THE HOUSE THIS MORNING

Mr. Achi's Long Civil Procedure Bill
is Received.

Extra Compensation Items Knocked Out—Un-
paid Claims Act Passes—Public
Parks Matter—Bills Referred.

A wait of 20 minutes was necessary for a quorum.

The Finance Committee, by Mr. Pogue, recommended that the item of \$300 for extra compensation to J. H. Boyd be not allowed. Mr. Boyd as first clerk was expected to fill the office of Chief clerk when necessary. At such times his own work was done by the clerks under him. Mr. Hasinger was absent through illness. Had he been sent away on business by the Government the case might be different.

The Finance Committee, by Mr. Gear, disallowed the items of \$48 and \$311 to indemnify Bruce Cartwright and Alameda for tax overcharges. Grace Kahaalii had paid double taxes on the Alameda property for six years and the committee recommended an item of \$129 to indemnify her.

The Committee on Health and Education, by Mr. Gear, also disallowed the item of \$300 to imburse Charles Wilcox for extra work incident to the death of R. W. Meyer. In view of a recommendation in the Appropriation bill for an increase of salary for Mr. Wilcox, which would be ample compensation, the committee recommended that the item not pass. The additional salary, however, was recommended.

The Judiciary Committee, by Mr. Robertson, made a long report on Senate bill 19, setting apart certain lands for public recreation grounds. The committee finds that both lands are larger than is necessary for more recreation purposes and that there is ample room for combining certain park features such as shade trees, shrubbery and seats or benches. With this idea in view it is recommended that the grounds be called "parks." The committee finds incidentally that the district near Nuuanu stream is Kaliu, not Aala, and recommends these amendments to the bill. It is further recommended that the Nuuanu or Kaliu grounds be called "River Park" and the old baseball grounds "Makiki Park."

Mr. Robertson gave notice of "an act to regulate the practice of veterinary surgery, medicine and dentistry."

Mr. Achi introduced a very long bill to reform civil procedure, etc.

Mr. Robertson moved to reject, as the bill was so long that it could not be finished this session. Considerable discussion followed, after which the motion was lost.

The bill passed first reading by a vote of 6 to 4. Mr. Gear did not vote. Mr. Richards moved to refer to the Judiciary Committee without printing. Lost. Bill went to Printing Committee.

Senate Bill 24, submission of differences to the Supreme Court direct without action, passed final reading by unanimous vote.

After administering a "roasting" to the officials of Hilo hospital for neglecting to send in bills promptly as instructed, the House accepted certain expense items and inserted them in the Appropriation bill.

Senate bill 3 unpaid claims, was taken up for final reading. The Boyd item, \$300, was disallowed; Charles Wilcox item, \$300, shared a like fate.

Bills were referred as follows: House 74, to prohibit the erection of barbed wire fences along public highways, and 75, construction of railways, Public Lands Committee; 73, descent of property, Judiciary Committee; 74, notices of increases of assessments, and 77, to relieve the Sailor's Home society of taxation, Finance Committee; 76, carrying

SOUTH SEA ISLAND TRADER

Talk of Mission Work in Marshall and
Caroline Group.

is a Success and Should be Vigorously Kept Up
—Something of the Spanish and
Their Methods.

H. Kimm, a trader at Jaluit, Marshall Islands, was a passenger by the Missionary packet Morning Star yesterday on his way to the States. He speaks very interestingly of mission work in South Seas and gives one of the best accounts of the last cruise of the Star. He says:

"At noon of February 20 we sighted the Morning Star at Kusaie and sailed four days later for Pohnape. On this island of the Carolines the Spanish governor and officials reside, and here the Jesuits have their convent as well. In former years the island was much disturbed by revolutions, but peace seems to have settled permanently there now. A large fortification is occupied by Spanish military, for they still fear the natives.

"The Spanish officials received us most cordially. In the Carolines these men are noted for civility. A singular fact in connection with this possession is that the Spanish government receives no revenue or income from it. The trading in the group is carried on by a large German firm and a few Japanese. In place of the possession being a paying property it is an expense; for they even have to pay the petty chiefs salaries to keep in their good graces.

"After taking on provisions and water at Pohnape, we sailed for Rak and entered the lagoon there on March 3. At this place I was amazed at the contrast between heathen and Christian natives. The former flocked around us in canoes, their nakedness just covered with some dirty, yellow paint and an unclean piece of calico, hair long and done up like a woman's, and chains in their ears. But when we went on shore to take in the church services we saw an entirely different sight. The church people were all dressed and clean, their hats nicely trimmed, hair combed and every body seeming happy and contented.

"The little church, however, roughly built, was decorated with wreaths of flowers, and good Mr. Prie, a true Christian and gentleman who has brought the Light to these poor Micronesians, conducted the service in a most able manner. It was truly inspiring to hear those people, amid so much ignorance and vice, raise their voices in that good, old song, 'My Redeemer.'

"From Rak to Honolulu we lived like one big family. However sedate missionaries are on sacred occasions, they 'turned themselves loose' on the return voyage and made themselves pleasant to the joy and comfort of all. We had games and other pastimes and frequently music, there being an organ aboard. The good people frequently reproached me for smoking, a habit I formed many years ago, and I kept an anxious eye on my tobacco, in deathly fear that it might go overboard from a well-meaning though fateful hand.

"Altogether the trip up was most pleasant to me. Captain Bray, the officers and in fact all aboard were exceedingly kind. The men take a great pride in their vessel and spent many days cleaning, scraping and painting that everything might look nice upon her arrival here. I feel that I echo a general sentiment when I say I hope the Morning Star may make many more successful voyages to these poor Micronesians, carrying knowledge and Christian light to those who stand so much

DANCED BEFORE ROYALTY

Elsie Adair Gives a Court Performance
in Siam.

Applause Led by the King—Interesting National
Peculiarities—Furore Over
Serpentine Dance.

W. B. Vanderlip, Jr., Manager of Miss Elsie Adair, the talented American danseuse at present in Honolulu, describes their experiences at the Royal Court, Siam, as follows in a letter to a New York paper:—

On the evening of December 11, we were commanded by His Majesty the King of Siam, to appear at Bang-paiu Palace. The throne-room had been made ready for our use, stage and accessories were in place, costly chandeliers containing myriads of electric lights lit up the great room, gorgeous in its oriental decorations; paintings by native artists, depicting famous battle scenes with the Burmese, in which elephants played the most important part, lined the wall.

Down the centre of the room was placed a series of ebony screens dividing it into two parts, the reason whereof I was soon to discover.

Promptly at nine o'clock, the King entered accompanied by about 40 young boys (his sons), all ranging between three and fifteen years of age; then followed numerous Princes and Ministers of State, including his royal brothers, to the number of about 30. Not a lady had appeared yet. When the male portion were all seated on one side of the line of screens the King arose, glanced carefully around, and then issued a command. Immediately a silken curtain was drawn aside on the vacant side of the room, and there filed in the members of the harem headed by the Queen, numbering in all about two hundred! All were attired in the national dress, which consists of a long piece of silk draped about their limbs and caught up at the waist. The effect is that of a pair of bicycle bloomers. Then comes the latest fashioned waist with balloon sleeves, set off by the royal pale blue sash plentifully adorned with jewels, then short crisp straight black hair, a rich dark complexion, bright black eyes, and you have your Siamese Royal Lady. The following story is told in explanation why the women of Siam wear short hair:

About 200 years ago the Burmese, their life long enemies, were besieging their capital city; the fortunes of war were going bad for the Siamese, when the women, cutting off their hair, donned male attire and made such a brave show on the ramparts, that the invaders drew off, and so short hair remains the fashion to this day.

Finally when all were seated, His Majesty gave the signal for the performance to begin. The first number was a 40 minute Yankee comedy chosen by one of the Princes from our repertoire, as being most likely to be appreciated as it was full of business and action. A knowledge of English is confined to the King and a few of his royal brothers.

As the play commenced, we were all taken very seriously, the audience gazing upon us with wonderment, for remember we were the first European or Western performers to appear before the Siamese Court.

Matters began to appear decidedly frosty. Talk about a chilly first night, we had been working hard for about 10 minutes and not a smile. Finally at something Miss Adair did or said, His Majesty laughed, that laugh broke the ice and saved the play. From that time on the audience broke forth into peals of laughter, but mind, always following His Majesty's lead. When the maid servants threw a pan of flour over the light

WARD FOR CONSUMPTIVES

Queen's Hospital Trustees Considering
an Important Innovation.

Increase of Consumption Among Hawaiians
Becoming Alarming—Quarterly Report
of Visiting Physicians.

The Board of Trustees of the Queen's Hospital held a special meeting this morning to consider the proposition to erect a special ward for the treatment of Hawaiians suffering from consumption. This subject has been brought to the attention of the trustees by the report of physicians showing the alarming increase of that dread malady among Hawaiians and the necessity of segregating those suffering from it from the rest of the patients in the hospital. The proposition involves the erection of an entirely new building to be used entirely by Hawaiian consumptive patients.

After some discussion at the meeting this morning the matter was referred to a special committee for investigation and recommendation.

At the quarterly meeting of the Trustees, held on Thursday, only routine business was transacted.

Following is the report of the hospital physicians for the quarter ending March 31:

To the Trustees of the Queen's Hospital.

Gentlemen:—We have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending March 31, 1898. The number of patients at present in the Hospital is 75; viz.: 46 Hawaiians (33 males, 13 females), 2 Chinese, 10 Japanese and 17 of other nationalities; 25 paying.

The number of admissions during the quarter was 162; viz.: 91 Hawaiians (62 males, 29 females), 3 Chinese, 19 Japanese and 49 of other nationalities.

Discharged 124; 72 Hawaiians (49 males, 23 females), 1 Chinese, 10 Japanese and 41 of other nationalities.

Deaths 19; viz.: 5 Hawaiians (3 males, 2 females), 1 Chinese, 3 Japanese and 10 of other nationalities. The causes of death were cardiac asthenia 1; cerebral tumor 2, cerebral hemorrhage 1, catarrhal pneumonia 1, dysentery 4, embolism 1, intestinal perforation 1, pericarditis with effusion 2, peritonitis 1, sarcoma 1, tuberculosis 1, tumor of bladder 1, typhoid fever 2.

Of the above 4 died within 18 hours of admission. The highest number of patients was 75, lowest 57, daily average 64.

There have been 18 major and 10 minor operations and 2 post mortem examinations.

The number of patients treated was 348; viz.: January 107, February 113, March 128.

The schooner Wm Bowden sailed for San Francisco this afternoon with 24,390 sacks of Makaweli sugar, 2,804,850 pounds, valued at \$98,000, shipped by Wm G Irwin & Co. to Alexander & Baldwin.

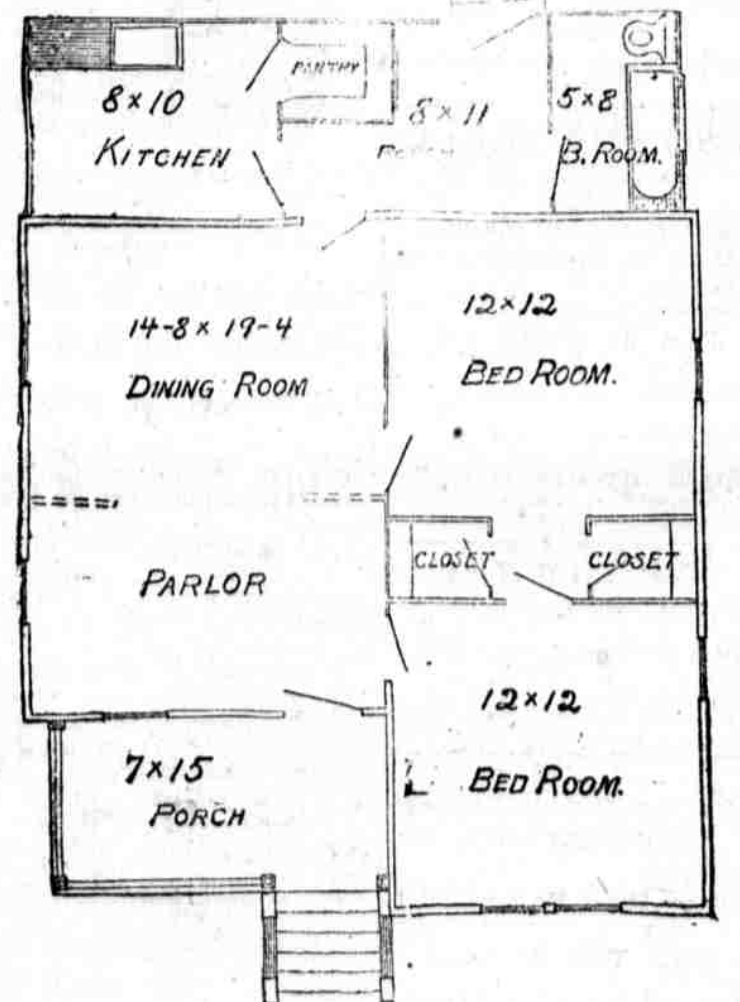

It is to be hoped that, right from the start, the baseball season will be conducted with reasonable regard to the comfort of the patrons of the game. There need be no restriction upon the spontaneous applause of the galleries, even where it may be distinctly partisan, but all outrageous and unseemly racket, or insulting demonstrations toward any team or individual player, ought to be remorselessly suppressed.

Two of the most important measures of the session are slumbering in the arms of committees. They are the New York Cable Company's franchise and the national debt refunding scheme of the Minister of Finance. Meanwhile a great deal of attention, both in and out of the Legislature, has been bestowed upon matters that, as to some, the public at large care nothing about, and, as to others, that it were good service to the people to have incontinently consigned to oblivion. Upon the two subjects awarded importance above, the BULLETIN will have something to say, in due time, which it is to be hoped will aid in preventing the commission of irreparable blunders.

The question propounded by Senator Hocking a day or two since to the Minister of Interior ad interim, and the answer thereto, which was printed in the last issue of this paper, have both been referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee, it is presumed for the purpose of determining what, if any, right the Executive Council has to set apart portions of the public domain for any purpose whatever. If, as the Executive has assumed to be the case, it has the right to set apart even the small plot needed for a drinking fountain then it may safely be argued that it has the same right to set apart lands for other public purposes, and that the action of the Legislature in recently creating public recreation grounds at Aala and Makiki was unnecessary, even if it was not an interference with the prerogatives of the Executive Council. Probably no more important matter has ever been referred to a Senate Committee.

Interest in the Federation scheme has come to a white heat in the Australian Colonies, with the completion and submission of the Federal Constitution. Mr. Barton, Premier of New South Wales, addressing a large meeting in Sydney called the document "The Australian Constitution of 1898," saying he used the term prophetically in full confidence of the inauguration of a federal government the present year. It does not appear, however, that the scheme has perfectly smooth sailing. The Australian Star, Sydney, points out what it deems to be defects in the instrument, particularly mentioning the financial part of the scheme. It also emphasizes the fact that Queensland still holds aloof from the proposition, saying if that colony stays out it will make "dis-united" instead of "united" Australia.

This, however, may not be so formidable an objection as the paper seems to think. Several of the original States of the American Union withheld their acceptance of the constitution for some years. Two of the Maritime Provinces declined to enter the Dominion of Canada thirty-one years ago, and one of them—the great island colony of Newfoundland—still remains out in the cold. British Columbia was only admitted several years after the Dominion started on its career. Union must be the destiny of Australia—probably also of Australasia, for even New Zealand will be attracted by the united commonwealth of her neighbors. It looks absurd to see such a congeries of wealthy and resourceful states—under a common flag, speaking one language; identical in political, ancestral and social conditions—elbowing each other yet maintaining tariff and other obstructions to their mutual commerce.

in need of it. The work must prove a success if prosecuted steadily and faithfully." Mr. Kimm thinks highly of Kusaie under missionary auspices. "The work is progressing very favorably at Kusaie," he says, under the admirable superintendence of Dr. Price and wife. They have three schools—one for Gilbert island boys, one for Marshall island boys, and one for Marshall and Gilbert girls. They are taught arithmetic, reading, writing, and religion. All the natives are in the greatest contrast to those of some other islands. They are all civilized and have none of their old heathen habits. Under the noble results of missionary work, Kusaie is one of the most desirable spots in the Pacific."

Work Is Discouraging.

An attache of the American Board said yesterday of the South Sea Islands work: "The Morning Star brings the same story of discouragements. Work down there is carried on at great expense, and it seems that progress is very, very slow. Besides, our missionaries are unable to stand the climate. They are sick a great deal. Some times I feel like surrendering a fight."

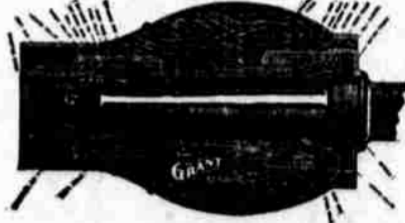

Generally speaking, the muffs are medium in size, but there are directoire and Marie Antoinettes, which are so large and softly built as to be capacious enough to almost lose one's elbows in. These muffs are also made up of velvet and trimmed with not a few heads and many tails, interspersed with frills and bows. Bows are exceedingly pretty with numbers of bushy tails and heads fastening under the chin, while others have ribbons or velvet bows intermingled. The short fur boa is the newest and smartest affair and the most becoming.

Fashion's new aims as evinced by the dressmaker's productions, are in the direction of clinging skirts, close sleeves, a narrow back, long waist and low bust, all of which give to the form quite a new shape. The latest cut in skirts is the deep circular flounce, which widens into one with the back breadth and is stitched on to the apron shaped top in front and at the sides. Braiding or bands may cover this seam.

In cloth gowns the latest development is a combination of cloth in two shades of the same color. Velvet sleeves are a feature of other new cloth gowns. All cloth gowns, by the way, show a greater amount of trimming than heretofore displayed. Fancy waists, quite unlike the skirts, certainly have lost none of their former popularity, and rumor tells us that they will come to the front with renewed favor when the spring fashions appear. Indeed, dress-

From Paris comes the news that the becoming neckwear of the present season must give way to a severely plain neck finish. Coming back to the present, dinner gowns are quite elaborate. Trains of moderate length are in order, and the sleeves, which are long, are frequently made of shirred net or lace.

The bustle is an accomplished fact. It is already here in modest proportions and is welcomed by tall, slender women. It is claimed that there is already considerable demand for these small bustles. As at present worn the bustle as a rule consists of a small plaiting of horsehair, some of two narrow plaitings, only large enough to fit into the hollow of a woman's back. Some of these bustles, however, are made with hip pads attached, and then again the hip pads can be purchased separately.

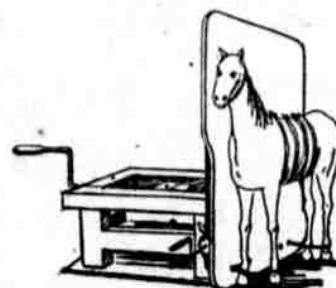

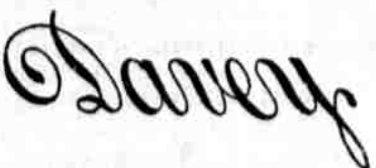

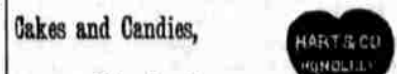

IN THE COLONIAL STYLE.

Design For a Simple Yet Elegant Cottage to Cost \$3,500.

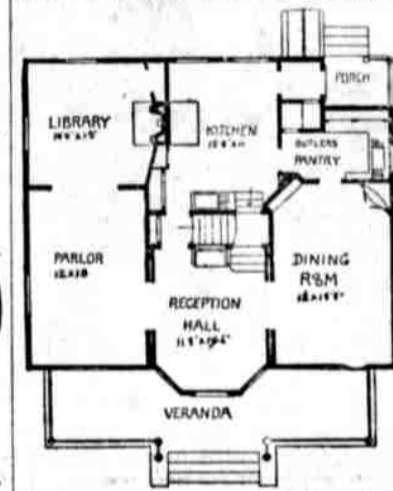
Building a house is very much like buying a pair of shoes. Do not buy a pair that is too small for you, for they will surely hurt you. Likewise do not build a house that is too small for you, one in which your family will be crowded. And, like a pair of shoes, a good house will outlast several poorly constructed ones. Do not decide in a hurry how you intend to build. Remember that Rome was not built in a day. Get all the points possible from your neighbors' buildings and im-

prove upon them. Get papers and borrow books on architecture, so that you may formulate your ideas as to what you wish and what your circumstances require. Then sit down and roughly sketch out plans, and when you have finally come to time with yourself consult your friend the architect as to the feasibility and practicability of your design. He will give you an approximate value on your home and advise you on the minor details which have not occurred to you and which are indispensable to your comfort. When he has satisfied you, he can undoubtedly refer you to some reliable builder in your particular territory who has done other work for him and therefore understands his method of working, which is always more or less a saving of time and money to the owner. Employing a builder unknown to the architect necessitates considerable time and often a great deal of correspondence before all details are arranged.

The most profitable style of building nowadays is one in the colonial style, as it

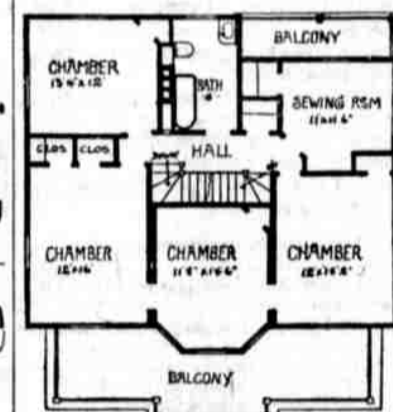


FIRST FLOOR PLAN.

utilizes all possible space and at the same time embodies neatness, durability and last, but not least, cheapness.

This design was erected about 25 miles from New York. The first floor consists of parlor, dining room, library, reception hall, kitchen and butler's pantry. The front piazza covers the entire front portion of the building. On the second floor are four chambers and a bathroom, with all modern improvements, and one room to be used as a schoolroom, a playroom or a sewing room, or it may be pressed into service as a spare bedroom. This room opens on a balcony over the rear piazza.

In the attic two large rooms are finished off, while one other room is finished for a storeroom. The attic chamber rooms are finished for the use of the servants. The cellar is 7 feet deep; first floor, 9 feet 6 inches; second floor, 9 feet. The entire house is heated throughout by a hot water

boiler of approved make, with radiators in the various rooms, concealed pipes being used. The plumbing is all open, nickel plated work. A fireplace is arranged in the library suitable for burning large-wood. The laundry is situated in the cellar. There is also a servants' water closet in the cellar. The cost of this building within a radius of 25 miles of New York will not exceed \$3,500.

AFTER WIRE FENCES.

Mr. Isenberg's Bill to Prohibit Them on Public Roads.

Hon. Paul Isenberg's bill relating to barbed wire fences is quite an important measure. It is short and reads as follows:

Section 1. From and after the passage of this Act it shall be unlawful for any person to build or erect any fence made or constituted wholly or partly of barbed wire along or adjoining any public highway, or to place upon or attach to any such fence any barbed wire.

Section 2. Any person violating Section 1 of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be liable to pay a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or be imprisoned at hard labor not more than one month.

comedian by mistake, it aroused the King's sense of humor to such a degree that he arose in his seat, stopped the play, and walked in among his consorts, and between peals of laughter explained the joke to them. We were then allowed to proceed, and the curtain fell upon a success.

The next number was a Shadow Pantomime, which pleased them immensely, but one of the Princess insisted on pulling the curtain aside to discover for His Majesty how one man could grow large, while the other grew smaller. Hugh J. Emmett, the ventriloquist, caused much wonderment. The King caused a large pair of field glasses to be brought, and although seated but 20 feet away, he kept them levelled constantly upon Mr. Emmett, trying to discover from whence the voice came, and so the entertainment proceeded, each member of the company gaining unstinted applause. Finally the room was darkened, the curtain arose, the bell sounded, and six calcium lights disclosed Elsie Adair in the folds of the serpentine dress. Here was an audience who had never seen a western performance, the rainbow colors of a lime-light and a serpentine dress were unknown quantities, and as the colored discs began to revolve, I peered out in the dim light here is what I saw. The entire audience were still as death; their bodies bent forward, eyes staring from their sockets as a huge serpent or butterfly passed over the dress. The first number finished, and still they sat immovable trying to pierce with their eyes the empty void of the black cabinet, and so on through the succeeding numbers not a sound came from that sphinx audience. At last on the dress appeared the Royal ensign, the picture of a white elephant on a red ground; then they awoke, here was at last something earthly with which they were acquainted.
