## Violent End of a Criminal Career.

New York, April 13.—The police were startled today by the announcement that the well-known Madame Restell had been found dead early this morning in the bath room in her mansion on Fifth Avenue. By Judge Stewart, of the District Attorney's office, was called by the woman's family at an early hour and informed that she had retired late last night, leaving dependent about her trial, which was to have taken place today. She rose in the night and went into the bath-room, where she fell dead. She stated last night to a friend that she did not care what might be the result of the trial, so far as her own fate was concerned; she only cared for the reputation and feelings of her grandchildren. Ever since her arrest she has manifested great fear and anxiety on account of a belief that the prosecution intended to bring other charges against her in reference to old cases. This belief had taken possession of her mind—that it almost amounted to hallucination. The neighbors of her family said she was very nervous all day yesterday, and showed symptoms of mental derangement. The suicide was discovered about 8 o'clock this morning.

The notorious Madame Restell referred to above has figured for many years in the great city of New York, and amassed a large fortune in the practice of a very questionable profession. Such was the influence she would command through the use of her wealth and the efforts of influential citizens that although it was a notorious fact that she was violating the law daily, that up to a recent period she could always escape punishment. In connection with the prosecution of her suit we find the following in a New York paper, which is more than likely true, and that this bold, bad woman is still alive and safe from punishment for her life of crime:

New York, April 13.—This afternoon it was positively ascertained at police headquarters that Madame Restell had called for Europe, and that a body from the morgue had been purchased and packed off as hers at the funeral.

## To the Editor of the Hawaiian Gazette:

Sir,—The straggled women (sent to Section 513 of the Civil Code, introduced May 4th, by Hon. Mr. Nakalea), should be summarily repealed. It is as follows: that the King, Foreign Diplomatic Corps, and their attaches, clergymen and parties licensed to preach, teachers of schools, soldiers in actual service and members of Fire Departments, be exempt from taxation, excepting that owned by the state. Schools and graveyards, the burden of taxation should rest equally on all, King and peasant. Many shoulders must bear light work. Diplomats and their attaches should be taxed or not taxed, just as the custom is in other nations. This country is not wealthy enough to exempt them from taxation if it is usual for them to be taxed by other nations; if not, of course they should be exempt. If school teachers are unable to pay their taxes their salaries should be raised; they are engaged in a noble and arduous avocation and should be well paid. The stability and prosperity of the state depend on the intelligence of the average citizen and therefore it is good economy to pay the teachers liberally.

The education forms the common bond; it is as the tie that binds the friends together. Clergymen, and all parties licensed to preach. This, is evidently the pill that is to be sugared in between the King and Fire Department. The honorable member should be careful and not permit himself to be used as a stalking horse by greedy ecclesiastics; there is no earthly or heavenly reason that they should not pay their full proportion of taxes. If gospel exponents are to be exempt from taxation, so must lawyers and physicians—all the professions must be treated alike. The priesthood here and elsewhere always try to evade their fair proportion of taxes on account of their heavenly character, at the same time they are extremely fond of earthly possessions, the camel and the needle have no terrors for them. The accumulation and exemption from taxation of ecclesiastical property have produced in other countries great revolutions, want, ignorance and oppression. Let Hawaii beware and scotch the monster. If theology is not sufficiently remunerative and the flies avoid the parlor of the spiders, let the D. D.'s betake themselves to the cultivation of rice and sugar. It is doubtful if the morals of the community would suffer if every "clergyman and all parties licensed to preach" were to become planters. Soldiers in actual service; it would be difficult for the country to do too much for our veterans, losses of a hundred fights with John Barleycorn. It is claimed that the system can be so developed as to furnish steam at fifty pounds pressure transmitted through twenty miles of pipe, thus applying power for engine and manufacturing, and steam for cooking and laundry purposes, for extinguishing conflagrations, for clearing streets of ice or snow, or protecting hydrants from frost.

**ANNA JACOBS vs. THOMAS CUMMINS**  
Before Harris, C. J., and Judd and McCully, J.J.  
Chief Justice Harris delivered the decision of  
the Court as follows:  
In this action the plaintiff claims dower in  
a certain piece of land sold by her late husband,  
Samuel Jacobs, in his lifetime to the Defendant,  
and the first point made by the defendant is,  
that at the trial, the presiding Judge was asked  
to instruct the jury.  
First, That this being a possessory action the  
jury must be satisfied that, at the time of the  
commencement of this action, the defendant was  
in possession of the land in dispute.  
Secondly, That the plaintiff not having elected  
to accept her dower instead of the provision made  
for her by will, she cannot maintain this action.  
These instructions were refused by the presiding  
Justice, and such refusal duly excepted to.  
The presiding Justice left this question to the  
jury. Is the plaintiff entitled to dower?  
By this Court an action to determine  
the right of dower and by no possibility  
could the plaintiff in this action recover possession  
of any of the land in question, since by showing  
herself entitled to dower, she, by no means, gets  
a judgment for any particular piece of the land, but  
only establishes her right to have her one-third  
set off in accordance with the statute; she there-  
fore has proceeded against the person who has  
title to the land, and it could make no difference  
to her who was actually occupying the land at  
the moment of the commencement of the action.  
The Judge, therefore, very properly declined to  
instruct the jury that it was a possessory action,  
or that the plaintiff should be shown to be in  
possession of the land, if he was shown to have  
the title of the land. Upon the second point,  
namely, that the plaintiff did not elect to accept  
her dower, instead of the provision made for her  
by her husband's will. The statute itself does  
not provide that her failure to make an election  
shall bar her of her dower; but merely says that  
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
