OPPOSITION TACTICS.

The organs of the "Independent Opposition" are very touchy if the methods of their party are explained to the native people.

For example, a placard calling a public meeting of the voters of Honolulu for Wednesday night at the Armory, has been made the pretext for a gross attack upon native voters and the native people generally.

We are not interested to know the banking account of any man for political purposes, and we do not think this is a matter which concerns any one but the individual and his creditors.

There is a great deal of point in this remark. In no other civilized community would the drainage of a public house and other buildings be permitted to be stored in a cesspool or well under the floor of a building occupied as a store and in a time past also as a dwelling, without any outlet whatever.

If the Opposition can prove malfeasance and misrule by the present Administration, as alleged, let them bring forward their proof; but vague assertion is not proof, and in the end it will only hurt the cause in whose behalf it is made.

ABOUT IMMIGRATION. We were in error yesterday in crediting the appropriation of \$36,000 for immigration, by the Legislature of 1868, to the recommendation of the Chamber of Commerce, conse-

quent upon Mr. Gibson's action in discussing the question before that body. This discussion took place four years later, in 1872. The error is simply on a matter of detail, however, because although the appropriation in question was recommended by King Kamehameha V., in his speech at the opening of the Legislature, the suggestion came from Mr. Gibson.

In April, 1868, Kamehameha V. paid a visit to the island of Lanai in his yacht Kamalii, and encamped at Honouliuli. Mr. Gibson was then engaged ranching on the island of Lanai, and as far as supplies for his retainers were concerned, the King was practically the guest of that gentleman.

The King, who was a statesman as well as a sovereign, was impressed with these suggestions, and on his return to Honolulu a few days afterwards he took effective measures to vitalize the ideas communicated to him. The Legislature met shortly afterwards, and in his opening speech to that body the King recommended an appropriation of \$36,000 for the promotion of immigration, which was made, but which remained unused for that purpose by the Government of the day.

ABOUT NUISANCES. Some time ago the ADVERTISER mentioned, as a typical nuisance, the cesspool in Fort street, under the floor of the premises occupied as a photographic gallery below the Keystone saloon.

Nothing as yet has been seen of Frank Corthell, the escaped prisoner. It is reported that he got away on the Alameda with the circus. A reward of \$300 has been offered for his capture, and his description and photograph has been sent to the Sheriff on the other islands.
