Hawaiian Plays.

The company arranging to put on a series of Hawaiian historical plays in the Opera house will be ready to present the first one in about three weeks. Rehearsals are held every afternoon. It is said that the plays are masterpieces of their kind and that the scenery has never been excelled here. It has taken several months to prepare the latter.

The first two plays will be followed by one illustrating the overthrow of the monarchy in 1893. This will follow history to the letter. Every important incident of that exciting period will be reproduced, even to the reading of the proclamation by H. E. Cooper and the shooting of a policeman by Captain John Good. The Queen will be impersonated in the exciting Palace scene by a Hawaiian young lady of sixteen. All of the plays bear the promise of drawing immense audiences.

New Zealand Mail.

The "Auckland Star" says: "Already there are indications that an attempt will be made during this session of Parliament to get rid of the Auckland-San Francisco mail service. There may be nothing in the rumor that the Union Steamship Company proposes to build special steamers for a Vancouver service on condition of receiving a Government subsidy. But every year we may safely expect that Southern members will advocate the claims of some other route in preference to the 'Frisco route,' and judging from an article which appeared lately in the "Lyttleton Times," the campaign against the Auckland service has already begun.

"We are informed that Messrs Spreckels intend to apply this year for an increased subsidy for a fortnightly San Francisco service. When the 'Frisco line was before the House in October, 1901, it was arranged to offer Mr Spreckels a poundsage subsidy on mails ranging from a minimum of £15,000 to a maximum of £20,000 a year for a 17 days' service. The contract was fixed for 18 months only, so as to allow the matter to come up again for discussion during this session. When the question is raised in the House no doubt the request for an increased subsidy will be made an argument for modifying the present arrangement in such a way that the Spreckels Company will not be likely to renew it."

THOUGHTS FOR THE AUDITOR.

Can anyone tell us why Judge Weaver and three or four officers of the Registration Land Court should be paid large salaries from July 1 to the middle of September when there is no court and no work to do save the inconsequential details of organizing the office system, which might easily be completed in a day? After receiving his appointment as Judge, Weaver decide that he must go to Boston to "learn" the proceedings of the land court there. It was presumed at the time he was appointed that he was capable and ready to assume the duties of the office, but such seems not to have been the case. While away, and doing nothing direct for the good of the country, he draws his salary and, we are reliably informed, expects to draw a large sum for expenses of the junketing trip in his own behalf.

In addition to this large, unauthorized and illegal expenditure and proposed diversion of public funds, it is intended to keep up the salaries of three, and perhaps four officials of the court for more than two months, while they do absolutely nothing and have no duties to perform. Registrar Savidge makes the apology that the officers will, between now and the return of Judge Weaver, have upon them the "onerous" duty of getting the office in shape. One would suppose from this that a Great Eastern department or a new Government was to be established. As a matter of fact the work of getting the Court in shape could easily be performed in twenty-four hours.

There is an important thought in the case for the Auditor. That official is supposed to issue salary warrants for work performed for the Govern-

ment. In this case there has been no work, and there can consequently be no salaries.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Charles Notley is a good joker. He is a good joker because he tells a political joke in an entertaining way and is able to palm it off on the Advertiser and Star at par. 'Rsh for Notley!

Treasurer Keпоiki was this morning presented by Miss Anne M Prescott with a copy of her book "Makapala-by-the-Sea." He is her beau-ideal of "a marvel and a masterpiece, the *che d'oeuvre* of Hawaiians." May we ask in what is he "a marvel and a masterpiece?" Miss Prescott may know and be able to answer our question.

Thus far a Hawaiian has not received recognition at Annapolis as a Government aided student. The first cadet from Hawaii was a Connecticut boy, a son of Captain Pond of the Iroquois. The second, Ellis Lando, was born in a mainland State and has been here but a very few years. Up to this writing, therefore, Hawaii has not been represented at Annapolis, save for the late Paul Neumann's son and perhaps other "psy" students.

The San Francisco Call is just now making a tremendous bid for public favor in the Sunday field. Its Sunday editions, besides containing the news of the world, carry a valuable fund of interesting and reliable matter on numerous topics. A vast amount of talent and money is also expended upon its art supplement, an innovation in newspaper "extras" not exceeded in point of excellence and attractiveness on the Pacific Coast. The Sunday Call is above par in the scale of reading matter for the home.

The late Pope Leo XIII., the "man of peace," probably averted more clashes between civilized nations than the world has ever known or ever will know. His successor must follow his example, or there may at any time be serious disruptions of the peace of Europe and perhaps general wars. It is very doubtful that Cardinal Oreglia is just that man. He is a man of strong prejudices, particularly in a political way, which will probably introduce into the Papacy an element avoided by the late Pontiff and most undesirable at this time. However, the future alone can tell.

Of the six names endorsed by the Republican Central Committee for the new position of Deputy Insurance Commissioner under the Treasurer, three are mentioned as "esquires," they having the "Esq." tagged after their names. Such being the case, pray, what are the others? Are they "nobodies" or "nobodies?" Or are they—? Or as suggested by a prominent Republican, the three "esquires" are of the upper crust, and those without are of the people. But of the lot, in the order presented, as elsewhere herein shown, we would suggest the Biblical saying that "the first shall be last and the last first." The last name is our choice and drop the other Republican office seekers and job chasers.

We object most positively to the locating of the military armory on the Palace grounds at the corner of Hotel and Likelike streets, and are

surprised that the suggestion of such a thing should ever have been made. For many years it has been generally and strongly felt that the park around the Palace has been too much encumbered with secondary and outside obstructions. The old kitchen and Wray Taylor's garden at Hotel and Likelike streets are among the number. The Palace grounds should—and must be—kept clear of unnecessary buildings. Let the armory go to some unoccupied Government lot, of which there are a number. If it is located on the Palace grounds we can assure the men responsible for it that they will hear something drop with a mighty "dull thud" in the next Legislature. Let that be remembered.

While the Democrats and Home Rulers are working on the same lines, and closer together than ever before, there is still not that union that will positively assure success in the County elections on Oahu and Kauai. As to the two counties of Hawaii and Maui County there has for some time been no cause for doubt. It seems to us, however, that on this island there should be some slight rearrangement of central committees. The heads of committees, most of all, should be willing and aggressive workers, and should have the confidence of the precincts. Men who work one week for a cause and rest fifty-one do not, as a rule make good political motormen. A little readjustment is in order, and it should be carried out before the battalions are arraigned for the fight.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

J A Wilder returned by the Sonoma this morning.

Work of pile driving at the Oceanic dock will be completed about the middle of next week.

Princess Kalaniana'ole entertained a large number of friends at her Waikiki home yesterday afternoon.

Upon the return of Governor Dole from Hawaii the Kohala mountain water leases will be put up at auction.

Prof J T Crawley and family will leave by the Siberia to spend the warm season at Los Gatos, Cal.

Dr and Mrs J T McGrew are at home again after a visit to the farmer's old home in Cincinnati and a tour of California.

Prof W D Alexander returned from the Coast today after a visit there on business for the Federal survey department.

A survey of the steamer Clavering, which went on the reef Sunday night, will be made under the direction of Lloyds here.

It is said that Col C P Iaukea is organizing a Citizens Party for the County election, with himself on the slate for Sheriff of Oahu.

The Oahu Lumber & Building Co has sued W S Elings for a balance of \$618.81, citing the First National Bank of Hawaii as garnishee.

Judge Gear has appointed O J Willis commissioner to partition lands in the suit of Caroline Haughton vs Percy K Mossman and others.

A concert will be given by the band at Thomas Square this evening. Tomorrow night there will be music on the grounds of the Hawaiian hotel.

The big steamer Siberia will not be due until Friday but will probably get in tomorrow from Yokohama on her way to San Francisco.

The Peking arrived off port about 10 o'clock last night from San Francisco. She will sail at 12 o'clock tonight for Japan and China.

The Iwalani will get away at 5 o'clock this afternoon for Hawaii ports. The Noeau will sail at the same hour for Lahaina and Hamakua ports.

Prof A Koebele returned by the Sonoma this morning from San Francisco. He will probably continue his voyage on the same vessel to Sydney.

There are only forty tax appeal cases this year, compromises having been effected in most of the disagreements. The largest appeal is on a valuation of only \$40,000.

R W Shingle, W F Dillingham and Frank Halstead left yesterday for a hunting tour of Kahoolawe. They will be called for there by either the Kinau or one of the Maui liners.

Bishop street, which has just been macadamized, will have to be torn up again on account of a water conduit running from the Young building to the old Arlington site having been laid too near the surface.

As the steamer Clavering and her cargo are valued at about \$700,000, the tugs Fearless and Counselman would have a salvage claim of over \$100,000. It is not unlikely, however, that a compromise will be effected for something like half that amount.

G R Carter and J O Carter, trustees under the will of the late H A P Carter, have filed their account for the year ending June 30, 1903. They charge themselves with \$244,207.77 received on account of principal and \$26,839.50 on account of income, and ask to be allowed the latter sum for payments and charges on account of income. The \$244,207.77 mentioned includes \$48,180.02 cash on hand uninvested.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Federal Attorney Breckons is laid up with the dengue fever.

The Sonoma will sail at 7 o'clock tonight for Samoa and the Colonies.

Noah W Aluli will be appointed an assistant in the office of the Attorney General.

Architect O G Traphagen is having drawn the plans for the proposed new armory building.

A B Wood, wife and son, left by the Ventura last evening for San Francisco on a pleasure trip.

Deputy Sheriff J K Nabale, of Kona, is said to be a candidate for sheriff of West Hawaii county.

Hackmen have had a harvest today taking passengers by the Peking and Sonoma to the Pali and other places.

A M Brown, James H Boyd, Col C P Iaukea and a "dark horse" are thus far the candidates for sheriff of Oahu county.

A T Atkinson, Superintendent of Public Instruction, and wife are still at Ahuimanu. They will return to the city tomorrow or next day.

The clock tower over Aliiolani Hale, now the Judiciary Building, is giving out "flbs" by showing the wrong time of day. It was so yesterday and is still so today.

The woods are full of candidates for supervisors. All thus far in the field, however, are Republicans. The names of the successful candidates are yet to be announced.

Edward Hors of Waiialua, for many years district magistrate of Waiialua has been licensed by Judge Da Bolt to practice law in the district courts and before circuit judges at chambers on appeal.

Superintendent Cooper did not go to Kauai yesterday as he had intended, but decided upon a tour of Oahu instead. He is in Koolau today and will return by way of Waiialua, arriving home on Friday.

Former British Consul W J Kenay, who will be so pleasantly remembered here, is a through passenger from England by the steamer Peking for his post in Formosa. He is spending the day meeting old acquaintances.

Guy Livingstone and Miss Winnie Sharratt will be married at St Andrews cathedral this evening. Mr Livingstone is a clerk in the Auditor's office and both of the young people have many good friends in the Islands.

There will be an open installation of officers of Damien Council No 563 Y M I at San Antonio hall at 8 o'clock this evening. Owing to the death of His Holiness the Pop, the social will be dispensed with. Admission by cards.

The Wm W Biscoe Co has brought suit to recover \$15,000 alleged to be due for railroad material supplied to the Kona Sugar Co. The Hutchins syndicate gave a bond of \$30,000 against the case with W R Castle and J A McCandless as sureties.

Judge Da Bolt dismissed the case of Alfredo Andrade De Mattos vs Jose G Serrao without prejudice for want of jurisdiction. It was a suit claiming \$5000 damages for malicious prosecution on a charge of common nuisance in keeping cattle that disturbed a neighborhood in South Hilo.
