### The Merchants' Association.

At a special meeting held on Saturday of the members of the Merchants' Association, Mr. Geo. W. Smith read a report of the committee on permanent organization, consisting of a draft of the constitution as follows:

"The association will hold quarterly meetings.

"Any person, firm or corporation doing business in Honolulu is eligible for membership. The admission fee is \$10 and monthly dues \$2.50. All members of firms or corporations may take part in discussions, but each concern has but one vote. Three months' delinquency subjects to forfeiture of membership. Fifteen members constitute a quorum.

"Regular meetings shall be held quarterly, with the usual provision for special meetings.

"Nine directors shall be elected annually, at the first quarterly meeting, who shall elect from their number a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer.

"Directors shall meet monthly, with five as a quorum. One month in advance of election the president is to appoint a committee of three to nominate directors, who report to the secretary. Members are to be notified by mail of nominations five days before election, and in the same limit of time any member may

nominate one or more candidates. Election shall be by ballot.

"At the first monthly meeting of directors the president shall appoint these committees: 1. Public Affairs; 2. Publicity and Promotion; 3. Trade and Finance."

The following members were nominated for the first board of directors: F. W. Macfarlane, H. F. Wichman, H. F. Lewis, J. F. Humburg, R. F. Lange, W. W. Harris, F. L. Waldron, E. O. White and W. W. Dimond.

A few minor amendments were made, and with these alterations the constitution was adopted as a whole.

### An Important Decision.

The Supreme Court has handed down a decision in the case of Theodore Lansing, treasurer of the Territory vs. Theo. H. Davies & Co., Ltd., the substance of which is that sections 764-768 of the Penal Laws relating to license fees are unconstitutional.

The sections referred to provide that a fee of \$50 per annum shall be paid for the privilege of selling merchandise and imported goods, if the annual sales fall short of \$20,000, and if the sales exceed that sum, then three-eighths of one per cent of the excess shall be paid. The license fee for the year ending June 30, 1900, to be paid by defendants under the Hawaiian law would have amounted to \$5,976.90.

### McKINLEY'S MODE OF BRIBING.

The appointment by the President of Justice McKenna's son to the position of Inspector-General of Porto Rico and of Justice Harlan's son to be Attorney-General of that island, is such a barefaced attempt to influence two justices of the Supreme Court on the eve of their rendering a decision of vital importance to the declared policy of the President, that even the staunchest administration organs are condemning the action of the President in strong language.

We have no doubt that the "job" thrown to the two justices will have no effect whatsoever, but the methods of McKinley stamp him, not as clear headed, upright statesman, but rather as a shrewd politician ready to use any means to gain a point, and never expecting to get something for nothing. His schooling by Mark Hanna has evidently borne good fruits, but one thing is for a politic "machinist" to use Hanna methods and for the President of the United States to adopt them especially when dealing with members of the highest tribunal of the land.

The following editorial from the N. Y. World handles the matter without gloves:

President McKinley's promotion of Justice McKenna's son to the Inspector-Generalship of Porto Rico, and his nomination of Justice Harlan's son to the Attorney-Generalship of that island, are acts so unfortunate at this time that even so staunch an Administration journal as the Chicago Times-Herald sharply criticizes them. It points out the "ugly and haunting coincidence" of such Presidential appointments in Porto Rico "at the very moment when the policy of the Administration toward the island is an issue before the court."

Charitably assuming, as the country generally will be inclined to do, that the President could not "have harbored for a moment the idea of influencing the judgments of Justices McKenna and Harlan by favors to their sons," the Times-Herald nevertheless declares that his ill-considered action "has discounted the decision of the court and prepared the way for the 'I-told-you-so's' of the disappointed." And it thinks that as "the damage is done" the only way to repair it is for the two Justices whose sons have been thus unseasonably favored to "decline to sit longer in the island cases."

The impression which this incident will make on the public mind will be deeper because of Mr. McKinley's misuse of patronage on many past occasions. It is not forgotten that he selected two Senators, both members of the Foreign Relations Committee, to go abroad

and make a treaty with Spain, on which they were later on to pass judgment as Senators. That the votes of certain Democratic Senators by which that treaty was ratified were notoriously rewarded with appointments to office, and that one Democratic Senator under criminal indictment was rewarded for his vote to ratify by the quashing of the indictment, are also well remembered bits of history.

That we are in the islands at all is due to the ratification of the Spanish treaty by one vote only, and that one would have been lacking but for Mr. McKinley's flagrant misuse of the power of patronage. That he should now have exposed our highest tribunal to even the suspicion of being swayed in favor of the view which Mr. McKinley and his party desire to have it adopt of our status in the islands is, in view of his past record, an amazing indiscretion.

Paraphrasing the characterization by Daniel Webster of a certain Presidential nomination, it may well be said of the appointments of the two Justices' sons: "They are appointments not appropriate to be made."

### TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The Hilo people are anxious to have a visit from Francis Murphy. The old lecturer prefers Australia to our local Sodom. To reform the capital of the big island is a task even beyond his strength.

Obedience to the "unwritten law" is well illustrated to the insignificance attached to the assembling of the electors in the several States to choose the next President and Vice-President of the United States. This assembling, which the framers of the Constitution intended should be a great event, took place on the 14th instant, and it is safe to say that very few people even remembered the event. It was taken for granted that out of the 447 electors 292 would vote for McKinley and Roosevelt, and 155 for W. J. Bryan and Adlai Stevenson. None of the electors had pledged his vote, and all the law says is that the electors shall "meet in their respective States and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same State with themselves." There was nothing to prevent the electors to have voted all for McKinley or for Bryan except the unwritten law, the obedience to which was considered such a foregone conclusion that no one took the trouble to enquire what the result of the election by electors was.

The negroes and Porto Ricans are great acquisitions to the islands, say the planters. The Maui people, however, suggest the immediate return of the Tennessee negroes to their native State and say that it will be cheap in the long run to pay their passage to San Francisco. In regard to the Porto Ricans the Maui News advises not to import any great number of them as they are a miserable lot of people. In the meantime we are told that the Italians and Alabama negroes are very promising people. How long will the praise last? The Mauites have a great deal to say against the Japanese, who are getting up strikes and who are to be bundled out of their cabins until they become submissive. Who flooded the country with Japanese in spite of the warnings of men who had some foresight and took an interest in Hawaii which is not tied up in sugar? It is bosh—this talk of driving the Japs by the wholesale away from the plantations. The Japs will live by legitimate or illegitimate means and we hardly think Maui is in a position to hold them down by force if they get ugly. Treat them like men should be treated and pay good wages. Then there will be no trouble. We learn that the Zealandia will be chartered upon her return to San Francisco to bring about

2000 negroes to this port. They lanterns will keep on playing with fire until they and their plantations will be burned. The pity is that those imposed to this outrageous importation of the scum of the earth will also be made to suffer from the worse than criminal folly of the "missionary" worshippers of mammon.

A great kick has been registered because the Chief Justice has given the contract for the printing and binding of volume 13 of Hawaiian Reports to the Hawaiian Gazette Co., although smaller bids were tendered by the Evening Bulletin and The Republican. If the Chief Justice considered that the work would be done better by the Gazette Company than by the other bidders he was entitled to grant the contract to the Gazette Company irrespective of its higher figures. The point, however, which places the Chief Justice in a peculiar position, and which a published letter from the Chief Clerk does not explain is the fact that part of the work had been given to the Gazette Company before tenders for the contract were called for, and that it undoubtedly was the intention to give the contract to that company without reference to the bids of others. The Chief Justice virtually made fools of the proprietors of other printing offices when he asked them to figure on a contract which he under no circumstances would have granted them anyhow. It is a transaction which reflects no credit on the Chief Justice, and which demands legislation for the prevention of a repetition of such uncalled for favoritism. The Clerk in his letter to the Advertiser says that the offices of the Gazette, Republican, and Bulletin were crowded with work to get out the necessary judiciary blanks, the text of which had to be changed owing to the passage

of the Organic Act. Owing to this pressure the decisions in the Lovejoy & Co. and Peacock & Co. cases, and in the case of Edwards, were given to the Gazette Company for publication in the Advertiser, because it was important that these decisions should be published at once. Why was it important, we should like to know. The parties interested in the decisions had undoubtedly received copies of them from their attorneys, and the public could read the findings of the Court in the news columns of the papers. Besides the printing offices mentioned there are about half a dozen other establishments in the city which would have been perfectly willing to print some of the blanks which were crowding the offices mentioned to such an extent that it became advisable to let the Gazette Company start filling a contract which had not been awarded to it, and for which tenders had not been called. Let us now hear an explanation from Judge Fear.

**LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.**

The band will play at Emma Square this evening.

The Fisheries Association will meet at 3:30 p. m. to-day.

Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Baldwin are expected home at the end of this month.

Dr. C. L. Stow of Hamakua has moved to Hilo where he will practice medicine.

Scotland beat the Iolani United football team on Saturday with a score of 4 to 3.

The Healan "boys" will meet this evening to consider the matter of a minstrel entertainment.

Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth and Misses Ackerman and Murcutt were out slumming on Saturday night.

Mr. Wm. Downer and bride who have spent their honeymoon in Honolulu will return to their home in Hilo to-morrow.

Strikes are the fashion of the day on Maui. Japanese, Hawaiians and negroes are all having their innings and the plantation managers are getting grey haired.

Latest advices from Washington indicate that Mr. Edgar Cayless will be appointed Circuit Judge of the First Circuit, through the influence of Delegate Wilcox.

Yesterday was the birthday of the German Emperor. The day falling on a Sunday there was no official celebration. Loyal Germans remembered the day all over the city however.

A number of Hawaiians have filed papers of incorporation for an agricultural company to operate on lands near Hookea. The prospectus of the new hui is very promising and should meet with success.

The damage suit for alleged libel brought by H. J. Lyman against the Tribune Publishing Co. of Hilo ended in a verdict for the defendant. Plaintiff wanted \$10,000 and has entered an appeal to the Supreme Court.

This is the week for moonlight concerts and the band will play at Thomas Square on Tuesday and Thursday evenings; at Makee Island on Wednesday evening, and will besides endeavor to play at the Departure of the Sierra and Zealandia.

Francis Murphy spoke yesterday morning to the prisoners in Oahu jail. In the afternoon he spoke to men at the Y. M. C. A., and last night he addressed Hawaiians at Kawaiahao Church. Rev. Mr. Desha acting as interpreter. To-morrow the temperance lecturer will leave by the Sonoma for Australia.

The John S. Kimball was fined \$500 by the collector of the port for having had her Custom House seals broken on the high seas. The explanation was that it was necessary to get into the cold storage room to effect certain repairs or the whole cargo would have been spoiled. The matter will be referred to Washington.

Judge Wilcox told a "fresh" Japanese in the Court this morning that the order of things was changed in Honolulu since the Japs carried their heads high because Naniwa was in port. Now the Japs are under American laws and any appeal to the Naniwa would probably be answered from Washington by an enquiry as to what mudflat the old cruiser wished to occupy.

A runaway horse attached to a wrecked buggy was stopped on Fort street this morning by Officer Vida. The horse was badly cut on the hind legs and was taken to the Police Station where it was learned that it was the property of L. B. Kerr. It appears that when Mrs. Kerr was getting into the carriage the horse started on a run and continued its mad career from the Kerr residence on Boretania street till it was stopped on Fort street. The horse which generally is very gentle and safe must have been scared, fortunately, before Mrs. Kerr entered the buggy.

The Kinau will go in commission again to-morrow and on her usual route.

The case of Ah Kwai vs. Liliuokalani will probably be finished to day in the Circuit Court.

Will Carlisle returned to Honolulu by the Zealandia and will resume his old position with Lovejoy & Co. Willie says that there is no place like Hawaii and the majority who leave us second the motion.

Carl Klemme is back again after a prolonged visit to Bremen where he was in business. He will reside in Honolulu and expect his family, including new twin, to arrive in a few months. He states that his brother Emil is doing well in Bremen.

W. H. Coney has been given the position as city editor of the Evening Bulletin. The promotion is well deserved, Coney being one of the brightest and most pushing young newspaper men in the city. His predecessor Dan Logan is now city editor of the Republican.

Dr. and Mrs. Hawley who arrived by the transport Warren and were requested to leave the ship at this port, called upon the Deputy High Sheriff on Saturday afternoon for the purpose of airing their domestic trouble. Mr. Chillingworth, who has learned a trick or two from Judge Wilcox—having no experience of his own—calmed the tempest and induced the couple to go home and try again.

We are informed by Messrs. W. G. Irwin & Co., the agents of the Oceanic Steamship Company, that the "Zealandia" is to leave Port Los Angeles on February 15th, and will arrive in Honolulu on or about the 23rd. No bookings will be made for cabin passengers from Honolulu to San Francisco on that voyage of the "Zealandia;" accommodations, however, will be provided for steerage passengers.

**A Run Away.**

Early this morning there was a run-away on Queen street. A horse attached to a buggy driven by a woman became unmanageable, overturned the buggy, from which the driver was thrown out and ran at full speed along Queen with Lieutenant Leslie in pursuit. Near the Occidental Hotel Leslie caught hold of the bridle of the runaway and after a tug-of-war succeeded in quieting the horse and leading him to the police station. The driver, Mrs. Reid, was considerably injured, and was assisted by Captain Neilson of the S. N. Castle, who happened to be passing by the scene of disaster. The captain escorted the lady to a doctor where her injuries were attended to.

**His Last Appearance**

There was a good audience at Kaunakapili on Saturday when Papa Ita ten times walked across the hot stones prepared for him. The stage setting was excellent and the olioli of Hawaiians and the imitations of the old Tahitian added to the weird performance. In the audience were Queen Liliuokalani, Prince David, Judge Kalua and several Senators and Representatives elect and all watched the feat of Papa Ita with deep interest. Papa Ita leaves for Hilo tomorrow to give an exhibition in the rainy city.

**Died from His Wounds.**

Kukuma, the Soth Sea Islander, who was assaulted early on Saturday morning by some unknown person, and who was severely cut, died at the Queen's Hospital on Saturday afternoon. The following gentlemen were called upon to serve as a coroner's jury: G. C. Griffiths, W. E. Burnette, A. P. Taylor, Charles Spencer, A. G. Nicholas, and Mr. Jeffs. The jury viewed the body at the Hospital and adjourned until called by the coroner. The police authorities hope to be able to find the perpetrator of the dastardly deed.

The executive committee have decided that masks will be worn until a late hour, and it is probable that they will not be removed before midnight.

### The Merchants' Association.

At a special meeting held on Saturday of the members of the Merchants' Association, Mr. Geo. W. Smith read a report of the committee on permanent organization, consisting of a draft of the constitution as follows:

"The association will hold quarterly meetings.

"Any person, firm or corporation doing business in Honolulu is eligible for membership. The admission fee is \$10 and monthly dues \$2.50. All members of firms or corporations may take part in discussions, but each concern has but one vote. Three months' delinquency subjects to forfeiture of membership. Fifteen members constitute a quorum.

"Regular meetings shall be held quarterly, with the usual provision for special meetings.

"Nine directors shall be elected annually, at the first quarterly meeting, who shall elect from their number a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer.

"Directors shall meet monthly, with five as a quorum. One month in advance of election the president is to appoint a committee of three to nominate directors, who report to the secretary. Members are to be notified by mail of nominations five days before election, and in the same limit of time any member may

nominate one or more candidates. Election shall be by ballot.

"At the first monthly meeting of directors the president shall appoint these committees: 1. Public Affairs; 2. Publicity and Promotion; 3. Trade and Finance."

The following members were nominated for the first board of directors: F. W. Macfarlane, H. F. Wichman, H. F. Lewis, J. F. Humburg, R. F. Lange, W. W. Harris, F. L. Waldron, E. O. White and W. W. Dimond.

A few minor amendments were made, and with these alterations the constitution was adopted as a whole.

### An Important Decision.

The Supreme Court has handed down a decision in the case of Theodore Lansing, treasurer of the Territory vs. Theo. H. Davies & Co., Ltd., the substance of which is that sections 764-768 of the Penal Laws relating to license fees are unconstitutional.

The sections referred to provide that a fee of \$50 per annum shall be paid for the privilege of selling merchandise and imported goods, if the annual sales fall short of \$20,000, and if the sales exceed that sum, then three-eighths of one per cent of the excess shall be paid. The license fee for the year ending June 30, 1900, to be paid by defendants under the Hawaiian law would have amounted to \$5,976.90.

## McKINLEY'S MODE OF BRIBING.

The appointment by the President of Justice McKenna's son to the position of Inspector-General of Porto Rico and of Justice Harlan's son to be Attorney-General of that island, is such a barefaced attempt to influence two justices of the Supreme Court on the eve of their rendering a decision of vital importance to the declared policy of the President, that even the staunchest administration organs are condemning the action of the President in strong language.

We have no doubt that the "job" thrown to the two justices will have no effect whatsoever, but the methods of McKinley stamp him, not as clear headed, upright statesman, but rather as a shrewd politician ready to use any means to gain a point, and never expecting to get something for nothing. His schooling by Mark Hanna has evidently borne good fruits, but one thing is for a politician "machinist" to use Hanna methods and for the President of the United States to adopt them especially when dealing with members of the highest tribunal of the land.

The following editorial from the N. Y. World handles the matter without gloves:

President McKinley's promotion of Justice McKenna's son to the Inspector-Generalship of Porto Rico, and his nomination of Justice Harlan's son to the Attorney-Generalship of that island, are acts so unfortunate at this time that even so staunch an Administration journal as the Chicago Times-Herald sharply criticises them. It points out the "ugly and haunting coincidence" of such Presidential appointments in Porto Rico "at the very moment when the policy of the Administration toward the island is an issue before the court."

Charitably assuming, as the country generally will be inclined to do, that the President could not "have harbored for a moment the idea of influencing the judgments of Justices McKenna and Harlan by favors to their sons," the Times-Herald nevertheless declares that his ill-considered action "has discounted the decision of the court and prepared the way for the 'I-told-you-so's' of the disappointed." And it thinks that as "the damage is done" the only way to repair it is for the two Justices whose sons have been thus unseasonably favored to "decline to sit longer in the island cases."

The impression which this incident will make on the public mind will be deeper because of Mr. McKinley's misuse of patronage on many past occasions. It is not forgotten that he selected two Senators, both members of the Foreign Relations Committee, to go abroad

and make a treaty with Spain, on which they were later on to pass judgment as Senators. That the votes of certain Democratic Senators by which that treaty was ratified were notoriously rewarded with appointments to office, and that one Democratic Senator under criminal indictment was rewarded for his vote to ratify by the quashing of the indictment, are also well remembered bits of history.

That we are in the islands at all is due to the ratification of the Spanish treaty by one vote only, and that one would have been lacking but for Mr. McKinley's flagrant misuse of the power of patronage. That he should now have exposed our highest tribunal to even the suspicion of being swayed in favor of the view which Mr. McKinley and his party desire to have it adopt of our status in the islands is, in view of his past record, an amazing indiscretion.

Paraphrasing the characterization by Daniel Webster of a certain Presidential nomination, it may well be said of the appointments of the two Justices' sons: "They are appointments not appropriate to be made."

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The Hilo people are anxious to have a visit from Francis Murphy. The old lecturer prefers Australia to our local Sodom. To reform the capital of the big island is a task even beyond his strength.

Obedience to the "unwritten law" is well illustrated to the insignificance attached to the assembling of the electors in the several States to choose the next President and Vice-President of the United States. This assembling, which the framers of the Constitution intended should be a great event, took place on the 14th instant, and it is safe to say that very few people even remembered the event. It was taken for granted that out of the 447 electors 202 would vote for McKinley and Roosevelt, and 155 for W. J. Bryan and Adlai Stevenson. None of the electors had pledged his vote, and all the law says is that the electors shall "meet in their respective States and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same State with themselves." There was nothing to prevent the electors to have voted all for McKinley or for Bryan except the unwritten law, the obedience to which was considered such a foregone conclusion that no one took the trouble to enquire what the result of the election by electors was.

The negroes and Porto Ricans are great acquisitions to the islands, say the planters. The Maui people, however, suggest the immediate return of the Tennessee negroes to their native State and say that it will be cheap in the long run to pay their passage to San Francisco. In regard to the Porto Ricans the Maui News advises not to import any great number of them as they are a miserable lot of people. In the meantime we are told that the Italians and Alabama negroes are very promising people. How long will the praise last? The Mauis have a great deal to say against the Japanese, who are getting up strikes and who are to be bundled out of their cabins until they become submissive. Who flooded the country with Japanese in spite of the warnings of men who had some foresight and took an interest in Hawaii which is not tied up in sugar? It is bosh—this talk of driving the Japs by the wholesale away from the plantations. The Japs will live by legitimate or illegitimate means and we hardly think Maui is in a position to hold them down by force if they get ugly. Treat them like men should be treated and pay good wages. Then there will be no trouble. We learn that the Zealandia will be chartered upon her return to San Francisco to bring about

2000 negroes to this port. The lanterns will keep on playing with fire until they and their plantations will be burned. The pity is that these imposed to this outrageous importation of the scum of the earth will also be made to suffer from the worse than criminal folly of the "missionary" worshippers of mammon.

A great kick has been registered because the Chief Justice has given the contract for the printing and binding of volume 13 of Hawaiian Reports to the Hawaiian Gazette Co., although smaller bids were tendered by the Evening Bulletin and The Republican. If the Chief Justice considered that the work would be done better by the Gazette Company than by the other bidders he was entitled to grant the contract to the Gazette Company irrespective of its higher figures. The point, however, which places the Chief Justice in a peculiar position, and which a published letter from the Chief Clerk does not explain is the fact that part of the work had been given to the Gazette Company before tenders for the contract were called for, and that it undoubtedly was the intention to give the contract to that company without reference to the bids of others. The Chief Justice virtually made fools of the proprietors of other printing offices when he asked them to figure on a contract which he under no circumstances would have granted them anyhow. It is a transaction which reflects no credit on the Chief Justice, and which demands legislation for the prevention of a repetition of such uncalled for favoritism. The Clerk in his letter to the Advertiser says that the offices of the Gazette, Republican, and Bulletin were crowded with work to get out the necessary judiciary blanks, the text of which had to be changed owing to the passage

of the Organic Act. Owing to this pressure the decisions in the Lovejoy & Co. and Peacock & Co. cases, and in the case of Edwards, were given to the Gazette Company for publication in the Advertiser, because it was important that these decisions should be published at once. Why was it important, we should like to know. The parties interested in the decisions had undoubtedly received copies of them from their attorneys, and the public could read the findings of the Court in the news columns of the papers. Besides the printing offices mentioned there are about half a dozen other establishments in the city which would have been perfectly willing to print some of the blanks which were crowding the offices mentioned to such an extent that it became advisable to let the Gazette Company start filling a contract which had not been awarded to it, and for which tenders had not been called. Let us now hear an explanation from Judge Frear.

**LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.**

The band will play at Emma Square this evening.

The Fisheries Association will meet at 3:30 p. m. to-day.

Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Baldwin are expected home at the end of this month.

Dr. C. L. Stow of Hamakua has moved to Hilo where he will practice medicine.

Scotland beat the Iolani United football team on Saturday with a score of 4 to 3.

The Healan "boys" will meet this evening to consider the matter of a minstrel entertainment.

Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth and Misses Ackerman and Murcutt were out slumming on Saturday night.

Mr. Wm. Downer and bride who have spent their honeymoon in Honolulu will return to their home in Hilo to-morrow.

Strikes are the fashion of the day on Maui. Japanese, Hawaiians and negroes are all having their innings and the plantation managers are getting grey haired.

Latest advices from Washington indicate that Mr. Edgar Cayless will be appointed Circuit Judge of the First Circuit, through the influence of Delegate Wilcox.

Yesterday was the birthday of the German Emperor. The day falling on a Sunday there was no official celebration. Loyal Germans remembered the day all over the city however.

A number of Hawaiians have filed papers of incorporation for an agricultural company to operate on lands near Hookea. The prospectus of the new hui is very promising and should meet with success.

The damage suit for alleged libel brought by H. J. Lyman against the Tribune Publishing Co. of Hilo ended in a verdict for the defendant. Plaintiff wanted \$10,000 and has entered an appeal to the Supreme Court.

This is the week for moonlight concerts and the band will play at Thomas Square on Tuesday and Thursday evenings; at Makee Island on Wednesday evening, and will besides endeavor to play at the Departure of the Sierra and Zealandia.

Francis Murphy spoke yesterday morning to the prisoners in Oahu jail. In the afternoon he spoke to men at the Y. M. C. A., and last night he addressed Hawaiians at Kawaiahao Church, Rev. Mr. Desha acting as interpreter. To-morrow the temperance lecturer will leave by the Sonoma for Australia.

The John S. Kimball was fined \$500 by the collector of the port for having had her Custom House seals broken on the high seas. The explanation was that it was necessary to get into the cold storage room to effect certain repairs or the whole cargo would have been spoiled. The matter will be referred to Washington.

Judge Wilcox told a "fresh" Japanese in the Court this morning that the order of things was changed in Honolulu since the Japs carried their heads high because Naniwa was in port. Now the Japs are under American laws and any appeal to the Naniwa would probably be answered from Washington by an enquiry as to what mudflat the old cruiser wished to occupy.

A runaway horse attached to a wrecked buggy was stopped on Fort street this morning by Officer Vida. The horse was badly cut on the hind legs and was taken to the Police Station where it was learned that it was the property of L. B. Kerr. It appears that when Mrs. Kerr was getting into the carriage the horse started on a run and continued its mad career from the Kerr residence on Beretania street till it was stopped on Fort street. The horse which generally is very gentle and safe must have been scared, fortunately, before Mrs. Kerr entered the buggy.

The Kinau will go in commission again to-morrow and on her usual route.

The case of Ah Kwai vs. Liliuokalani will probably be finished to day in the Circuit Court.

Will Carlisle returned to Honolulu by the Zealandia and will resume his old position with Lovejoy & Co. Willie says that there is no place like Hawaii and the majority who leave us second the motion.

Carl Klemme is back again after a prolonged visit to Bremen where he was in business. He will reside in Honolulu and expect his family, including new twin, to arrive in a few months. He states that his brother Emil is doing well in Bremen.

W. H. Coney has been given the position as city editor of the Evening Bulletin. The promotion is well deserved, Coney being one of the brightest and most pushing young newspaper men in the city. His predecessor Dan Logan is now city editor of the Republican.

Dr. and Mrs. Hawley who arrived by the transport Warren and were requested to leave the ship at this port, called upon the Deputy High Sheriff on Saturday afternoon for the purpose of airing their domestic trouble. Mr. Chillingworth, who has learned a trick or two from Judge Wilcox—having no experience of his own—calmed the tempest and induced the couple to go home and try again.

We are informed by Messrs. W. G. Irwin & Co., the agents of the Oceanic Steamship Company, that the "Zealandia" is to leave Port Los Angeles on February 15th, and will arrive in Honolulu on or about the 23rd. No bookings will be made for cabin passengers from Honolulu to San Francisco on that voyage of the "Zealandia;" accommodations, however, will be provided for steerage passengers.

**A Run Away.**

Early this morning there was a run-away on Queen street. A horse attached to a buggy driven by a woman became unmanageable, overturned the buggy, from which the driver was thrown out and ran at full speed along Queen with Lieutenant Leslie in pursuit. Near the Occidental Hotel Leslie caught hold of the bridle of the runaway and after a tug-of-war succeeded in quieting the horse and leading him to the police station. The driver, Mrs. Reid, was considerably injured, and was assisted by Captain Neilson of the S. N. Castle, who happened to be passing by the scene of disaster. The captain escorted the lady to a doctor where her injuries were attended to.

**His Last Appearance**

There was a good audience at Kaunskapii on Saturday when Papa Ita ten times walked across the hot stones prepared for him. The stage setting was excellent and the olioli of Hawaiians and the incantations of the old Tahitian added to the weird performance. In the audience were Queen Liliuokalani, Prince David, Judge Kalua and several Senators and Representatives elect and all watched the feat of Papa Ita with deep interest.

Papa Ita leaves for Hilo tomorrow to give an exhibition in the rainy city.

**Died from His Wounds.**

Kukums, the Soth Sea Islander, who was assaulted early on Saturday morning by some unknown person, and who was severely cut, died at the Queen's Hospital on Saturday afternoon. The following gentlemen were called upon to serve as a coroner's jury: G. C. Griffiths, W. E. Burnette, A. P. Taylor, Charles Spencer, A. G. Nicholas, and Mr. Jeffs. The jury viewed the body at the Hospital and adjourned until called by the coroner. The police authorities hope to be able to find the perpetrator of the dastardly deed.
