There was one vote in the Senate and another in the House against the cable contract.

A Scotch syndicate has opened its doors at Billings, Mont., for the purchase and slaughtering of horses for beef for foreign trade.

A halt has been called on the 'Tiger' blackguardism of Congressman Hilborn and 'Spreckels.' L. A. Thurston protests against the trades of abuse lodged at Mr. Hilborn for no greater an offense than gentle expression of an opinion on Hawaiian affairs.

It is not yet clear that the Board of Education could not do more for the school cause and the community interest by building a suitable high school in a proper location instead of taking over an abandoned mansion for the purpose.

In the House debate on cable, Minister Hatch head of the foreign office, was quick to deprecate the suggestion of one of the members that Washington legislation bearing on Hawaii might be shaped by private or entirely personal ideas of President Cleveland.

The custom house editorial in this day's 'Tiger' praises that bureau to the extent of saying that 'honest, if abortive, attempts have been made to prevent opium smuggling.' That the work in this field has been confined almost entirely to 'attempts,' and that these 'attempts' have been 'abortive,' is notorious.

THE CHICAGO OF 1825

A VILLAGE WHICH PRESENTED NO "THRILLING PROSPECTS."

The Country Throughout Offered Few Features, and There Was Nothing Worthy of Ecstasy—A Report That Failed Completely as a Prophecy.

The Chicago of nearly 75 years ago did not present an inviting appearance. The party of Keating and Lang left Fort Wayne in May to discover the source of the St. Peter's river.

"Our path led us over the scene of the bloody massacre which occurred in 1812, when the garrison of Chicago was destroyed by the Potawatomies. No traces are now to be seen of the massacre."

"The appearance of the country near Chicago offers but few features. There is too much uniformity in the scenery. The extensive water prospect is a waste uncheckered by islands and unsheltered by spreading canyas."

"The village presents no thrilling prospects, as notwithstanding its activity it consists of but few huts, inhabited by a miserable race of men, scarcely equal to the Indians, from whom they are descended. Their log or bark houses are low, filthy and disgusting, displaying not the least trace of comfort."

"Chicago is perhaps one of the oldest settlements in the Indian country. Its name, derived from the Potawatomian language, signifies either 'skunk' or 'wild onion.' Mention is made of this place as having been visited in 1671 by Perot, who found 'Chicago' to be the residence of a powerful chief of the Miami."

"As a place of business it offers no inducement to the settler, for the whole annual amount of trade on the lake did not exceed the cargoes of five schooners, even when the garrison received its supplies from Mackinaw."

"It is not impossible that some distant day when the big banks of the Illinois shall have been covered with a dense population and when the low prairies which extend between that river and Fort Wayne shall have acquired a population proportionate to the produce which they can yield, Chicago may become one of the points in direct communication between the northern lakes and the Mississippi."

"The Indians were chiefly Potawatomies, but intermixed with Ottawa and Chippewas. Among many charges against these Indians there is none more horrible than the charge of cannibalism. This has been denied, but it has been acknowledged by the Indians themselves, and it has been uniformly admitted by the interpreters and traders who have long resided with them."

"It is a common superstition with them that the taste of the body of a brave man acquires a part of his valor, and if he can eat of his heart, which by them is considered as the seat of all courage, the share of bravery which accrues from it is still greater."

"Captain Wells is still mentioned as the bravest white man with whom they ever met. He had almost become one of their number and had united himself to a descendant of Little Turtle."

"At the commencement of hostilities between the British and Americans he sided with his own countrymen, while the Indians of this vicinity all passed into the British service. Wells was killed. After the action his body was divided, and his heart was shared, as being the most certain spell for courage, and part of it was sent to the various tribes in alliance with the Potawatomies, while they themselves feasted upon the rest."

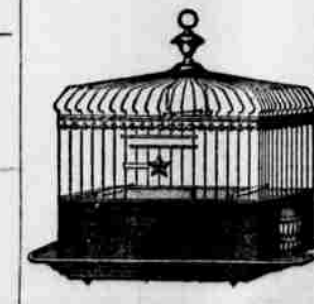
