NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

For a Noble for the Island of Oahu, to Fill the Vacancy Caused by the Death of the Late Hon. Samuel G. Wilder, and of the Rules and Regulations Governing Such Election.

In accordance with the power vested in the Cabinet by Article 80 of the Constitution, to make and publish all necessary rules and regulations for the holding of elections prior to the passage by the Legislature of appropriate laws for such purpose, notice is hereby given:

1. That an election will be held on the Island of Oahu, on WEDNESDAY, the 22d day of August, 1888, to fill the vacancy in the office of Noble for said Island, caused by the death of the late Hon. Samuel G. Wilder.

2. That the Rules and Regulations governing the administering of oaths, the registration of voters and holding elections for Nobles and Representatives published by the Cabinet in conformity with said Article 80 of the Constitution, on the 25th day of July, 1887, as amended on the 8th day of August, 1887, except as hereby modified, shall govern such election.

3. Rules 15 and 17 of the Rules and Regulations above referred to are hereby repealed so far as may affect the election hereby ordered, and the following rules shall govern the matters therein referred to, viz: "Rule 15. The chairman of each Board designated to register voters for Nobles shall at least seven days before the holding of the election hereby ordered, make out from the Register of Voters entitled to vote for Nobles, a correct alphabetical list of all the persons qualified to vote for Nobles residing in the precinct for which he is appointed, and cause copies of the same to be posted at the place in such precinct where the election is to be held; and at the same time he shall in like manner from such Register make out lists of all persons qualified to vote for Nobles, residing in the other precincts or wards respectively in such election district, and shall send to each chairman of the Boards of Inspectors in such district a copy of the list of persons qualified to vote for Nobles residing in his precinct or ward."

"Rule 17. The Boards of Inspectors designated to prepare lists of voters for Nobles shall hold at least two sessions of reasonable and sufficient length, at some convenient place in the district, not less than four nor more than seven days pre-

ceding the said day hereby appointed for holding said election, for the purpose of receiving evidence of the qualifications, and of registering the names, of persons who may not have been previously registered by the Inspectors and who may claim a right to vote; and also for the purpose of correcting, when necessary, said lists."

4. For the purposes of this election the District of Honolulu shall be and hereby is divided into three polling precincts, divided as follows:

FIRST PRECINCT. Ward 1; Ward 2; Ward 3.

SECOND PRECINCT. Ward 4; Ward 5.

THIRD PRECINCT. Ward 6; Ward 7; Ward 8; Ward 9.

5. The polling place for the First Precinct shall be House of Engine Company number 4.

The polling place for the Second Precinct shall be the Bell Tower.

The polling place for the Third Precinct shall be the Rifles' Armory.

YESTERDAY afternoon recorded another victory for the cause of responsible government against absolutism. The bill requiring books to be kept in Hawaiian or some European language was passed by a vote of 36 to 2. We do not propose to enlarge on the merits of the bill, which perhaps contains some rather severe provisions. The real issue was even more clearly recognized than before, and the vote shows that the House, instead of retrograding, stands more firmly than ever on its former position. If Mr. Kauihi had not added one more to the list of his indiscretions, the vote would have stood the Hon. Mr. Paeahoale against the House and the country.

Bills which have passed their third reading are always sent to His Majesty with the following clause: "Approved this \_\_\_ day of \_\_\_ 1888," and then follows a space for the signature. The blanks in the vetoed bill had been filled up on the seventh day of August, and then hastily scratched out again, showing that on that day His Majesty intended to sign the bill. The whole public will doubtless now be speculating as to what caused His Majesty to change his mind so suddenly. It is certainly an inquiry of curious interest, not without historical parallel. The truth is that His Majesty has conceived so extraordinary an affection for the new Constitution that he is even a trifle over-sensitive as to any law which may by any possibility contravene any of its provisions. Doubtless the Constitutional objections occurred to His Majesty just in time to restrain his royal hand from the act of signature.

THERE are two names prominently before the public for election to fill the vacant seat of Noble for the Island of Oahu, those of William C. Wilder and H. W. Schmidt of Hackfeld & Co. Both are excellent men, whose loyalty to the principles of the reform party can be depended upon. Either will be of help and assistance in the Legislature. Probably neither has had any particular legislative experience, but as far as that is concerned good sense and intelligence, both of which are possessed in a large degree by both gentlemen, go a long way to make up for lack of experience.

It is rumored that two or three of the delegates chosen from some of the Wards are not properly entitled to act, never having joined the Reform Ward Associations. This should be looked into, as the convention ought to be truly representative.

The coming election is of great importance. The Noble to be elected may not have much voice or influence in the present Legislature, but the Assembly will not have adjourned before he will take his seat. He may be called upon to vote on very important questions. The House is not so large but that every vote is of great importance. It is never safe to sleep in face of the enemy. In politics it may be said that the enemy is ever in front. The enemy in our case are those who would restore the former condition of disorder, extravagance and corruption. Alone, they are in a hopeless minority, but, joined with those of the reform party who may be discon-

tented and those whose votes will be lost by staying at home, they may be very strong. It is a time for work, not for inaction. It will not do to permit anyone who is lukewarm or an enemy to be elected, by default. Every nerve will be strained to fill the vacant seat with someone who will try to undo the work so far accomplished toward constitutional government and to support the King in his endeavor to regain lost power.

There are other reasons why a good man should be elected to fill the present vacancy, besides those specified above. The moral effect of a victory is something which can never be left out of account. There are of course soreheads in the reform party, men who are disappointed in the attitude which affairs have taken, and who thirst for a change. What party is free from such men? The members of the reform party are like the draught of fish in a great net—they are of all sorts and kinds, some far below as well as some far above the average tone of the movement. Those who are below it always confound men with measures, and lose sight of principle altogether because this or that man has failed to be appointed to some particular office. It behooves the voters who believe that, after making every deduction, the present Ministry and Legislature are doing efficient work for the cause of honest and responsible government; to assert that belief at the polls, by bringing in an overwhelming majority for a candidate who represents and sympathizes with that cause.

The prestige of a strong majority returned for either Mr. W. C. Wilder or Mr. Schmidt (and we believe that either will represent the country honorably) will be very great. The opportunity is offered to the Government, by the election, to submit itself and its principles once more to the test of popular approval. We earnestly exhort everyone who has the good of the country at heart to bury prejudice and personal pique, and every merely personal grievance, and prove, as it can easily be proved, that the cause of public honesty and public order is as strong here to-day as it was a year ago.

The Oahu Railroad.

MR. EDITOR: I notice in your paper of to-day a letter from Mr. Gribble. As this gentleman has, much to my surprise, raised a question of veracity, I feel it my duty to reply, and will be as brief as possible. In regard to the points in the interview or "dialogue" disputed by Mr. Gribble, I maintain they are absolutely as reported. I have made no statements which I do not know, or believe, are true, to which I would make oath.

In regard to Mr. Gribble's reference to the \$450,000 for building twelve miles of street railway, I beg herewith to submit a copy of that portion of the Hawaiian Tramways Company prospectus, which refers to the contract for building the twelve miles of road. \$90,000 is not quite \$450,000; this I will admit, unless computed at \$5 to the pound, as was proposed in the first set of bonds sent from England. The paragraph in said prospectus is as follows:

The present holders of the concession, Messrs. Kinnet & Co., by a contract dated the 23d March, 1888, between themselves of the one part and the company of the other part, have agreed to transfer the concession to the company, and to undertake the entire construction and equipment of the above mentioned lines, and at their own expense to manage and work the same for three months after completion, for \$90,000, payable in cash, debentures, or shares. The present issue will provide for this payment and leave \$5,000 for working capital, which is considered ample. There is also a contract dated the 23d March, 1888, between the company and Mr. Theodore Graham Gribble with reference to his appointment as engineer to the company.

Mr. Gribble has referred twice to the publication I made of the Tramways Prospectus, as though some wrong had been committed. It is a public document, and I can see no reason why the people in this country should not read it, unless Mr. Gribble thinks his suggestion to me—not to show the original copy (which was sent to me by a friend in England), "as people here might not understand it"—was not duly regarded by me. Mr. Gribble says: "The idea of giving the Tramways Company a controlling interest in the steam railway by the subscription of the majority of the stock originated absolutely with Mr. Dillingham." This statement is simply overwhelming. When I was given to understand by Mr. Gribble that he must have the control of the Pearl River road or he would oppose me, I did very reluctantly try to make an agreement that would protect the rights I claim in the enterprise in question, without a collision with the Tramways Company. Accordingly after our return from the trip in the country, I drew up a form of agreement, and met Mr. Gribble by appointment in the evening. One of the first points of objection raised by him was the right I had reserved for the people in this country to raise 49 per cent. of the capital. He anticipated my intention to secure if possible two more shares after the scheme should be floated, and thus hold the control, and he told me frankly that if we bought two shares more we would have the control, and said his friends would not agree to such a proposition. He forthwith cut the option for subscribers here down to 40 per cent. He objected to nearly every point I made, and finally I told him to draw up what he thought the agreement should be. As time passed on I became convinced that it could be impossible for us to agree; I could see no good reason why I should be forced to sign any agreement of the kind.

The "practical question" to which Mr. Gribble refers, in closing, I beg to touch upon. If the Tramways Company

are ready to make a contract to build the road, so are the proposed Home Company ready to make a contract for the same purpose. And under a fair franchise, such as I have asked for, if the road can be built at all without a larger subsidy, which Mr. Gribble urged should be asked for, I am confident the road will be built. B. THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Sixty-first Day.

FRIDAY, AUG. 10.

The House met at 10 o'clock, a. m., the President, Hon. W. R. Castle, in the chair. Absent: Ministers Green, Austin, Thurston and Ashford; Nobles Robinson, Dowsett, Jaeger, Smith, Foster, Wall, Campbell, Widemann, Makee, Wilcox, Bertelmann; Reps. Hustace, Dowsett, Kaulaoka, Kauihi, Kinney, Maguire, Kamaoaha, Horner, Gay. Minutes read and confirmed.

Noble Hitchcock moved the following: Resolved, that on and after Monday next, August 13, the daily sessions of this House commence at 9 o'clock a. m. Adopted.

ORDER OF THE DAY. Security for Depositors.—Third reading of the bill: to give greater security to depositors in the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank. Passed.

Tax Assessors and Collectors.—Second reading of the bill, introduced by Minister Green, July 21, to amend and regulate the law relating to the appointment and tenure of office of tax assessors and collectors, and the assessment of taxes. Taken up section by section, with the report of select committee, 7th inst., thereon.

Section 1 divides the Kingdom into four districts, (1) Oahu, (2) Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Kahoolawe, (3) Hawaii, (4) Kauai and Niihau.

Section 2 requires the appointment, on or before April 1, 1889, of an Assessor of taxes, for each taxation district.

THE SECOND VETO MESSAGE. The following was delivered to the President by a messenger from the King, and read to the House:

To the Hon. W. R. Castle, President of the Legislative Assembly of the Kingdom. Sir,—The bill entitled "An Act to regulate the keeping of books of account by wholesale and retail license," has been submitted for our approval, and I return the same without My signature for the following reasons:

Firstly, Section II. of the Act is in contravention of Article 12th of the Constitution. Secondly, The Act is in contravention of Article 13th of the Constitution.

Thirdly, The Act subjects persons to penalties for dereliction which it may not be in their power to avoid. Such an Act is not only unreasonable and impartial, but oppressive and in restraint of commerce.

Done at our Palace at Iolani Hale on this 7th day of August, A. D., 1888. KALAKAUA, REX.

Laid on the table to be considered after the special order of the day.

ORDER OF THE DAY. Resumed consideration of the tax assessor's bill, at Section 2.

Noble Smith moved to amend by adding, after the word "Cabinet" in line 1, the following: "upon the nomination in writing of a majority of the Nobles of each taxation division."

Noon recess, one hour.

Afternoon. Re-assembled at 1 o'clock.

Consideration of the tax assessor's bill, continued. The amendment proposed by Noble Smith was discussed by the mover and Rep. Kauihi, for; the Attorney-General, Minister of Interior and Noble Young, against.

Noble Hitchcock would like to see assessors elected in the districts where they are to serve. He moved an amendment, to insert in line 2, "and Collector" after the word assessor.

P. Brown moved that the section read, as follows: Section 2. The selection of the Assessor and Collector of taxes for each taxation division, shall be by ballot, cast by the members of the Legislature, in session assembled, and such Assessor so selected shall hold office until his successor is elected by the said ballot.

Rep. Kauihi took the floor and spoke at great length. Members resorted to the lobbies. "No quorum" was called several times.

Noble Young moved the "previous question." Members swarmed in and carried the motion.

Rep. Brown's and Noble Smith's amendments were lost.

Noble Hitchcock's amendment was adopted and the section, so amended, passed, as follows: Section 2. The Minister of Finance, with the approval of the Cabinet, shall on or before the first day of April, 1889, appoint an Assessor and Collector of taxes, hereinafter called the "Assessor," for each taxation division of the Kingdom.

Section 3 passed, minus the word "who," as in a bill.

Section 4. Noble Smith moved to strike out of line 4, the words, "and Collectors." Lost.

Passed as in the bill. Sections 5 and 6 passed as in the bill. The committee recommended striking out of the 7th Section, the word "real," in the fifth line, and the insertion of the words, "in his opinion," after "shall" in the eighth line. Adopted.

Rep. Deacon moved to insert, after "estate," in the fifth line, the words "or personal property." Withdrawn.

consulting with the Ministers, who would be ready to confer with him at any time. They advised him that such a course would have the effect of bringing him into conflict with the Legislature and would therefore be derogatory to the dignity of the Sovereign.

Rep. Kamaoaha asked the Attorney-General and Ministers for their opinions on the merits of the objections set forth in the Veto message.

Minister Ashford said the objections, on constitutional grounds, are not well founded. The obligation to keep books in the prescribed languages, under this Act, would, in the terms of the license, be a matter of open contract. Persons applying for licenses would know the terms beforehand. Similar laws are in operation in other countries. German firms doing business in England keep their books in English, and English firms in Germany keep their books there in German. The provision by which officers of government are authorized to enter a licensee's place of business and see his books had a precedent in the opium license Act of 1886. No search can be unreasonable that is previously bargained for and agreed to. The objection based on Article 13 of the Constitution is of no force. Article 13 has no more bearing on the Act than has the article providing for liberty of worship.

Rep. Kamaoaha said that having heard the matter cleared up satisfactorily, he would vote for the passage of the Act.

Noble Baldwin thought the explanations of the Attorney-General were good and sound. The case has been as fully discussed as necessary. He would not move the previous question, but would call "nainau."

The ayes and noes were taken on the question: "Shall this Act become a law notwithstanding the Veto of the King?" and was decided in the affirmative on the following division:

Judicial Decisions. The opinion of the full Court by Judge Preston, in J. S. Martin vs. L. B. Kerr, malicious prosecution, was filed on the 10th inst. It is signed by all the Judges except Judge Dole, who is absent holding Circuit Court on Kauai. The opinion is on exceptions to the trial Judge (Dole's) charge to the jury, and motion for a new trial based thereon. The Court sustains part of the exceptions, particularly where the jury were told that the withdrawal of the charge against plaintiff (Martin), in the Police Court, was prima facie proof of malice on the part of defendant (Kerr), and concludes: "Our decision is that the verdict and the judgment entered thereon be set aside and a new trial had between the parties, but as Mr. A. C. Smith, a witness in the former trial, has since deceased and his evidence appears to be material, we make it a condition that his evidence, as appears in the bill of exceptions, may be read by either party."

The opinion of the full Court by Judge McCully is rendered in The Ung Wo Sang Co. vs. T. Alo et al., on a motion for counsel for the plaintiff, for the Court to hear a re-argument on the bill. The point at issue is regarding a water course right, whether it was appurtenant to a certain lease or not. The motion for re-argument is denied. Signed by all the Judges except as in the above case. A. S. Hartwell for plaintiffs; Paul Neumann for defendants.

Mr. W. C. Wilder on the Chinese Question.

An ADVERTISER reporter interrogated Mr. W. C. Wilder regarding his attitude toward the bill for keeping accounts in civilized languages, explaining to him that some of his supporters feared he was at a disadvantage, in the keen but friendly rivalry for the Reform nomination for Noble, from his position on that and cognate questions being insufficiently known.

"Yes; I declined to sign the petition to the King to veto the Accounts bill. It was brought to me by Mr. Alo when it contained only about four names, and after reading it I refused to sign it, saying that I was in favor of the bill.

"This was before my name was mentioned as a candidate. I had no idea of seeking the nomination, but it was offered me by many leading men whose names I could give you."

"I know that," remarked the reporter; "one of them has just told me all about it."

"In reply I told them," said Mr. Wilder, "that I accepted the nomination subject to the action of the convention."

"Well, you are on the same footing as Mr. Schmidt in reference to the bill, which is what your supporters want published."

"Yes; I have never expressed my views publicly on the Chinese question in general, but my views privately are well-known to many friends. For years ever since I gave the subject consideration, I have expressed myself decidedly in favor of Chinese restriction."

Mr. Wilder thanked the reporter for the opportunity of gratifying his friends with a statement of his position, and the interviewer, promising to faithfully reproduce the substance of the conversation, withdrew.

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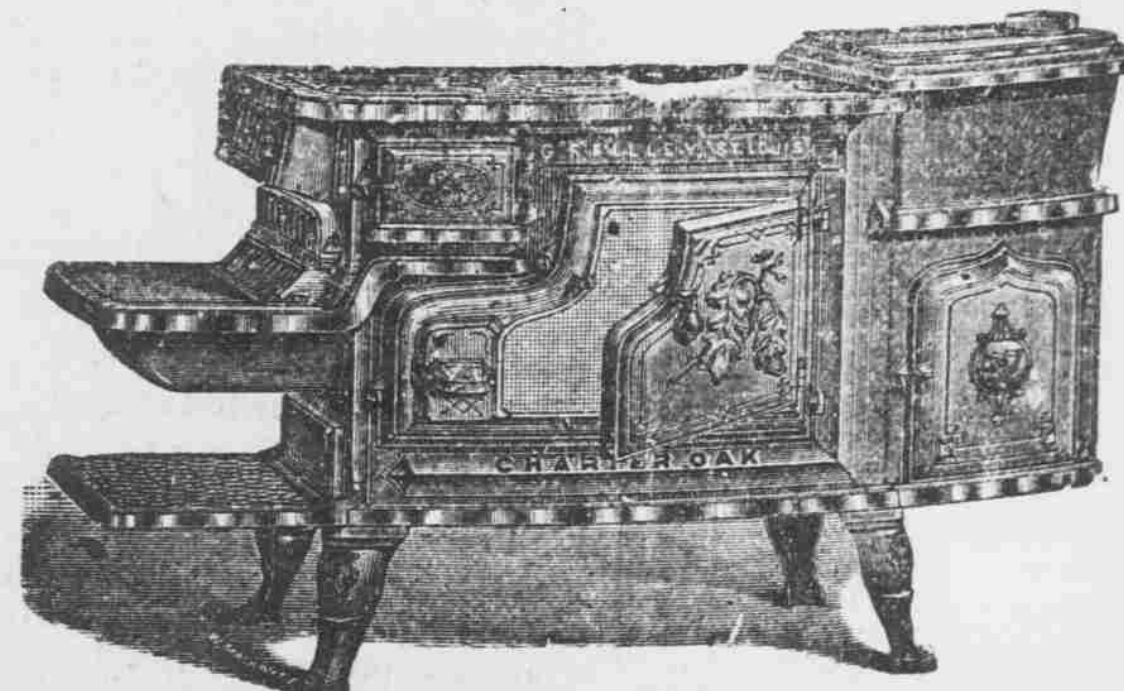
