THE ADMINISTRATION AND THE SPOILS.

The present Administration is now on trial before the country. It is not intrinsically a strong one, being somewhat of a compromise in character; but there is a general feeling among the conservative portion of the community—that portion which desires good government for its own sake, and not for the spoils of office and the pickings of official patronage—that the Cabinet should be given an opportunity to show what it will do, and to judge it on its merits as evidenced by its actions.

The defiant reply of the Cabinet to the champion of the spoilsmen, Mr. Marques, caused a sensation of satisfaction throughout the community. This feeling received a decided dampener when Captain Tripp was almost immediately after made Port Surveyor. However excellent a gentleman Captain Tripp may be, he is not one in whom the community has confidence as a proper incumbent to fill this position.

A day or two later* the community received a distinct chill when three members of the Cabinet united in a partisan move to hound Dr. Kimball out of office, without any charge of mal-administration or failure to properly discharge the duties of his office, having been made against him. This action was peculiarly flagrant, because the Cabinet had assured him of its support, and the Doctor was simply acting as the executive officer of the Board of Health, of which the Attorney-General is a member. Moreover the action was taken without consulting with the Attorney-General and while he was absent from the House.

It is now openly claimed by the spoils faction that they have secured another scalp; that Dr. Tucker, the Superintendent of the Insane Asylum, is to be removed, and Dr. Oliver appointed in his place.

We are credibly informed that Minister Spencer has admitted the truth of this claim, and while expressing perfect satisfaction with Dr. Tucker's administration, says that "he cannot stand the pres-

sure" which is being brought to bear for a change.

If this is to be the keynote of the Administration, the sooner it is found out the better. If brave words are to be backed up by weak actions, let us know what to expect. If the Minister of the Interior is simply to be the recording clerk of an unseen and insatiable mob of office-seekers, instead of the responsible representative of the people, let him say so, and the people and the Legislature will govern their action accordingly; but the present weak-kneed policy of good Lord, good Devil, is neither one thing nor the other. It does not placate the spoilsmen, and it certainly disgusts honest citizens.

The action of the Administration concerning this appointment is being watched with anxiety, as it may be the turning point of their fortunes. Although the appointment lies entirely with the Minister of the Interior, the whole Administration will be judged by it.

Obituary. Mrs. Mary Akopia, wife of the Rev. S. L. Desha, pastor of the Haili Church at Hilo, died at the residence of her father, Mr. S. Kekumani, at Napoopoo, South Kona, Hawaii, on the 10th of September. Dr. A. Mouritz with promptness and great kindness and attention did all in his power to save her, but God, in his all wise and inscrutable providence had otherwise determined. The deceased was only twenty-six years of age.

The remains were borne to the old mission church, where appropriate funeral services were observed. There the great grandfather of the deceased had worshipped more than sixty years ago. There, too, her grand parents and their families still worship.

Africa Portioned Off Between Germany and England.

England and Germany have arrived at an amicable settlement of their dispute with reference to their colonial territories in Eastern Africa. According to this agreement, the German Sphere of Influence is to include most of the territory south and east of the Lake Victoria Nyanza, while the English Sphere of Influence is to include all that is north of a line stretched from Mombisa on the coast to the middle of the eastern shore of the Lake Victoria Nyanza up to the borders of Egypt and of the Italian Sphere of Influence. In addition to this, England is to have the protectorate in the Sultanate of Zanzibar, and receives in connection with this very important cession Witu and the islands of Manda, Patta and Somali, comprising a coast line of over two hundred miles. The British Sphere of Influence is to include all the territory lying between the first degree of south latitude, the southern borders of Egypt and the coast and the Congo Free State. England has every reason to be satisfied with this arrangement, but there has been a most outspoken denunciation of Lord Salisbury's negotiations because he has offended English susceptibility by ceding to Germany Heligoland, a small island lying north of the mouth of Elbe. Mr. Stanley approves the agreement and praises Lord Salisbury for having accomplished for Great Britain a remarkably favorable arrangement. He is delighted with the result, and thinks that the future of Africa is particularly bright. Mr. Stanley has himself been appointed to the Governorship of the Congo Free State, and it is understood that he has accepted the appointment, and will shortly return to Africa, with his bride, to take charge of that immense territory. This is quite as important an event for the future of Africa as the agreement concluded between Germany and Great Britain.—Exchange.

OUR SAN FRANCISCO LETTER.

Samoa Matters.

Consul General Sewall has selected a site for the proposed American naval station on the Samoan Islands. It is on Pago Pago Bay, facing south, and is surrounded by highlands. The site is located upon a broad tract of land at the western side, and to the north of an arm of the bay. There are 121 acres in all. There is a deep water-frontage suitable for wharves and docks, and good anchorage ground. Storehouses and other necessary buildings will be erected, where a quantity of supplies will be kept on hand for use of vessels in the South Pacific.

Concerning the Samoan treaty Minister Phelps recently said: "It really is not working formally at all yet. At least, its influence so far is not what its provisions intend it to be. As yet they are not operative; they cannot be until the Chief Justice gets here, his decision being the center and power of the simple machinery. But the mere moral influence of the treaty's provisions has kept the natives peaceful for more than a year, and that is a pretty good test."

Mind Reading Feat.

P. Alexander Johnstone, the mind-reader, performed a feat in Chicago, Sept. 10, which eclipsed all similar records. He has been doing many remarkable things there and finally his manager decided to attempt the same test which resulted in the death of the well known mind-reader Bishop in New York—that of finding a name in a register and pronouncing it. A committee of well-known newspaper men and a physician drove in a hack from the Auditorium to the Grand Pacific Hotel by a tortuous route, and going to the register, selected a name. Leaving one of their number in charge of the register, they returned to the Auditorium, where Johnstone had remained in custody of another committeeman. They bandaged his eyes securely. Johnstone instantly rushed downstairs, mounted the box of the carriage, and drove, blindfolded, to the Grand Pacific, avoiding cable-cars and thousands of vehicles on the way. He rushed to the register, turned the leaves rapidly, found the name, repeated it, gave the number of the page and date of the month. On his way back to the Auditorium, Johnstone was taken with a severe chill which threw him into a cataleptic fit. The physicians at first pronounced him dead, but after working over him two hours life was again perceptible. At night the mind-reader was resting comfortably, but was exceedingly weak.

General News.

The Duke of Portland's Memoir won the St. Leger stakes at the Doncaster September Meeting, September 10th. Blue Green second, Gonsalvo third.

At the Maple Avenue Driving Park, Elmira, N.Y., September 8th, the world's record for high jumping was broken by the horse Roseberry, owned by Moorehouse & Pepper of Toronto, who cleared the bars at seven feet and five-eighths of an inch. The best previous record also made by Roseberry, at Chicago, was six feet eleven and three-quarter inches.

Ethel Curtis, 19 years old, a typewriter and stenographer, was smoking cigarettes in bed at her home on Lexington avenue, New York, September 5th, when she fell asleep and the cigarette dropped from her hand, and ignited the bed clothes. The girl was so terribly burned about the body that she afterward died of her burns at Bellevue Hospital.

A fatally destructive hurricane in the North of Italy, September 9th, did much damage at Belluno, and destroyed many bridges and houses in Zolda Valley. Twenty-two bodies have already been recovered from the debris of ruined buildings, and it is feared the remains of other victims of the storm are still buried under the ruins of dwellings.

The Serbian newspaper Sioboda states that all Austrians are to be dismissed from the State service in Serbia at once. The article is supposed to have been inspired by Russia.

The deadly grip, that carried off so many people last winter, has reappeared at Washington, notwithstanding all assertions to the contrary, and the first death from it was reported to the Health Office September 10th. The victim was 7 months old, a child who died three days ago after an illness of about one week.

Investments in Hawaii.

A dispatch from New York dated September 11th says: Levy Mayer, the Chicago lawyer who has been identified with the formation of a number of big English syndicates in this country, went to Europe last summer to find investors in American property and enterprises. He returned yesterday. He said:

"There are two companies which I represent in London, the Anglo-American Investment Company and the city of London Contract Company. The Anglo-American Investment Company has several schemes on foot, each of which is a big investment in itself. It has placed \$9,000,000 in railroads in Arizona and New Mexico, and will probably complete contracts in a few days for the purchase of three large sugar plantations in the Sandwich Islands, now owned by a corporation in Hawaii.

Sporting Items. An injunction is wanted against the Pelican Club in London to restrain them from having glove fights in that city.

It is stated that the Dwyer Bros. have lost \$150,000 in racing this year.

The father of John L. Sullivan died on the 7th inst. at Boston. John is an orphan.

George Dixon, a resident of Toronto, walked across the Niagara gorge on a seven eighths inch cable on the 6th inst.

A race for \$20,000 a side is proposed between Salvo, owned by J. B. Haggis, and Kingston, owned by the Dwyer Bros. A mile and an eighth is the distance proposed. Sullivan's appearance as an actor has caused Kilrain, Ashton, Corbett, Jackson and McCaffrey to want to blossom out on the stage.

Shipping News.

The Spreckels Commercial Co. has purchased all of the Porter Land and Water Co.'s wheat crop in the San Fernando Valley. It consists of 20,000 bushels from the country around Newhall. The firm has bought largely through all the Southern counties. This wheat will be taken to San Diego for shipment to Liverpool.

The Caibarien is ashore at Altata, and is a total loss. The date is not given, and there is no news as to whether the crew were saved or not. She sailed from this port July 11th with a general cargo. E. L. G. Steele & Co. were the owners.

The new shipbuilding syndicate recently formed at Philadelphia has purchased a site of sixty acres on the Delaware just below Spreckels refinery. The shipyard is intended to be the largest in America if not in the world.

Admiral Porter has made a big attack on the vessels of the new American navy on account of their lack of sail power.

An ocean race from Queens-town to New York between the Teutonic and the City of New York was won on the 10th inst. by the Teutonic in 5 days and 20 hours.

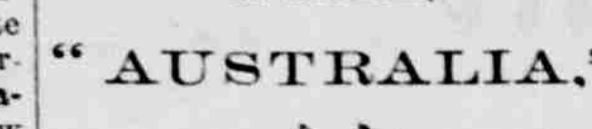

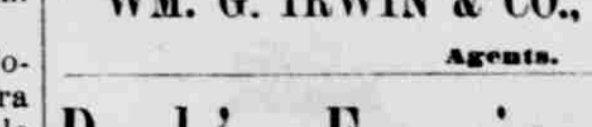

It will be remembered that Mr. Maby wrote from the Volcano house under date of the 11th that the Dana lake had become dead on the 9th, and that he expected to see more changes. The party who were probably at the crater yesterday may have some interesting news to relate when they return to town to-morrow or Wednesday.

MR. F. A. HOSMER.

Of Great Barrington, Mass.—The New President for Oahu College.

When Mr. Bingham withdrew his acceptance of the Presidency of Oahu College, Dr. Hyde had only four weeks left of his allotted time in the States, to secure a president and bring him on.

One week of most diligent search most happily resulted in finding a teacher of the requisite qualifications, who was willing and ready to come to Honolulu. Mr. Hosmer has shown his business and executive ability in closing up his business, selling his house and furniture, saying good bye to his friends, and leaving San Francisco for Honolulu, all in three weeks' time.

Mr. Hosmer is a native of Woburn, a graduate of Amherst College, of the class of 1875. The first year after graduation he taught in the High School at Brimfield, Mass., where Dr. Hyde was once pastor.

He taught two years in Palmer, Mass. But for ten years he has been the successful and popular principal of the High School in Great Barrington, Mass., the native town of Rev. Dr. Beckwith. Maurice Beckwith has been for several years one of his pupils. Mr. Hosmer has been particularly favored in securing the good will and awakening the enthusiasm of his pupils. De Boies, the young negro who graduated this year at Harvard University with his highest honors, began his student career under Mr. Hosmer. Many of his pupils have entered Williams, Cornell, and other colleges of high grade. He was strongly recommended by Prof. Hitchcock for the High School in Portland, but declined the invitation. More recently also he was invited to the Lynn High School, to which he declined to go. But he found special attractions in the Presidency of Oahu College, and a successful future is prophesied for him by his many personal admirers.

The people of Great Barrington tendered him a farewell reception at the beautiful stone church built by Mrs. Hopkins of San Francisco. There were strong testimonies given of his helpful influence over more than 500 pupils. A most fitting memento was presented, a portfolio of water color sketches in and around Great Barrington. The Berkshire "Courier," with which Mr. Hosmer had been connected on its editorial staff, has given its testimony to his worth as a citizen and a man in an editorial article from which we quote: "The High School has had a steady career of growth and usefulness up to the time of Mr. Hosmer's resignation. It has been attended by a good many young men and women from other towns, who had the intelligence to appreciate its advantages. Mr. Hosmer gave his whole time and strength to the welfare of his pupils. No one of them ever sought his counsel and assistance to be met with indifference. Any pupil, who for any reason, needed extra aid and instruction, received it without stint. After their graduation, Mr. Hosmer took an active concern in helping them to obtain employment as teachers and otherwise. The relations between himself and his scholars were always admirable on both sides, dignified, courteous, yet familiar; and he receives from all who have been under his instruction that intelligent and abiding esteem which is the good teacher's best reward. Mr. Hosmer has always been a good citizen, interested in whatever would contribute to the public improvement. He was one of the original organizers of our Free Public Library, and has always given to it a great deal of care and labor. He has done good service as a member of the town's School Committee. As a teacher in the Sunday School of the Congregational Church, and in all ways open to him, he has tried to do his part towards the advancement of society. It would be the general wish that Mr. and Mrs. Hosmer should remain here, but he has been called to a far-distant position of honor and responsibility, and as he and his wife journey to their island home, they will be followed by the good wishes of everybody in this town."
