BE PREPARED.

Again we urge our friends to pay their personal taxes and endeavor to see that the taxes of their neighbors and friends are paid before the end of this month.

The territorial bill will read that whoever is a citizen of the territory, and who can read and write English or Hawaiian and who has paid the poll tax for the current year, is entitled to a vote. The bill will undoubtedly pass with those provisions and the Hawaiians will own their own country. But beware of the treachery in the Dole camp; beware of the numerous slips between the cups and the lips.

What does the current year mean and who are the men to decide whether a man is entitled to cast his vote or not? The official organs have never mentioned the question which we now bring to the notice of our readers. Not one word has been said in their columns in regard to the tax clause in the proposed territorial bill; and that is what makes us very suspicious indeed because we feel that the Dole ring will once more throw the Hawaiians down and prevent them from voting at the first election under the new bill.

It is always well to be prepared and every Hawaiian who wants to have a voice in our next election should pay his personal taxes at once and not take any chances of being disfranchised from failing to put up the small sum demanded.

All want to see the present oligarchy annihilated and all know that the task is easy if our men have the ammunition needed. The Attorney-General in Washington may rule that at the first election in Hawaii, the man who pays his one dollar as a poll tax is entitled to a vote even if he paid it the day before he voted but the almighty Supreme Court of Hawaii may decide that the "poll tax for the current year" should have been paid prior to March 31st. Take no chances, because there is a great deal at stake!

The interest of these islands is at stake and it behooves the men who will have a voice in the future government of Hawaii to remember that no longer will the government be run in the interest of the sugar barons and absentee land owners but in the sole interest of Hawaii. Let the men who we shall send to the first legislature ask an explanation of the fact that our exports are \$3,000,000 over our imports and that we nevertheless import a large amount of specie. Let them find out who the men are who have plundered the public treasury during the so-called plague epidemic. Let them demand an explanation of the terrible scandal of 1895 when butchers and bakers and clerks were sitting as a court martial and decent men were thrown into jail.

We need such men but let us be well prepared in sending them to the legislative hall less we may lose the game through a technicality. Be on the safe side whoever wants to vote in November and pay your personal taxes now.

Supreme and Circuit Court Notes.

A suit for injunction has been filed by Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan, attorneys for plaintiff in Liliuokalani vs. Alexander Young, Minister of the Interior, in connection with the taking of property for the proposed extension of B-retania street. Similar suits have also been filed by J. A. Cummins and Bruce Cartwright, trustee, et al.

Lo Kam's motion for a new trial was last Saturday denied by Judge Perry.

The argument on the demurrer of T. W. Hobron, one of the defendants in the case of Charles I. Helm vs. F. B. McStocker et al. was held this forenoon before Judge Perry and the same overruled. Exceptions noted. The Court also denied the motion for costs.

The bond of the executors of the estate of Mary Kaumana Widemann was this morning filed, approved by Judge Perry.

A decree in the divorce suit of Sarah Ai Swinton vs. Henry S. Swinton was filed this morning, the dissolving of the marriage ties being on the ground of extreme cruelty and neglect to provide. The custody and education of the children is awarded to the libellant, but the libellee may visit them on Sundays at reasonable hours.

Mrs. Julia Kiiulu has filed a fire claim for clothing and furniture destroyed by fire by order of the Board of Health, amounting to \$225 50.

Mrs. Margaret R. Dodd, widow of the late James Dodd, by her attorneys, Paul Neumann and Geo. A. Davis, has filed a motion and notice of motion to have delivered over to her certain chattels which she claims as her own personal property. Together with the above motion is also filed her affidavit, as well as an order for hearing the above motion, which is set for the 23d instant.

A petition in the ejectment suit of Jno. E. Bush vs. The Republic of Hawaii has been filed by Magoon and Long, attorneys for plaintiff, that the said cause be not heard until a Chief Justice is appointed, and that Judge Perry is not legally qualified to sit and hear the same.

A receipt in full settlement for \$100 and costs has been filed by plaintiff in J. M. McChesney, assignee for E. Poppleton, vs. J. H. Fisher.

Notice has been filed by the Deputy Attorney-General to have the cause of the Republic of Hawaii vs. Ah Tau, exception from fifth circuit for maintaining a gambling house, placed on the calendar of the Supreme Court, or as soon as it can be heard, for the purpose of having the same dismissed.

Service of summons in Sarah Anna Berger vs. Chas. W. Booth was filed yesterday by Deputy Marshal Chillingworth.

A. G. Cunha, executor of the will of Anton G. Cunha, yesterday filed his tenth annual account. The executor charges himself \$686 and asks to be allowed \$55445, leaving a balance of \$13155, which the executor states are two dividends due Mrs. I. Q. Tewksbury pending the master's report.

Councillor A. G. M. Robertson, chairman of the Committee on Rules, reported the new rules which were unanimously adopted.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The owner of an automobile should be treated as severely as an owner of a carriage attached to a horse whenever the vehicle becomes a menace to the public. Judge Wilcox is not in the habit of discriminating and the millionaires who own and ride the horseless rig have no preference when brought into the District Court.

Glancing at our London files by the last mail we note that the impression in France was that there was an agreement between Great Britain and Emperor William of Germany that the latter should endeavor to mediate in favor of peace in the South African War as soon as the British had compelled the Boers to evacuate Natal. Lord Salisbury's declarations, coupled with more recent events, should convince even fickle France that the British are an immeasurable distance from admitting defeat by accepting German mediation. England can conceive no other solution of the South African problem than the continuation of the struggle until it terminates in absolute victory for her arms. Afghanistan on the one hand and Italy on the other—diverse in their characteristics as they are and appreciably useful on different continents—see the necessity of the maintenance of Great Britain's imperial control as the balance wheel in the mechanism of international politics and the development of commercial civilization and progress. Without Great Britain's power the Mediterranean would become a French Lake, Russia would control India, China and Japan and threaten the growing predominance of the English speaking races throughout the world. This cannot and will not, as we read the dispensation of providence, be permitted. The Bible and the Koran will apparently carry the English tongue into every quarter of the globe.

To Educate a South Sea King.

A fund is being raised for the edu-
cation of Malietoa Tanus, the young
deposed king of Samoa. Secretary
Hay has addressed a note to Great
Britain and Germany, suggesting that
each advance a small sum, sufficient
to defray the expenses of the former
king while at school. This has been
done at the request of Malietoa him-
self, the request having been trans-
mitted to the State Department
through Consul General Osborne,
who is still at Apia

Malietoa wishes to be educated at
a European school, and it is prob-
able that the Powers will allow him
the small amount of money neces-
sary to defray the school expenses.

Malietoa Laupepa, the former
King of Samoa, whose reign was
full of trouble, and whose death in
1899 caused fresh disturbances to
arise over the election of a succes-
sor, received for his own use in all
about \$50 per month. His spouse
was obliged to take in washing in
order to eke out the royal income.
This was a rather lowly occupation
for a queen, and it is doubtful if
the income derived from this source en-
abled the royal pair to live in luxury.
Laupepa himself had too much re-
gard for his crown and his dignity
to hire himself out to do odd jobs
of any kind.

Small as were the emoluments,
there was always a lively competi-
tion among Samoan chiefs for the

throne—a competition which gave
rise to much bloodshed and internal
disturbances, which on several occa-
sions threatened to embroil the
three great Powers included in the
tripartite agreement.

In 1881, by an agreement between
Germany, Great Britain and the
United States, Laupepa became
King of all Samoa. But in 1887
Tamesese, another Samoan chief
encouraged by Germany, proclaimed
himself King and raised the
standard of revolt.

After a long civil strife Laupepa
was restored to his throne by the
treaty of Berlin in 1889. Laupepa
died in 1898, and then fresh trouble
arose over the struggle for the
throne, brought about by the rival
candidacies of Tanus and Mataafa.
These troubles were ended at last by
the abolishment of the kingship in
Samoa. Just the other day the
United States Senate ratified the
new Samoan treaty, which hands the
administration of Samoan affairs
over to Germany.

In all probability the young Tanus
will not suffer financially, at least,
from the loss of his throne.—N. Y.
Herald.

Charitable Bequests.

The will of Elizabeth K. Bing-
ham, deceased, has been admitted
to probate by Judge Perry in the
Circuit Court, on the petition of
William R. Castle, and letters testa-
mentary granted to Hiram Bing-
ham, Mrs. Lydia B. Coan and W. R.
Castle. The deceased died on Nov-
ember 27, 1899, in this city. Her
will was executed on March 22, 1895,
in the presence of George P. Castle
and Joseph P. Gilman. By the pro-
visions of the will, \$1030 is left to
Hiram Bingham; Mrs. Lydia P.
Coan, \$1000; Hiram Bingham, Jr.,
\$500; Charles H. Crocker and Larue
Sutherland, \$100 each; American
Board of Commissioners for Foreign
Missions, \$1000; Hawaiian Board of
Missions, \$200; Permanent fund for
Gilbert Island Bible, \$100; Women's
Board of Missions for the Pacific
Islands, \$100; Sailors' Home, \$100;
Seamen's Friend Society of New
York, \$50; Dr. George Martin and
Dr. Frank R. Day, \$100 each. In
the will the estate is valued at \$5000.
