



It is stated that the German Electric Company of Madrid has in contemplation the installation of a plant for electric ploughing on a large property in the central part

Lady Edith Ward, who is reported to be betrothed to Count Herbert Bismarck, is a tall and very stylish young woman. She is very highly educated, if not es-

pecially pretty. Imperial Rome has just been captured by an electric street railway company which proposes to run a line from the Porto del Popolo to the Ponte Molle, two miles without the city.

There appears to be an unpleasant collocation of disease germs in various foreign countries which are widely separated from each other. Cholera is raging in Japan with extraordinary virulence. If the newspaper stories are to be believed the mortality is quite exceptional. In France a new form of influenza, or la grippe, is said to have broken out. Unlike the last visitation, it is quite frequently fatal. It has features which resemble the symptoms of typhoid; it is accompanied by high fever, an ab-normal temperature, blister on the tongue and acute inflammation of the throat. A similar malady is said to have appeared at Berlin and St. Petersburg where whole regiments have been attacked. Cases of true Asiatic cholera are reported from England.




