OPIMUM.

It is pretty well understood that "opium smuggling has become systematized, and through its ramifications society has been demoralized, or at least its moral tone has been sensibly lowered;" and it, might be added, is practised in quarters and by persons from whom better conduct should be expected. Not, be it understood, by the class recently accused by a morning contemporary, or, at least, not mainly by that class; but by members of the so-called national party. Nevertheless, we are unable to see why it should be "impossible to prevent opium smuggling," or reduce it to insignificant limits, if all departments and officers of government were determined upon doing so. But we can well understand its impossibility so long as the illegal and iniquitous practice is sympathized with, probably winked at, possibly shared in by those who should uphold the law.

NEWS FROM THE VOLCANO.

SYMPTOMS OF RETURNING ACTIVITY.

A letter from Mr. J. M. Lee, keeper of the Halfway House, Kau, dated April 14, gives the following account of the state of the Volcano when he visited it on two recent occasions:—

"I suppose people in Honolulu are anxious to hear news about the Volcano, and as I just came down from there last night I can give you the very latest information regarding that matter. I was there last Thursday, and from the bluffs I observed quite a heavy smoke pouring out from the crater of Halemaunau. This smoke had commenced four days previous and had been steadily increasing all the time, so the people up there expected the fire to break out every minute. They have been disappointed so far, but there is no doubt that in a few days the fire too will be visible.

"I took another trip yesterday and went right down to the crater, hoping to see some sparks of fire at the bottom; but the old Madame was not ready yet with her toilet. I suppose she don't like to show herself till she can dazzle her woovers in her former splendor. The smoke was much denser and heavier now than last time I was up; it rolled out like clouds from a big chimney. Sometimes it was very calm and only a faint blue smoke was to be seen, but that only lasted a few seconds, and then again with many doubled force it was puffing away, filling up the whole crater, so we could hardly see anything around us but smoke. It must be very active underneath, and you can plainly see that powerful forces are working and working to break through. Right on the edge of the hole where the smoke comes up it has formed a sulphur bed, which has been observed only the last two days, and a little distance towards west there is a whole system of steam, forming a long line; this is above the crater itself, commencing close to the edge. The new lake is quiet, and all the power seems to be concentrated in the crater of Halemaunau."

A letter from Mr. J. H. Maby, of Wilder S. S. Co.'s Volcano House, dated April 12, says the side from which steam has been lately rising, now emits dense volumes of dark blue smoke. The whole chasm around Halemaunau has become fearfully hot within the last few days. The place the smoke principally issues from seems to be a cone and is forming sulphur very fast. The natives say the present indications are very favorable for a sudden and mighty fire, and expect to see Kilauea in its former activity before long. In speaking of the Volcano, Mr. Geo. Beckley says that the smoke ascending from the crater can be plainly seen at Hilo.

DAISY PARTY.

The "daisy party" at the Yosemite rink, last evening, drew a large number of ladies and gentlemen. There were many "jolly jack tars," from the war vessels in port, on wheels. A few of them could skate pretty well, but about a dozen created much laughter by their ludicrous contortions with a biff-bang all in a heap. At 8:30 o'clock Mr. Thomas Wall rang the bell for attention, and when all were quiet he delivered the following little speech: "Ladies and gentlemen, this is my last week in Honolulu for some time to come, and about my last night at this rink. I am going to Australia by the S. S. Mararao, and I embrace this opportunity of thanking the patrons of this rink for their kindness, hoping they will do as well with my brother, who succeeds me in the management, as they have done by me." Pretty buttonhole bouquets were then passed around to every person, and at 9 o'clock dancing was commenced to the euphonious strains of the Hawaiian Band. Mr. Thomas Wall has made many friends by his genial manner and good management of the rink, and they all wish him a pleasant voyage and a speedy return.

A NOBLE CRAFT.

The British bark Natuna that arrived here a few days ago, 135 days from Glasgow, on her maiden trip, is one of the most noble specimens of marine architecture that have ever entered these waters, not excepting even the magnificent steamships that now regularly call at this port. She was built by Russell & Co., Greenock and Port Glasgow, Scotland, is owned by Peter Denniston & Co., Glasgow, and is one of a line running to the port from Great Britain, for which Messrs. F. A. Schaefer & Co. are agents. The Natuna is built of iron, her gross tonnage 1800, measurement 1165 tons, length 217 ft., breadth 35 ft., depth of hold 21 ft. 3 in. Her houses are all on deck, giving a flush hold fore and aft. There is a collision bulkhead of iron near the bow, and the masts are of the same material. Very ample ventilation is secured through the masts and also by separate hooded shafts. The standing rigging, of wire, has screw setting, that enables resetting with a very little trouble. All the upper works are finished in teak, with doors of pine and panels of birdseye maple, while

the bulwarks are built of a species of ironwood from Guiana and figured with chaste design of old gold. The officers' rooms and the fore-castle are more than ordinarily airy and spacious, the comfort of the hardy mariners having evidently been made an important object. As for the captain's quarters, no passenger steamer can surpass them in provision for comfort, convenience and the gratification of elegant taste. The galley is partitioned off from the fore-castle with iron plate; its floor is of iron covered with brick; thus the danger from fire in that quarter is placed at the minimum. Every modern convenience for saving labor, such as patent windlass and capstan, is provided, besides which, where only strength and good mechanical finish are looked for on a sailing vessel, here those are found with the adornments of color and carving without any mere ginger-bread work. After discharging the goods for this port, the Natuna will sail for San Francisco, where the bulk of her cargo is destined. She is under command of Capt. Grahn, who, in company with Mr. F. A. Schaefer, this morning kindly showed a BULLETIN reporter all over the ship.

SUPREME COURT--APRIL TERM.

IN CHAMBERS.

Hassinger, an adjoining land owner, who states that the land is fully worth \$2,000, and that if it were his he would not part with it for less than the sum of \$2,500. On the other hand the affidavits of Messrs. Jas. F. Morgan and C. W. Hart aver that the price bid was a fair one. The Court, however, to satisfy the heirs of the testator, ordered that the sale be set aside and that the premises be resold at an upset price of \$1,500, without prejudice to Mrs. Bolte's right of claiming that amount as her bid, should there be a failure of an advance from said amount.
