Constitution, it is well; if not, the Constitution stands as it is.

Well may our readers rub their eyes, and doubt the evidence of their senses, after reading the foregoing, but this is just the identical smooth, seductive, ingenious sounding language used by our Alcibiades in pre-convention times.

The pleasant idea of meeting the delegates "on equal terms in a frank and confidential manner," loses its force, when taken in connection with the remarks of the Hon. C. R. Bishop, before quoted by us, to the effect that the proposed amendments had not been published, and "only the King and Ministers knew anything about what was to be done, and the way the matter had been managed was not in accordance with a spirit of liberality; information had been withheld and the people kept in the dark."

The assurances given by C. C. H. that the delegates had an overwhelming majority, so that no changes could be adopted without their consent; that if the Convention should be willing to adopt an improved Constitution it would be well;—if not, the Constitution would stand as it was; and that if the delegates were obstinate, though no good would come of the Convention, most certainly no harm would result from it;—these do not harmonize with the following extracts from the King's speech dissolving the Convention:

"This is the fifth day of the discussion of this Article [on the right of suffrage] and it is certain that the delegates could not pass the Article. I, therefore, take away the Constitution of 1852, and I will give you a Constitution."

How does the foregoing bit of history read to those who love truth and fair dealing? In view of any possible but perfectly characteristic attempt by the Minister to shift the responsibility, we again suggest that he read the first two sentences of Article 31 of the Royal Decree of 1864.

YESTERDAY, March 22nd, was the birthday of the Emperor William I. of Germany. He was born in the year 1797, and is consequently seventy-five years of age. He succeeded his brother, Frederick William IV., as King of Prussia, January 24, 1861, and was crowned Emperor of the United Germany, January 18th, 1871. He occupies a position of rank, power and influence seldom exceeded in magnitude in the world's history of kings or emperors. It is not too much to say that in his hands today are held the destinies for peace or war in Europe. His responsibilities are great, but equally great is the confidence reposed in his wisdom and moderation. Successful with scarcely a parallel in war, he is an ardent lover of peace, and there is every reason to hope that Europe, controlled by the influence of himself and his dynasty, may enjoy many years of tranquility.

A Monster Pumpkin.

PROBABLY SOME OF our Irish fellow citizens remembered that last Sunday was the 17th of March, and quietly did honor to the memory of the patron Saint of the Emerald Isle, but we are reminded that in other countries, California among the rest, St. Patrick's day is celebrated with no little enthusiasm. At these islands the 17th of March was for many years observed as a great holiday, as being the anniversary of the birth of Kamehameha III. Among our Irish residents of those times, the King of Hawaii was esteemed as doubly honored in having been born on so lucky a day. Horse races, picnics, salutes, parades and general jubilee was the order of the day on the 17th twenty or twenty-five years ago. But this is a far different era, and even St. Patrick is scarcely remembered with us now. The patron Saint of Ireland is claimed however by the Scotch as a native of their country. They say that he was born near Dumbarton, and that he founded many churches in North Britain before sailing for Port Patrick for Ireland. Arrived there, he energetically set to work converting the heathen (among whom there was no "refuse of civilization" at that time) and founding churches. In explaining the doctrine of the Trinity, he plucked a leaf of trefail, and showed how three leaves might be united and yet be but one. The shamrock has therefore been recognized as the national emblem ever since. The saint is also said to have charmed all reptiles from the island, so that none can exist there; and also to have taught the natives the true art of mixing their liquor—their formerly drunk it "neat"—an art which has never since been lost, whatever else of his teachings they may have forgotten. He died A. D. 432, at the good age of 123, and was buried in the cathedral city of Down. For some pious reason, the Reformers left St. Patrick's name out of the Calendar, but an Order of Knighthood was established in his honor by George III., and there appears but little likelihood of his being forgotten by the saint's adopted countrymen.
