THEIRBACH TAKES HIS LIFE

COULD NOT LIVE WITHOUT HIS SWEETHEART.

Suicide of the Book-keeper in Davey Co.'s Gallery—Had Received Sad News From San Francisco.

Charles Thierbach, book-keeper in Davey & Co.'s photograph gallery, committed suicide this morning by taking a large dose of cyanide of potassium. His body, stiff in death, was found shortly before 1 o'clock this afternoon, in his lodgings in the Popular house, on Fort street. He left nothing to explain his rash action, but on a card found on his dressing table was written: "Notify C. Thierbach, 1979 Washington street, San Francisco."

By the last mail from the coast Thierbach received word that his sweetheart, who resides there, was at the point of death, and could not possibly live. The news depressed him very much, but he never said anything about it except to his associates in the gallery. The young man had been seriously ill, with ear trouble, for several weeks, and had not yet sufficiently recovered to resume his duties at the gallery. It is supposed that his illness and the bad news he had received led him to believe that life was not worth living.

Last night Thierbach was about the city as usual, and seemed to be in a cheerful mood. This morning, about 7:30 o'clock, he was seen by his landlady, Mrs. Bettis, to whom he remarked that he had not slept during the night. He said that he would lie down for a while and asked to be called at 10 o'clock. Later he stuck his head out of the half opened door and told Mrs. Bettis not to call him, as he would not get up until he awakened. That was the last seen of the young man alive.

Paddy Ryan occupies the room adjoining the one occupied by Thierbach. When he went home at noon he tried Thierbach's door and found it locked. Half an hour later he inquired of Mrs. Bettis where the young man was, and on learning that he had not yet left his room, became alarmed. Ryan again tried to arouse Thierbach and fainting, burst in the door. He found the body on the floor, and saw at a glance that life was extinct. A half emptied glass, containing some white powder and water, told the story of his death. The stuff proved to be cyanide of potassium, a poison that kills in five seconds. It was easily obtained by Thierbach, as it is used in photography.

Dr. Miner was summoned to examine the body, as he had been attending Thierbach during his recent illness. Deputy Marshal Hitchcock was also notified and took charge of the remains, which were not removed to the morgue. Little is known of the deceased here. He came to Honolulu about five months ago with a veriscope show, which did not pay, and he severed his connection with it to take a position as book-keeper in Davey's gallery. As nearly as can be learned, Thierbach was about 28 years of age, and native of San Francisco. His mother died when he was a child, and he was brought up by a sister, who resides in San Francisco at the present time. He had never spoken of a sweetheart until he received word by the last steamer from the coast. Thierbach was apparently well educated. He was plentifully supplied with money, for there is still in Mr. Davey's hands a considerable sum for which he has never asked. Mr. Davey knew him in San Francisco as the manager of Foss' branch photographic store, under the Palace hotel.

An inquest will be held by Marshal Brown tomorrow morning.

NEW STOCK ISSUED TODAY

BIG IMPROVEMENTS ON PIONEER MILL PLANTATION.

Capital Stock Increased \$150,000—About \$250,000 Appropriated for Pumping Plants and Wells.

The Pioneer Mill Company today issued \$150,000 additional stock, increasing its capital stock from \$600,000 to \$750,000.

The stock was given out pro rate to the stockholders of the company at the par value of \$100 per share. A great many shares changed hands during the day, the purchasers paying \$165 for each share. The market held firm at this figure. This gave the shareholders a profit of \$65 on every share. Pioneer Mill stock has sold at \$165 for some time. It has reached \$175.

The money realized from the new stock has been appropriated toward putting in extensive improvements on the plantation. A new pumping plant will be put up and several wells will be sunk. The total cost reaches \$250,000, of which \$100,000 was provided out of the revenues of last year's crop.

This vast improvements will add very materially to the plantation. The plantation is located at Lahaia, Maui, and is ably managed by A. Ahlborn. Paul Isenberg is president of the company and John F. Hackfeld vice president.

LITTLE TOTS PLAY.
The Government band played at Queen Emma hall this morning for the amusement of the Kindergarten children. The little tots put in the morning playing games and marching about the grounds to the tune of the music. Miss Lawrence, the directress of the Kindergarten, is highly pleased with the past month's work.

IMPRISONED WHALENS.
Secretary Gage has requested the Secretary of the Interior to instruct the Alaskan officials to gather about 600 head of reindeer from the government herd for the use of the expedition for the relief of the ice bound whalers in the Arctic. The herd, which will be killed for food if necessary, will be driven overland, and it is the confident expectation that they will reach the imprisoned whalers before the middle of February. The route over which the herd will be driven is said to abound in moss upon which the reindeer feed, and it is agreed that the scheme is feasible, and will be attended with little danger. The eight vessels now ice bound have a combined compliment of 265 men.

SHIPS FOR JAPAN.
Japanese Keep Increasing Their Fleet Rapidly.
The Japanese authorities placed orders in July last for four men of war, as follows: In England, an iron clad of 15,000 tons displacement, 4500 horse power, 18 knots speed, to be completed by October, 1899; a first class cruiser, displacement 9855 tons, 18,000 horse power, and 20 knots speed to be completed by April, 1898; a first class cruiser, displacement 9855 tons, 18,000 horse power, and 20 knots speed to be finished by June, 1898. To Germany, a first class cruiser, displacement 9800 tons, 15,900 horse power and 20 knots speed, ordered in September last, and to be finished in April, 1900.

Porter & Ordway today pray for judgment on the demurrer filed in their suit against the Canadian and Australia S. S. Co.

TURKISH EMBASSY HARD UP.
A Berlin dispatch says: The condition of the members of the Turkish embassy is deplorable. None of them has received his salary for over a year, and their debts in this city aggregate 1,500,000 marks. Their creditors are importuning them for their money.

To make room for the grand display of Christmas goods, Iwakami, the hotel street merchant, will hold a clearance sale to commence Saturday, December 4th. Everything will be disposed of at "sacrifice" prices. The sale will be held at his old store on Hotel street.

GOODS FOR CHRISTMAS.
The opening of the Christmas display of Holiday Goods in the big store formerly occupied by Ehlers & Co., on Bethel street, was a grand success, and has been viewed by many. This stock was imported by Iwakami, the Hotel street merchant, and will be the place for Christmas bargains.

WILL MAKE IT A SUCCESS

NEW OWNERS OF KOHA'S BIG COFFEE PLANTATION.

Will Put a Competent Manager in Charge of the Property—Purchasers and Their Plans.

There was a short meeting of the new purchasers of the Kona Tea and Coffee company's property in the office of Theo. H. Davies & Co. this morning. But very little was accomplished. Another meeting will be held either on Saturday or Monday to complete all details for the reorganization of the company.

Harry Lewis, who bought in the property for \$30,000 at the public auction sale on Monday, has associated with him in the enterprise, Theo. H. Davies & Co., Tom May, Fred J. Lowrey and F. A. Schaefer.

One thing has been decided upon at least. The plantation will be conducted in proper shape. A competent man will be given the management of the plantation. One of the first things to be attended to will be the pruning of the trees and putting the plantation in good condition. This will require quite a little expenditure.

Last year's crop did not amount to much, but the '98 crop, it is believed, will be a good one.

The agency of the plantation has been given to Theo. H. Davies & Co. The name of the company has not yet been decided upon.

One of the stockholders said this morning that the plantation would be owned by a close corporation, but little if any of the stock being offered for sale. It is the determination of the new owners he said to make a success of the plantation.

Harry Lewis, Tom May, F. A. Schaefer and Fred J. Lowrey were stockholders in the old company and lost in the enterprise.

The news that this big plantation will be run in first class shape by the new owners will be received with the greatest delight by the residents in Kona. It was the starting of this mammoth plantation that encouraged others to go into coffee cultivation, and Kona's present prosperity is due in a great extent to the establishment of the Kona Coffee and Tea Company.

A PAINFUL ACCIDENT.

Mrs. Deming of San Francisco, who with her daughters are guests at the Hawaiian hotel, met with a painful accident last evening. While getting out of a carriage in front of the hotel she slipped and fell, breaking her arm. Medical attendance was summoned, and the unfortunate lady carried to her room. Today she is suffering considerably from the pain and shock. Mrs. Deming had planned to return home on the Moana, but her departure may now be postponed.

VALUE OF COCONUTS.

E. Lindeman's Plantation on Kauai is Prospering.

The planting of coconuts has been profitably attempted by E. Lindeman on Kauai. He set out 2000 Samoan nuts which began to bear fruit at the age of four years. His trees are now five years old and he says each tree will produce 1.00 worth of Copra at present.

The Samoan tree is an early bearer, and would be a splendid tree for thousands of acres of our coast land which are good for nothing else. Vegetable fats are becoming very popular among a large class of consumers who fear to use diseased animal products. Through recent improved methods the fatty oils of copra are manufactured into an article of food the demand for which cannot be supplied.

All the makai lands of Kaiakea will make ideal coconut plantations. The stony lands of Puna, worthless for cultivation, would produce coconuts. The expense of maintenance would be next to nothing. Twenty acres in copra.

TWO PICTURES.

Two handsome pieces of Japanese work appear in the windows of the Pacific Hardware Company. They are pictures, painted on silk, representing naval scenes during the civil war. Surrounding the pictures are patriotic designs very finely embroidered. The Pacific Hardware Company has framed them for a private party.

DR. GUPPY HEARD FROM.

Dr. Guppy, who spent a considerable time in scientific investigations in these islands during the past year, writes to The Star that he is now in Fiji, and is studying the botanical growth at the mouth of the Rewa river. He says it is very different work to making scientific observations at the top of Mauna Loa. The doctor reports himself in good health, and says he is much interested in his work. He has furnished The Star with information relative to the Labor Question in the Colony, which will be of interest to the planters here.

THE BOHEMIAN MEMORIAL

PICTURES OF JULES TAVERNIER'S TOMB.

"Uncle George" Bromley Visits the Grave of His Old Friend—Joseph Tilden Buried Here.

The steamer Mogna will carry away to San Francisco next Thursday a large, finely colored portrait of "Uncle George" Bromley, standing over the grave of Jules Tavernier, in Nuuanu cemetery.

The picture, which was cleverly executed by Photographer Frank Davey, will be given a prominent position in the Bohemian club building of San Francisco. The dead artist is held in loving memory by the members of this organization. During his life Tavernier was always a favorite at the club and a view of his grave with "Uncle George" Bromley at the tombstone will be put among the invaluable collection of portraits now held by the club.

The large granite tombstone on Tavernier's grave was sent from San Francisco by the Bohemian club. It bears the inscription: "In memory of Jules Tavernier, artist, by the members of the Bohemian club." In the picture the grave is decorated with flowers, while the big rugged monument, which is artistic, even in its crude state, is encircled with leis made by the Hawaiian people, whom the dead artist loved so dearly during his lifetime.

Jules Tavernier is well remembered in Honolulu. He came here from San Francisco to make his home. His paintings are celebrated in the United States. Among his cleverest bits of art was a painting of the mid-summer high jinks of the Bohemian club up in the Redwoods of California. The painting was hung up on the club room walls. Col. W. H. L. Flower, a prominent Bohemian, was so well pleased with the work, that he had Tavernier paint a duplicate, for which he paid \$500.

"Uncle George" Bromley also visited the grave of Joseph Tilden, another Bohemian, who lost his life several years ago in a hotel fire.

A CHANCE FOR DREYFUS.

PARIS, November 29.—General Saussier, the military governor of Paris, has appointed General Pellieux to inquire into the charges brought against Count Esterhazy, a former major of French infantry, who has been charged by Mathieu Dreyfus, brother of the former Captain Dreyfus, of the French army, of being guilty of the crime for which Alfred Dreyfus is now undergoing a sentence of imprisonment for life.

JAMES McINERNEY'S CURIO.

Has an Earthen Pot With Grass Growing on the Outside.

James McInerney has an oddity on exhibit in the McInerney store which he brought back with him from the States. It is an earthen pot and on the outer side a healthy growth of green grass. The grass seen was put on the pot after it had been in water for several days. To keep the grass alive water is kept on the inside of the pot. Mr. McInerney planted the grass seed three days ago and the grass is now nearly an inch long. It will grow somewhat longer and will live several weeks.

A number of people have examined the pot with much astonishment.

HIG FLEET OF VESSELS UP TO WINDWARD.

Long Passages Due to Contrary Wind —Anchor Recovered Off Kilauea— Water Front Notes and Gossip.

The Kinnu will sail for Hawaii and Maui ports tomorrow morning.

The next steamship to the coast will be the Moana, due to leave here on the 9th.

The bark Encore is now about due from Valparaiso, with a cargo of nitrates. She will likely get a sugar charter.

The P. M. S. S. Rio de Janeiro is due here on Saturday morning, and is not expected before that time. The next vessel from the coast will be the Australia due here on Tuesday of next week.

The Kaala arrived last evening from windward ports, with 1400 bags of paddy and 30 of rice. Captain Mosher reports that Kahuku will commence grinding today, and has promise of the biggest crop ever known there.

The Hawaii departed this morning for Honolulu, with the new sugar mill and a lot of additional freight. She is a big carrier and was loaded deep. The heavy machinery of the new mill was put aboard without any accident.

There is supposed to be a big fleet of coast vessels up to the windward, waiting for a favorable breeze to blow them into the Mokohai channel. The Albert is the longest out, having sailed from San Francisco 21 days ago.

The bark Fresno is overdue from the Sound with a lumber cargo. It is very likely that the next favorable wind will fill the harbor with foreign vessels.

Sugar is commencing to pile up on Kauai, and additional steamers will soon have to be put on to handle the business. Lihue is running day and night, and turning out about 1500 bags every twenty-four hours. There were 2000 bags in the warehouse there when the James Makee sailed, and 7000 bags at Kilauea. There are 5000 bags of paddy in the warehouse at Hanalei.

The James Makee arrived in this morning with 2550 bags of Kilauea sugar, which is going into the Bryant at the Wilder wharf. She will sail again this afternoon for Kapua, with a cargo of coal. While the James Makee was lying off Kilauea on Tuesday last, Captain Tullet discovered an anchor, with a few fathoms of chain, on the bottom, in about five fathoms of water. A diver was sent down and passed a rope around it, and the anchor was hauled aboard. It proved to be a good one, but little the worse for wear, and is supposed to be the one lost by the Mikahala about a year ago.

IT WAS SWALLOWED UP. Railroad and Station Sinks Out of Sight Into the Earth.

LARNED, Kans., November 19.—The railroad and station of Rosedale on the bank of the Santa Fe, has been swallowed up by the earth, and today there is a dark stagnant pool of water where three hours ago stood a grain elevator and several small buildings. The swallowing process occurred during the night. The drift of the water is unknown. Sticks thrown into the pool are sucked out of sight, as if by a monster undertow, although on the surface the water has a placid appearance. Hundreds of people visited the scene, and found the bottom had dropped completely out of the land, upon which the hamlet was situated, leaving in its stead a hollow.

Similar freak occurred in Mead county about ten years ago. The phenomenon has given rise to the theory that there is a great river or sea under all western Kansas.

AGRICULTURAL FAIRS.

A correspondent yesterday suggested that a fair be held in Honolulu, and that agricultural products be sent thither for display. Some fifteen years or so ago we used to have an Agricultural Society that inaugurated a flower show, and the display of dairy products, vegetables, fruits and domestic animals. Prizes were given for three or four years, but after that time it came to grief, exactly why, the writer cannot remember. Then there were for a year or two flower shows held on King street, domestic animals, and dairy products and vegetables no longer being displayed. But this also came to an end, and for many years nothing has been done in this line.

The suggestion made is a very good one, and those who are interested in the minor industries should agitate among themselves and get up such an exhibition. There is hardly a town in the United States and in England that does not have its agricultural show at some time in the year. The yearly display is of great benefit to the producer; he sees what others are doing, and learns from their successes. Such a show would make a very pleasant break in the monotony of the year, and many would come to it from the other Islands. Indeed there is no reason why such shows should be confined to Honolulu. Each Island might have its show, at some period of the year, suitable to the particular agricultural industries.

In a matter of this kind the Commissioner of Agriculture should take the lead. It is clearly in his province to draw up plans for such a purpose, and funds would be forthcoming if the affair were agitated by that department of the government.

But this is only one branch of what ought to be done. Several years ago the present writer suggested that the small producers should join together and start an emporium for purely Island products, and thus sell direct to the consumer. The goods so sold were to be marked as coming from the particular ranch which shipped them, and in this way a reputation for particular excellence might be built up, and stuff not worth twenty cents a pound would not be put alongside gilt edged butter, and sold under the generic name of "Fresh Island Butter," as it is at present.

Were there such a central distributing point Island vegetables and fruit would take a distinct place in the market. There is no reason why we should get cauliflower from California, when we can raise just as good an article here. We can raise all the grapes we need, in fact there are quantities of garden and orchard produce which we need, are constantly asking for, which could be produced here if there was some systematic way of getting the produce before those who are asking for it. As it is now, Island products are lost among the mass of foreign products, with which the grocer's store is necessarily filled.

It is to be hoped that these suggestions will meet with the approval of some of our practical farmers and that action may be taken in the matter at an early date.

A PRETTY STORY.

A very pretty instance of autocratic sovereignty has been displayed recently in Russia. As is well known the Czar, Alexander II, had a left handed wife. Monarchs have a way of having left handed wives who receive titles and honors. The left handed wives of other people are apt to receive evil names instead of titles, but this by the way. Alexander II also left a large family by his "Princess" and like a good father provided handsomely for them. The little fortune amounted to \$30,000,000, and Baron von Taube was made trustee of the property. The Baron recognized that the laborer is worthy of his hire and managed to get away with the modest amount of \$4,000,000, or in plain words embezzled that sum. The Princess found out the peculations and brought suit against the Baron. The latter, in self defense, began giving so many unsavory details of the late Emperor's life, to whose Don Juan he had played a life-long Leporello, that the present Emperor wished to stop the trial. The Baron's guilt was clearly proven, but the Emperor wished the Princess to drop the case, offering to

pay the \$4,000,000 out of his private purse if she did. But the Princess was pig headed and wished to punish her Baron, so the Emperor finally made use of his autocratic power, and stopped the case. Being very wrath, he now refuses to pay the \$4,000,000, so the Princess has lost both her revenge and her dollars.

But this gives a very unsavory picture of court life, and one that the republican can use with somewhat telling force, when he comes to argue about the ways of monarchs and their relations with their subjects. Here we have in the first instance a monarch defying the moral law. We have one of his tools steeping himself in crime, and then we have the head of the State stepping in and interfering with what justice can be obtained, by quashing the proceedings summarily. Is it any wonder that Nihilism is rampant throughout a country where such can occur. Autocracy is untamed and unclipped monarchy. It is monarchy at its very worst, but the germ of autocracy lies in monarchy, and all men who love freedom, know that the only true safety of liberty lies in clipping monarchy of every scrap of power, and vesting it in the people. There is only one form of government that a freedom loving people should have, and that is a republic.

Several gentlemen who are interested in building up and developing the city and are putting good hard cash into fine buildings, are anxious to know why the work of widening Fort street is not commenced at once. They say that every day of delay will mean extra expense to the government, as the value of Fort street property is advancing rapidly, and the government will have to pay more for condemned property in proportion to the advance. The last Legislature appropriated \$200,000 for this purpose, and the funds are available. Property owners are naturally indifferent as the widening of the street only means a lot of extra trouble in tearing down and putting up buildings that are flush with the old street line. Naturally they are willing to put off the evil day, knowing that the longer the delay, the more damages they can get from the government. Meanwhile the builders and developers find themselves handicapped by the narrowness of the street.

The Honolulu public cannot complain about not being able to obtain books in cheap form. All the stationers' shops have lines of books at rates that must satisfy the most moderate purse. Standard works are to be obtained, neatly bound, printed on good paper and in clear type, from anywhere from 25 cents to 75 cents. Copies of Dickens, Thackeray, the principal poets and many of the modern authors are to be obtained at these cheap prices. No one can complain that it is impossible to buy books in this city. All this is due to the typographic machine.

DASH AT HEADLONG SPEED

RUNAWAY DRAY CAUSES GREAT

wood. But luckily nothing was in the
way except the light express wagon
mentioned, and it soon lost its identi-
ty. The team wheeled into the stable
on South street. The gate was closed
but they dashed into it, breaking it
down and coming to a dead stop in the
wreck. None of the horses were hurt.

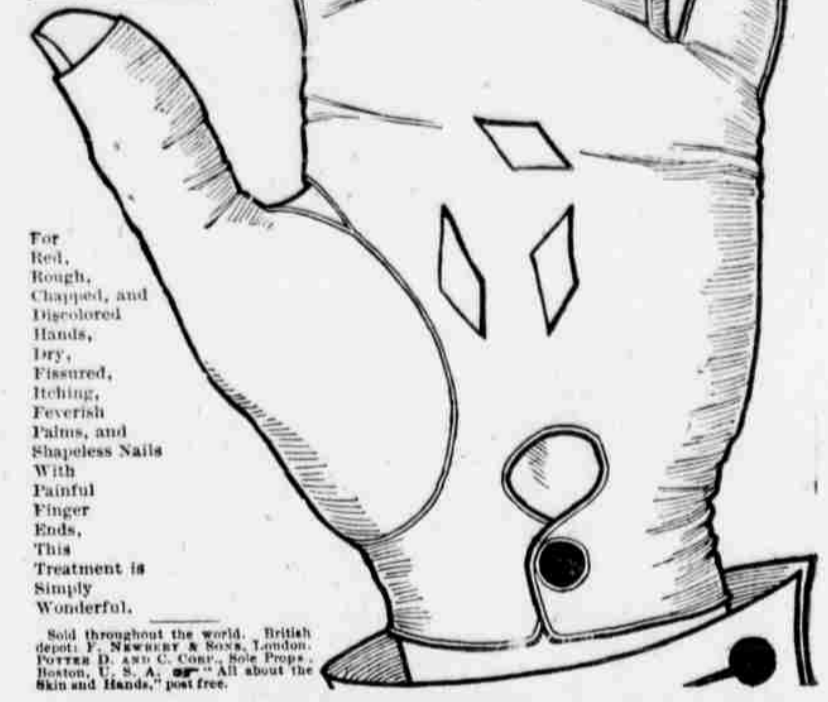


