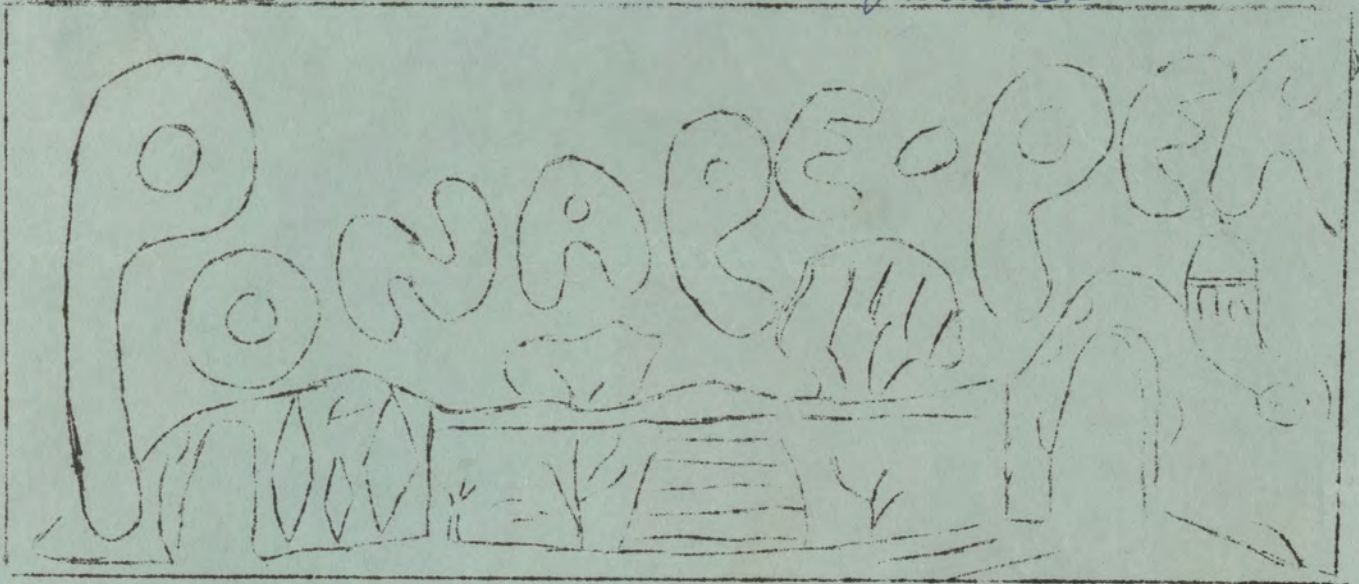

US CONGRESSIONAL PARTY ARRIVES IN SAIPAN

Headed by Congressman Craley, the United States Congressional party arrived in Saipan on November 15, 1965. The visitors were greeted by the High Commissioner and the Assistant Commissioners. There were, besides the official greeters, many spectators, including students displaying placards, at the airport to greet the visitors.

Representative Ray Taylor and Representative Charlotte Reid are scheduled to arrive in Guam on November 22 and 19, respectively, to join the party for the eastern leg of the visit. Mrs. Van Cleve, who is the Director of the Office of Territories, is also scheduled to arrive in Saipan on November 22 to join the party.

Until the arrival of Representative Taylor, Representative Craley will be serving as senior member of the party for Saipan, Yap, and Palau visits.

The Popular Party of Saipan won eleven seats in the sixteen member Mariana District Legislature in the November 14th election. Rota's three seats were won by the Territorial Party. Tinian's one seat was won by an independent candidate.

MAILLO ACCEPTS HEINE'S RESIGNATION AS SPEAKER

Vice Speaker of the Congress of Micronesia's General Assembly Petrus Maillo of Truk has announced that he has regretfully accepted the resignation of Mr. Dwight Heine of the Marshalls as the Speaker of the Assembly.

Heine submitted his resignation when he assumed the post of District Administrator for the Marshall District on October 15. In his letter of resignation, Heine said "... as my last act as Speaker of the General Assembly I submit immediately to you my resignation as a member of the Congress of Micronesia and request that you assume the duties as Acting Speaker. I rejoice that my duties as Speaker are transferred to such wise and capable hands. I am sure that you will be recipient of the same loyalty, cooperation and respect from all members of the General Assembly which I received in full measure during my tenure as Speaker."

In a letter accepting Heine's resignation from the Congress, Acting Speaker Maillo said: "I am sure that all members of the Congress share the regret I feel over the loss of the services of our highly respected Speaker despite the pride we all feel over his appointment to the high administrative post of District Administrator. As he continues his career of service to Micronesia, he and his family have our best wishes and gratitude."

HEADLINE NEWS . . .

A 16 year old Texan fired several shots from 2 pistols into the lounge of a national airlines jet over the Gulf of Mexico Wednesday night. The boy wanted to go to Cuba to aid anti-Castro troops. No one was hurt.

The American First Cavalry smashed a communist mortar and sniper ambush early Thursday in the search for what is believed to be the main supply base for North Vietnamese infiltrators in the Republic of Viet Nam.

In another action, the Viet Cong struck at another American Airfield in Viet Nam. Reinforced communist battalions destroyed 5 American Air Force spotter planes and inflicted casualties described as moderate on the field's defenders, South Vietnamese Rangers.

The State Department has denied a report that the United States received an offer from North Viet Nam to start unconditional peace talks. It was made clear that Hanoi officials were still insisting on prior conditions before the talks could start.

Defense Secretary McNamara says the communist offensive that started in Viet Nam at the beginning of the monsoon season has been defeated. He also said that communist military man power is increasing. He said that at least 4 regiments of the regular North Viet Nam army are now in the Republic of Viet Nam. A regiment is estimated to total about 1500 men.

President Johnson has sent a letter to the chairman of the Civil Rights Commission asking for a report as soon as possible on racial conditions in the nation's schools. Johnson said that many Negroes are being deprived of quality education and training for a variety of reasons.

Britain's Princess Margaret and her husband were guests of honor at a White House dinner-dance Wednesday night. The occasion also marked the 31st wedding anniversary of President and Mrs. Johnson.

At the U.N., Red China loses out again. For the 15th time, the U.N. General Assembly refused to give Red China membership in the United Nations.

A Dominican Republic rebel delegation left Santo Domingo for Brazil, Wednesday night, to ask the Organization of American States to remove all foreign troops from the Dominican Republic.

Senator Robert Kennedy was given a noisy and friendly welcome at a farming center near Santiago, Chile. He also met with Chile's President.

Former President Eisenhower's physical condition is progressing to a point where his doctors are debating when and how to move him to Walter Reed Hospital for final recovery. He was lifted from his bed to a chair Thursday for the first time since his second heart attack 8 days ago.

A giant spruce, the nation's Christmas tree, is enroute from the Fort Apache Indian Reservation in Arizona to the White House. The tree was 102 feet tall, but was trimmed to 80 feet.
