THE NEW LORD MAYOR.

Justice Wright Declares that His Business Ventures Should be Investigated.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—The Lord Mayor's show, which marked the induction of A. J. Newton into office, was favored to-day by exceptionally brilliant weather. Antiquated floats failed to satisfy the London crowds, poured out in enormous numbers to vent their martial enthusiasm. The streets were lavishly decorated with flags, but the absence of a detachment of the Household Cavalry and the substitution of a number of school-boy brigades testified to the presence of the veterans at the front. A car representing Great Britain surrounded by her sons, the Canadian and Australian volunteers, evoked hearty applause as did the boys of the Duke of York's Royal Military School. The crowds, however, wanted khaki uniforms and refused to be reconciled with the Lord Mayor's coach and other emblems of purely civic power.

In introducing the new Lord Mayor at the law courts this afternoon the Recorder referred to certain charges against Mr. Newton in connection with company promotion and assured the Justices that the Lord Mayor courted the fullest inquiry. The Lord Chief Justice said he had heard the statement with considerable relief, adding, "that the community would heartily rejoice when the Lord Mayor had cleared his reputation."

Mr. Newton is a director in eight companies, some of which are said to be under clouds. One of these companies is described as being so notorious that Justice Wright recently declared it might be necessary to refer it to the attention of the public prosecutor.

Says Ladysmith is Safe for Some Time.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The Telegraph has received the following from its correspondent at Pietermaritzburg:

"I have some hesitation in accepting the rumors of heavy fighting near Ladysmith. The Boers are evidently trying to effect a lodgment around the place whence they can shell the town and camps, but General White's batteries are able to prevent them from closing in too near. Owing to the fact that Ladysmith lies low and the Boers have unluckily been permitted to occupy Mount Bulwan and other of the surrounding big hills, so attempts to open up heliographic communication have proved a failure.

"As regards Estcourt and Pietermaritzburg, they are safe. So is Ladysmith for a long time to come. Two white men, Messrs. Barnard and Hoenkins, who, owing to their knowledge of the district, were able to escape from Ladysmith Sunday night, arrived at Estcourt to-day, having traveled by way of Frere. They rode west, following the Kaffir paths. They report that the Boers have guns north, east and west of the town, namely, on Signal Hill, Mount Bulwan and Pepworth Hill. Beyond killing a few Kaffirs and coolies their shells have done little damage.

"General White, they say, wrote to General Joubert, asking permission to send away the non-combatants. The Boer leader's reply was that the women and children would be received under the guns at Mount Bulwan. All others in the place and the town guard would be prisoners of war. A meeting of the towns people was held, under the presidency of the Mayor, and declined to accept these terms. The audience enthusiastically sang the national anthem."

AMERICA AND ENGLAND.

Ambassador Choate Refers Kindly to their Amicable Relationship

EDINBURGH, Nov. 10.—Joseph Choate, the United States Ambassador, who was the chief guest at the annual banquet of the Walter Scott Club this evening, met with an enthusiastic ovation. Sir Herbert Maxwell, who presided, made a cordial reference to the friendship that seals England and America.

In the course of a speech proposing the toast to literature, Mr. Choate said:

"Truly your country and mine are connected by bonds of sympathy that were never stronger and closer than they are at this very hour. I can assure you that Lord Salisbury's generous and cordial words at the Lord Mayor's banquet yesterday will meet with a quick and hearty response beyond the Atlantic.

"It has been said by a great poet that 'peace hath her victories not less renowned than war,' and this ironclad friendship which now prevails between these two kindred nations is her latest and greatest victory. It means not merely peace between your country and mine, but among all the great nations of the earth, and it tends by advancing civilization to remote the welfare of the whole human race."

THE TREASURY SURPLUS.

It is a rare occurrence that the treasury of a government is over burdened with money, and it is a very unusual spectacle to see bankers and speculators and merchants devising ways and means for emptying the treasury and throwing the moneys of the tax payers into their coffers.

That is however what is happening to-day, and it is amusing to read the opinions of the great financiers who have been interviewed on the subject by the official organ. They all admit that under existing laws the treasury vault must remain closed until congress opens its doors. And then they give numerous advices how to get into the strong box and get hold of the precious coin.

Mr. P. C. Jones and Mr. W. W. Hall are of the opinion that money should be "turned loose" in some shape or other on the present stringent financial market. We are somewhat surprised that the gentlemen don't offer some kind of feasible plan like that adopted by E.O. Hall & Son at one time, when the "sinking" of capital was considered a fine policy. And if the two financiers really desire to relieve the present stringency why not pay out the dividends which certainly must have accumulated from the firm mentioned?

Mr. E. D. Tenney expresses the most intelligent views. He adopts the bold policy of Colonel Spalding and says: "I consider that the only feasible plan to get the money out of the treasury would be to break into it and carry it off." Is Mr. Tenney understudy of the gallant Colonel or simply sarcastic?

The proposition to reduce the rate of interest on the deposits in the Postal Savings Bank, which, to our surprise, the interviewed financiers seem to approve of is simply an outrage, and we should think that the men advocating the scheme must be devoid of the first ideas of national financiering.

Money was plenty and the ordinary interest was 6 percent, when the Postal Savings Bank was instituted. Considering that the Postal Savings Bank was a safe institution people invested their savings in it, accepting 5 percent or 4 1/2 percent on their deposits.

Now money is scarce, according to P. C. Jones and others, and interest is consequently high. It is easy to place money on good security at 8 percent or 9 percent, and yet under such circumstances the Government with its coffers full of money dare to listen to a proposition to reduce the rate of interest to 3 percent on deposits in the Postal Savings Bank.

Has anything more contemptible ever been proposed in the line of public financiering. The private Savings Banks are paying interest at 4 1/2 percent, and for their benefit the Government proposes to force the

depositors out of the Postal Savings Bank by lowering the rate of interest. The Government is secured by the national treasury, what the securities in other banks may be depend perhaps on the value of sugar stocks. Should Mr. Dele's Government attempt the game and really lower the rate of interest on deposits in the Postal Savings Bank, it will have committed the worst blunder it so far ever has done, and that will mean something.

It will be wise to leave the Surplus alone, until we find out what we are at. There is no good reason to spend territorial money on federal property. Hang on to the coin. Mr. Lansing, it may come in very handy for territorial and municipal purposes after Hartwell, Smith & Co. have been defeated in their efforts of creating a Colonial Government for Hawaii with the family compact as a perpetual fixture.

THE SMALL FARMER.

We have heard so much about the "small farmer" and about the wonderful chances he could find here by purchasing land and cultivating his cabbages, vegetables generally, and raising pigs. Where is the market, asks the would be settler? "In Honolulu of course," answers the theorist, who never saw a farm in Hawaii and doesn't know a head of cabbage from his own head.

It is wrong under present circumstances to induce people to come here, act as "small farmers" and then find themselves handicapped by the rates of freight and by the lack of a market where a profit can possibly be made. The dealers in fruits and home produce (besides sugar) have prayed for the arrival of the small farmer but they have never conscientiously been able to encourage him to cast his lot in Hawaii nei.

Let us give an example of the manner in which the "small" farmer is treated by our local steamship monopolists. Mr. D. G. Camarinos, the leading dealer in fruits and provisions received the following letter a few days ago:

HONOLULU, HAWAII,
Nov. 16, 1899.

D. G. CAMARINOS.

Dear Sir:—I have shipped to you per "Noeau" 25 bags cabbages, they are in fresh and good condition. I understand there is a good demand for this in Honolulu so trust you will be able to do well with them if the price is satisfactory I can probably do more business with you.

The freight of this invoice of cabbages was six dollars (\$6.00) and the 25 bags were delivered in a condition that showed they must have been submerged in salt water or placed under the machinery of a sugar mill. The steamer company charging \$6 for freight is not responsible for perishable goods and in this instance cabbage was certainly "perishable" Mr. Camarinos set his men to work to pick out the few heads not damaged but under the circumstances what show have the "small farmers." Do the theorists expect team to buy steamers of their own for the transportation of cabbages?

Lumahaehai's Funeral

The last obsequies of the popular Hawaiian, whose untimely and horrible death was deeply deplored by all, were attended by a large congregation of friends and relatives. Cornwell, Colonel John D. Holt, Jr., Morris Keohokalole and Jesse Makainai.

The ship will sail before the case is heard in the higher Courts, and Captain Sterling of the Great Admiral will bid good riddance to his man.

Planters in Council.

President H. P. Baldwin called to order the 18th annual session of the Hawaiian Sugar Planter's Association yesterday morning and the customary reports were read.

The statement of the Hawaiian Sugar crops from Oct. 1, 1898 to September 30, 1898 showed that it amounted to 282,807 tons, divided as follows: Hawaii, 117,239 tons; Kauai, 65,359; Maui, 54,389 and Oahu 45,820.

The following were elected trustees for 1899-1900; J. B. Atherton, C. Bolte, H. P. Baldwin, G. H. Robertson, C. M. Cooke, W. G. Irwin, F. A. Schaefer, F. M. Swanzy and J. F. Hackfield with the following as officers; C. M. Cooke, president; F. A. Schaefer, vice-president; F. M. Swanzy, treasurer; C. Bolte, secretary, and Geo. H. Robertson, auditor. In taking the President's chair at the afternoon session President Cooke referred to the interesting fact that when the Association was formed the output of Island Sugar was only 18,000 tons instead of, as now, over 250,000.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

It is to be hoped that the road supervisor at once will have the pile of rocks at Pawa, where King street turns into Waikiki, removed. They have for a long time been a menace to the public and no one seems to know why they are there as an obstruction to public traffic. Several accidents have occurred on account of the rocks and the crowning accident was the killing of Major Lumaheibei on Sunday last. Mr. Ouder Kirk will undoubtedly place that important piece of road in proper condition before another unfortunate accident occurs.

The humane officers here look even after rats. A chinaman was fined \$10 in the District Court this morning for ill-treating a rat. The fellow had pinned the feet of the animal to the floor and left it standing in that position. When brought to the police station the animal was still alive. Rats rank with vermin and should be exterminated of course but there are methods in all things. By the way is it not cruel to boil a live lobster? We only ask for information, and in the interest of the lobster the opinion of which on the subject we have not before us. Is there any distinction between boiling a live lobster and "crucifying" a rat? If so we would like to hear about it from our humane officers.

The attention of the world is now centered in South Africa and it may be of interest to those anxiously watching the war reports to learn why the names of the places now at issue were created. Durban is named from Sir Benjamin Durban, who was Governor of the Cape in 1834. Grahamstown and Harismith are named respectively from military commanders—Col. Graham and Col. Sir Harry Smith. Caledon, Beaufort, Somerset, and Cradoes are named from former governors—the Earl of Caledon, Lord C. Somerset, and Sir J. Cradock (Lord Howden.) The towns of Ladysmith, Port Elizabeth, and Lady Grey are called after the wives of Cape governors. Kimberley is named after the Earl of Kimberley, who was Colonial Secretary from 1870 to 1874, when that town advanced from the position of a mushroom camp to that of a permanent mining centre.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The War Department received a dispatch from General Otis stating that hopes of saving the transport Hooker have been abandoned. Her supplies will be taken off and the hulk will be sold at auction in Manila. The vessel was worth about \$150,000.
