RESOLUTIONS TODAY

Two Introduced by C. Brown and One by Crabbe.

ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE  
APPEALS TO SENATE

Wants to Know What to Do With Old Bills—Chairman Refuses to Give His Sanction.

In the Senate this forenoon, Mr. C. Brown introduced two joint resolutions, one dealing with the reapportionment of the membership of the Senate and House of Representatives and the other providing for the long and short term Senators. Both these were laid on the table, the Independents and Republicans voting solid for and against respectively.

Another thing done was the introduction by Mr. Crabbe of a resolution to the effect that bills amounting to \$2527.25 be authorized paid, by the Senate. The resolution expressly states that the new Committee on Accounts does not care to take upon themselves the responsibility of paying the bills and therefore submits the whole thing to the Senate. At the bottom of the resolution is this:

I submitted the above bills for action by the Senate. I could not approve these bills.

When the Senate met this forenoon, the clerk read a communication from Secretary Cooper to the effect that the Governor had signed the following bills:

An Act relating to the sale of alcohol: amending Section 15, and repealing Sections 10, 13 and 24 of Act 64 of the Session Laws of 1896.

An Act to amend Section 45 of Chapter LVII of the Session Laws of 1892, relating to cases of absence, disqualification and vacancy in the offices of Circuit Judges.

An Act to provide for the promulgation of the Laws.

Several communications from the House, submitting bills passed in third reading, were read, the bills passed in first reading and then submitted to the usual course.

Mr. White presented a petition from residents of Lahaina, asking for a water pipe for the town. This was laid on the table to be considered with the Appropriation bill.

House bill 83, relating to hydro-carbon gas for Honolulu was reconsidered, a couple of amendments inserted and the bill passed in third reading unanimously.

The resolution of Mr. Crabbe with reference to bills contracted by the Senate and already referred to above, was adopted.

Mr. C. Brown introduced the following joint resolution relating to the reapportionment of the membership of the Senate and House of Representatives:

Whereas, Section 55 of the Organic Act provides that the Legislature at its first regular session after the census enumeration be ascertained, and from time to time thereafter, shall re-appoint the membership in the Senate and House of Representatives among the Senatorial and Representative Districts on the basis of the population in each of said Districts, who are citizens of the Territory. And Whereas, said census enumeration has been duly ascertained.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Territory of Hawaii. That for the purpose of reapportioning the membership in the Senate, the Territory of Hawaii is divided into the following Senatorial Districts, viz.:

- First District—Island of Hawaii.
- Second District—Islands of Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Kahoolawe.
- Third District—Island of Oahu.
- Fourth District—Islands of Kauai and Niihau.

That the electors of said Districts shall be entitled to elect Senators as follows:

- In the First District, four.
- In the Second District, three.
- In the Third District, seven.
- In the Fourth District, one.

That for the purpose of apportioning the membership in the House of Representatives, the Territory of Hawaii is divided into the following Representative Districts, viz.:

- First District—That portion of the Island of Hawaii known as Puna, Hilo and Hamakua.
- Second District—That portion of the Island of Hawaii known as Kau, Kona, and Kohala.
- Third District—The Islands of Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Kahoolawe.
- Fourth District—That portion of the Island of Oahu lying east and south of Nuuanu street, and a line drawn in extension thereof from the Nuuanu pali to Makapuu point.
- Fifth District—That portion of the Island of Oahu lying west and north of the Fourth District.
- Sixth District—The Islands of Kauai and Niihau.

That the electors in said District shall be entitled to elect Representatives as follows:

- In the First District, four.
- In the Second District, four.
- In the Third District, six.
- In the Fourth District, seven.
- In the Fifth District, seven.
- In the Sixth District, two.

This resolution was laid on the table and then Mr. C. Brown introduced the following concurrent resolution:

Whereas, under Section 30 of the Organic Act, it is provided that seven of the Senators elected at the first general election shall hold office for the term of two years only, the details of such apportionment to be provided for by the Legislature. And

Whereas, nothing has as yet been done by the Legislature to apportion such term of office.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Territory of Hawaii, That the several Senators elected in the First, Second, Third and Fourth Senatorial Districts, at the first general election held in the Territory of Hawaii, who received the lowest number of votes, shall each hold office for the term of two years from the date of such election.

That for the First Senatorial District, J. D. Paris and N. Russel, having received the lowest number of ballots cast, shall each hold office as a Senator for such District, for the term of two years.

That for the Second Senatorial District, William White having received the lowest number of ballots cast, shall hold office as a Senator for such District for the term of two years.

That for the Third Senatorial District, D. Kanaha, George R. Carter and D. Kalauokalani, having respectively received the lowest number of votes cast, shall each hold office as a Senator for such District for the term of two years.

That for the Fourth Senatorial District, I. H. Kahilina having received the lowest number of ballots cast, shall hold office as a Senator for such District for the term of two years.

The motion to lay this resolution on the table was put and the majority voted in the affirmative. The chair was just about to announce the vote when Mr. C. Brown arose to a point of order to the effect that all those whose names appeared in the resolution, had no right to vote. The chair was pondering over this when the motion to take a recess until 2 o'clock was made and carried.

GOVERNOR DOLE  
CHARGES BRIBERY

At the mass meeting of citizens and voters of the Territory, upwards of a thousand in number, which met on the drill shed grounds Saturday evening to listen to Senators and Representatives on the matter of the extension of the present session of the Legislature, the following set of resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Be it resolved, in mass meeting assembled by the citizens of the Territory of Hawaii held in Haimoipo Square, on Saturday evening, April 27, 1901, that by unanimous acclamation, and as expressing the will of the people, we are in favor of extending the present session of the Legislature, according to the spirit of the resolutions presented to Governor S. B. Dole by the House of Representatives and Senate, so that our Legislature may complete their work on important and necessary measures now before them, for the welfare and interest of the citizens of the Territory of Hawaii.

Be it further resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded and presented by the following committee of five: R. N. Boyd, C. B. Malle, J. W. Kualuku, I. W. Pipikane, and T. C. Polikapa, to S. B. Dole, Governor of the Territory of Hawaii.

During the meeting of the Governor's Council this morning, the committee named in the resolution, called at the executive chamber. Business was suspended and the committee fled into the room and Mr. R. N. Boyd, the chairman and spokesman presenting the resolutions of the people to Governor Dole, awaited until the personal offices had been completed.

Governor Dole quietly told the committee that he had received resolutions of the same nature from both the Senate and the House and that he had, on both occasions, refused to give his sanction to a prolongation of the present session.

The Governor went on to give his reasons for not granting the extension

which had been asked for. There had been a waste of the public funds and nothing had been accomplished.

It was at this point that the Governor, speaking in the Hawaiian tongue stated that he knew bribery had been carried on during the present session—members of the Legislature had accepted money to do certain things during the session.

All the while the natives of the committee were listening very carefully and when Mr. Dole had finished this charge, Mr. Boyd said:

"Governor, this is a most serious charge you make and it is one that every man of honor among us wants to see proved. You say you know that bribery has been carried on. Now then, we are very anxious to know and we want the names of the men who have been bribed and the circumstances of such bribery in order that we may report to the Legislature and in order that punishment may immediately be meted out to the guilty ones."

The Governor did a little clearing of the throat, glanced around the room, said that such a thing was very hard to prove and then branched off into another matter that was about as far from bribery as he could conveniently manage at the time.

After the meeting with the Governor, the natives fled out of the room. One of the committee, in speaking of the matter later on, said:

"From the remarks of the Governor, I do not believe that an extension of the session of even fifteen days will be granted. In fact, we did not expect it. The meeting Saturday night was to complete a little noise which we have prepared for Governor Dole. He has refused to grant the prayers of the Senate and House for an extension of the present session and now, if he refuses to grant a resolution from the people it will simply resolve itself into this:

"Damn the Senate! Damn the House of Representatives!! Damn the People!!"

"How will that look to the people in Washington?"

THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL SELECT PATRONESSES

In the Executive Council today Governor Dole was present after an absence of nearly two weeks from his office.

The application of Dr. Raymond for certain water rights on Maui was considered. It was finally voted to allow him a perpetual lease on one half of the water developed upon a certain tract, providing the grant can be legally made. The legal phase of the matter was referred to Attorney General D. L.

A. Thurston was present with a proposition to extend the Hilo railroad through the town of Hilo. With some slight changes suggested by Surveyor Wall the proposition was approved and submitted.

The bids for dredging the Waikiki beach between the reef and the mainland were presented by Mr. McCandless. After discussion the bid of Colton Bros. was accepted as the best. The firm is required to begin work within thirty days.

HAILI ORGAN INSTALLED.

On Friday evening, April 19, there was an organ recital in the Hall church at Hilo. The instrument used being the new one just recently installed. The program throughout was excellent, all the selections being applauded enthusiastically. Miss Cranz, who was accorded the honor of opening the organ, did her work well. The Hilo Orchestra, Mrs. Bartels, Mrs. Lewis and Mr. Howland took part in the program. Over \$100 was taken in at the door and this will go toward the entertainment of the Hawaiian Evangelical Association which meets in Hilo in June. Mr. Bergstrom of the Bergstrom Co., the firm installing the organ, gave personal attention to the organ during its trial.

HEALANI MINSTRELS.

The Healani minstrels will meet tomorrow night at 7:15 o'clock on account of the opera. On Wednesday night the mandolin club will meet for practice in Ernest Kani's music studio in the love building. On Friday evening the chorus will meet again, and every one is asked to be present. The burlesque on Sappho was read about last Friday night and the way the boys collapsed left no doubts as to its success.

Some Bad Weather  
Yesterday Morning

Yesterday morning between 4 and 5 o'clock, Honolulu was treated to a heavy thunder storm accompanied by vivid flashes of lightning and a strong wind which sprung up suddenly from the southwest. During the heaviest part of the blow, the barkentine Benicia and the bark Hesper, moored in naval row, carried away their stern lines and drifted onto their anchor chains. One time the vessels came together but so gently as to do no damage.

Assistant Harbormaster Fris was early on the scene and hauled the two vessels back to their original position, securely mooring them anew, so they would be in no danger in case of another blow.

LAHAINA IS JUBILANT

Lahaina was by no means behind the times in making a struggle for the county seat. On Thursday evening last a mass meeting was held, resolutions passed and a committee appointed to urge the claims of Lahaina before the Legislature. The delegates appointed to carry the resolutions to Honolulu were ready to start when a message was received by wireless telegraph that evening saying that the county bill had passed with Lahaina as the county seat of Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Kahoolawe.

This good news obliterated the necessity of the delegates going but copies of the resolution were forwarded by the Kinaiu, to the Governor of the Territory, to members of his council and to all members of both branches of the Legislature. Lahaina is jubilant over the news.

SOUTH STREET RUNAWAY.

There was a bad runaway near the Stock Yards stable Sunday afternoon. Hack 55, driven by a former mounted patrolman, was standing near the trough outside the stables and the driver had just removed the bridle from his horse's head in order to allow the animal greater freedom in drinking. For some unknown reason the horse began to kick and then, becoming frightened, started off. Although the driver had the reins in his hands, he could do nothing, as the bridle had been removed. The horse dashed past the stables and then turned out on the first road leading to Kewalo. In doing this, the hack was thrown over and smashed and the horse was flung with great force upon the ground. Stablemen arrived and the animal was quickly unharnessed before he could arise.

ELKS TO HAVE HOME.

At the first regular meeting held by the local lodge of Elks, by a big majority, it was voted to incorporate and build an Elks' Home. It is the intention to incorporate for \$40,000 and erect a well appointed three-story building. A committee has been appointed to consider different locations for a site and make recommendations.

The idea so far as perfected is to turn the lower story of the new building over to business purposes. The second and third floors to be made into attractive club home and lodge room for the Elks. Fred J. Church was elected to be trustee for the short term.

COMPANY B WINS.

Company B clinched their hold on the McCarty Cup yesterday by defeating Companies F and G in the annual shoot for the trophy. The score was: Co. B, 665; Co. F, 588; Co. G, 533 with fourteen men.

The interest over the event was quite high, as it gave Co. B a chance to even up a few old scores. The best scores of the day were made by Johnson, 44; O'Connor, 41; and Mullen, 44. Co. B, and Sam Johnson, 44; Gouvela, 44 and Tracey, 44, of Co. F. For Co. G, Kulike, Rose and Morse made the largest scores, each making 42 points.

Companies B and F will shoot a return match next Sunday afternoon for \$50 a side, Co. F being somewhat dissatisfied with yesterday's match.

The old fashioned riding party arranged by Queen Liliuokalani for Saturday afternoon, turned out to be a very successful affair. In the neighborhood of a dozen young Hawaiians took part. The ladies wore the old time pa'us of brightly colored cloth, while the men wore tight fitting suits, broad brimmed hats and a profusion of leis. The party rode through the streets and out to Kapiolani park. It goes without saying that many curious eyes followed them as they rode along.

There were sixty-four cases on the Police Court calendar this morning. Of those twenty-seven were for drunkenness, fourteen were for disturbing the quiet of the night and the others were charged with crimes from assault to murder in driving without a light.

EMMELUTH GOES  
OVER THE EXPENSES

Expense of the Government is Greater Than California.

SETTLEMENT COMMITTEE  
REPORT IN THE HOUSE

House Accepts Oahu Electric Bill as Amended by the Senate—Little Done Outside Reading the Reports.

The House convened promptly on time this morning. The Oahu Ice & Electric Company's bill came back from the Senate with an amendment that the tax on the franchise should be 2 1/2 per cent of the gross receipts. The amendment was concurred in.

The report of the special joint committee which visited the leper settlement at Kalaupapa early in the session was read. This is the same report as that submitted to the Senate Saturday. It was adopted.

Emmeluth then introduced a report from the Committee on Public Expenditures which was in part as follows:

Assuming the population to have averaged 115,000 during the three years covered by the appropriations, it cost a total of \$5,518,859.66, or a per capita cost per annum of \$19.58. In California the State cost shown by the last reports was \$1.66, while in the city of San Francisco, having perhaps one of the most costly of municipal establishments, the amount of all taxes, per capita was only \$5.43.

In May, 1900, the appropriation for salaries and payrolls was enlarged by the addition of \$410,658, making a grand total of \$2,745,442 for the period to December 31st of this year. These appropriations were made by the Council of State. Those made by the Legislature of 1898, amounted to \$1,268,458, including appropriations amounting to \$44,260, rendered inoperative by the Organic Act. The cost to the government of maintaining the leper settlement amounted to \$305,265. The insane asylum cost \$91,977; hospitals, \$39,210. The Attorney General's expenses were about as follows: Incidental, civil criminal expenses, that is, cigars, meals, hack, etc., footed up well on the program. Stationery amounting to \$2,295, stamps \$919, typewriting \$1574, sundries \$317, and "ice" \$337, also figured on the list.

The consular expedition list was also large. Sending one man to the United States for four months amounted to \$5,020. Another trip to London cost \$1,424. A trip of eight months to Washington cost \$8023.

The Public Works expenditures were also very large. An amount of \$76,542 had been expended on the Pali road, but \$1436 had been saved on the Kalia pumping plant by hiring day labor. There were still unpaid bills to the amount of \$86,900, besides \$75,000 still due the Japanese Government, over the Japanese-Hawaiian compromise.

The House took the usual noon recess before any action was taken on the report.

John Piver, manager of the Healani minstrels, complains that the sweet singers and black face artists are a little shy at rehearsals. There will be a rehearsal tomorrow evening at which the minstrels are all expected to be present, especially the chorus.

STRIKE IS IMMINENT

The chances are good for a general strike among journeymen plumbers, beginning Wednesday. Two plumbers, working for John Nott, quit today and it is believed they will be followed in their walk out by the thirty-five or forty others who compose the working force in that line in the city. It is understood that the walk out will occur Wednesday morning.

The following notices were posted in the shops of twelve master plumbers this morning:

"This shop will not pay more than \$5 for a day's work to either foremen or journeymen plumbers."  
The walk out of the two Nott men immediately followed. The journeymen made a demand a couple of weeks ago for \$8 per day after May 1. The master plumbers will not pay this, saying that they already pay \$1 per day more than is paid to other mechanics.  
A strike at this time would stop a great deal of important work.

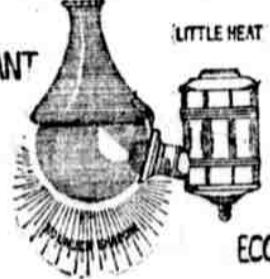

## MASS MEETING TO SEEK EXTENSION

### Natives on Drill Shed Grounds Adopt Set of Resolutions.

### SPEAKERS ACCUSE THE REPUBLICAN MEMBERS

#### Say They Have Sought to Obstruct Legislation—Beckley Tells About Loan Bill—Delegate Wilcox Speaks.

The mass meeting on the parade grounds in front of the drill shed Saturday night was attended by a very large crowd. It is estimated that nearly a thousand were present. The object of the meeting was the consideration of a resolution looking toward the extension of the present session of the Legislature for the purpose of completing important work. The reasons for asking Governor Dole for an extension, were very forcibly presented by speakers from the Senate and House of Representatives.

Mr. Kalaokalani who presided at the meeting, was the first to speak. His remarks were listened to with great interest. In the beginning of his speech, he lifted a great mass of bills, in his hands and showed these to the people as representing a part of the work that had been done during the session. The Independents had not wasted the time as had been accused. Their promises to the people had been fulfilled. In order to complete the work of the session, there should be an extension. Fifteen days would be plenty enough. A great mass of work was all but completed and, to choke everything off at this stage, would mean nothing short of disaster. The Governor was unjust. Both the Senate and House had asked for an extension of the session. Since he had persisted in refusing, the only way left was to appeal to the people.

Mr. Kanoho of the House blamed the natives of Oahu for the dilemma in which the Legislature had found itself. He claimed that the Oahuans did not stand by their colors and that, by electing Messrs. Achi and Cecil Brown, they had sent obstructionists to the Legislature.

Mr. Hiblo of the House voiced the sentiments of the previous speakers. He was very hoarse and gave as the reason for this, the steady work, which he had done day and night in the interests of the people.

Mr. Kanuha of the Senate said that the refusal of the Governor to extend the session was only a trick of the Republican party, at whose door could be laid the blame for the shortcomings of the present Legislature. Mr. Kanuha then went on to talk about the recent plague epidemic and referred to what he considered to be the shameful treatment of the poor people. He stated further that, had it not been for the fact that the Legislature was in session when the last plague scare was attempted in Honolulu, there would have been a repetition of the scenes of the epidemic.

Mr. Beckley of the House was one of the most forceful speakers of the evening. He also blamed the Republicans as the ones who had obstructed legislation and created the present state of affairs. Then he referred to the Loan bill which had come down from the Senate, saying that he had purposely withheld it from the House for a purpose. He then spoke of the accusation against the Independents to the effect that they had wasted the money of the public. He pointed to the drill shed and said he had drilled there for a long time. When it came to wasting money, it was at the military that the Legislature could point an accusing finger.

Mr. Puuki of the House advised all those concerned to go home and pray to the Lord for what they wished to accomplish just as Daniel did in the lions' den.

The speeches were concluded by Delegate Wilcox who said that an extension of the session was absolutely necessary. There were important bills such as the Municipal, Loan and Appropriation bills which should be passed. He urged the adoption of the resolution which was to be presented to them saying that, in case the government should refuse to grant the prayer of the people they had done their part. The people at Washington were watching and would have something to say later on.

Mr. R. N. Boyd then arose, read the resolution asking the Governor for an extension, and then called for three cheers by all those who favored the adoption of the resolution. There was a ringing cheer that could have been heard for blocks and then the meeting adjourned.

### ODD FELLOWS ANNIVERSARY.

The Odd Fellows of Honolulu celebrated in fine style Friday night the eighty-second anniversary of their order. The celebration took place at Progress hall and was a happy event. A literary and musical program occupied the early evening.

These exercises consisted of a prayer by Rev. Alexander Macintosh, anniversary proclamation by J. D. McVeigh, music by Miss Iola Barber, violin; selections by Prof. Sharp's orchestra, and a bright paper by Sister S. L. Williams on the Rebekah branch of the order.

At the close of the literary and musical program, the floor was cleared for dancing. The committee in charge of the entertainment were:

Peace was apparently restored yesterday, as the crew was at work clearing away the wreck of the Villard's jibboom and its rigging in the morning. She will get away late tonight or tomorrow.

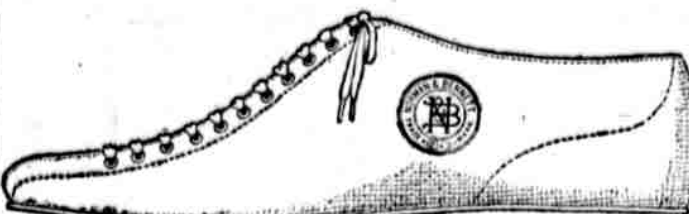

Total 71300 bags. Kahulu is generally figuring in the charter parties of most of the coal ships from Newcastle and the Sound. From its geographical position to windward of all the other island ports it is being selected in preference to Honolulu, as a port of call for orders.
