In this issue appears the first half of Hon. W. M. Springer's clear and forcible monograph on the Hawaiian question in the North American Review.

Jos. Emerson is quoted in an American paper as writing a warlike letter to his brother, saying the P. G. supporters here "would rather die like men than live like curs."

LET THE PEOPLE DECIDE.

One of the P. G. organs quotes Senator Vest, a supporter of President Cleveland's administration, in his speech on the Hawaiian question, and intimates editorially that the comfort and consolation he gives to the royalists are rather slight.

The doctrine of the United States through all our history has been that the people should determine their own government—not the educated people, not the titled people, not the opulent people, but, under God, the people, rich and poor, high and low.

What Mr. Vest there advocates is just what the Provisional Government will not do—allow the people to decide their own destiny. The very hint that the United States Government might demand a vote of the Hawaiian people before considering a treaty of annexation was enough, not long ago, to produce paroxysms of fury in the P. G. press and people.

WHAT ARE THEY?

Most of the controversy on the Hawaiian question here and in the United States rages around the point as to whether the Provisional Government has any right to cede the sovereignty of the Hawaiian Islands. This fact suggests an inquiry into the nationality of the persons making this offer of a nation as a gift.

The newspapers that take up the same cause are wholly insignificant, or their opinions are bought. Thus and so the annexation papers of Honolulu would make their readers believe.

A GREAT TEA CROP.

Big Profits Made by Ceylon Growers—Coffee Plantation Killed by Fungus.

F. M. Mackwood, who has lived for over thirty-one years in Ceylon and who is now one of the largest tea-growers of that country, is in town. Mr. Mackwood says that the coffee business, which was once so flourishing in Ceylon, and from which vast fortunes were made, is now almost a thing of the past.

monarchy did not exceed one hundred persons all told! Therefore the claim that the lives or property of American citizens were in danger is a mere pretext, having no foundation whatever in fact.

The people of the United States are not responsible for the kind of government that may be in existence in the Hawaiian Islands. Nor is it any of their concern as to whether that government deals justly with its citizens and subjects or not. Whether the government of Hawaii is a good government or a just government is a matter for the people of that island to determine for themselves. There is no divine right of republicanism in this world, any more than there is a divine right of kings. The divinity in all these matters is in the right of the people to govern themselves.

In this connection it is worthy of remark that the American minister, Mr. Blount, in his report to this government, summarized by Secretary Gresham, states that while at Honolulu he did not meet a single annexationist who expressed a willingness to submit the question of annexation to a vote of the people, nor did he talk with one on that subject who did not insist that if the islands were annexed to the United States suffrage should be so restricted as to give complete control to foreigners or white persons. I have, myself, on several occasions, conversed with those representing the provisional government in Washington upon this very point, and I inquired especially of them why means were not taken to submit the question to the people of Hawaii as to whether they desired to maintain the provisional government or to be annexed to the United States. In every instance I was informed that the people of the islands were not capable of self-government, and if the question were submitted to them that they would be hostile to this movement. The fact is that the people of Hawaii have never been consulted upon this subject. The so-called provisional government did not emanate from them, and does not have their sanction. It is a usurpation, which could not have had any *de facto* existence, except for the presence of the overpowering armed forces of the United States. What right has a provisional government, thus established, to make a treaty with the government of those islands to our government? Who has clothed this provisional government with authority to speak for the people they pretend to represent?

The Great Bell of Moscow.

Close to the tower of Ivan Valiki, in Moscow, and reared on a massive pedestal of granite, stands the mighty bell, justly named "The Monarch," for no other in the world may dispute its sovereignty. It was cast by command of the Empress Anne in 1730, and bears her figure in flowing robes upon its surface, beneath which is a deep border of flowers. "The Monarch" is highly venerated, for the religious feelings of the people were called into action when it was cast, and everyone who had a fraction of the precious metal thrown into the smelting mass some offering of either silver or gold. The bell has one great defect—its decorative parts are in low relief and of extremely bad execution. The great bell has ever been one of the great curiosities of the world.
