IMMIGRATION CO'S TAKE REVENGE.

The Hawaii Shipco says in regard to Japanese immigration:

The Shipco is in receipt of more evidence of the work of the immigration companies in Japan to prevent the coming of Japanese to Hawaii. Not only does it appear that they are working in Yokohama to cause the rejection of immigrants, as intimated in these columns last week, but they have agents in the outer districts of Japan, from which the would-be immigrants come, telling of the alleged difficulties of getting to Hawaii and warning the people against trying to make the journey, as well as spreading falsehoods about harsh treatment after they get there.

As evidence of the work being done in Yokohama, there is a clear and specific cause. The wife of a Honolulu Japanese is one of those who tried to get passage, and her experience, told in a letter to her husband, shows just what is being done to obstruct immigration to Hawaii. It seems to be a matter calling for some action and the Planters might bring it to the attention of the Foreign Office, for it will soon cause a labor shortage here. No matter what is to be the policy in the long run as to labor for Hawaii, whether it be getting laborers from Japan or from America or Europe, for the immediate present Japan is the only source of supply, and it will not do to have it shut off in this way.

The woman in question tried several times to get passage, and was always rejected on account of ill health, as she was told. The physician in charge of the examinations; it is stated, is a white man, a renegade Methodist preacher, who was fired from his church in California and went to Japan, where he seems to have got a hold. He is the man who, as stated last week, found 450 out of 500 applicants for tickets to be in too poor health to be immigrants. In the case of the wife who wanted to come here, he rejected her without the slightest cause, as subsequent events showed. Finding that she was not able to get passage because of some supposed disease, but being determined to join her husband, the woman went to a hospital in Yokohama. She asked for an examination and treatment for whatever was the matter. She didn't know that she was sick in any way, but was ready to take the verdict of the doctors. She took a thorough examination and the doctors told her there was nothing to treat her for. She was healthy and they told her to go,—they couldn't find an excuse for giving her even a pill. Again she applied for passage to Hawaii, and again after the physical examination she was rejected as a passenger.

All this is told in a letter to her husband in Honolulu. The woman wants to know how she can get to Hawaii. She suggests that her husband will have either to send her cabin passage money or at least

money enough to come in the white steerage, as she is unable to get into the Asiatic steerage as long as this grafting doctor is doing the examining.

This case shows clearly what is going on, and a protest should be made. If the coming of laborers is to be stopped in this way, Hawaii will suffer a serious shortage within six months. This has nothing to do with plans for getting white laborers eventually, but is a matter of immediate supply from month to month, to make up for the constant departures. The trouble is caused by the immigration companies. They are determined to show to the planters if possible that they can control the situation, in the hope of forcing the planters to pay them money for assistance in getting labor here. Since the planters have refused to pay them, they are doing all they can to prevent immigration to Hawaii. It's a kind of blackmail. The planters should investigate what is going on in Yokohama and report it to the Foreign Office, by means of a complaint.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

It's really too bad, Mr Garden Island, that Oahu County is expanding in area and is as well expending some of Kaula's corporation income tax money. Go on, howl away, and hope you'll get it—in the sweet mahope.

Gerrit P Wilder is going to the little islands between here and Midway to plant cocconut trees. If in order, we would suggest that he plant them upside down in order that the cocoanuts may not be blown away by the hurricanes that prevail in those parts.

The poor old Bennington was run into by the cruiser Chiosgo at San Francisco while being towed to Mare Island, and another hole was made in her side. It begins to look as though the Honolulu favorite gunboat is becoming the hoodoo ship of the American navy.

The combination between the banks, open and secret, is shaping itself into an invitation for some outside money institution to come

in here. If a new bank, headed by a former hotel man and a late cashier of a local bank, should come in here it need not surprise anyone.

Dear Garden Island; please don't worry over the health of THE INDEPENDENT, as it has weathered many past ailments. It is old enough for its size, we are past twenty one and are able to guard against being in bad health

There are numerous strenuous Republicans in Honolulu who have been out with a lantern regularly to find flaws in the work of County Treasurer Trent. But it invariably turns out that Trent is "there with the goods," putting his critics to dismay. He will come up again tomorrow with the September warrant, which will be turned into cash with out discount.

Kaula is still complaining because the taxes of the outside islands come to Honolulu. There is no just cause for complaint, as the Territorial receipts are bulked and then pro-rated among the counties as provided by law. If Kaula has a kick about its coin coming to Honolulu, Oahu has a greater kick on the score that it pays a large share of the expense of Kaula county.

Labor organizations have made a great mistake in having their leading features of Labor Day at Pearl Harbor. There are numerous places in the city suitable for the events, and by going away to the Peninsula hundreds of people will be deprived of the enjoyment of the program. It is too late now to change the plans, but it is to be hoped that the mistake will not be made again.

The credit for bringing about peace between Japan and Russia is given to President Roosevelt, but does he deserve that credit? He has done no more than could have been accomplished by the King of Great Britain, the President of France or even Governor Jack, of Hawaii nei. What Roosevelt may be credited with—and the only thing—is that he got in ahead of the other fellows and "got the job."

Just why the people of San Diego should present a loving cup to Commander Lucien Young, of the Bennington, is not clear. When the disaster occurred he was up town and took no chances whatever. If the loving cup comes from the saloon men of San Diego, however, there is, perhaps, no just cause for a kick as they have doubtless made the price of it many times over out of the Bennington's commander.

The decision of Judge Dole against the steamship Stanley Dollar, in the damage cases brought by thirty-six Japanese, will probably result in the Dollar line discontinuing its Hawaiian service. In one way it is a good thing for the islands, for the flooding of the Pacific Coast with Japanese, as planned by Stanley Dollar, was bound to bring

serious trouble in time and when it did come Hawaii would have gotten the blame for it all.

The Garden Island reports that Judge Kabele fell and "injured his trip." We are sorry—very sorry. Our Supreme Court judges are unanimous in the opinion that a trip is a good thing in hot weather, and we are inclined to the same view. Just how the fall injured Judge Kabele's "trip" the Garden Island does not tell us; but it is presumed that he was laid up until after the steamer had sailed.

Surely, Mr Garden Island, THE INDEPENDENT will keep cool and await your pleasure until the fifth of September when we expect to have both the matters, in re Kanealii, settled by our best authority, the Supreme Court, adversely to you. Your Judge Hardy will surely be made to approve and accept Kanealii's bond as supervisor and he will be seated as such. A grand jury indictment for forgery does not make one guilty of the offence, not until he has been tried and proven guilty of committing a felony. See, Smarty!

A despatch from Berlin says that the agreement reached by the peace commissioners at Portsmouth is considered to be a "moral victory for Japan and a diplomatic victory for Russia." That is certainly expressing it neatly. As a matter of fact Japan has been clearly humiliated, and in almost the same way as she was cheated out of Port Arthur and a strip of Manchuria after the war with China. Although the government of Japan has sanctioned the treaty it is not likely that the people will take in a kindly spirit a settlement that gives them practically nothing in return for a costly and bloody war.

Treasurer Campbell is licensing every person that applies for the privilege of selling liquor, presumably for the purpose of increasing the revenues of his office, thereby making a good showing. This may be a good thing for the treasury and Mr Campbell but it is a bad thing for the city as it is filling it up with liquor joints. Moreover, it is contrary to the intentions of the law. Every sane man knows full well that the Legislature had no intention of making saloons out of grocery stores and meat markets. Mr Campbell's policy will result in either killing the new law, which is considered a good one, or the flooding of the city with gin shops, which should not be thought of for a minute.

We thought the Independent knew something of the habits of the Hawaiians, but find ourselves sadly mistaken. The Hawaiian does not call a haole doctor until he is dying, and under such circumstances it is just as useless to know Hawaiian as Patagonian.—Garden Island.

A meeting of the Board of Health will be held this afternoon.

Yesterday the German bark Marie Hackfeld sailed for Port Townsend.

The Alameda sailed on schedule time this morning for the Coast.

A meeting of the county supervisors will be held at 7:30 this evening.

There will be another big entertainment at the Kaimuki zoo tonight.

S B Rose left in the Alameda this morning for a three months tour on the mainland.

Baseball games scheduled for next Saturday have been postponed to Monday, Labor Day.

Treasurer Trent expects to receive \$40,000 tomorrow as Oahu's quota of taxes for the month of September.

A quarterly meeting of the Bar Association will be held in Republican headquarters at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Dave Barry is billed to fight Tommy Burns in San Francisco tomorrow night. This promises to be a fierce contest.

Queen street north of Fort is being torn up and will be thoroughly macadamized. It has been in very bad shape a long time.

The steamer Doric will be due tomorrow from Yokohama on her way to the Coast. She has 500 tons of freight for Honolulu.

This week the crews of the two boat clubs have gone into hard training for the regatta events to take place on September 16.

The community will be greatly gratified at hearing that Mother Rice is slightly improved after the stroke of paralysis she suffered two weeks ago.—The Garden Island.

A special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce is being held this afternoon to set on Promotion Committee affairs and to prepare for a reception to the Taft party on its return.

For some reason unknown wireless telegraphic connection between here and the island of Hawaii has been broken for two days. Manager De Cew fears that there has been a storm on the big island.

Honolulu Japanese will have a big peace celebration after the Portsmouth convention has been signed. On the date set apart it is expected that a holiday will be declared on the plantations.

A luau was given yesterday by the parents of Helen Maau Kanelani Allen in honor of the child's birth anniversary. A large number of friends attended at the residence near the Mormon church.

For nearly a week there has been a tremendous run of fish in the harbor, particularly at the Bishop slip and near the Hackfeld wharf. Dozens of natives resort to those places in the afternoons to catch the finny prizes.

The receiving wire has been hung on the wireless telegraph pole at the naval station and the instruments are being installed in the telegraph house. In a week everything will be complete and communication at a great distance will be possible by time the next transports arrive.

The Iroquois will sail next Monday for Midway with cable station supplies. On the way she will call in at Lisianski, Laysan and Gardner shoals. Gerrit P Wilder will go on her as a representative of the Board of Agriculture to plant coconut trees on the various islands.

A luau was given by Mrs Mary Auld at her home yesterday afternoon to relatives and friends.

The daughter of ex-Speaker J A Akins will teach in the school at Waimea, Kauai, during the coming school year. She has already arrived there.

A birthday breakfast in Hawaii-ense was given yesterday by Hon J A Cummins at Ahipuu, Nuuanu Valley, in honor of his youngest son, Lorillard. It was enjoyed by many. Queen Liliuokalani was present.

A G M Robertson has reimbursed the Barete estate for the amount of money embezzled by P D Kellett, Jr. Robertson was one of the bondsmen. W Savidge was appointed trustee to receive the money under \$1000 bonds.

Eleven new cases of cholera were discovered in Manila yesterday, showing that the disease is spreading. Hereafter it is not likely that troops arriving in transports from there will be allowed ashore either in Nagasaki or here.

Accident to Judge Kahala.

It is learned from the Garden Island that District Magistrate H K Kahala, of Lihue, is suffering from the result of an accident. On going to bed an evening last week, he threw himself down a little carelessly, injuring his hip. The injury is very painful and will incapacitate him for work for some time to come. In consequence of which Jas H K Kaiwi has been appointed as assistant during the Judge's indisposition.

High Life Again.

Another episode, of a somewhat high life character, is reported to have taken place last Sunday evening out in the Plains section of this city. Fists were employed. The chief actors are alleged to have been a journalist versus an insurance man, the latter coming out the worst. The journalist is going about with a painful sprained thumb.

Stanley Dollar Losses.

Judge Dole has decided the Stanley Dollar damage cases in favor of the Japanese claimants. He made the following awards:

"For loss of baggage, \$90; fare on railroad to Honolulu, 45 cents; passenger fare, cash and note, \$32.

"The matter of damages for loss of work for 53 days at \$24 a month of 26 working days, and for expenses for 53 days board and lodging in Honolulu at 50 cents a day, I refer to the Commissioner to adjust with power to take evidence thereon."

Condor Shows Up.

The German gunboat Condor arrived off port early this morning from Samoa and anchored in the stream about 10 o'clock. She saluted the American flag while entering port. While here her officers and men will be royally entertained by local Germans. The Condor will be here about ten days.
