## HILO HERALD KICKS

### At the Proposed Territorial Legislation.

It Claims that It is Again Centralization Under Another Guise, and Compares It to the Hand of Esau but the Voice of Local Self-government is a Nightmare.

(Continued from Yesterday.)

Sec. 11. That the style of all process shall be "The Government of Hawaii," and all prosecutions shall be carried on in the name and by authority of the Government of Hawaii.

Sec. 12. That the legislature of the Territory of Hawaii shall consist of two houses and no person shall sit as senator or representative in the legislature unless elected in conformity with this Act.

Sec. 14. The general election shall be held on the Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 1899, and every second year thereafter.

Sec. 16. That no member of the legislature shall, during the term for which he is elected, be appointed by the Governor or elected to any office of the Government of Hawaii.

Sec. 17. That no person holding office in or under, or by authority of the government, including notaries public and agents to take acknowledgments, or any employee of said government, shall be eligible to election to the legislature or to hold the position of member of the same while holding said office, nor shall any person be entitled to vote at any general election in the Territory of Hawaii prior to 1903 who, having been entitled to qualify and vote under the constitution and laws of Hawaii prior to October, 1897, and since July, 1894, failed to register as such voter, unless he shall take an oath to support the constitution of the United States. But this disqualification shall not apply to any person so entitled to vote at a general election who was prevented from registering as a voter by reason of sickness or necessary absence from the Hawaiian Islands.

Sec. 18. Provides that idiots nor insane persons can not register and vote, nor can persons expelled from the legislature for bribery or receiving bribes, or who have served terms of imprisonment exceeding two years.

Sec. 19. Refers to the oath to be taken by members of the legislature and officials of the government.

Sec. 20. Provides that the Senate and House shall select its own officers and determine rules of procedure.

Secs. 21 and 22 refer to ayes and noes and quorum.

Sec. 23. Provides that a smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members.

Sec. 25. Provides for the punishment of persons not members.

Sec. 28. That for the purpose of representation in the Senate, until otherwise provided by law, the Territory is divided into the following Senatorial districts:

- First District—Hawaii.
- Second District—Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Kahoolawe.
- Third District—Oahu.
- Fourth District—Kauai and Niihau.

### In the Police Court.

The District Magistrate disposed of 86 cases at his seance yesterday morning. An Irishman charged with profanity demanded a lawyer and got a fine of \$6 and costs. A soldier charged with being drunk failed to materialize nor could any traces of him be found. There was no bail and no record of the man. Later on it was learned that Marshal Brown had released the man through telephone, and had forgotten to notify the prosecuting officer. The Marshal has learned new tactics in San Francisco. The Magistrate had the incident placed on the official records.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Our politicians may possibly take as a gubernatorial straw, showing which way the Washington winds blow, the fact that Mr. S. M. Ballou, in the Supreme Court yesterday morning, addressed General A. S. Hartwell as "Governor" with a meaning smile wreathing his mouth. What say you editors of the Advertiser and Bulletin to this freak of worthy fortune? No one can doubt this general's Americanism and he is also a resident of Hawaii. Constitutionally and Territorially he is eligible.

Last evening's shower showed the wretched condition in which the drainage of the streets is maintained. At upper Fort street between Beretania and Hotel, for instance, the water rose to the level of the car tracks in the centre of the road, and to cross dry-footed at the corner of Fort and Hotel was for some minutes impossible. This comes from not keeping the gutter ways clear of rubbish when the sweepers are around. Perhaps, when we obtain our new government with new men as captain and crew, things may be changed for the better. If not we must follow San Francisco's example and get the merchants to take hold of matters and instil new life into the governmental moribunds.

THE INDEPENDENT has taken no active stand in the differences between the so-called first and second congregations of St. Andrew's Cathedral. We believe that discipline must be upheld in a church, as much as in an army. All who claim allegiance to the Anglican Church must bow to the Bishop, placed at the head of the local branch of the church. The parsons who have tried to fight the Bishop of Honolulu, and have caused discordance in Hawaii will not be encouraged by the congregation, which as a whole is loyal and true to their church. The following paragraph from the last number of the Honolulu Diocesan Magazine should be carefully read by the "parsons" as well as by the congregation. It says: "The legal advisers of the Rev. Alex. Mackintosh would have done well to point out to him that the Canon Law (Chalcedon IX.) expressly forbids a clergyman having a matter against a Bishop to run to the secular courts of justice." It seems a pity, that Christians should injure the great religion of the civilized world by squabbling over trifles. We still believe that the quarrel between the two congregations can be described as a fight between "Cocoanut Oil" and "Lubin's Extract." But it should be remembered that the church, which Bishop Willis represents, came here, not in the interest of the "Lubin Extract" faction, but for the benefit of the "Cocoanut Oil" crowd comprising the natives of Hawaii.

## CALLED AWAY.

Russel D. Walbridge Is Gathered Into the Fold.

The sudden death of Russel D. Walbridge, which occurred this morning made many a man whom he in days gone by had befriended wipe away a tear and give a sympathetic thought to him who, with all his faults was well-beloved, and whose heart always was in sympathy with those who were poor and suffering.

Poor Walbridge, an intelligent, bright and clever American, who the writer remembers as the political leader of the "missionary" circles on Maui, and then cast aside like the peel of an orange after the Baldwin clique had used him.

He was a noble opponent in the days of political fighting. He was a man to the back-bone then, and if he had met the gratitude due to him, instead of the rank ingratitude offered him by the men he served, the writer might yet have had the pleasure of sharpening our political sword and hear our steel clashing against each other or side by side against the opponents as the case might be.

Russel Walbridge was born in 1849 in Buffalo. He was an engineer of marked skill and received a thorough education at the Polytechnic Institute of Troy. In Idaho, he learned the practice of mining engineering and eventually he graduated in 1871 as civil engineer.

In 1878 he arrived in Honolulu, and accepted a position at the Wailuku Plantation on Maui. Upon the death of his father in 1880, he went home and returned to Hawaii in 1884, when he again accepted an appointment at the Wailuku Plantation, of which he eventually became the manager.

Walbridge married Miss Bernice Parke in 1890. This amiable lady survives him with one child, the issue of their happy union.

Mr. Walbridge, whose untimely death it is our sad duty to record was always a gentleman, an accomplished scholar, a clever politician and a man who only had friends in this, his adopted country.

The time of his funeral will be announced to-morrow.

Deputy-Marshall Hitchcock has left for Molokai with his family, and will return to town on Sunday.

The railroaders to Kahuku speak very flatteringly of the ride. Excursion trains will be very popular.

Dr. A. N. Sinclair has opened his offices at 413 King street, next to the Opera House, in the late W. M. Gibson's former residence.

The Amateur Orchestra is exactly what its name implies; an orchestra of amateur musicians, and it may be added an honor to Honolulu.

Professor Yandley whose health has been prostrated by his exertions in the cause of music is rapidly recovering at the Queen's Hospital.

J. Ericson of Hilo, was the lowest bidder for the new school at Waiakea, Hilo, at \$1220. John Cook's bid was \$1263 and Albert Trask's \$1450.

Wm. Robert Hoare appears in the Gazette of the London Times of December 9th, as H. B. M.'s Consul for the Hawaiian Islands and dependencies.

The Panorama of Bethlehem may be seen at St. Louis College. Admission free. It is a rarely beautiful conception, and one especially pleasing to the children.

It is the impression around the Courts that the Supreme Court will deliver an opinion in the matter of the Chinese Habeas Corpus cases, at 10 o'clock to-morrow morning.

The Y. M. C. A. Treasurer, Mr. Chas Atherton, would much like to receive \$1000 before March to meet the drain on the current account caused by kindly hospitality shown to the soldiers in transit for the scene of war.

The steamer Tartar brought 705 more Japanese. There are now some 2000 Asiatics at the Quarantine Station, 120 of whom are Chinese under habeas corpus awaiting the decision of the Supreme Court on their cases.

The Orpheum Theatre will close down for a fortnight after Saturday evening's performance to enable certain important changes to be made in its construction. It will re-open materially improved and with a strong company.

A special term of the Supreme Court has been ordered to commence on the 9th inst. This is necessitated by the condition of the calendar owing to the Chinese Habeas Corpus cases and the two legal holidays intervening.

Tuesday, the 17th inst., has been declared a legal holiday. It is the anniversary of the revolution which overthrew the Constitutional Government. The day will be honored by a breach of its observance by all the people except a small minority of office seekers and incumbents.

Applications for a writ of mandamus against the Collector General to compel him to grant Hawaiian registry to the bark Williscott and the ship Euterpe have been made. There proceedings are probably taken to delay matters until the wish of the National Government has been ascertained.

The Consul for Italy and Mrs. F. A. Schaefer yesterday afternoon handsomely entertained the officers of the Italian cruiser Etna at Aina-hau, the charming Waikiki residence of Ex-Governor A. S. Cleghorn and Princess Kaiulani. President Dole was among the large number of guests present.

**ST. LOUIS COLLEGE.**

**A Beautiful Panorama of the City Bethlehem.**

Several newspaper men paid a visit to St. Louis College yesterday and viewed the artistic panorama of the traditional Christmas scene at Bethlehem. This year the hard working and clever Brothers have done wonders, and the miniature representation of the birthplace of Christ is worth seeing.

On the stage in the big hall is placed the Panorama with Bethlehem, the city of Tyrus and the crib, allegorically represented. The crib in the foreground was finished with unusual skill, and the running waterfalls, the sheep, horses, cows, donkeys and asses (no Kaiser) were distributed over the landscape.

By electric light the panorama looks simply brilliant under the grand motto of *Gloria in Excelsis Deo*. The river Jordan is represented in such a picturesque manner as only could be done by men living near the Nuuanu stream, and the streets of the old town and the roads are even superior in construction to those leading to the College.

It is a pleasure to take a walk through the fine college grounds and admire the school buildings. We wish that the College could be placed on higher lands and removed from its present vicinity. The work done by the Brothers is splendid, however.

St. Francis School on the corner of Kukui street and College lane has been opened as a free school for children of the Roman Catholic faith, at the expense of the Bishop of Panopolis, and over 200 boys are attending this school, which certainly deserves a subsidy from the next legislature. The handsome building was erected by the Lucas Brothers under the personal supervision of Mr. Thos. Lucas, and the painting was done by Mr. Con. Sterling. In the new building there is plenty of light, first class accommodation for the pupils, and an easy access to the school without necessitating the "free" scholars to come into contact with the regular boarders and the paying pupils of the main college.

It is always a pleasure to walk through the grounds of St. Louis College and admire the trees, the flowers, lawns and the menagerie. The old alligator, generally docile and sleepy, snorted violently when the visitors appeared and showed his teeth in a fear inspiring manner. Brother Thomas, who conducted the party, expressed his surprise at this unusual behavior of the pet alligator of the schools, but ex-Hon. "Tommy" Lucas, on behalf of the ugly animal, explained that the appearance of a reporter from the Bulletin, the only paper the beast reads, has disturbed his "neutrality." Dan Logan then tried to climb over the fence, but the 'gator shook his head and whispered to the Brothers, "I can't even swallow anything belonging to the Bulletin; give me something fresh;" and then the mocking bird whistled.

On Friday, the 6th inst., a concert will be given, when the panorama will be seen by electric light. Admission will be 25 cents, and the theatre will be open from 7 to 9 o'clock. On Sunday next the great hall will be open to the public without charge, but a collection for the benefit of the hall will be taken up. St. Louis College is the most useful educational institution in Hawaii, and it is always a pleasure to visit the great school.

districts shall be entitled to elect Senators as follows:

In the First District, four.

In the Second District, three.

In the Third District, six.

In the Fourth District, two.

Sec. 38. Provides for the division of the islands into Representative districts as follows:

First District—That portion of the island of Hawaii known as Puna, Hilo and Hamakua.

Second District—That portion of the Island of Hawaii known as Kau, Kona and Kohala.

Third District—The Islands of Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Kahoolawe.

Fourth District—That portion of the Island of Oahu lying east and south of Nuuanu street and a line drawn in extension thereof from the Nuanu Pali to Makapuu Point.

Fifth District That portion of the Island of Oahu lying west and north of the Fourth District.

Sixth District—The Islands of Kauai and Niihau.

Sec. 39. Apportions the districts as follows:

In the First District, four.

In the Second District, four.

In the Third District, six.

In the Fourth District, six.

In the Fifth District, six.

In the Sixth District, six.

Sec. 40. A representative must have attained the age of 25 years, be a male citizen of the United States, have resided in the islands not less than three years, and shall either own property in the Territory worth not less than \$500, or have an income of \$250 during the twelve months preceding the date of election.

Sec. 41. Provides that the first regular session of the legislature shall be held on the third Wednesday in February, 1900, and biennially thereafter in Honolulu.

Sec. 45. That all legislative proceedings shall be conducted in the English language.

Sec. 57. That the legislative power of the Territory shall extend to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of the United States, locally applicable, and the provisions of this act, but the legislature shall not grant to any corporation, association or individual any special or exclusive privilege or immunity, or franchise, without the approval of Congress nor shall it grant private charters but it may by general act permit persons to associate themselves together as bodies corporate for manufacturing, agricultural and other industrial pursuits, and for conducting the business of insurance, savings banks, banks of discount and deposit (but not of issue), loan, trust and guarantee associations, for the establishment and conduct of cemeteries, and for the construction and operation of railroads, wagon roads, vessels and irrigating ditches, and the colonization and improvement of lands in connection therewith, or for colleges, seminaries, churches, libraries, or any other benevolent, charitable or scientific association, nor shall any divorce be granted in the territory unless the applicant therefor shall have resided in the territory for one year next preceding the application, but this provision shall not affect any action pending when this act takes effect; nor shall any lottery or sale of lottery tickets be allowed; nor shall any public money be appropriated for the support or benefit of any sectarian, denominational or private school, or any school not under the exclusive control of the government of Hawaii or any political or municipal corporation or subdivision of the Territory, make any subscription to the capital stock of any incorporated company, or in any manner loan its credit for the use thereof, nor shall any debt be authorized to be contracted by or on behalf of the Territory, or any political or municipal corporation or subdivision thereof, except to meet the casual deficit in the revenues, to pay the interest on the existing indebtedness, to suppress insurrection or to provide for the common defense, except that in ad-

dition to any indebtedness created for such purposes the legislature may authorize loans by the territory, or any such subdivision thereof, for the erection of penal, charitable, and educational institutions, and for public buildings, wharves, roads, and harbor and other public improvements, but the total of such indebtedness incurred in any one year by the Territory or any subdivision shall not exceed one per centum upon the assessed value of taxable property of the Territory or subdivision thereof, as the case may be, as shown by the last general assessment for taxation, and the total indebtedness of the Territory shall not at any time be extended beyond seven per centum of such assessed value, and the total indebtedness of any subdivision shall not at any time extend beyond three per centum of such assessed value, but nothing in this provision shall prevent the refunding of any existing indebtedness at any time; nor shall such loan be made upon the credit of the public domain or any part thereof. No retrospective law shall be enacted.
